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News/Views

News from Chad

ARRIVAL - We arrived at Ndjamena, capital city of Chad, at 4:00 am on June 10. We are told that the plane to Moundou is broken so we will have to travel by land via Cameroun. We must get visas and other papers and spend the day doing that. We are completely depend other people because we have no idea where to go, or what to do. Absolutely everything is new and different. We leave the next

morning at 6:00 am. What a trip! But there are no regrets, our eyes are not wide enough to take everything in. The scenery appears to be semi-desert, with some trees. We see little villages en route. How to describe them? First impression, it's poor. How can they live like that? Will I be able to stay? I feel disturbed and at ease at the same time. It's hard to explain, I feel a bit panicky inside. We get stopped often and our papers, baggage, etc., are verified. The car we are travelling in gets three flats. Weight, (ours and the baggage) is too much for the poor car, so we all get into a Jeep and leave the baggage in the car. We are pretty crowded in the Jeep but at least there are no more flats, it is bumpy though. We stop in a little village called Lere, a Chadian religious community welcomes us. We do not get to see too much because it's dark. Next day, we travel all day and arrive in Moundou, our home around 6:00 pm, very tired and full of dust, anxious to wash, to eat, and to rest. The trip was an unforgettable experience.

OUR HOME - it's a lovely bungalow. We each have our own bedroom with a shower in it. I almost feel like I have a suite. The problem is, there is no hot water, but after a days work in the heat, a cold

shower is welcome and refreshing. Our living room is big enough for the three of us. There are two kitchens, an interior one and an exterior one. The exterior one is used more often because it does not warm up the house. We have a cook who prepares our dinner Mondays to Saturdays. On Sundays we do our best. Cooking takes a lot of time, no microwaves, no TV dinners. It's a full time job. You have to go to the market every day to get vegetables, and going to market is an experience. You have to bargain for everything. I'm getting better at it, but still give in too easily. It's not something I enjoy. Back to our home. We don't have all the conveniences but we don't lack anything essential.

SCHOOL - Education here is a privilege and many children cannot go to school because the parents can't afford it. The girls in our school are highly motivated. There is a lot of work to do at school. My days are long, they start at 6:30 am until 1:1:00 pm, and again from 3:00 pm to 5:30 pm. School is open from Monday to Friday and Saturday morning. There are all sorts of unforeseen things and the administration is called upon very often to answer all sorts of needs. There are no phone, and many people cannot read or speak french therefore communication is not always easy. A lot of it is oral and there are

translators. When I have some free time I try to rest because I may be called on at any time including Sundays.

THE CHADIANS - Their lifestyle is very simple and their needs few. They have an openness and relationships are very important. They take time to socialize. They don't only greet me, they stop and talk with me. I had the opportunity to visit one of their properties. It's very clean and well organized. A family consists of uncles, aunts, cousins etc. Everyone lives in their separate little huts but share the food, water, etc. The visit was a most enriching experience - one which made me appreciate a different lifestyle.

TEMPERATURE - The heat is not too bad right now. When we arrived it was the rainy season. During that time

it rains heavily, flooding roads and making travel impossible. It's also very slippery, it's like walking on ice and we have to be very careful. October was very hot. Inside the house stayed around 30 to 35 degrees Celsius and at night did not go down too much, maybe 25 if we were lucky. November is a bit better. It's cooler at night and I sleep better. There will be no more rain until May. Everything will dry up we are told. In the afternoon, from 1:00 to 3:00 pm the heat is almost unbearable and we stay away from the sun. They tell us December and January will be cold. Right now it's hard to believe.

PROPOSED WINTER ROAD CONSTRUCTION - BLOODVEIN RIVER AREA (FILE: 3926.00)

A Proposal filed by the Pine Falls Paper Company for the relocation of 7 kilometers of the existing winter road located on the east side of Lake Winnipeg in Township 32, Range 6 EPM and Township 33, Range 6 EPM. The road would be built by Pine Falls Paper Company and would become part of the provincial winter road system which is maintained by the Manitoba Department of Highways. The existing winter road from the Bloodvein Indian Reserve to the junction of the northern end of the proposed winter road would be abandoned following construction of the relocated portion of winter road. The project is scheduled to be completed before the winter road closes in March 1995.
