Two Drown in Winnipeg River

Heroic Rescue Attempt Ends in Tragedy

A Sagkeeng family's fishing afternoon ended in tragedy July 1.

An eight year old youngster, on a rock close to the river's edge immediately behind Lucy's Beauty Shop, accidentally slipped into the river. His stepfather, twenty year old

Kyle Courchene, a non swimmer, immediately plunged in after him - into eight feet of water. He did not re-emerge. Another youngster ran up the river bank for help. David Sinclair responded. He swam out to the boy, who was lying face down in the water, and

brought him to shore. Sinclair gave him CPR until the ambulance arrived, but the boy was pronounced dead on arrival at the Pine Falls hospital.

Kyle Courchene's body was recovered by the RCMP about an hour and a half later.

Three Hospitalized After Manigotagan Brawl

Four visitors to Manigotagan got into a dispute in the North Star Hotel early Sunday morning which resulted in one having a beer bottle broken over his head and two others being stabbed. All three were taken by ambulance

to the Pine Falls hospital. The severity of the wounds is not known.

The dispute became violent when one man hit another over the head with a beer bottle, breaking the bottle in the process. The injured man's companion ran outside the

hotel and returned with a knife. In the ensuing melee, one man received a badly cut thumb, and the other three stab wounds, at least one of them to the chest.

At press time no charges had been laid. The RCMP are continuing with the investigation.

The winner is the first tic to reach the edge of the circle. Tics are not marked, owners are responsible for keeping track of their own.

The tic owned by J.R. Barker was an easy winner. Rhonda Hardisty's tic beat out

Delores Boulette's in a close race for second place. The fourth tic did not seem to understand the purpose of the contest and was still wandering around the circle long after the other three tics were safely back in their containers.

About \$200 was raised by the sale of pies for the annual pie throwing contest. Actually no contest, and no throwing. Pies are squashed into the faces of the Mayor and Council, and Council employees, thus avoiding any possibility of missing.

John Deer and Rudy Simard of Manigotagan won the annual canoe race.

A fun filled day of events, mostly for children, ended with fireworks after dark.

Northern Lights Artisans Sale in Vic. Beach a Success

In an atmosphere humid, and crackling they came. By bicycle, truck, car and on foot they came. The Northern Lights Artisans Arts and Crafts Sale in Victoria Beach Sports Club on Pine Road held another block buster event on Sunday, July 3, 1993. As usual, the building was filled to capacity before the official eleven A.M. opening.

There were many artists and artisans visible.....all displaying beautiful wares, but

the first place I headed was the Nancy Lou Ateah art booth. Nancy does wonderful work.....I gawked and gaped, oohhed and aahhed, then purchased what I could afford, talked to Nancy for a few moments...she said she is doing well, and very much enjoying the show circuit. Her booth is always one of the busiest. Then it was on to the next.

The next display to catch my untrained eye was Fiddler's Green. Merrilee Green, a former school teacher in Charleswood, does some very intricate wood carving. Her loons are very finely carved, one in particular showing a young loon on its back, each feather delicately carved into the form. She told me that particular loon was a special order for a woman in the north.

Green also showed me North Wind Spirits made from Manitoba quaking aspen bark. This was an almost whimsical, though lovely idea in the use of bark. Green said she has won several North American championships with her wood carving. I can certainly believe that....they were simply charming. Green's husband Rick makes all the beautiful clocks which were on display. He also made the delightful toy train made entirely from Manitoba Red Pine. The engine, cars and even the track were all carved from wood. This year they have added some buildings to the little "village."

Mrs. Green's daughter, Karen, is certainly keeping up with the "crafting" in the fam-

ily. She had a display of her own featuring wonderful sparkly candles made from beeswax. The beeswax comes in sheets which when heated with a hair dryer become pliable. The crafter than cuts and rolls the beeswax into candles. The warm candles are then rolled in the 'sparkles.' This was a pretty and very unique product.

Next stop was another artist with watercolor paintings. Suzanne Wiebe from Steinbach. Suzanne displayed some spectacular florals which caught the eye with their vibrance and movement. Suzanne likes to do work close to nature, and often uses music to set the mood for her painting.

My imagination was caught by a display of baskets....Brigitte Weber had baskets of varying sizes from rather large to one not much bigger than a thimble! Brigitte told me that she has been working with commercial rattan reed, rushes, dogwood and hazel wood for quite a few years. She started doing basketry after taking a course from Louise Tully of Winnipeg's Craft Guild. Only natural materials are used, and the finished product is beautiful. Brigitte is offering courses in basketry for both children and adults. (Dates and times at conclusion of feature.)

The booth manned by Grant and Shirley Boulden of Belair was next on the list. This was a very colorful booth, as the display consisted of fascinating little finger puppets, plastic canvas items, hand

knitted sweaters and things. It too was a busy place with lots going for it.

Zedworks booth was a beehive of activity. One almost had to wait in line in order to even see what the display was all about. However the wait was more than worth it. Here was a myriad of wonderful color, every hue, shade and nuance. I could have stayed there most of the afternoon except for the crowd of people also pushing to see. Here was jewelry by Zena Boyes of the most delicate design and color. I saw Indian glass, exquisite Chinese porcelain earrings, Japanese decal beads and African ceramics. So lovely!

Another interesting display was from Carol Eggie who showed darling little mice and pigs. Carol began crafting after a job layoff in 1986. She says the crafting has more or less taken over her house. Words echoed by many crafters!

