Grand opening of DSFM St. Georges School

Une moment historique... Speeches, ribbon cutting, cake, and singing were only a part of the community joy which was so very evident at the official opening of Ecole Communautaire de Saint-Georges. The celebration took place on Thursday, November 24th from 11:00 A.M. till 3:00 P.M. Mme. Lola Archer, principal and half time high school teacher was the MC for the event. Mme Archer was very capable in this capacity, and kept everything humming.

Mme. Archer introduced the speakers, beginning with Councillor for Ward III, Diane Dube. Diane is a supporter of the school, and has lobbied long and hard for funds used in the renovation and upgrading of the building in which the school is located.

Gilles Avanthay was the

next speaker, and one did not have to understand the French language to hear his passion, love and appreciation for the new school. Father Belanger followed with a short Blessing and a prayer. Father was followed by M. Raymond Bisson, Superintendent of all Division Scolaire Franco Manitobain schools in Manitoba. M. L. A. for Provencher, Darren Praznik, did his bilingual best speaking in French, and also in English. Praznik made warm references to Mme Wilcott, for whom the long years of waiting finally came to an end in September of 1994 when the DSFM school opened in St. Georges. Praznik paid tribute to the parents who were fervent in their wish to see a French language school return to St. Georges. He also paid high tribute to the volunteer seniors who renovated and refurbished the

building. The work done by the seniors of St. Georges is phenomenal.

Said Praznik, "It isn't just about language, it isn't just about progress, its about parents having some control over education, family values, religion and culture. These are things that are important to the parents of the students of 'Ecole Communautaire Saint-Georges'."

M. Louis Alain, Principal of the DSFM school in Saint Laurent was in attendance. M. Alain was most helpful to the Parents Committee in the initial stages of preparation for Ecole Communautaire Saint-Georges. M. Alain gave up his vacation time during August to give his expertise to the grateful parents.

Other speakers who concluded the afternoon's celebrations were Mme Lemoine from Bureau Education Francais,

Ms. Remillard from SFM, students Mireille Lavoie and Gaylaine Guimond. The students summarized what they like about the school based on what they see. They see it as being a family atmosphere, given the small size of the student body. The students were followed by Bev Neisteter, Special Assistant to M. P. David Ifody, who was unable to attend due to another commitment.

A pot luck lunch had been served prior to some of the speeches, this was followed by the official ribbon cutting. At the conclusion of the celebrations, the student body were joined by everyone attending in the singing of wonderfully upbeat tune, "C'Est Une Histoire."

The entire student body, forty four in total, were present throughout the speeches. They were extremely well be-

haved. The cake was cut and served at the conclusion of the singing. Best of luck to Ecole Communautaire Saint Georges.

**A little history about the school...and some facts regarding its operation: The location of the newly opened school, which is in the Community Club building, was a school before Agassiz School Division officials declared it unfit in 1979. Community members identified a use for the building, and began lobbying government for grants to fund the renovations and upgrading required to make the building useful again as a clubhouse. It was in use for several years and housed the Manitoba Metis Federation, Fran's Accounting, Library Allard, Manitou Rapids Arts Council, St. Georges Economic Development Committee, the SFM Regional Com-

Mill Union rejects contract

Last Thursday Pine Falls Paperworkers Union (UPIU) voted 83% against acceptance of a contract negotiated by the union negotiation team. Major issues were: payment for paper machine wire, notification of shift changes and vacation scheduling. The most stated reason for the rejection

was that union members were not about to make additional concessions immediately after conceding a 10% wage reduction and a five year wage freeze
Office workers ratify contract
Mill office workers, also vot-

ing last Thursday, voted 95% in favour of a contract which gave them minor gains, the most significant being bargaining unit protection for part-time workers. Contract negotiations for the loggers union (LSWU) were completed on Saturday.

Stead Road signs installed

The residents of Stead are back on the map.

