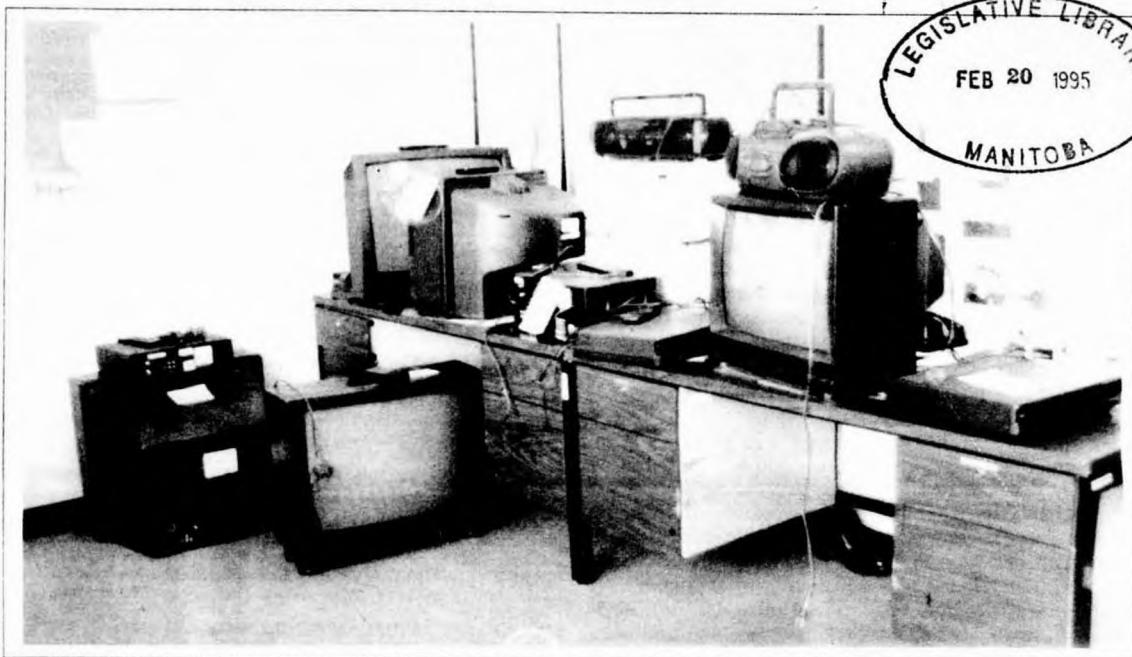


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\$7000 worth of stolen property at the Powerview RCMP Detachment

Mill Buys Post Office Building

The Pine Falls Paper Company has purchased the Federal Government building on Highway 11 for \$75,000. The building had been advertised for sale by tender by the federal government. Three tenders were received, - from the mill, Doug Ursel, and a Manitoba numbered company.

Pine Falls Paper Company CEO Fern Pitre said the company had no plans to use the building, but would probably lease or sell it. He said it was purchased to ensure control of the development of the town.

Canada Post will continue to lease the ground floor of the building.

RCMP Recover Stolen Goods

Powerview RCMP detachment have recovered more than \$7,000 worth of stolen property - and closed eleven files as a result.

Three local young offenders have been charged. One with 12 offences, the others two were to be charged with between five and eight offences.

The stolen property was recovered from as far away as Winnipeg. All of them the proceeds of October Break-and-Enter complaints from local businesses and residences in Pine Falls, The Rock, St. Georges, Powerview, Dufort Trailer Court, and some places in the LGD of Alexander. RCMP are still in the process of attempting to recover other property stolen from these

locations.

RCMP also seized a vehicle as the "proceeds of a crime" because some of the stolen items were traded in for the vehicle, a 1982 Ford Escort.

RCMP Constable Brian Jack said two of the young offenders have been through the court system before, "One of them a lot". He said they were likely to be back on the streets before the story appeared in the press.

Constable Jack advised people to protect their property by making use of dead bolt locks and motion lights. He said owners should record serial numbers because it makes it easier to identify owners of stolen property after it is re-

covered. Constable Jack recommended involvement in Neighbourhood Watch pro-

grams, Rural Crime Watch, Citizens on Patrol, and Community Advisory Groups.

