Heritage Region To Hold Public Meetings

The Wasaanebe - Shining Waters Heritage will be holding public meetings throughout the region at the end of January and beginning of February.

Times and places are to be announced. Heritage Region Coordinator Chris Leskiw said the meeting were to inform local communities

of what the Heritage Region is all about, to advise them of the ways they might get involved with local development using heritage resources, and to begin to solicit stronger participation and ideas from communities in the region.

Heritage Regions have been established all across Canada - from Vancouver Is-

land to Newfoundland. The Wasaanebe - Shining Waters Heritage Region is the tenth in Canada and the first in Manitoba. In other parts of Canada Heritage Region have resulted in substantial increases in tourism resulting in major economic benefits for the local communities. They attract visitors who are interested in the

history, culture and the natural beauty of the region. The term "eco-tourist" is often used to describe the type of visitors likely to be attracted to a heritage region.

In common with the other nine heritage regions in Canada, the Wasaanebe-Shining Waters Heritage Region is being set up with the assistance of Heritage Canada, a non profit corporation. Heritage Canada uses a community development process where the whole process is driven by the people of the communities involved. The shape and structure of the Wasaanebe Heritage Region will be determined by the people of the region. It is a bottom-up rather than a top-down process. Success depends entirely on the participation and drive of the people of the region.

The Wasaanebe - Shining Waters Heritage Region was established last year with funding from the Manitoba Model Forest.

Consumer and Corporate Affairs Marketing Practices have been advised of this type of telemarketing fraud and are investigating. This is just a reminder that if you, the reader, receive a call of this nature and if it "sounds too good to be true," IT PROBABLY IS!! Beware.

Salvation Army set up Crisis Stabilization Unit

On Monday, January 16, 1995 The Salvation Army will officially open their Crisis Stabilization and Mobile Stabilization Units in Selkirk at 448 Queen Avenue.

The Crisis Stabilization Unit is an 8 bed residential unit for adults and adolescents from the Interlake and NE Manitoba regions that are in psychiatric crisis. The program aims to provide short term, intensive care and treatment to voluntary clients who require specialized services in the community but do not need hospitalization. Services are provided by professional staff.

The Mobile Stabilization Unit is a mobile team of professionals and paraprofessionals who provide effective screening and assessment services thereby reducing the unnecessary use of

emergence services. The team provides appropriate treatment services to minimize the needs for hospitalization enabling individuals to resolve mental health crisis in the community, and linkage to appropriate resources to assist persons in a psychosocial crisis to meet a wide range of needs in the least restrictive manner possible. Services are provided by professional staff.

Community Holistic Healing Circle - Part 3

New Directions
From the first disclosure of sexual abuse in 1986, the community was forced to take a hard look at the ailments of First Nation people. What was seen that there had been a great deal of sexual abuse going on for many years, but the talking about it was taboo. Most members of the Resource Group had somehow been affected by it one way or another. It was discovered that as the blanket of alcohol abuse was removed, many First Nation people were holding on to acute anger, hurt and dysfunctional behaviour patterns that were re-

lated to sexual abuse or to some other personal violation. There was much work to do in order to facilitate healing.

In April of 1988 the entire Resource Team of twenty seven people, travelled to Alkali Lake, near Williams Lake, British Columbia, to take part in a program of personal growth training called "New Directions." At the conclusion of this training the group returned with fire and enthusiasm for what had been experienced at Alkali Lake. Hearts had opened to one another sharing hurts giving support, forgiveness and love, and

learning to take personal responsibility for our own continuing journey.

From this training the Resource team developed a plan. A n independent, non profit society was formed S. A. F. E. Inc. "Self Awareness for Everyone."