Highways Department crews have installed new directional signs on PTH #59 in advance of the Stead Road and PR #304 turn-offs.

Recently, residents of the area had expressed concerns over the lack of advance signage before the intersection, pointing out safety concerns as well as the need for local sod producers to provide accurate travel directions to their customers.

The initial problem began a couple of years ago. The original signs were removed during regular road maintenance and area residents, after raising the issue with Praznik, were promised that proper signage would return. However, response from Highways officials to requests for additional signage was met

with a resounding "NO". A longstanding Highways' policy did not allow for new signage or replacement signs for small communities that did not meet Highways' Department criteria.

After the issue was raised in a newspaper article, Praznik took the matter to Highways Minister Glen Findlay who agreed that departmental

policy could be modified to provide signage to small communities. This policy change also resulted in the return of signage at Highland Glen on PTH #44.

"It may be a small item in the overall Highways' budget," noted Praznik, "but it is a very important issue to my constituents in the Stead area."

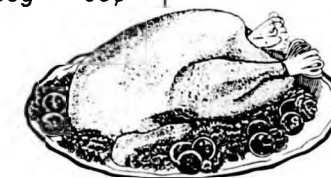

The Snofund

The Snofund is a vision for the future. The purpose of the Snofund is to ensure more trails, better trails and safer trails for snowmobilers in Manitoba. The increasing demand on the present trail system has exceeded the available funds. The Snofund will ensure that the snowmobile clubs will be able to continue to maintain and improve the trail systems. In those areas where the trail system does not exist, the Snofund will help local clubs develop a trail system that will link the area with the rest of the system. When you buy a SnoPASS, you are helping to preserve and improve the sport of snowmobiling in Manitoba.

What is a SnoPASS and how do I get one?

A SnoPASS is a sticker that you affix to your snowmobile registration plate. With it, you can legally ride any designated trail in Manitoba. For the 1994-95 snowmobile season, the SnoPASS will cost \$35.00 per season per snowmobile and is valid from April to March. There will also be a \$20-7 day (consecutive) SnoPASS available for occasional and out-of-province riders.

How will the funds be used?

Administered by the Snofund Board of Directors, the Snofund is dedicated funding. Money raised will be used to offset the costs related to such things as main-

taining existing trails, developing new trails, purchasing and maintaining trail equipment, purchasing and installing trail signs and producing regional trail maps of the designated trail system. Only Snoman and its member groups will qualify for trail support funding. 100% of the Snofund will go back to snowmobiling.

mittee, and Le Petit Soleil. Library Allard still occupies space in the building, and is used by the school. The other tenants have found space elsewhere in the area.

**Ecole Communautaire Saint-Georges has a staff of three full time teachers, one half time who teaches High School grades 7, 8, 9, and 10. Mme Archer also teaches High School half time, as well as carrying out her duties as Principal. One half time person is also responsible for "la Phase d'accueil" which means bringing students to the level of French required (when necessary) and Gilles Avanthay has been hired to teach catchism.

In addition to their regu-

lar studies, the students write and publish a school newspaper. They have adopted the gray wolf as their symbol. The color gray is incorporated into their school colors.

A committee of volunteers for the school includes Diane Dube, President of the Community Club from whom the space for the school is rented, Mme Madeleine Lavoie, representative for Eastman division of Schools, two teachers, two students and anyone who wishes to be part of the committee. All work together regarding any and all activities, such as the setting of school and playground rules and regulations, and the organization of events such as the Grand Opening.

Manitoba Crime Stoppers and the Powerview R.C.M.P. Detachment would like your assistance in solving a theft from a vehicle in the Gem Lake area. Gem Lake is located south of Beresford Lake near the Manitoba/Ontario border.

On August 15th, 1994 the victim drove his 1985 Nissan 4X4 pickup truck to Gem Lake. He arrived about 5:00 P.M. he and his wife camped in the area for two days. The only persons he saw in the area was on August 16th when 3 males were observed in a yellow boat on the lake. The 3 males avoided any contact with the victim and his wife.

