## Belair Post Office Move Complete

The move of the Belair Post Office from the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Green to the Country Mile Mercantile (formerly Belair General Store) was completed on Wednesday, November 9th, 1994. The change in location was prompted by the resignation from Canada Post by Mrs. Green.

Canada Post officials approached Audrey Litzenberger and Wendy Wach, owners of the Country Mile Mercantile asking if they were interested in locating the complete Post Office within the store. They were. After

some delays approval was given by Canada Post to complete renovations required for installation of the boxes.

Audrey and her staff have received three days of training from Mrs. Joan Kleyh of the Pine Falls Post Office. An informal survey of residents showed that most are happy with the move of the postal facility to the store. Reasons given were mainly the ability to retrieve the mail at any time of day during hours of store operation. For residents who work in areas other than Belair, it was often a problem collect-

ing mail only on Saturdays. Another reason cited was the "one stop shop," now people can pick up the mail, newspaper and gasoline and groceries all with one stop.

Although residents were happy with the move of the Post Office, there were still many who were very sad to see it move from Mrs. Green's home. Betty was always in a happy frame of mind, and never failed to give a cheery word to all who stopped at her home. Best of luck to Betty and to Audrey and staff.

## Talent Showcase Planned for Sagkeeng

Mel Fontaine is planning a "Talent Showcase" to be held in Sagkeeng in the near future.

Fontaine said Sagkeeng has "a lot of good talent, but it's sleeping - somebody needs to waken it." He said the community has instrumentalists, (guitar, violin, etc.), singers, and music and song writers. He has asked Lionel Desjarlais, of Sunshine Records, and Julian Paquin to attend the showcase in the hope they will "discover" local talent with professional potential.

Paquin is Susan Aglukark's agent. Sunshine Records specializes in aboriginal talent. Desjarlais has told Fontaine there is a strong market for gospel music, and Fontaine plans to

use funds generated by the Showcase to fund the production of an album "Hymns from Sagkeeng". He said he has made arrangement for Sunshine Records to produce the album for approximately half the normal cost (\$2,000).

Fontaine said there is government funding available, but he plans to manage without it. Government funding "kills initiative - kills your humanness" he said.

Her said if the gospel album is successful he plans to use the money, first to pay the musicians and singers, then for other community projects. He mentioned Dana Morisseau, a young marathon runner. He said she is a potential Olympic athlete. "She needs coaching," he said.

Money could also be used to promote culture, the promotion of local painters and sculptors, and possibly a wilderness encampment, complete with teepees, etc.

But Fontaine's first priority is to get local musicians together to practice. He said it is especially important that singers and their accompanists practice together. He said a first class Showcase is vital if visiting talent scouts are to be impressed.

The showcase is not exclusive to Sagkeeng, nor to gospel music. Fontaine said musicians of all types, from any of the local communities, are welcome to participate. "Music is the way to get people together." He said.

I was very pleased to at last see common sense prevail within government, (especially in a justice department), when Justice Minister Rosemary Vodrey expressed her views on the Federal Liberals' proposed new firearms controls. She apparently now realizes that the proposed legislation is not the answer, and like its predecessors, never was!

What is particularly interesting, though, is the politicization of this issue. Opposition members, seeing government support for a purported "right-wing" cause, are trying to turn this into a "right-vs.-left" conflict. Are we to believe that there are no social democrats (or near-cousins) that own, use, and appreciate firearms for their safe recreational use? Hardly!

I'm sure there are many N.D.P. and Liberal voters out there who are hunters, target shooters (shotgun, rifle, or handgun), or even collectors. Ideology does not dictate what sport or diversion one is drawn to, but some would have us think so.

I am sure that many who dislike firearms do so of fear or ignorance. I have used them for over forty years, safely and enjoyably, as have many of my acquaintances and their families. We have never experienced the aberrations so graphically and continually illustrated in movies, T.V., and the like, which engender this irrational fear. But we do know that with any object, someone, somewhere, is going to misuse it, sometime.

No responsible firearms owner objects to a thorough screening process before acquisition, or training/testing if required. We do object to full registration of all firearms, for that is a totally useless, and extremely expensive bureaucratic exercise that will do

nothing to address any of the problems that currently exist. It will only harass and inconvenience the legitimate owners. It may be far easier and cost-effective to licence users as to their degree of expertise in various shooting disciplines, with any number of firearms types. (Fewer restrictions for duly accredited individuals.) Much of this could be done by existing, recognized shooting organizations in the field, (with perhaps an overview from a small government agency,) with no, or very little cost to the public.

I would hope that the general public would view their fellow citizens (who just may happen to own firearms) as no different from themselves. We are no different—we hate crime, violent or otherwise, and probably participate in many similar pastimes as you do, apart from our firearms-related activities. Hopefully, Ms. Vodrey, and others similarly enlightened, will be able to bring common sense back into the firearms control debate (debauch?).

## Heritage Region Finally Gets a Name

Following from the work initiated over the past year, and supported by the understandings and plans developed at a recent workshop, the community membership of the local Heritage Region took their first formal steps with agreement on a name for the Region and the establishment of a Board of Directors.