Beaches Nursery School officially open

The long awaited facility, in operation in the old Kindergarten room at the school since November, was declared open by acting president Laura Benedict. Nursery School is separate from the school, has it's own entrance and washroom. Each child has his/her own locker.

MP Darren Praznik was introduced just prior to the official ribbon cutting. He declared his pride in this new facility, not so much for the facility itself, but the manner

in which it came about.

Praznik said, "Here is a service to this community, much needed, which came about because of the perseverance of a handful of determined women. There were many, many obstacles to overcome, but they didn't give up....they didn't wait for Government handouts. They did it themselves. These people have much of which to be proud. Children today, particularly rural children, because of the downsizing of families, and often some remoteness of locale, do suffer

from the lack of interaction with other children. This facility gives the opportunity for this very important step in a child's development. This community and these women have much of which to be proud."

Trustee Ken Avery agreed with Praznik's statements, adding only that he too felt great pride in the efforts of the organizers in overcoming the multitude of roadblocks on the pathway to project completion.

Coffee, delicious sandwiches, and dainties were served and enjoyed by all in attendance.

Emergency Services Continue at Pinawa Hospital

Emergency services continue at Pinawa Hospital, albeit at a reduced level, despite a continued shortage of physicians. The emergency room is closed each evening from Monday-Thursday, 5:00 PM to 8:00 AM, but open the remaining time, including weekdays and weekends.

Since the change in emergency service effective January 9, no medical difficulties have been encountered, according to Judy Coleman, Director of Patient Care for the Winnipeg River Health District.

"During the time when the emergency room has not been available, we've only received six phone calls at the nursing station. Four of these were urgent and referrals were made to another facility. Two were not urgent and patients were advised to see their own physician the next day. No one has presented themselves to the emergency room when there has not been a physician on call. In all cases, the nursing staff follow a protocol to assess the need for medical attention."

While emergency health care continues to be provided by the District for about 60% of the time, confusion still exists among some residents. This confusion stems from the necessity to cover the hospital signs along access highways.

According to Health District Executive Director, Beth Dyck, covering such signs is a standard procedure in all ar-

reas of the province where emergency services are reduced or eliminated. "Hospital signs are basically for the benefit of the travelling public unaccustomed to an area - they aren't meant for residents who presumably know about the existence and location of local hospitals and any changes in operation. When such signs are visible, there is an expectation that emergency medical services are available. Thus, if emergency services are not provided when such signs are visible it potentially opens the health facility to legal liability. The question as to whether or not hospital signs along highways are covered is dictated by circumstance - it is an administrative procedure necessary to protect the interests of the health care facility and its personnel."

Despite the issue of hos-

pital signs, and the reduction of emergency services, residents of the Health District catchment area continue to be well served by medical staff. Nurses, who continue to attend the needs of acute care patients on a 24-hour basis, are still available to perform necessary first-aid treatment during periods when physicians are not available for emergency room service. Says Judy Coleman, "All patients requesting assistance are dealt with during the hours the emergency room is closed. If the medical need is urgent, the ambulance service is dispatched quickly to transport the patient to the nearest appropriate hospital."

Rural Crime Watch - TIP OF THE WEEK

Auto Theft Prevention

Auto theft is a widespread crime that affects the whole community. Higher insurance rates, property damage and possible injuries and loss of life from accidents are the results. It's a billion dollar a year crime. The thieves' motives are joy riding, transportation, or profit (either selling the vehicle or stripping the parts.)

You can reduce the risk of theft of your unattended

car, its parts or contents by observing certain precautions.

The majority of stolen cars were left unlocked, often with the keys in the ignition. whether you leave your car for a moment or for several hours, always lock it and take the keys with you. NEVER leave your vehicle with the engine running. Don't make it easy for a thief!

Be careful of Your Keys
Keep car keys and house keys on separate rings. Never

have an identification tag on your car key ring - thieves may use it to locate your car. Never hide an extra car key under the hood.

Secure Valuables and Parcels
Never leave unattended in your car, cheque books, credit cards, or other such articles. Lock valuables in the trunk.

Park in Well-Lit and Busy Areas

It is important for both your personal safety and the protection of your car and its contents to park in well lit and busy areas.

Secure Registration
Do not keep your vehicle registration or driver's license inside your car. Carry it with you at all times.

