Tragic Accident on HWY 304

A cyclist was fatally injured in a motor vehicle accident on Highway 304, at around 3:00 pm last Saturday, June 11.

Accompanied by his wife driving a van, Dauphin doctor Jan Liebenberg, 29, a keen cyclist, was travelling by bicycle from Dauphin to visit friends in Pine Falls.

With the van in front, and Dr. Liebenberg behind, the couple had just passed the road to Stead when they were

hit from behind by a semi tractor trailer unit travelling in the same direction. Dr. Liebenberg was fatally injured, and both vehicles caught fire. Mrs. Liebenberg, who is four months pregnant with their first child, was treated in hospital and released. The driver of the semi trailer was unhurt.

Dr. Liebenberg, who is from South Africa, had spent most of his professional career in Namibia, and had been in Dauphin for two years. He

was a long time friend of Dr. van der Walt of the Blue Water Medical Clinic in Pine Falls.

Dr. Kuschke, who had known Dr. Liebenberg for two years said he was cycling from Dauphin to visit his friends at the Pine Falls clinic. He said he always took a long cycling trip around his birthday which would have been next week.

Mrs. Liebenberg, who has no relatives here, will be returning to her family in South Africa.

Part way through the program, Chief Jerry Fontaine presented Ms. Aglukark with a painting done by a local artist very aptly titled, "The Gathering." Young Sabrina Twoheart presented Ms. Aglukark with a huge bouquet of flowers.

Aglukark spoke very softly, and was often very hard to hear, a fault which perhaps lay more with the sound personnel, rather than Aglukark, but even with that little inconvenience, the concert was

more than worth seeing.

The evening got off to a flying start with the heart stirring singing and drumming of the White Eagle Singers. Chief Jerry Fontaine followed as he spoke briefly welcoming everyone to the concert. Mr. George Munro was the very able MC for the evening. He handled his duties very well as he thanked all who gave so generously of their time in the organization of this event. He had special thanks for the boys from the Al Care Centre who did the set up, and take down.

The opening act was "Darrell Phillips and Company," a local quartet. These guys were great! The quartet comprises, lead Darrell Phillips, tenor Kim Wilson, baritone Joel Lamoureux, and bass Rubin Batke. They sang "Ride On King Jesus," "Yah Weh," an Aboriginal lullaby, and the final was a medley of gospel songs including, "Will the Circle Be Unbroken," "I Saw the Light," and "I'll Fly Away." Santini Centre Stage in Theatre of the Mind

Steve Santini is a very impressive young man. Certainly he impressed me. I don't believe in magic as such, it is all illusion... but on Wednesday afternoon, June 8th, I saw some simple acts at the Birchwood Hotel which made me a convert.

The first thing he did was a psychic trick involving a dozen white cards, with black squares on the face, a dozen white cards with black X's on the face. It appeared simple enough... split the cards evenly, shuffle our respective cards, then I placed mine in random fashion face down. Santini watched, then placed his face up, asking me to turn the cards over. As I did, I watched in amazement as one by one the cards all turned up matching the card I had placed down!

It was time for Steve Santini to do what he had intended to do... drive blindfolded down the road at the Birchwood, using human pylons on a slalom course. The pylons were Reeve Ken Danwich, Councilor Bruce Anderson, Constable Dave

Sparrow of the Powerview RCMP detachment, Birchwood owner Monty Vialoux, and LGD's special Summer Constable Brad Patzer.

Everything was in readiness. Santini taped coins over his eyes, then had three fabric blindfolds placed on his head. He was led out to the parking lot, placed in a strange car (belonging to Reeve Danwich) and with an assistant in tow started up the car. The assistant, Onalee Anderson, had been told NOT to utter one word, even if it appeared they were headed for an object.

After some intense revving of the engine, the car began to move. Santini passed by, wearing the blindfold, he moved slowly and safely past the first pylon, then the second, the third, at the fourth, which was Constable Sparrow, he brushed dangerously close, but continued on past the fifth obstacle. The car stopped and everyone breathed again.

It was a fabulous stunt, unless of course you were one of the pylons.

Back inside the hotel, with some cool stabilizing liq-

uid (it was iced tea... I swear) Santini began to show us more. He asked for some spoons (he insisted he doesn't get invited for dinner because of the next feat of skill performed,) and a towel. Placing a stainless steel spoon inside the towel, he asked Lori Vialoux to tell him what the spoon was made of. She did, and he told her it was plastic. He then began to stroke the spoon, and as Lori said 'plastic' over and over, the spoon bent. Santini looked at the spoon with an awesome intensity and the spoon fell over completely, then the spoon fell away from the handle.