Health Services and Promotion Branch of Health and Welfare Canada agreed to fund our initiative as a Community Action Program as part of the National Drug Strategy. The proposal to Health Services and Promotion Branch contained seven objectives:

1. To reduce or eliminate expensive travel costs and tuition fees resulting from sending many of our people to British Columbia.
2. to build a resource bank of Manitoba trainers
3. to take ownership of our own Manitoba program
4. to eventually eliminate the high cost of renting a self awareness program from out of province by building our own program.
5. to be able to deliver the same program whether it be in an urban centre or in an isolated community.
6. to evaluate and make the necessary program changes to best meet the clients needs.
7. to evaluate the changes occurring in client attitudes toward themselves and the community after graduation from the S. A. F. E. program.

By March of 1991 four hundred twenty five people had gone through the training. More than one hundred people had taken the training more than once to reinforce what they had learned. In all twenty eight training sessions we offered, and nearly six hundred people were exposed to the training. What was not anticipated was the saturation point which would be reached in our own area.

While these happenings were unanticipated, they gave the resource Team an opportunity for re-evaluation. In rethinking the goals and strategies of the S. A. F. E. program had been initiated in order to expose the population to the Alkali Lake New Directions training approach.

"Teen Touch" information available at P.F. Health Complex

Teen years are particularly tough to live through. They are tough for the teens in the family, and they are tough for parents and other siblings. Today's youth are subject to a profusion of stimuli that simply were not part of the picture when their parents were growing up. These differences are even more significant than the teen years experienced by their grandparents. A fact which causes some grandparents to consider their grandchildren to be aliens from another planet.

Some teens sail through their life experience, and others become bogged down in the mire of indecision, ignorance and misunderstanding.

Enter "Teen Touch Inc." Teen Touch, a support service for teenagers in Manitoba is community based, province wide charitable organization. This organization operates a 24 hour distress line for youth. The distress lines are staffed by sixty trained volunteers. Though the name implies it is only for teens, the service is also meant for the families of teens.

The service is confidential, anonymous, and non-judgmental. The main purpose is to provide a safe environment for teenagers and others to seek information, receive referral information, and if necessary discuss their difficulties and concerns.

For teenagers, with their hormones raging, a stressful situation can seem catastrophic. Teens can benefit from the calm, non judgmental, caring, volun-

teer listeners at Teen Touch. It is felt that this assistance will help the distressed teen make a more informed decision about his/her problem, thus preventing or circumventing a more serious crisis.

Teen Touch has been active in Manitoba for more than a decade. The founders of Teen Touch, who were working in juvenile corrections services in Manitoba, recognized a need for a helpline service for youth. The Teen Touch Inc. Distress line began with a handful of volunteers who staffed the line for a few hours each day. The service grew and in 1990, a 1-800 line was inaugurated for the youth in rural Manitoba. In 1983, the first year of operation, the distress line received 212 calls, in 1993 the distress line received 6,036 calls. Teen Touch reports that in 1994 the majority of calls received were from rural teens. Obviously there is a need.

Teen Touch is funded by a weekly Tuesday afternoon bingo, (approved by the Manitoba Lotteries Foundation,) and additional funds are raised through donations, and an annual phone campaign and magic show.

Volunteers concerned with youth and the many issues that affect the, staff the distress line. A twenty hour training program is provided to all volunteers in the Teen Touch program. This training is designed to enhance problem solving skills, teach listening skills and underline the Teen Touch philosophy. Training is also provided to volunteers

regarding youth issues, which include child abuse, suicide etc., and to provide the teen with referral information. Volunteers listen to a caller, offering options and choices, not judgment. Teen Touch does not subscribe to "Call Display" thereby ensuring complete confidentiality to the caller.

Some of the issues received on the distress line in 1993 are as follows:
Alcohol, Legal Information, Peers, Loneliness, Birth Control, Physical Abuse, Pregnancy, Rape, Boy/Girlfriend Relationships, Crime committed, Depression, Runaways, Drugs, STD's (VD), Emotional Problems, Sex Issues, Homeless, School, Homosexuality, Siblings, Incest, Weight Preoccupation, Job Information, Parents

Teens in trouble, or who seek information regarding any of the above issues, or something more personal which affects them have a line to call. Informational brochures are available in the waiting room of the Pine Falls Health Complex.