Mark Your Property
Criminals have also

found it profitable to steal equipment and accessories. Engraving tools are available to mark equipment and accessories such as batteries, stereos, CB radios and hub caps. The engraving tools may be borrowed from your local detachment.

Discourage the Thief
Some thieves specialize in lifting the door locking buttons with a coat hanger. Consider purchasing smooth, non flared locking buttons for your car doors.

Hood locks are available for vehicles with hoods that can be opened from the outside. Anti-theft alarm systems can be installed on your vehicle. Alarms can be wired to go off if any door, hood or trunk is opened and to detect any movement of the car.

Fuel and electrical cut-off devices can be installed to shut off fuel to a vehicle engine shortly after starting, if

the vehicle is stolen. Hidden switches can be wired to prevent starting a car with a stolen key or to help deter easy jump starting.

IF YOU ARE THE VICTIM.....Report the theft to the police immediately. If your car or accessories are stolen, the police will need specific information to identify the car, parts and accessories:

- *Year and make, model, color.
- *License Number.
- *Vehicle identification number (serial number)
- *Tires - size brand and serial number.
- *Special equipment - CB radios, tape player, etc. - description, make and serial numbers.
- *Dents scratches or other accidental damage that makes your car different from any other car of the same make and model.

Combat Auto Theft (C A T) Program

Manitoba Public Insurance and Manitoba Justice have sponsored the province wide Combat Auto Theft (C A T) program in an effort to curb auto theft. The C A T plan has been effective in preventing auto theft for those motorists registered. Since its inception, 10,000 vehicles have been registered in Winnipeg, and of this number only three vehicles have been reported stolen. Introduced in Winnipeg in November, 1990, the success of the program has prompted a number of local police services across the province to participate.

Registration is easy. If you are a Winnipeg resident you simply send your registration form to Manitoba Public Insurance, to the address listed

on the brochure. You can also register at any Winnipeg Autopac claim centre, or at any Winnipeg Police Service station.

Outside the city of Winnipeg, rural residents can confirm by telephone the participation of the local police in the program. The auto owners can register at the participating police service. In the beaches, registration is possible by contacting either the Powerview or Grand Marais R C M P detachment.

The Combat Auto Theft programs works. Motorists simply state on the registration form that their vehicle is rarely if ever driven between the hours of 1:00 A M and 5:00 A M. These hours are the prime time for auto theft. A reflective decal is given to

each registrant with instructions for positioning it on their vehicles.

Auto theft can strike any of us, wherever we live or work, making crime prevention everyone's business. You can do your part by joining the C A T program.

If police spot a vehicle with a C A T decal being driven between 1:00 A M and 5:00 A M, they will stop it and verify the driver's license and vehicle registration. You can also help if you see a vehicle that you suspect has been stolen by calling your local police or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-8477.

Auto theft is a crime. All vehicle owners suffer as a result of auto theft. The cost of auto theft can far exceed insurance dollars. Lives are also at risk since drivers of stolen vehicles are far more likely to be involved in an accident. Injury or death is too high a price to pay. Register with your local R C M P detachment today. It takes only a few minutes and perhaps one day will save your car.

Generally, when rates rise, the unit value of a fund that invests in bonds or mortgages will fall. Conversely, as interest rates fall, the unit value of a bond or mortgage fund will rise.

Balanced Funds

• So called because the fund manager invests in a balanced mix of stocks, bonds and money market securities to provide both income and the potential for capital growth.

• **Who they're for:** Balanced funds are perfect for investors looking to simplify the investment process, and are suitable for most RSPs. They are convenient "one decision" funds where the experts monitor the mix of investments.

Growth or Equity Funds

• Growth or Equity funds invest primarily in stocks and, as their name implies, strive for growth in the value of your investment.

• Although they can be more volatile than other investments, equities tend to outperform other investments over the long term.

• **Who they're for:** Growth funds are generally recommended for more aggressive investors looking for long-term growth.

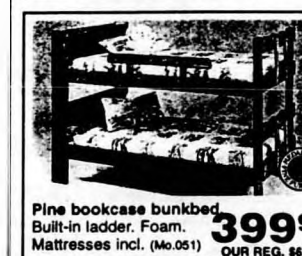
