Buffy Sainte Marie Coming to Sagkeeng

"Bawigiwin" From the first two syllables comes the word "Pow Wow". A long time ago, a man in the East had a dream. He dreamed that all the people had come together in friendship. His elders said let's make this dream a reality. And so the Pow Wow was born, meaning dream, and being a gathering for people to come together and make friends.

This weekend Sagkeeng will be hosting the biggest gathering ever in Manitoba, and one of the biggest ever in North America. Don Marks, of Native Multi Media Productions, and one of the organisers of the entertainment for the event said the planning began more than a year ago -

"and just exploded, and now we've got this huge, huge show."

A jam packed program, beginning with a parade at 10:00 am on Wednesday to the closing ceremonies on Sunday evening will have something for every one of the up to 20,000 people Sagkeeng is hoping will join them in their celebration.

There will be children's games and story telling, an attempt to make the worlds biggest bannock, a \$60,000 bingo, symposiums and workshops, slo-pitch and lacrosse, birchbark biting, wild rice processing, soapstone carving, aboriginal art displays, helicopter rides and mud bogging. (A complete schedule

can be found in the Pine Falls Service Centre ad on Page 3).

There will also be an impressive line up of entertainers on the main stage in the Sagkeeng Multiplex every evening, culminating with Buffy Sainte Marie on Saturday evening.

Buffy Sainte Marie is a Cree from Saskatchewan, who was raised in Maine. She has been in the Vanguard of Indian folk music for many years. Frank Sinatra's gold record, "Until it's time for you to go" and "Love lifts us up where we belong" from the movie "An Officer and a Gentleman" were both written by Buffy Sainte Marie.

Each evening the stage program begins with "Country Legends" with Vince Gill, Billy Ray Cyrus, Reba Mcintyre, and Garth Brooks impersonators. But these are no ordinary impersonators. They were winners of a North

American wide competition held in Las Vegas.

On Wednesday evening, singer and song writer Winston Wuttunee from Alberta will entertain with a selection of aboriginal chants, rhythms and languages in a modern presentation. Thursday singer and actor Tom Jackson, who grew up in Winnipeg will entertain. Jackson will be familiar as the Chief in "North of 60". He appeared in "Star Trek" last week "Diviners", Medicine River", and "Spirit Rider" are among his credits.

Friday, Shingoose and Charlie Hill will provide music and comedy. Shingoose is from Roseau River. He was the star and Executive Director of the award winning show "Indian Times" shown at the Forks recently. Charlie Hill is a regular comedian at the "Comedy Store" in Los Angeles.

Every Evening the program will wind up with aboriginal dancers from all over North America. In addition to local Ojibwe dancers, already familiar to people in the area, See "Gathering" page 5

Construction Begins on Effluent Treatment Plant

Work began Tuesday August 2 on site preparation for a 26 million dollar effluent treatment plant for the Pine Falls newsprint mill. The plant will be located opposite the mill, South of PTH 11, (see map, p. 8).

Mill environmental Engineer, Kevin Allan said the initial work will be the excavation of drainage ditches to drain the

site. By August 15 site clearing will begin, and in mid-September pile driving for the plant's concrete work will begin. He said foundations for building and clarifier foundations will be in place before freeze-up. Construction will be completed by October 95, and the treatment plant will be fully operational by the end of 1995.

Until the transfer of ownership of the mill to its management and employees the cost of the work will be covered by Abitibi-Price. They will be re-imbursed by the new owners after the formal takeover of the mill, expected to be August 31 or September 1.

Allan said the treatment plant will be fully operational by the end of 1995. Continued on page 8

Accident on #59 Sends Car and Driver into Water Filled Ditch

Thick early morning fog is believed to be the cause of a single vehicle accident Sunday, July 31st. The accident occurred slightly north of the intersection of Highway 59 and Traverse Bay Road E, when a van belonging to Don Cunningham, and driven by his son Devon, 16, plunged down a steep 25 foot embankment into four to five feet of water.

Cunningham stated he was northbound, driving home about 5:45 early Sunday morning after visiting a friend in Grand Beach. The fog was not too bad until after he passed Traverse Bay Corner, when it became very thick, giving almost zero visibility. Devon had reduced his speed, but missed his turn to Traverse Bay Road East, crossed the centre line, and ended up in the west ditch. Fortunately Devon, wearing a seat belt at the time, sustained no personal injuries, but it is believed the 10 year old van may be a write off.

Local Rinks Faced with Increased Costs, Reduced Ice Rentals

On July 25th members of the executive of the Powerview Athletic Association, the Pine Falls Recreation Association, Pineview Ringette and Pineview Minor Hockey met to discuss proposed user fees for minor hockey, ringette and figure skating. As operating and maintenance costs keep rising for aging equipment and revenue from ice rentals is dropping, both rinks are looking for ways to keep operating.

Until this year minor hockey, ringette and figure skaters paid \$5 dollars per person per year to each arena on top of their \$96/year family membership dues. This has not been enough to keep the organizations operating in the black. Somehow, we need to increase our revenues or reduce our costs. A number of possible cost saving and money making ideas were discussed at the meeting and these include:

1. Close down one of the rinks on alternate days on the weekends. This would reduce the manpower requirements at the rinks, and we would not have workers on site waiting for one or two games on a Saturday afternoon. The rink could be opened for public skating if we could get volunteers to supervise.

2. All minor hockey teams be required to hold at least one home tournament each year. The rinks would get some revenue from ice rentals but it would also increase revenue to the cantons.

