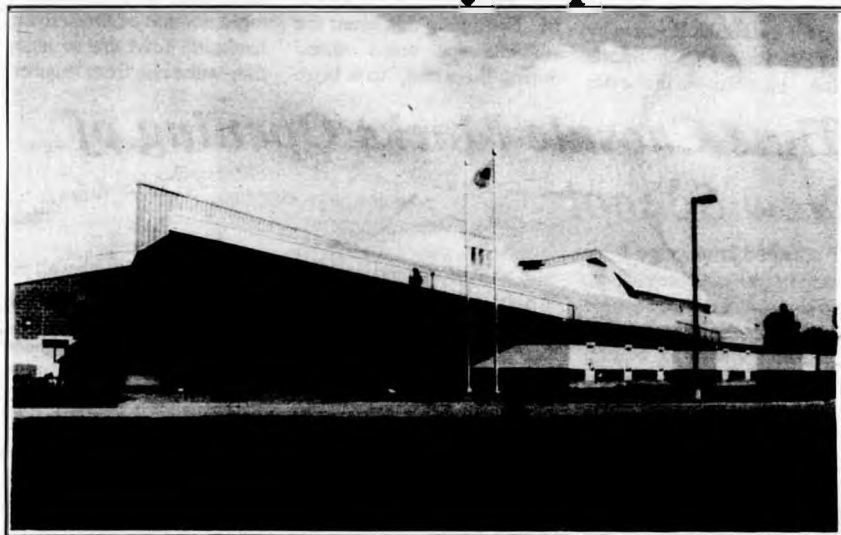

Sagkeeng Anicinabe High School Officially Open



Sagkeeng's brand new high school on the North Shore

The official Grand Opening of a very grand school, "Sagkeeng Anicinabe High School," located on the North Shore of the Winnipeg River, took place on Friday, September 16th, 1994. Scheduled to begin at 1:00 P.M., a slight delay was experienced while awaiting the arrival of the White Eagle Singers' drum.

Upon the arrival of the drum, the festivities began. Pat Bruyere was his usual affable self as he performed the duties of MC, giving the opening remarks. Pat was followed by the White Eagle Singers. This group stirs the emotions, setting spines a-tingle with their sound.

Prayers were offered to the Creator by Father Paradis, and then by Reverend Andrew Sinclair. In the absence of Elder Jack Starr, who was

unable to attend, the welcoming was given by Elder Victor Courchene. The ribbon cutting ceremony took place with Elder Mr. Sidney Dorie, student Melodie Abraham, students Darryl Bruyere, Robin Sinclair, Chief Jerry Fontaine and Sagkeeng Education Authority representative Raymond Guimond.

Following the official ribbon cutting ceremony, the officials, students, and attendees proceeded indoors to the gymnasium. First on the agenda was Chief Jerry Fontaine. Chief Fontaine spoke of the importance of the young people of the community. He stated that the strengths of the community, and its future are firmly rooted in education. Attached to the front wall of the school are the words, "Voices of Tomorrow." The future hopes for First Nations people are with the young.

The second speaker of the afternoon, needed no introduction, for his is a face easily recognized by all... Grand Chief Phil Fontaine. An eloquent speaker, Grand Chief Fontaine alluded to the functionality of the new facility. He also stated that the hopes of the future lie with the young people of today. First Nations people are entitled to receive an education in a state of the art facility, the same as everyone else. Fontaine stated that the facility he now found himself standing in for opening ceremony was vastly different to those in which he was educated.

Grand Chief Fontaine also spoke of the Indian Affairs Branch, and current discussions as to its dismantling. Fontaine told the crowd that the decision to dismantle will be made by the people of 60

He has served on the Pine Falls Hospital Board, the Pineview Lodge Seniors Board, the Model Forest Board, and the Pineview Economic Development Group. He was a member of the founding committee of the 4P festival and served on the board of directors for five years.

"We've been very pleased to live in the Pine Falls area," Boyko said. "It's such a beautiful part of the country." He said they had come to know a lot of nice people. "We're going to miss them," he said, "it's going to be a big change."

The Boyko's expect to be moving to the Okanagan in mid-October.

Continued from page 1 communities and their chiefs. He also stated that power now is in the hands of persons other than their own First Nation community. The dismantling will empower the First Nations. Grand Chief Fontaine declared emphatically the need for First Nation independence. He said, "First Nations children deserve the best...and in this facility, they have the best."

An special presentation of a beautiful jacket, and a plaque, was made to Roland Bruyere, the first firefighter in Winnipeg from a First Nations community. Roland has also honored his community and himself with his many feats of greatness in lacrosse. Roland is admired by many, and is a great role model for the youth of the community. The soft spoken Bruyere spoke briefly about his achievements.

Items were gathered which will be deposited in a time capsule. The time cap-

sule will be opened on September 16th, in the year 2025.

George Hardy, Project manager for the building of the School, spoke briefly to the audience about the actual building of the structure. He was followed by other officials of the building trade who took part in the building of the school.

