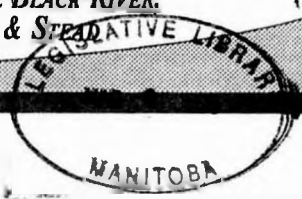

ABITIBI FINED \$50,000

Winnipeg - Feb. 22, 1995 - Abitibi-Price Inc. pled guilty in Provincial Court in Pine Falls to one charge of "depositing a deleterious substance into water frequented by fish," in violation of Sub-section 36 (3) of the federal Fisheries Act.

The court imposed a pen-

alty of \$50,000 which consisted of a fine of \$15,000 and a payment order of \$35,000. The payment order will be used to promote the conservation of fish or fish habitat in the waters of, or adjacent to the Winnipeg River.

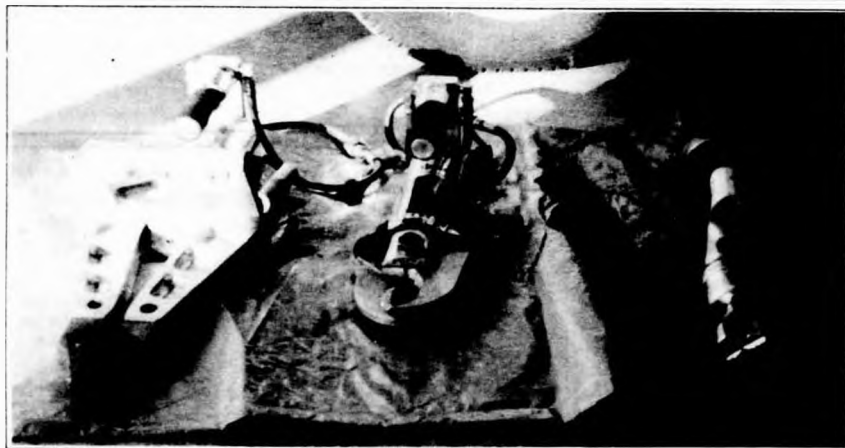
Charges had been laid by

Environment Canada in August 1994 following an investigation into a spill of 828 kilograms of Busan 52 at the former Abitibi-Price mill in Pine Falls on March 11, 1994. Busan 52 is a chemical used for controlling slime and bacterial growth in the paper mill.

Mill employee Craig Schmidt, who was also charged with "depositing a deleterious substance into water frequented by fish" said charges against him were dropped as a result of negotiations between Prosecution and Abitibi lawyers.

Barry Briscoe of Envi-

ronment Canada said that payment order of \$35,000 to be used for the conservation of fish or fish habitat will be disbursed after his department has consulted with federal and provincial fisheries officials and other stakeholders to determine the best way it can be used.

A Little History of a Great Service

Pine Falls District Ambulance was first organized in 1975. The Ambulance Board comprises one member from each government body: ie the RM of Victoria Beach, Village of Powerview, town of Pine Falls, and the LGD of Alexander. One additional member is the representative from the crew. Day to day business is provided by a manager.

In 1994, the call volume was 472 calls. The service operate two modern type 3 ambulances, and one older

model which is used as an Extrication truck. This unit carries "Jaws" and other equipment, including lighting necessary for the removal of trapped people from motor vehicle accidents. This unit can also be used as a command post for multicasualty incidents. There are eight First Responders, or E M A's who are crosstrained to operate this equipment, two of this crew are in Victoria Beach. There are also three members who are basic First Aid.

Pine Falls District Am-

bulance covers a wide area, including several small communities, three Aboriginal communities, and a number of cottare areas. It is not unusual to spend twenty to thirty minutes with the patients, prior to arrival at a hospital. (Sometimes that time frame can be up to one hour.)

Pine Falls District Ambulance provide transfers from more remote northern communities such as Bissett. The ambulance from Bissett is normally intercepted and the pa-

GUILTY PLEA FOR MAJEAU

Alain Majeau, who last summer was charged with two counts of sexual assault on a young female child, and two counts of sexual assault on adult female, appeared in court in Pine Falls on February 24th. After consultation with all parties, Majeau agreed to

plead guilty to one charge of sexual assault on a young female child. One charge of sexual assault on a female child was stayed, and the two charges of sexual assault on adult females were also stayed.

Majeau was set over for sentencing in April.

