## Happy New Year

### Dr. Siddal Retires After 43 Years Service to Community

Dr. Siddall's last working day at the Pine Falls Medical Clinic is Jan. 7/94. His retirement on this date also marks the desolvement of the long-standing Partnership of Drs. Siddall and Dr. Walia. Commencing on Saturday, Jan. 8/94, The name of the Medical Clinic changes to the BLUE WATER MEDICAL GROUP under the Partnership of Drs. Johann M. Kuschke, N. T. (Jaco) Van Der Walt and Lorinda Van Den Berg. Drs. J. S. Walia and Dr. Daniel Rens will continue to practice at the Clinic until a later date. The present Clinic office staff will all be continuing their employment with the new Blue Water Medical Group.

DR. EDWARD SIDDALL, known to most everyone affectionately as just "Ted", graduated from University of Manitoba in 1949 as a fully qualified M.D. At the completion of his Internship at the Wpg. General Hospital, which is now the Health Sciences Centre, Dr. Siddall was hired to practice in Pine Falls by Dr. K. I. Johnson in 1950. "Ted married his sweetheart,

June Anderson, and Ted and June settled down in Pine Falls. They have raised a family of three children, a daughter, Elaine, and sons Bill and Jim.

Drs. Siddall and Johnson practiced together until Dr. Johnson retired from active medical practice in 1964, at which time, Dr. Siddall became owner of his own practice. 1964 also saw the original enlargement of the Pine Falls Hospital and the Medical Office was moved from the corner of the old white building into the basement of the new addition. In 1966 the Government amalgamated the First Nations peoples into the medical system with everyone else by closing down the Indian Hospital in conjunction with the enlargement of the General Hospital. Dr. Pitamber Geer, who had been employed with the Dept. of Indian Affairs, joined Dr. Siddall in his General Practice.

Dr. Jagdish S. Walia joined the Pine Falls practice in Jan. 1967. Dr. Walia completed his medical degrees, including post surgical studies in Edinburgh, Scotland - obtaining the degrees of L.R.C.P., L.R.F.P.S. and last

but not least, his F.R.C.S. from the Royal College of Surgeons (Edinburgh) in 1953. Dr. Walia practiced in England, Uganda, East Africa and came to Canada in Dec. 1966.

Dr. Siddall, Dr. Geer and Dr. Walia formed an equal Partnership under the name of the Pine Falls Medical Clinic in 1972. Unfortunately and sadly Dr. Geer suffered a fatal heart attack in 1980, leaving Dr. Siddall and Walia as the Partners of the Pine Falls Medical Clinic. Since that time, there have been many Physicians who have come to practice for a brief time in our community. Of the Physicians, Dr. Michael Meckin remained the longest having come from England in 1982 and leaving to practice in British Columbia in Sept. 1992.

Although these younger Physicians came for a spell and left for "greener pastures", Dr. Siddall remained a faithful and devoted family physician in our Community for 43 years. Dr. Walia's long service and devotion to our medical health is also recognized. Dr. Walia celebrated his 25 years in Canada and our Community in Dec. 1992.

Chairman of the Workplace Health and Safety Committee by Minister of Labour Darren Praznik and Abitibi Safety Officer Alain Majeau.

Majeau congratulated the assembled employees on their achievement especially during a difficult transition to changes in operating methods and "always dangerous working conditions"

"But one thing is more important than any record," he said, "that is, you go home after a days work in one piece." Majeau said the safety theme for 1994 would be "I am my brother keeper." He said it would not be new to the Woods Department.

Praznik said the record

was quite an achievement considering the logging industry has one of the highest Workers Compensation claim rates. "Pine Falls has proven that you can have a safe woodlands operation." He said.

Mill Manager Fern Pitre said. "What Mario Lemeix and Wayne Gretskey are to hockey you are to safety. You can compare yourselves to any in the industry. You are working in a dangerous environment," he said, "and can't relax for a moment. - Keep it up."

Individual employees also received recognition for personal safety records with Mike Rachuk being recognised for 36 years without a lost time accident.