David Ifody, M P for Provencher, gave a short speech, indicating how proud he felt to be the M P for the community of Sagkeeng, and how respectful he was of education, and what it can do for the individual. Junior Chief Melodie Abraham presented her remarks to those gathered for the occasion. Also presenting short speeches were Darren Montour of Anicinabe Community School, William Bruyere of Sagkeeng Community School, Gerald Courchene, Ruth Norton, both community members, and Nancy Bruyere, as a parent.

The common thread of all the words spoken was that these students "Be the best that they can be." Some speakers made reference to their remembrances of schools of the old days, and the good fortune of those who are being educated today. First Nations people should be proud of their heritage, for they have much to be proud of.

There were many presentations of special plaques to officials present, to School Board members, and to many others who have made significant contributions to the education of First Nations children. Athletic awards were to have been presented on Friday afternoon, but it was decided they would be presented on Monday morning, September 19th. The White Eagle Singers performed once again, and the afternoon speech making was wrapped up with the closing remarks of Pat Bruyere.

All afternoon the wonderful aroma of cooking had been emanating from the kitchen of the Home Economics lab. The festivities were followed by a Potluck Community Feast. The food was delicious and enjoyed by all who remained to sample it.

Job Openings in Construction of Effluent Treatment Plant

The capital spending program of the Pine Falls Paper Company is already beginning to have an impact on the local economy. In an advertisement in this issue the company is asking for local people to submit resumes to the employee relations department for openings in the construction of the effluent treatment plant.

The project is already under way. Drainage of the site, West of the Manitou Lodge, began before the change of ownership. A contract for the construction of the foundations, and underground piping will probably let early next week.

The first part of the 26 million dollar project, site drainage, involved mostly heavy equipment to dig drainage ditches and build an access road to the site. This phase provided little opportunity for local employment, but phase two, effluent treatment plant foundations and underground piping should provide more local employment opportunities. Contractors are under an obligation to hire local people where ever practical. However, the bulk of this project will be built next year. It is scheduled for completion

in late fall 1995, and will be in operation before the end of the year.

Design Started on Recycle Mill

Construction jobs will also be available in 1995 and 1996 on the construction of a newsprint and magazine de-inking mill. Within days of the management/employee buy-out of the former Abitibi mill, Toronto consultants Dick Engineering were hired to carry out preliminary engineering design for a 100 tonne per day newsprint and magazine de-inking plant. Their report will define the process, and identify capital and operating costs. Other recycle mills of this type cost in the order of 30 million dollars. There is a two year design and construction schedule for this project. Completion is expected towards the end of 1996.

The two projects combined will represent a total capital expenditure of more than fifty million dollars over the next two years. No estimate of the number of local jobs likely to be generated is available, but with both of these projects contractors will be obligated to local people where practical.

Thanks Coach

As the junior competitive season winds down, I think it is time for parents to show how much we appreciate the time and effort coaches put in to help our children. They are enhancing our children's curling skills and building the future for the sport as well.

More importantly, these coaches are helping our children mature into the kind of people our society needs. They help them learn to work as a team, to handle success and failure, and to persevere in difficult and stressful situations. These lessons are learned slowly over the years but they will give children and young adults a much needed advantage when it comes to facing other obstacles that life will throw in their paths.

These young people learn from these "mentoring" relationships, that they can learn from others if they are open to their influence. Learning how to benefit from the skills, knowledge and support of others is perhaps the most important lesson in life they will ever learn.

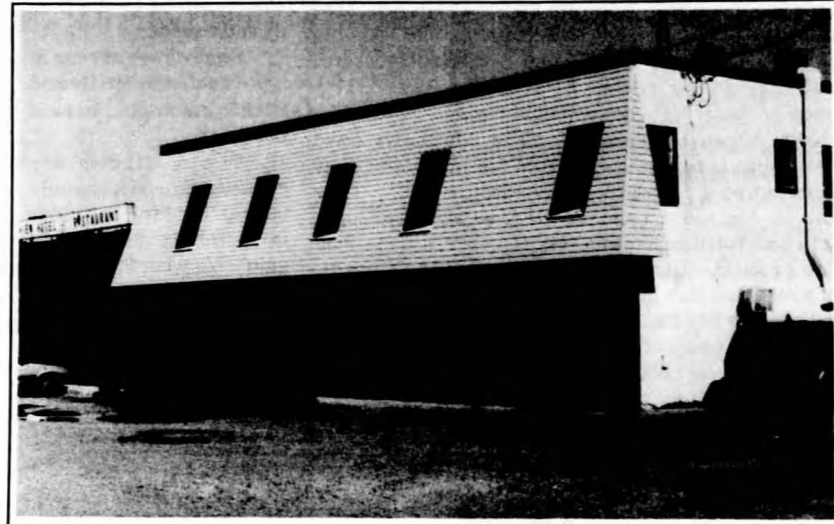
