## Walleye Classic A Success

### Low Attendance, but Great Fun

In spite of the disappointing number of entries, the Pine Falls International Walleye Classic was deemed a success by those who took part in the two day event held on the Thanksgiving weekend.

A total of 56 teams took part. The winning team, Alex Keszler, and Andrew Klopak took home a first prize of \$2100, plus trophies, with a catch of 44.75 lbs (for eight fish).

Very close behind was a local team, Don Powell of Pine Falls, and Ray Fawcett of Victoria Beach, with a catch of 44.55 lbs. Powell

and Fawcett were way out in front after the first day, with a total of 30.88 lbs compared with Keszler's 13 lbs, but on Sunday the situation was reversed. Keszler came from behind to steal first place. Powell also just missed out on the trophy for the biggest fish, at 11.4 lbs. The trophy was taken by a fish weighing in at 11.9 lbs - caught by Keszler.

"We really enjoyed ourselves" said Powell. "The fishing was good. The weather was good." He said the Pine Falls Walleye Classic would be-

come one of the best anywhere. "There's no reason why it shouldn't be." He said. "The fishing is great at this time of the year."

Organizer of the event, Dan Sernyk, said he thought the event went really well. "We had very good weather," he said. There were no hitches with the launching, and the live load weigh in went very smoothly." He said there were 56 teams that really enjoyed themselves and are looking forward to next year. ## Walter Whyte Students Raise Money in Terry Fox Run

Monday afternoon, September 20th, one hundred and fifteen students from Walter Whyte School, grades one, through nine took part in the annual Terry Fox run. The runners, with their R C M P escort, ran a total of two kilometres on Jackfish Lake Road. For some of the young children, the fact that Terry Fox died of cancer before they were even born, did not affect their enthusiasm to raise money in this way. Parents and community residents are justly proud of the efforts of these young people. The decision to hold the run, and the actual run itself all took place within a three day period. There was no time in which to collect pledges, so these young people brought their own money! A whopping one hundred and seven dollars and sixty five cents was raised (\$107.65)! This money, all in coin was attached to a four foot by eight foot Canadian map, showing the Trans Canada Highway. The route which Terry Fox ran, from Victoria to Thunder Bay was taped completely in silver coin, the rest of the route, from Thunder Bay to St. John, Newfoundland, was done with loonies. The impressive map, once completed, was presented to Colleen Plumton, Provincial Director of the Terry Fox Foundation of Winnipeg. The presentation made to Mrs. Plumton, by Kimberly Cooke, on behalf of all the students, took place in the school gym. The very enthusiastic student body was on hand to witness, and hear, as Mrs. Plumton gave a short history of the Terry Fox Foundation. Mrs. Plumton told the students that Terry Fox himself, through his own run, raised twenty four million dollars in aid of cancer research. Since that initial run, more than one hundred million dollars has been raised in order that the search for a cancer cure may continue. Mrs. Plumton presented the students of Walter Whyte School with a plaque which shows their involvement since 1987 in the raising of funds for the Foundation. This community should be proud of these students.....our citizens of tomorrow!

**Tragedy at Papineau's Point - A local Historical Moment**  
With author George Lalor

At almost the precise location where the Powerview dam joins the south shore of the Winnipeg River, a granite peninsula once jutted out into the mainstream of the river. Here, in 1949, a diver doing exploration work in preparation for the dam's construction found deep on the rocky stream bed a hand gun, sheathed in the remnants of a leather holster. Royal Canadian Mounted Police investigations regarding the weapon soon traced it back to a Royal North West Mounted Police trooper whose name was Ditch, and an incident of twenty-eight

years before.

At Papineau's point, named for its close proximity to Joe Papineau trading post, a powerful downstream current from the cataract of Pine Falls merged with an equally powerful backwash. The converging waters caused a whirlpool which because of a deceptive smooth and therefore innocent appearance, became a lethal trap for inexperienced canoeists. Into its jaws, one day in June of 1921, went Trooper Ditch.

Young Ditch had paddled his way downstream from his detachment's headquarters

at Lac du Bonnet, the purpose of his journey being a routine visit to the reserve at Fort Alexander. With him was another trooper whose name was Woodcox and Ditch's wife and eight month old son. Homeward bound, the two troopers and the woman and child made a carefree foursome; the patrol had gone well and the weather was fine. As the party approached the rapids at Pine Falls, Ditch decided to stop at the Papineau trading post to pay his respects to his French friends.

Their visit to the trading post over, the travellers were about to depart when Joe Papineau said to Ditch, "Don't try to make it around the point. The water is high today and the current very strong. It would be better for you to make a longer portage."

But young trooper Ditch was more accustomed to giving than to taking advice. He brushed aside the trader's warning with a laugh, boarded the little craft and guided his party straight in the direction of the merging waters. When he saw the whirlpool and heard its ominous roar, it was too late. The downstream current struck the canoe broadside, capsizing it, throwing its occupants into the river. Mrs. Ditch screamed as she saw her baby swept away.

Both troopers were able to cling to the canoe and, for a brief few seconds, Ditch held to his wife before she was torn from his grasp.

Hearing the woman's scream, Papineau and the others rushed from the trading post, launched a nearby boat and were able to save the two troopers. A search for Mrs. Ditch and the child began at once and, strangely, the youngster was found still alive in the shallow water below. Rushed to the home of Jean-Baptiste Chevreuil's by Trevor Wright a teacher from Leonard School, the little boy lived for several more hours before succumbing to pneumonia. The search for Mrs. Ditch proved fruitless and, two years later, Trooper Woodcox also died from a cause linked to the tragic experience.

Trooper Ditch's service revolver is, reportedly, now on display at the RCMP museum in Regina.

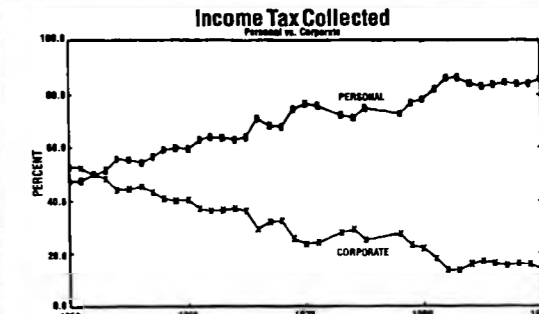

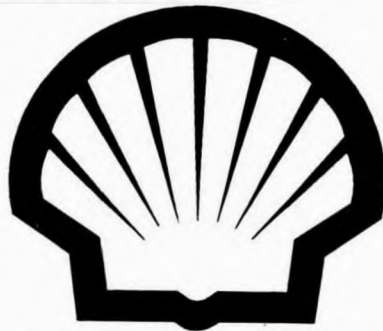