The victim returned to his truck at 3:00 P.M. on August 17th and noticed the vehicle had been broken into. Stolen from the vehicle was a "husky" 8500 lb. super winch which had been mounted on the front bumper along with all the mounting hardware and a hand held remote control for the winch. Also stolen was a jackall, assorted wrenches,

high pressure tire pump, assorted tools and a Sears Die Hard battery.

Police feel the 3 males observed on the lake may be suspects in this theft.

Features

History of the Pine Falls Health Auxiliary

The Pine Falls Women's Hospital Auxiliary was formed in 1951, in response to a growing need in our small private hospital. It was felt that with volunteer help from the ladies, we could provide necessary missing comforts for our patients and at the same time ease the yearly budget.
Early in 1952 a new wing to our hospital was completed and our ladies furnished all wards with new draperies and new linens as well as new operating room gowns and drapes. With this new addition our hospital graduated to the status of a small General Hospital and served the surrounding districts.

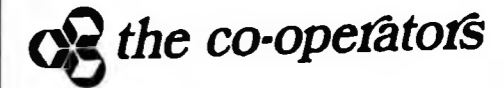
At this stage, the Auxiliary assumed the responsibility for all "new sewing" and mending. These projects carried right through to 1964.
In 1964 our Pine Falls General Hospital amalgamated with Indian Affairs Hospital to form one hospital. A new wing was added to accommodate this amalgamation. The hospital increased to 48 beds and a government diagnostic unit, with lab and x-ray facilities was added. With the increase in size the "new sewing" and mending phase of the auxiliary work had to be abandoned as it was too much for our small group.
Throughout our 43 year history, many projects have been taken on by our auxiliary. In the early days, it was

fun fares (started in 1955), cooking schools, auctions, bake sales, card parties, cook book sales, (started 1977 - last one sold in 1993 after fourth or fifth printing, garage sales, raffles, craft sales, membership drives plus our annual crocus tea and bake sale.
Our first membership drive was started in 1955 in order to make people aware of the auxiliary and obtain new members. We canvassed door-to-door and signed up over three hundred, mostly associates, at \$1.00 per membership. This tradition continues today. Last year our drive netted us \$3,234.00.
Our gift cupboard is as popular today as it was 43 years ago. Our items for sale were originally kept at a members home. When room was found in the hospital, our local pharmacist (Fred Welsh) donated a cupboard in 1966. This cupboard was used by our auxiliary until 1993. At this time a new and larger cupboard was built and sits in our main waiting room in the Health Complex. The old cupboard now rests in our personal care home dining room, displaying some prize china. Hundreds of volunteer knitters and sewers have kept our cupboard well stocked throughout our forty three year history.

Our Spring Crocus Tea is another tradition that is still carried on by our auxiliary. We have a gigantic bake sale in conjunction with our tea,

along with raffles and a Chinese auction. Thanks to our active members and associate members, it is always a success.
Our daily room to room notion shop on wheels continues and requires many volunteer hours. With the introduction of sophisticated vending machines, the importance of this cart has dwindled. It is mainly a mode of visitation now. The slack is taken up by our two pop vending machines that we operate.
In 1974, the name of our auxiliary was changed to the Pine Falls Health Auxiliary. Our active membership hasn't changed much through the year, about 15, plus or minus.
In the late 80's, our hospital took on a great metamorphosis. In 1989, it emerged as a brand new health complex. In 1990, a beautiful personal care home, Sunnywood Manor, was added and in 1993, a dialysis unit was added. The challenge was put to our auxiliary to help equip these units with items not covered by the government. I think we answered this challenge quite aptly. Since 1989, to present 1994, our auxiliary has donated \$43,833.00 to our Health Complex.

Since the auxiliary was founded in 1951, our goals have remained the same. That is to provide necessary missing comforts for our sick and at the same time ease the yearly budget. Our membership is small but our dedication is big time.

