Historic Board Meeting in Pine Falls



New board of directors of the Pine Falls Paper Company

Last Thursday, September 29, The Board of Directors of the Pine Falls Paper Company Ltd. met in Pine Falls for the first time. It marked the first time that decisions critical to the future of the Pine Falls newsprint mill were made in Pine Falls.

The nine directors have, between them, a wealth of experience in papermaking, engineering, business administration and accounting. One of them will bring to the board the perspective of mill employees, and another the perspective of the people of Sagkeeng. The Secretary to the Board is a lawyer specializing in corporate law.

Ashok Narang

Chairman of the board, and co-CEO, Ashok Narang, was born in India in 1939, graduated in Metallurgical Engineering in 1959, and spent the next ten years in the steel industry in India, Wales, and the United States.

In 1969 he joined Consolidated Bathurst, a large paper making conglomerate, in Montreal. Twenty years later he had progressed to the posi-

tion of senior Group Vice President - International Operations and Joint Ventures. Narang lives in Montreal and enjoys sailing and curling.

Fernand Pitre

Company President and co-CEO, Fern Pitre, was born in Dalhousie, New Brunswick in 1937. He has an Engineering Diploma from St. Francis Xavier University, and a BSc in Electrical Engineering from the Technical University of Nova Scotia.

Pitre has spent all his professional life in the pulp and paper industry. Ten years with Stora Forest Industries, ten years with Canadian Pacific Forest Products, and thirteen years with Abitibi-Price in Pine Falls, the last seven years as Mill Manager.

James Clarke

James Clark, a director of the new company, is a Chartered Accountant. He graduated from the University of Manitoba with a Bachelor of Commerce degree in 1966. He held the position of Chief Financial Officer with the Monarch Life Assurance Company for six years, and is

currently President of Burrows Lumber Inc., a 115 year old Manitoba Company.

Clarke served as Governor of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants and has served on the boards of numerous high profile Winnipeg organizations. He currently serves on the boards of Manitoba Mineral Resources, The Royal Winnipeg Ballet, and the St. Boniface Hospital Research Foundation.

Robert Foster

Robert Foster, Director, is a Financial Analyst with extensive experience in corporate finance. He has a masters degree in economics from the University of Kingston. He is a board member of the Canadian Native Arts Foundation, and has served on the board of the Ontario Art Gallery. Foster lives in Toronto and enjoys badminton and skiing.

Henry Giesbrecht

Henry Giesbrecht, director, was born in Altona in 1942, and attended the Manitoba Institute of Technology in Winnipeg. In 1966 he moved to Pine Falls where he cur-

rently supervises the operation of two newsprint machines with a combined capacity of 500 tonnes per day.

Giesbrecht is a member of the United Paperworkers International Union and brings the mill employee perspective to the board of the new company.

Neil Guimond

Neil Guimond, director, was born in Fort Alexander in 1953. He is studying Economic Development at the University of Manitoba. He has served for seven years with the Fort Alexander Health Care centre, four years as chairman of the Finance Committee, and for the last year as manager of the Sagkeeng Multi-Plex Arena. He is Chairman of the Sagkeeng association, (a prospective shareholder in the new company), and will be serving on the environment committee of the board of directors. Guimond brings a Sagkeeng perspective to the board of the new company.

Thomas Kobayashi, director, has a mechanical engineering degree from the University of British Columbia. He is a founding partner, and Manager, of one of Canada's foremost firms of consulting engineers, Nystrom, Lee, and Kobayashi, (NLK). Stephen Kupfer, director, is Acting Deputy Minister of the Department of Industry

Sinclair is a past director of the Manitoba Association for Community Living. He currently serves on the board of directors of the Misericordia Hospital.

Pelletier

An Adventurer with a thirst for gold!

(Part one of a two part series)

If it had not been for the combined efforts of two men, the mines in the Bissett area might never have been discovered. These two men were Ephrem Pelletier and Duncan Twohearts. In the following article, I will outline the life and career of one of them, Pelletier. That of Duncan Twohearts will be described in a future article.

Ephrem Albert Pelletier was a fascinating person, successful in many areas of endeavour around the world in his day, but now virtually forgotten except in the annals of Bissett lore. He was born of French-Canadian parents at St. Ferdinand, Meganic, P.Q. on January 21, 1880. He was a brilliant student by all accounts, and joined the local militia at an early age. When the Boer War broke out in South Africa he was only 19. He promptly joined up, and served as a lieutenant in the 55th Highland Light Infantry Regiment. He was awarded the Queen's Medal for his activities in several campaigns.