Steve Santini is a performer. He is also a regular guy, and likes to be regarded as a regular guy. He says people are afraid of him, and often exhibit their fears openly. He insists fears are unfounded. Santini was born in Toronto thirty years ago. He became interested in magic and illusion at the tender age of twelve. He met Peter Reveen when he was twelve, and began a friendship with Reveen which has endured over time.

He began his career at a young age as an escape artist.

He escaped from handcuffs and now has quite a collection of cuffs which people have over the years, asked him to escape from. When he was twenty two, he had an accident, and he was underwater for five minutes. The compartment from which he was supposed to escape had rusted, and he was unable to release the lid. He had to be revived, but says he began to have premonitions and psychic dreams afterward, attributing this to the accident.

Santini says that all he has done is develop more of his mind than the usual person. He believes we could all use more of the ninety percent of the mind we now do not use. He himself has developed a method of hypnosis using video mind pictures. He says it is easy and successful. He uses hypnosis as part of his act.

Santini says he feels great when everything goes right. He has studied psychology for four years, and seems to have an uncanny way of reading a person. He didn't inspire any fear in me, just a lot of interest. I was struck by the intensity of his deep brown eyes before the parking lot stunt, and the softness of his eyes after he had done it. I don't know if Steve Santini uses some form of kinetic energy, or if what he does borders on the paranormal, but I know for sure, he is well worth watching.

Santini and his agent, Dave LeBlanc will also be in Powerview at the Papertown

on June 17th, then again on the 18th. He will be at the Birchwood on June 17th and 18th. He has a group of friends and motor over to the Birchwood for some great entertainment.

The International Peace Garden Inc. is made up of representatives of all the Groups from both the United States and Canada that have, and continue to participate in the building and the maintenance of the International Peace Garden.

The International Peace Garden is located near the geographical centre of North America, and straddles the U.S.A. and Canadian border a few miles north of Dunsineth, North Dakota and a few miles south of Boissevan, Man. on highway # 10. The Motto of the International Peace Garden is "A LIVING SYMBOL OF GOODWILL". The International Peace Garden is truly a beautiful place in the summer, a place that every

Canadian and American should try to visit at least once. The actual borderline between our two Countries is marked in the Garden by two Peace Towers which pays tribute to the peaceful co-existence between our two Countries. There is a large beautiful floral clock which is usually picture perfect, planted with flowers that grow in both our Countries. There is many picnic spots within the Garden. The Order of the Eastern Star have built a beautiful chapel within the Garden. Infrastructure Program Approved for LGD

Provencher M.P. David Ifody Lac Du Bonnet M.L.A. Darren Praznik announced Friday that a \$105,000 project to develop a truck haul sewage lagoon in the L.G.D. of Alexander has been approved under the Infrastructure Works Program. The project is funded equally by the Federal, Provincial and Municipal governments.

"The program will accelerate economic recovery by creating short and long term

employment through investment in local communities while meeting the well-documented needs of renewing and enhancing the physical infrastructure in local communities," said local M.P. David Ifody.

Local MLA Darren Praznik, whose constituency includes the L.G.D. of Alexander, noted that this project would increase local construction industry employment while developing an important municipal asset.

These approvals were part of the fourth round of recommendations made by a committee which includes representatives from the Manitoba Association of Urban Municipalities and the Union of Manitoba Municipalities.

The Infrastructure Works Program will see as much as \$205 Million invested in Manitoba by the Federal, Provincial and Municipal governments over the next two years to improve public facilities and create jobs.

of their music had an environmental message. Such songs as "Walking on Sacred Ground," "Listen to the Wind," and others. Westwood surprised the audience by launching into a short speech about the perils of alcohol and drugs. He poured a bottle of whiskey, (he called it "crap") onto the floor. The audience cheered!

The concert was held as a fund raiser for the upcoming Residential School Healing Conference which is slated for the Fall of 1994. Off Road Vehicles Act

Now that it is summer time, there will be an increase in persons operating off-road vehicles. The Powerview Detachment would like to remind citizens the rules of operating such equipment.

1. Off-road vehicles must be registered and insured for liability.
2. Licence plate must be affixed.
3. Upon request of a police officer, the operator must advise who the owner of the vehicle is.
4. Off-road vehicle must have the proper equipment - headlight, tail light, muffler, spark arrester and must pass the safety standards.
5. No person under 14 years of age may operate an off-road vehicle unless accompanied and supervised by a

parent or a person of 18 yrs. who is designated by the parent.