Besides being a nice play on words....Pam Cott, of Cott-On Works had a terrific display of hand crocheted items, not the least of which was a cotton nightgown with distinctive hand crocheted bodices.

Carol Pucci Pottery has, without a doubt some of the most intricately crafted pieces I've ever seen. She has pottery for every kitchen, in many colors and designs. She has some very delicately crafted candle lanterns, also in many colors and patterns. They were truly a feast for the eye.....and not expensive either.

A quick stop at Prairie Pillows rounded out my visits. Bev and Ken Grieve operate this booth. Bev began with hand quilted pillows, than found herself involved with the St. Norbert Farmers Market. She expanded her operation then and now has been in the crafting business of beautiful, decorative and functional pillows for five years.

Ken does the woodwork, making shadow boxes and other wooden items. He also does special order work. This enterprising couple do very well also, which was evidenced by the many people buying their superior product.

Unfortunately it was terribly warm in the building,

partly due to the temperature, the numbers of people in the building, and the terrifically high humidity. Black clouds were building up in the western skies, so it seemed like a good time to leave, even though there were displays that time, and the oppressive heat prevented me from visiting....there's always next year. It was as always though a great sale.

If you missed the Victoria Beach Northern Lights Artisan Art and Crafts sale, you can take in the next Craft show at Portage Place, September 19th to 24th. Watch the newspapers for times.....this is a great way to do Christmas shopping and it doesn't hurt as much as trying to do it all in December when the hydro bill is out of sight, January is fast approaching, Autopac, not to mention the big time Christmas (isn't that a naughty word in July?) bills.

Now for the news of Brigitte Weber's basketry classes for beginner children and adults. The children's classes will be held on Fridays, July 15th, 22nd...and August 12th, and 19th, from the hours of ten in the morning to twelve noon.

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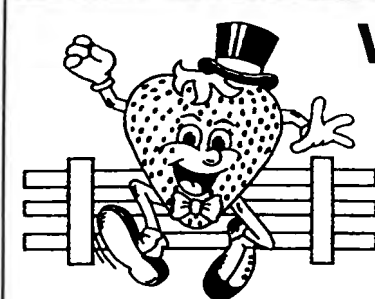
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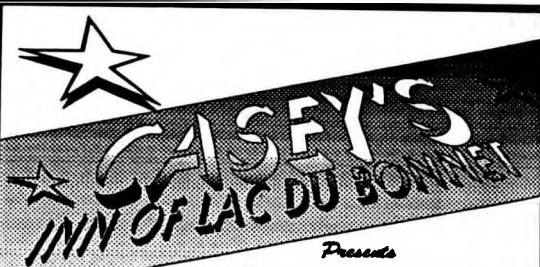
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Grad Issue Errors & Omissions

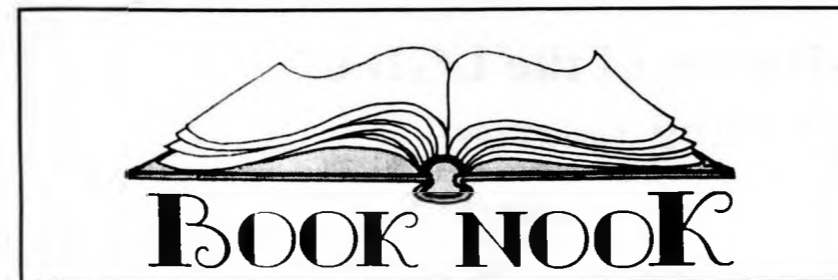

RCMP Report

On June 21, 1994 a vacant house near the Teacherage in Little Black River Indian Reserve burnt to the ground. Foul play is suspected and investigation is continuing.

June 21, at 1705 hours it was reported to police that the Catholic Church in the Fort Alexander Indian Reserve was on fire. As a result of the fire there was severe structural damage. The matter is under investigation.

On June 24th, it was reported to Police that several signs were painted and as well several roads in the Pine Falls, Powerview area were spray painted with graffiti. The matter is under Police investigation.

On June 26th, two reported thefts occurred at English Lake. One cottage owner reported his 15 foot Peterborough aluminium boat stolen, and another cottage owner reported his 15 horse power Johnson outboard stolen along with two oars. Police are investigating.

On June 27th, it was reported to police that two rims and tires were taken from a Chevy van, and two rims and tires were taken off a Ford van at Eagle Aviation. A Jack-Haul was used and one van received minor damage.

Police are investigating the break and enter to eleven of the teachers residence in Hollow Water Indian Reserve.

Just a reminder that bicycles have been recovered by police and are being kept at the RCMP office.

RCMP Powerview report a double drowning on the Winnipeg River at the Fort Alexander Indian Reserve. Kyle Burton Courchene, 20 years old, of the Fort Alexander Indian Reserve, drowned as a result of trying to rescue his 8 year old son who had fallen into the water. Both were fishing at the time on a cliff when the incident happened. The body of the boy was recovered at the scene almost immediately and the body of Courchene was recovered approximately 1 1/2 hours later by RCMP members.

On July 3rd, at a little after midnight, it was reported to police that a fight broke out at the North Star Hotel in Manigotagan. As a result, two people were stabbed with a knife and another hit on the head with a beer bottle. All were hospitalized. Police are continuing with investigation.