When the war was over he returned home to Canada, and decided to put his military experience to good use by join-

ing the North West Mounted Police, in 1901. Because of his military background and his ability to speak French (an asset even in those days!), he was appointed as an Inspector, a commissioned rank in the force even though most new recruits started out as Constables. He was posted first to the Yukon, where the Klondike Gold Rush was in full swing, and later to the North West Territories where he led a number of long and arduous patrols. The most outstanding of these patrols took place in 1908-09. In an attempt to establish links between NWMP posts in the Western and Eastern Arctic, in the days before radio and airplane made communication over long distances an easy matter, he led a patrol overland through the Territories from Athabaska Landing in Alberta to Churchill in Manitoba, a distance of some 4800 kilometres by canoe and dog-sled. This was the longest patrol ever undertaken by the Mounties.

When he finally returned to the outside world, by boat down lake Winnipeg, it was to a hero's welcome. Articles

about him appeared in papers from as far away as the Montreal Star, who described him as having: "acquired almost a world-wide reputation for his lonely journeys through the wilderness", and the New York Herald Tribune, who wrote a feature article with pictures of his exploits in their Sunday newspaper, and praised him as the Canadian policeman who: "Has won the distinction of having patrolled the longest beat on record."

It was at this point that one of those coincidences occurred which we all experience occasionally, coincidences which change the course of our personal lives and some-times influence events far beyond them. Arch Dale, a prominent political cartoonist with the Winnipeg Free Press, decided to meet Pelletier and interview him for the newspaper. Dale happened to have a drinking buddy, James Porter, who was also in meeting Pelletier because he had been Pelletier's commanding officer in the militia. Now it so happened that Porter had a cousin, Oswald Quesnel of Manigotagan, who he invited to come along as well. These

three men travelled to Gimli, a terminal for the lake boats of the day to meet the celebrity. During their meeting, Pelletier mentioned that he was considering leaving the NWMP, since he was becoming interested in prospecting, having seen lots of promising looking rock on his travels. Gold fever was of course at a high pitch at this time, because of the Klondike Gold Rush. Oswald then reportedly said, "You should meet my cousin Arthur. He knows lots about prospecting in the Manigotagan area." Pelletier must have stored this nugget of information, because a year later after having completed a tour of duty in Norway House, he resigned from the force and went directly to Manigotagan.

He then proceeded to stake his first claim in the area, the Ojibwa, on a point where the Manigotagan River widens out into Lake Winnipeg. He found traces of copper on this claim, but no gold. He also built a log cabin on a hill overlooking the river, which he used as his headquarters while he was in the area. At some point after he arrived, he contacted Oswald's cousin Arthur Quesnel about the possibilities of finding gold in the district. Now Arthur, who was quite a local wheeler-dealer, was involved in all sorts of business enterprises, among them prospecting and trading in furs. He had a group of Indian trappers bringing hem furs which he bought for resale in the Winnipeg Fur Exchange. These Indians knew the whole area east of Lake Winnipeg as far as the Ontario boundary better than anyone else, and Pelletier suggested that they be recruited to look for promising ore samples. Arthur agreed to talk to them and show them sample rocks Pelletier supplied, so they could see what to look for, with the understanding that he would have a share in any find. One of these native trappers was a man from Fort Alexander, Duncan Twohearts. Here, in a letter Pelletier wrote in 1941 to J.D. Perrin, the President of San Antonio Gold Mines, is an account of what happened next:

"Duncan Tohart (Pelletier's spelling) trapped and traded with Quesnel when I was prospecting in the district in 1910-11. I had met Duncan through Quesnel, and I got him interested in sending us samples of likely looking rock he might encounter on his trap lines. In February 1911 he sent some samples tied up in various pieces of cloth. One in a piece of blue denim looked particularly promising. I crushed it and panned it, and it showed colours (that is, traces of gold). In March of 1911 I took Johnny Wood (of Manigotagan) with me (as a guide), and went to Duncan's camp at Turtle Lake, where I showed him the piece of cloth. He remembered (where the sample came from) and next morning we started for Rice Lake. Duncan led me to (what was later known as) the Gabrielle Point, and told me that is where the sample in blue denim came from. A boulder of float rock (rusty quartz) was projecting out of the snow, and he had chipped the sample from a corner. We cleared out all the snow we could with snowshoes and shovels and made a big fire with jack pines then growing on the point. The heat of the fire chipped the rock and revealed lots of mineralization and promising looking quartz seamlets. There appeared a seam of oxidation running up the point, so began picking up this seam, cracking the quartz pebbles as I fished them out, and free yellow gold showed in one pyrite cavity the size of a small pea. That was good enough for me so I staked the claim (on March 6, 1911, at approximately 3:30 PM), and named it Gabrielle. I returned to Winnipeg, registered it and returned the same month with dogs, five loads of provisions and Desautels (who he had hired as a canoe man and helper). It was during this period that Desautels found and staked the San Antonio claim, with Pelletier's help, on May 17, 1911. During the next few months Pelletier also staked the Rachel and Emma claims and the Ross and Island fractions, on the shores of Rice Lake.