# International Year of the Family 1994

Across the world, the family unit is the social cement that binds together societies. In recognition of the importance of families, the United Nations has designed 1994 as the International Year of the Family. During the coming year, communities and organizations will be staging events which honour and recognize the family as an institution of economic and social stability.

There are many assumptions about what constitutes a family which could be any of a multitude of combinations. For example, one assumption is that a family is a unit of people who are in a state of independence - such that a change in the behaviour of one member affects the behaviour of the other members.

Certainly, though, the traditionally perceived structure of the family in the western world is changing, to accommodate economic and social realities of the late 20th century. The 1991 Canadian Census, for example, revealed some interesting facts about families in this country.

There are 7.4 million families in Canada. The average size of Canadian families was 3.1 persons, compared to 3.7 persons in 1971. Only one per cent of families with dependent children have five or more children living at home, compared with 10 per cent 20 years earlier.

The single parent family is the fastest growing family type. Most of these families (82 per cent) had female single parents - the result of marriage break-ups and an increasing incidence of never-married mothers.

Despite an apparent change in structure over the past few decades, the family remains an important component of society. The family is an important socializing force through which society's ethics and values are transmitted. The family is also an important economic component of society, whether it be running a family farm or heading a major corporation.

Consequently, when the cohesiveness of a family is threatened, the cohesiveness of society as a whole is threatened.

The International Year of the Family is intended to highlight ways of strengthening the family unit across the world. That objective is no better expressed than in the United Nations Guidelines for the Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency which provide that, "Every society should place a high priority on the needs and well-being of the family and of all its members."



## Notice of Public Hearing

### THE MANITOBA PUBLIC INSURANCE CORPORATION

**APPLICATION:** The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the "Corporation") has requested that The Public Utilities Board (the "Board") review its Order No. 162/93 so as to leave unchanged the standard rates for motorcycles and trailers for 1994, at the same level as 1993, with a view to the rates being revisited for 1995.

The application is made pursuant to *The Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act and The Public Utilities Board Act*.

**BACKGROUND:** The Board, following full public hearings to consider the Corporation's application for insurance rates for the 1994 insurance year, issued its decision as set out in Order No. 162/93 dated November 24, 1993. In its decision the Board increased the rates applied for by the Corporation for motorcycle and trailer major insurance use categories by 15% and 7.5% respectively. The Board in its Order gave the following reasons for this decision "...the principles of actuarially determined and statistically driven rates may be violated by the Corporation's failure to reflect indicated rate adjustments for major insurance uses in its rate design".

Using the Corporation's financial forecast and actuarial approaches the rate increases required for motorcycles and trailers amounts to approximately 100% and 42% respectively.

**PUBLIC HEARING:** The Board will hold a public hearing in respect of motorcycle and trailer rates commencing January 14, 1994 at 9:00 a.m. and continuing as necessary at the Bavarian Ballroom - B and C, Mezzanine Floor, Days Inn Marlborough Winnipeg, 331 Smith Street, Winnipeg, Manitoba. Presenters will be heard commencing at 9:00 a.m., January 14, 1994.

**SCOPE OF HEARING:** Interveners and presenters are advised that the Hearing will be limited to presentations relative to the rates proposed for motorcycles and trailers based on existing classifications and coverages as presented in the Corporation's amended Application filed July 29, 1993. The evidence filed at the October hearings will be incorporated into this proceeding and is available for inspection at the office of the Board or the Corporation.

The Board may restrict the time allocated to individual presenters and interveners in order to complete the hearing within a reasonable time frame.

**PROCEDURE:** The Board has adopted Draft Rules of Practice and Procedure which will apply to the conduct of the General Rate Hearing. Copies of this document are available upon request to the Board by writing to the Secretary or by calling 945-2638 (Winnipeg).

However, as timing is of the essence, the Board may exercise its discretion as set out in paragraph 4 of its Draft Rules of Practice and Procedure which state:

- (1) In any proceeding, the Board may issue directions on procedure which will govern the conduct of that proceeding and will prevail over any provision of these Rules that is inconsistent with those directions.
- (2) The Board may recommend that interveners with similar interests present a joint intervention.