Pharmacare Claim Reminder

All outstanding Pharmacare claims for the 1994 calendar year must be sent in BEFORE APRIL 30, 1995.

This includes:

- receipts for prescription drugs bought between January 1, and July 17, 1994;
- receipts for prescription drugs bought in another province or territory in 1994.

Please DO NOT SUBMIT receipts for prescription drugs bought after July 17, 1994 (unless your pharmacist has advised you to do so). Starting July 18, 1994, Manitoba's pharmacy computer network began recording all your prescription purchases. Under this new system, you do not have to send in receipts because you receive your rebate automatically after you reach your yearly deductible.

With the start of a new year, you are required to pay the full price for prescription drugs until you have reached your annual deductible level. After that you will pay a reduced price for your prescriptions.

In 1995, the only increase in Pharmacare deductible amounts is based on the Consumer Price Index. Therefore, effective January 1, 1995, the new deductible amounts will be:

- \$130.95 for a family where at least one member is 65 or older;
- \$231.05 for a family where all members are under 65 years of age.

these seasons were serving as a challenge and stimulus for growth among all the people.

What has been learned is that the real culture of day to day life flows along like a powerful river of people moving in the same direction. Individuals moving in that river are pushed along by its currents. It is not easy to move against the flow. Personal healing is a very critical dimension of the whole process of transforming the conditions that have prevented First Nation people from realizing their true potential as human beings. But personal healing needs to be linked to other dimensions of life if maximum gains are to be made in the over all process. There are still some mechanisms required i.e. for community conflict resolution, and participatory decision making, and other structural questions. There is yet another set of questions which are relational. How to get participants to let go of dysfunctional patterns they have lived out for years. Patterns such as manipulation, power tripping, intimidation, lying, smoke screening etc. It will take time. S. A. F. E. is a highly vital component of a long range but very exciting and positive process. The key lessons that have emerged from the S. A. F. E. Program are as follows:

1. Follow up to self awareness training in the form of ongoing mechanisms, such as support groups, reunions, and second phase training is vital. Involvement of graduates in the process of training others is a key strategy that works.
2. Self awareness training needs to be linked to on going community development processes. Producing a contract in which to apply what is learned through self awareness training gives long term support and sustainability to the personal growth process and as well fuels the process of community health development.

3. Training self awareness trainers is a long term process which requires a specific attention to the personal healing and development of the prospective trainers themselves. Unless their personal work receives proper attention, they will not be able to adequately aid others on a healing journey. Also, because some aspects of self awareness training are much like a compressed treatment process, we feel our trainers need counsellor training and an introduction to chemical dependency and abuse treatment strategies.
4. Issue oriented programming (e.g. focused on alcohol or sexual abuse or family violence) is not as effective as process oriented programming which integrates the per-

sonal healing and growth dimension with family, community and institutional development in one coordinated system. This approach addresses the root causes of issues and provides for the building of alternative life patterns instead of the band aiding of a particular problem. It cuts across may program lines and pulls them all together into a co ordinated effort. One of the critical keys to the success of this approach is the learning of participants on a personal and social level. People need to learn how to think and act in ways that lead to wellness in many different settings. This is the long range function of the S. A. F. E. Program.

Future Directions:
The Hollow Water First Nation is planning two new initiatives: A Wilderness Therapy Camp for Community Wellness and the Hollow Water First Nation Justice Committee.

The Wilderness Therapy Camp for Community Wellness is intended for all age groups and will provide an environment in which participants can learn social, interpersonal and life skills on their journey to wellness. Traditional teachings will be part of the experience, as well as work opportunities, in order to enhance self worth and self esteem of participants. Four campsites will mark the progression of participants through the camp and everyone will work at his/her own pace.

The Justice Committee will take an active part in the administration of justice by working with the existing system in determining effective rehabilitative treatment for the accused in the community or in the institution, and will provide input at the point of sentencing. Community resources will be utilized and all methods of treatment will be incorporated to ensure that healing of the individual and the community occurs.

It is anticipated that the two new initiatives and their workers will work closely with CHCH.
