## Sisters of St. Joseph to Leave Powerview

Powerview said goodbye to the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Hyacinth last Sunday.

After mass celebrating the feast of the Pentecost in the Powerview Church basement, parishioners met with many of the nuns who had taught at the Powerview School over the last forty five years.

With hugs and the occasional tear, former students recognized and embraced favourite teachers. In a series of presentations, speaker after speaker thanked the order for their contribution to Powerview.

At the invitation of Father Gustave Couture of St. Theresa's parish in Pine Falls, four sisters arrived in 1948 to teach at "L'Ecole Leonard".

There were 171 students from grade one to eight. The closest church was St. Theresa's in Pine Falls.

Lucien LaRoche, former elementary school principal, and later vice principal of the whole complex, in thanking the sisters for their contribution, said that when they arrived in what is now Powerview was known then as "Tin Town" and "Bannock Town", and the terms were used rather disparagingly.

"As soon as the nuns arrived the whole town seemed to perk up" he said. "We were somebody".

By Christmas 1950, two years after their arrival, a church had been built and services were being held in what is now Notre Dame de Laus

church basement.

Two years later the Village of Powerview was incorporated.

Accepting presentations from the parishioners, the Knights of Columbus, the Ladies Auxiliary, and three students, The Provincial Superior Sister Patricia LaLiberte said "There are no good bye's without hello's, and no hello's without good byes - It's a part of life". She hoped that they will leave behind people who will carry on the work and commitment to the church, and pointed to the fact that the parish is being run by the parishioners without the assistance of a priest as evidence of some success in that regard.

## Mill Buy-Out Update

West Coast Energy made a presentation on cogeneration to Premier Gary Filmon and members of his cabinet last Friday.

Present at the meeting were Pine Falls management, Eileen Mercier, Abitibi Price Vice President-Finance, cabinet minister Darren Praznik (Minister of Labour), Jim Downey (Deputy Premier), Eric Stephanson (Minister of Industry, Trade and Tourism)

and officials from these government departments.

West Coast Energy is proposing the construction of a gas pipeline from White-mouth, through Hadashville, Pinawa, St. Georges and Powerview to Pine Falls to supply natural gas for a 350 megawatt generating facility which will supply more power to the Manitoba Hydro grid than the Great Falls, See Buy-out page 3.

## Madness and Mayhem at Grand Beach

Traditionally the first long weekend is a time when young people cut loose after the long confining winter. This results in parties, drinking and rowdy behaviour.

This year however, rowdy behaviour became violence.

According to Const. Randy Daley, of the Grand Marais R C M P detachment, the violence was caused by large gangs of youths, who, fuelled by alcohol, wreaked havoc everywhere.

Many of these youths are drinking in the campgrounds,

away from the watchful eye of adults.

A total ban on alcohol in the campground may work. A ban will eliminate underage drinking in the park. Again quoting Const. Randy Daley, "the underage drinker will be removed from the park, and therefore will have to do their drinking elsewhere. When they seek other places to camp and drink, enforcement will be easier, as there are no other campgrounds in the area."

Added to the problem with underage drinking were many assaults, one sexual assault, resulting in a 23 year old man being charged, and two men who were hospitalized with stab wounds. R C M P investigations are continuing.

Her remaining sons are Freddie, who resides in East St. Paul, and Jim who also resides in Grand Marais.

Carrie, when she first moved to the beach, worked for Wilks Cartage, which was then the beach transfer. She later worked for the old "Blondie's" Restaurant, on Grand Marais Blvd, then for Canadian News, during the time the beach was run by C N Rail.

Carrie was for 32 years, involved with commercial fishing on Lake Winnipeg. She resided for many years on Anderson Street, then Pinehurst Avenue, and for the past few years has resided on Victory Road. She is a bright, aware, and very nice lady, who still walks each day. We wish you all the best.

Beginning in 1948 with four sisters, the convent grew to sixteen teachers at one time. Today only three remain. The last teacher, Sister Claudette Robert will be leaving at the end of this school year, to take up teaching in a mission in Africa.

Sister Patricia LaLiberte said when it became impossible to find a replacement for sister Claudette, the order was forced into the reluctant decision to close the convent. She said it was not an easy decision.

Sister Claudette will be studying "Missiology" a brand new discipline covering missionary work, at St. Paul's University in Ottawa for a year and will then be moving to Moundou, in the Republic of Chad, about 8 degrees north of the equator.

**Activities in the Model  
 Forest**

In recent issues we have told you about the Model Forest program in a general sense. In this issue and issues to follow specific projects will be highlighted and explained to keep you up to date on all the Model Forest activities. This week the spotlight is on

**Forest Birds of  
 the Model Forest**

This is a joint project between the Canadian Wildlife Service, the Manitoba Forestry/Wildlife Management Project, Abitibi-Price, Silvitech Consulting and Wildlife Resource Consulting. The total cost of the project in 1993 is \$47,000.00 with the Model Forest program contributing \$25,000.00.

The intent of this project is to gather information on the kinds and numbers of birds in the forest, the habitat they use and to then determine how commercial use of the forest such as logging affects their kinds and numbers. With this kind of knowledge forest managers and biologists can modify logging practices to ensure that habitat is main-

tained and even enhanced. The forest of this area is a very complicated ecosystem and the health of the forests' birds is an indicator of how healthy our forest ecosystem really is.

To carry out this project sites will be selected and established in the forest on a permanent basis. From these sample sites information on the birds and their habitat will be collected. To determine and locate these sites accurately the researchers will use a new technology called Geographic Positioning Systems. These systems are devices that bounce signals off satellites to accurately determine any chosen location. Once the signals are locked into the GPS device the researchers will return to the Abitibi-Price office where they will download the

information into Abitibi's computer based geographic information system. Maps generated from computers pinpointing the exact location of the plots and locations of the birds in the forest can then be produced.

Once this information is obtained and mapped the researchers can begin the job of analyzing the information and drawing conclusions on the preference of different species of birds to different forest habitats. □
