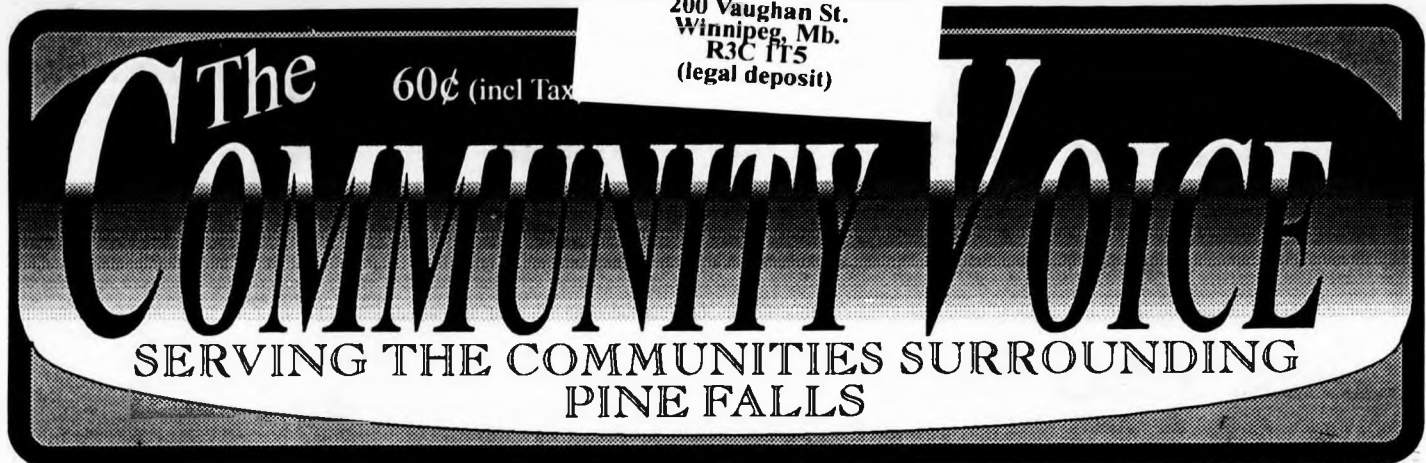

Chemical Spill Evokes Sagkeeng Water Scare

Health and Welfare Canada Advises Band to Shut Down Water Supply

Residents of Sagkeeng First Nation received a scare Monday, when Health and Welfare Canada advised the Band to shut down water supplies in order to protect themselves from any harmful effects of a chemical spill at the Abitibi Mill in Pine Falls.

On Friday at about 6:30 p.m. 828 kg. of Busan 52, a micro-biocide used to control bacteria and slime growth, was spilled on the basement floor of the mill and flowed into the sewer system. On contacting Buckman Laboratories, the manufacturer of the chemical, the mill was advised that the impact on the river would be negligible. As a result the mill deemed the incident a minor spill, and followed the corresponding reporting practices. Government officials were notified on the next working day, Monday March 14.

Federal officials took the spill more seriously. Peter Rogers of Health and Welfare Canada said that in cases like these, with the health of populations involved, you must take all possibilities into consideration. "We would not be doing our duties if we didn't

assume the worst." He said. "We have to be the proponent for health of the residents of Fort Alexander."

Another Official, Terry Youmans of Environment Canada agreed with Roger's position. "Apparently the chemical is fairly readily broken down. We have to find out if this is just a spit in a bucket." He said. "Until we have more information, it is best to err on the side of caution."

Health and Welfare Canada took samples of the river water downstream of the mill to test for the chemical. Rogers said he couldn't be sure about when the test results would be available but advised that residents of Sagkeeng continue to get their water from alternate sources.

The feeling at the mill is that the whole thing was blown out of proportion. Environmental Superintendent Kevin Allan said that every indication they have shows the chemical to be virtually harmless. "(Busan 52) biodegrades quickly. Any problem that would have existed would be gone by now, so reacting to it

this way so long after the fact makes no sense to me." Allan said.

Sagkeeng shut down their water supply and began trucking water in from the pumphouse in Pine Falls. They are also shipping in bottled water with the assistance of emergency funding from Indian Affairs.

Band Council Member Richard Bruyere couldn't understand why it took so long for the band to be informed of the spill. "The spill happened on Friday, and they didn't tell us until (Monday) at around 3:00 p.m." He said. He was concerned about the effects of the chemical (which he described as highly toxic and corrosive) that could have occurred over the weekend before anyone knew about it.

According to a letter issued by Interim Mill Manager Gerry Murray to the employees of the mill, the spill occurred while transferring the Busan 52 from its shipping container to the mill's holding tank. Because of improperly followed procedures, a transfer hose disconnected and caused the chemical to spill

onto the basement floor of the mill. The employee involved has been disciplined for his mistake.

In an interview with Tom Johnstone Senior Vice President of Buckman Laboratories in Montreal, The Community Voice learned the following information about Busan 52;

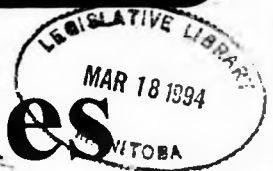
Busan 52 is a microbiocide used in the pulp and paper industry to control the growth of bacteria, fungi, and slime. It is an organic sulphur compound - a dithiocarbamate. It has been approved by Health and Welfare Canada for use in the manufacture of paper and paperboard which comes into contact with food. It's toxicity is about one third that of caffeine and approximately one and a half times that of Aspirin.

Busan 52 is biodegrad-

able, and breaks down in the environment very rapidly. By the time the water treatment plants were closed down Tuesday morning levels of Busan 52 in the Winnipeg River were probably undetectable. Because of its rapid breakdown it does not end up in the food chain.

Johnstone is quite confident that there will be little if any harmful effects from the spill. "The dilution factor is such that it would not have any environmental damage." He also said that because of Busan 52's biodegradability it would not get into the fish.

He did however, stress that this sort of thing be taken seriously. "Agriculture Canada and Environment Canada will be checking for residual levels. Nobody believes there is any problem, but when it comes to spills like this you have to make sure public fears are eased."

Proposed Electoral Federal Boundry Changes Comment:

Representation by population is the goal of the Federal Electoral Boundaries Commission, headed by Justice Charles Huband and his committee of two. The Commission will have achieved this goal if indeed the boundaries remain as they are drawn. The fourteen federal seats have been split with eight of the fourteen seats in urban Winnipeg, the remaining six rural. A close check of the population of each riding shows Winnipeg Transcona with the greatest at 80,872, and Churchill with the smallest at 73,486.

The proposed Churchill riding covers the northern two thirds of the entire province. The south boundary begins at the 53rd parallel on the west boundary, then crosses both Lakes Manitoba and Winnipeg, to the east of Lake Winnipeg, down the eastern shore of Lake Winnipeg to a point just north of the 50th parallel, thence straight across to the eastern border with Ontario.

Residents of a large portion of the L G D of Alexander, as well as Fort Alexander, will become part of Churchill

riding. What is ludicrous is the fact that residents of the extreme north Dauphin-Swan River or Selkirk Interlake ridings who are several hundred miles farther north, will be called a southern riding, while residents of a "northern" riding reside barely 60 miles north of Winnipeg. One wonders if since we may now be part of this northern riding, we will be eligible for a northern living allowance?

By far the largest concern however, is not any northern allowance, but how a representative in office can effectively keep in touch with his/her constituents. Having two or three constituency offices would of course help, but is not the complete answer. Representation by population may be the ultimate goal, but please, a little common sense.