6. The owner cannot permit anyone under 14 years of age to operate a vehicle unless the owner is the parent of that child or has been designated by the parent of that child.

7. No passenger is allowed unless off-road vehicle is designated for same.

8. Helmets must be worn.

9. Operator must drive: with due care and attention; reasonable consideration for others and their property; not on private property unless with permission; not within 30 meters of dwellings between midnight and 7:00 a.m. and not on a parking lot or any portion of a highway including the shoulder.

10. When crossing a

highway, the operator must stop, have a clear view of crossing, wait for the other vehicular traffic to pass, cross at a 90 degree angle, and hold a valid driver's licence.

11. Owner of an off-road vehicle is responsible for any offenses committed by the operator.

12. All accidents with damage over \$500.00, personal injury or death must be reported to police as soon as possible.

With the cooperation of the owners and operators of these vehicles respecting other people and other people's property, we will have a safe and fun summer.

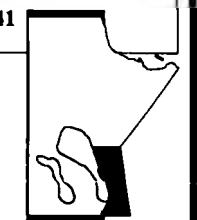

THE MANITOBA PUBLIC INSURANCE CORPORATION
APPLICATION: The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the "Corporation") has applied to The Public Utilities Board (the "Board") for approval of the Corporation's 1995 rate bases and premiums charged with respect to compulsory driver and vehicle insurance. The application is being filed pursuant to The Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act and The Public Utilities Board Act.

RATE IMPACT: The Corporation is requesting approval for basic Autopac rates effective March 1, 1995. Together with modifications to vehicle classification systems and other Autopac program components, as established by the Corporation, the proposed rate adjustments represent an overall average decrease in basic Autopac vehicle premiums of 0.6%. This represents a revenue decrease of about \$2 million.

The following average premium adjustments are being applied for:

Private passenger vehicles	-0.3%
Commercial vehicles	-4.0%
Public vehicles	-0.5%
Motorcycles	+6.5%
Trailers	+7.5%

The actual change in individual premiums may vary depending on the owner's claims experience, driving record, insurance use, territory and vehicle rate group.

No changes are requested for driver licence premiums or service and transaction fees. On July 1, 1995, time payment fees are proposed to change from the current \$14 to a fee consisting of a fixed \$4 for administration plus a variable charge based on the amount financed, the financing period and the prevailing interest rate, calculated at the prime rate plus 2%. Also on July 1, 1995, it is proposed that the method used to calculate insurance premiums upon purchase or cancellation of coverage be changed from a monthly to a daily prorationing system.

The overall impact of rate adjustments on the total vehicle population will be as follows:

- 83.7% of vehicles will receive either no change in rates or decreases ranging from \$1 to \$100;
- 13.9% of vehicles will receive increases of less than \$10;
- 1.9% of vehicles will receive increases ranging from \$10 to \$30;
- 0.5% of vehicles will receive increases ranging from \$30 to \$90.

 tive of its origin. We propose the following points as compelling goals of education gleaned from Baha'i Writings: 1. The realization that it is chiefly service to humanity and dedication to the unification of mankind that unlock individual capacity and release creative powers latent in human nature. 2. 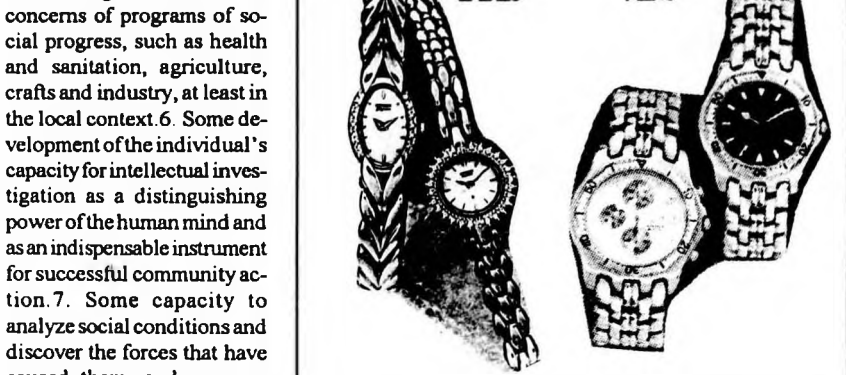
Indian Reserve some time between the 9th and 11th of June. The tools were kept in a grey plastic tool box which was also stolen.