3. A suggestion was made that the rinks could increase their revenue by actively marketing ice rentals in Winnipeg where ice time is hard to get and expensive. We could give a daily or weekend rate to Winnipeg teams for either one or both rinks. This would take some work in deciding what days would be available in which rinks, setting up an advertising system, and in general administration. If someone was to volunteer to take on this job, it could really benefit the rinks and also local businesses.

These were all good ideas that could help the situation, but they are only ideas at this point, and we need the operating revenue this year, and until the rinks have some guarantee that our operating revenue will increase, it was decided that we must go ahead with the \$30/hr. ice rental charge to all minor hockey and ringette teams. This translates into a \$215/yr./child registration fee. A joint general meeting of Pineview Minor Hockey and Minor Ringette has been scheduled for August 18 at the Pine Falls Arena. Please plan to attend and bring ideas on how you can help solve our present budget crisis. I must stress though, that it takes more than just ideas to make or save money, volunteers are needed to implement these ideas.

heritage, - and to unite." She said everyone from Pine Falls, Powerview and St George is welcome to join in the celebration.

 plant will use a conventional "Activated Sludge" process. He said there are less expensive processes available, using new technology, but they don't have the long history and successful track record of the process chosen by the mill. "We don't intend to take any chances," he said.

The process uses naturally occurring micro-organisms to consume organic material in the mill's effluent. To

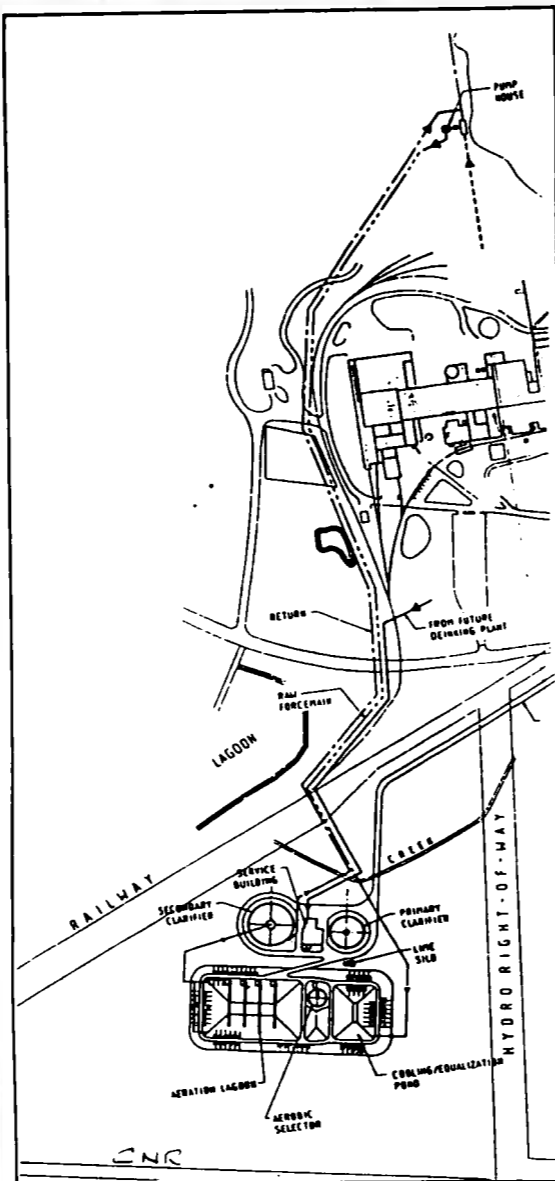
accelerate the activity of these organisms, air and nutrients not available in the waste stream will be added to ensure a healthy and stable environment for their growth and reproduction.

When the plant is operational the existing mill sewer will discharge to a trash screen and pumping station. It will then be pumped to an equalization basin to even out variations caused by the batch process in the Sulphite Mill.

In summer sprays will be used to cool the effluent to a temperature not detrimental to the organisms used in the process. It then flows to a 120 ft diameter clarifier whose primary function is to remove floating and settleable material. No chemical or biological activity takes place in these first two stages.

The waste stream then flows to an "Aerobic Selector" where it is mixed with activated sludge, then to an aerated lagoon where the micro-organisms consume the biological contents of the effluent. The lagoon will be 70m wide 120m long, and 10m deep. Air will be supplied by three 600 hp blowers. The treated effluent then flows to a 160 ft diameter secondary clarifier whose only function is to settle out the biomass. Most of this is returned to the aerobic selector (this is the activated sludge from which the process gets its name). The rest is removed, dewatered, and landfilled. (A new landfill site dedicated to this service, not the existing LGD landfill site.

Allan said the treated effluent will be non toxic to aquatic life, and will be below federal and provincial government limits for organic content and suspended solids.

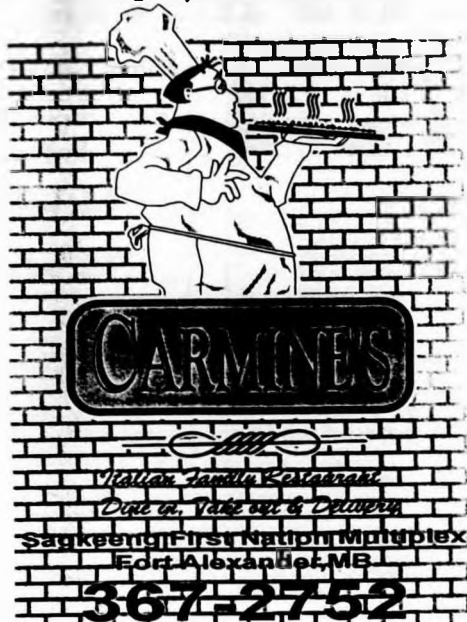