Members attending the first official board meeting on November 9, 1994 selected the name "Wasanebe - Shining Waters Heritage Region"; reflecting the area's relationship to one of its richest resources. The Ojibway

word "wasanebe" means "shining or shimmering waters". This selection was made from names and descriptions provided by local residents at the Heritage Buffet held in Stead, Manitoba on October 18th, 1994.

At the same meeting, membership appointed an executive to serve the Region until the end of March, 1995, when a full general meeting and election will be held. Activities are now being planned to hold a series of community meetings throughout the Region to explain the goals of the Heritage Region, and to obtain

feedback and plans from each of the area communities.

The newly constituted, interim Board of Directors are in the process of formally incorporating and have unanimously appointed the following executive:

**Dwight Deg, Chairperson** - A resident of the Great Falls/Lac du Bonnet area for the past 4 years, Dwight is an active community member and is currently 1st vice president (past president) of the Great Falls Recreation Hall. Dwight is originally from Brandon area and is an electrical technician for Great Falls Manitoba Hydro. Tourism development, job creation and ecological management are Dwight's priorities which led to his involvement in round table discussions about the development of a Heritage region late in 1993. On a personal level, Dwight is an accomplished musician, and sees music as another way of bringing the diverse regional cultures together in spirit and cooperation.

**Dorothy Hutchison, Vice-Chairperson** - Dorothy is originally from Grand Rapids and has resided in the Lac du Bonnet area for the past 15 years. Dorothy's extensive

community involvement includes being a founding member of local Heart Health and Community and Justice Groups, as well as being active in local education issues. She has also worked for the Manitoba Metis Federation as an enumerator and data base designer, and has held a teaching position with the Children of the Earth School in Winnipeg. Dorothy believes that individuals and communities have to contribute if change is to occur and that community empowerment by residents is the key.

**Earl Wood, Secretary/Treasurer** - Earl was born in Bissett and grew up in Manigotogan and Red Lake, Ontario. He recently returned to Manigotogan where he currently resides. Earl has extensive experience working in child and family counselling, mental health, probation and parole services, having graduated from Lakhead University with a BSW (Honours). Earl has been a pro-active volunteer and change agent with mental health community services and boards. His attraction to the work of the Heritage Region was the "challenge and rare experience" to start out with a project that is committed to development of, and from, the

"grassroots".

The Wasanebe Heritage Region, (pronounced Wasayannabee), is made up of 20 communities, from Brokenhead to Bissett, whose objective is to capitalize on the rich and varied cultural heritage and natural beauty of the area to bring visitors to the region and so to promote economic development. It is the tenth Heritage Region to be established in Canada. Others have been established all across the country, from Newfoundland to Vancouver island. In most cases they have had a substantial economic impact, often adding several million dollars a year to the local economy.

The Heritage Region will be associated with the LaVerendrye Trail, a Winnipeg River Brokenhead Ventures project. The LaVerendrye Trail Committee will be marketing the Heritage Region in other parts of Canada, the U.S. and Overseas. The Wasanebe Heritage Region is funded by the Manitoba Model Forest.

A workshop is scheduled for Saturday, November 26, to develop a vision for the future of the Heritage Region over the next five years.

**Kids Go To Camp As Part Of Fight Against Diabetes**

Young people with diabetes attended summer camps this year, thanks to the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA), and a \$10,000 grant from lottery and gaming revenue co-ordinated by the Province of Manitoba's Lotteries Distribution System.

to keep our capital costs down to virtually zero so we can serve the patients. That's our emphasis." Fifteen-year-old Heather Crow, who attended Camp Birchbark this year, said it was a good experience to live closely with other diabetics, while also sharing facilities with non-diabetics. She said teaching others about diabetes was important. "It's fun and they're very receptive. They enjoy learning about it, and it's good for both the diabetics and the non-diabetics."

Mr. Giesbrecht said the savings in future health care costs as lottery funding helps patients learn to care for themselves is "astronomical. It's probably one of the best places to put money, just to save money."

The CDA also received a grant from lottery funding of \$104,000 to partially fund a public opinion survey which helped the CDA devise a new way to approach educating the public about the disease.

Communications Manager Carol Enns said the survey showed "people did not realize how serious diabetes is. They really did not see it as a serious disease, life-threatening in some cases... and that certain types of diabetes can be prevented... or the onset postponed."

The CDA estimates 50,000 Manitobans have diabetes, although half don't know it. CDA's 12,000 members and donors serve diabetics through offices in Winnipeg, Steinbach, Brandon, Dauphin, Swan River, Elm Flon, Norway House and Thompson, and through numerous support and community groups throughout the province.

**It's "New And Improved" At Pine Falls Golf Club**

Pine Falls golfers who've enjoyed their local links this past summer (the previous summer was too wet to enjoy), benefitted from renovations and upgrading supported by grants totalling almost \$55,000 from lottery and gaming revenue co-ordinated by the Province of Manitoba's Lotteries Distribution System.

"Given the weather we had this year, we had a record year. It was excellent," said George Harbottle, who was Director of Special Projects for the Pine Falls Golf Club at the time.

He said, "The lottery funds were used for the purposes of putting in a year-round sewer and water facility. We were on a pump direct from the river... so there was no water in the early spring or late fall."

"Again with lottery funds, we were able to build a proper road into the facility, with drainage, etc., and also convert the clubhouse to a year-