Alzheimer Help Line Ready In New Year

A new Alzheimer Help Line will be going into operation in early January. It is being developed by the Alzheimer Society of Manitoba, with the support of a \$15,000 grant from lottery and gaming revenue co-ordinated by the Province of Manitoba's Lotteries Distribution System. The Society has also

received other grants totalling \$75,000 in past years.
Sylvia Rothney, Executive Director of the Alzheimer Society, says its mandate "is to provide family support, education, advocacy and research to eradicate the effects of Alzheimer disease."
"Family support would be the

first step in our mandate. Education would be education to care-givers, which could be family members or loved ones. It could be professional education, also."
With regard to the new Help Line, Ms. Rothney said the Society gets requests for assistance from across the province.


"We've actually had, more recently, people with early-diagnosed Alzheimer (disease) phoning us and trying to gather information, and just to have somebody who will listen to them. Often people who live in isolated communities, don't have anyone to turn to with concerns about a loved one that are very private to them."
"We're hoping to touch more people in the province with an '800' (toll free) line which will provide callers seeking information on Alzheimer Diseases, both anonymity and easy access to

information."
The Society has 40 support groups across the province, as well as a staff of ten people in Winnipeg and one each in Winkler and Brandon. Ms. Rothney says the new line will mean they will be able to make initial contact with people and send out information, "then be able to send the contacts back into the community so they can be supported within the community."
In this area, there are support groups in Lac Du Bonnet, Pine Falls and Beausejour.

Library Collection Expanded

Lac du Bonnet Regional Library is expanding its book collection, thanks in part to funding from lottery and gaming revenue co-ordinated by the Province of Manitoba's Lotteries Distribution System. In addition to an operating grant of \$17,000 the Library received \$10,000 from lottery revenue, half of which is designated for the purchase of new books.
Head Librarian Roz Burt is looking forward to further enhancement when they are able to join the computerized library system now developing throughout the province, possibly within the next year. That program, too, is supported by lottery funding.
The Library has a new home, which Lottery grants totalling \$105,000 helped to build and furnish.
Ms. Burt says the library is very appreciative of the lottery support the Library has received.
She also praised the work of community volunteers. She said, "We have a nucleus of 15-20 persons. They volunteer for different

jobs and bring different skills to the Library."
"We also use volunteers to a large extent on fund raising activities because we're still raising funds to complete our new building."
As an example she cited the many volunteers who prepared and served a very successful fall supper which raised \$1,900.
She also paid tribute to the volunteers who assist with the Christmas Children's Bazaar by purchasing bargain items throughout the year which are then sold at cost to area children for Christmas gifts during the Bazaar.
Last year approximately \$200 million of lottery revenue was used to support health care and medical research, learning and education, fitness and amateur sport, heritage and culture, community and conservation programs, economic development and deficit reduction. SnoPASS price will not include or require a snowmobile club membership.

What is a "designated trail"?

The local snowmobile clubs will determine which of their trails are to be legally designated as SnoFUND trails. If a trail is not designated as a SnoFUND trail, you will not require a SnoPASS to ride it.

How will I know what trail is a "designated trail"?

All designated trails in Manitoba will be mapped and signed with a "Designated SnoFUND Trail" marker. The maps will be registered with Snowman and Manitoba Natural Resources. Various trails in the provincial parks and forests will be designated as

SnoFUND trails and will therefore require a SnoPASS. Designated trails are subject to change each year.

What is a SnoCARD?

A SnoCARD is a wallet sized card entitling the owner to certain discounts at participating retailers displaying the "SnoFUND Partner" window decal. You will receive a SnoCARD when you purchase a SnoPASS and by using the SnoCARD your savings can exceed the cost of the SnoPASS. To validate your SnoCARD, simply sign it and affix your validation sticker number (which is the same as your SnoPASS number). The SnoCARD is non-transferable and is valid from April to March of the following year.