Caribou Lodge owner fined

Maruice Jean Sala, owner of the Caribou Hunting Lodge on Quesnel Lake, in the Bissett area, was fined in Provincial Court on February 9, 1995. Sala was charged with possession of a gall bladder removed from the carcass of a black bear. He had been

observed by Natural Resources officers, and also by a number of patrons, some who videotaped and photographed the incident, as he removed the gall bladder from a carcass hanging outside his lodge. Sala was fined \$1,000.00 plus a \$320.00 surcharge.

Welfare fraud expands to rural Manitoba

A new telephone reporting line has been expanded to rural Manitoba to help stop welfare fraud and ensure welfare dollars are going to those who need them most.

In making the announcement, Family Services minister Bonnie Mitchelson said the dedicated toll free line will provide a single reference point for reporting potential welfare abuse.

"Welfare fraud hurts our most vulnerable Manitobans," Mitchelson said. "The vast majority of welfare recipients follow the rules but those who don't are taking valuable dollars from a program designed to help our most needy citizens. Manitobans expect their government to ensure their tax dollars are being used wisely and accountably and that is what we are trying to accomplish with this initiative".

The penalties for welfare fraud can include fines and/or imprisonment. In recent years, enhanced controls have been introduced to detect welfare fraud. They include cross-checks with agencies such as Unemployment Insurance, Revenue Canada and Vital Statistics, regular reviews of high risk cases and the creation of a provincial investigation unit to work specifically on welfare abuse.

Suspected welfare fraud should be reported by calling 1-800-230-STOP. All calls are confidential and callers can remain anonymous.

Drug Abuse

Some drugs are legal, like alcohol. Others, like marijuana, are not. Some drugs are medically necessary, such as insulin and penicillin. Others, with moderate use, are rarely harmful. But with ABUSE, drugs can take control of your life. Alcohol is our most popular drug.

As concerned parents you ask yourselves - Will my child use drugs? In today's drug oriented society, it is PREDICTABLE that about 90% of all children will at least experiment with drugs. Your child could very well be one of them.

Easier access to drugs combined with social pressures make drug use more prevalent in today's world. Children experiment with drugs for a number of reasons:

1. Peer pressure - everyone's doing it.
2. Curiosity
3. To draw attention to themselves (underlying problems)
4. As an escape
5. They find it pleasurable

Signs of Drug Use

1. Drastic change of attitude (lazy - spaced out.)
2. Change of diet.
3. Change of friends.
4. Change of hours (coming and going.)
5. Attention span and memory functions reduced.
6. Loss of motivation.
7. Can't account for the way they spend their money (increased need for money.)

Physical evidence (drug paraphernalia)

Plastic bags, Silver foil, Smoking devices (pipes, roach clips), Scales (large or pocket size), Actually find plants or unknown substance, Cigarette papers, Bottle caps or small vials (weed oil)

What can you do when your child experiments with drugs????

There are no easy answers or solutions to this problem.

To The Residents On The East Side Of Lake Winnipeg

If you thought that the surveying on Highway 59, north of Scantbury, meant that this highway would be twinned in 1995, THINK AGAIN!!! After numerous phone calls to MLA Darren Praznik's office and conversations with Mr. Praznik's executive assistant, Bill Hood, and Mr. Barry Prentice of the Highways Dept. in Steinbach, I have learned that two years or more in the future is the soonest any new major works are scheduled for this highway. There hasn't been any more major work on Highway 59 north of where it was last twinned for about 10 years. Other projects have been started and finished or almost completed in this time. For example, reasphalting of Highway 15, now being looked at for twinning. Another example is Highway 44 - twinned from 59 east to near Beausejour. Now they are looking at upgrading Springfield Road to Oakbank, which may require a major bridge over the floodway and the north east perimeter highway expansion, already in progress. What is it going to take to get Highway 59 completed? A major accident with lots of blood, gore and deaths that are publicized on the TV and in the papers?

Two years ago, I was told by Mr. Praznik that Highway 59 was only busy for a few months during the summer. Tell that to someone who does not see all the semis going down the road with loads of logs and newsprint, as well as the morning and evening commuter rush. Maybe it's time and MLA was elected who could speed up this process and get the Highway finished.

PF Fire Department gets air compressor

A \$16,000 air compressor has been installed in the Pine Falls Fire Department Fire Hall. tient transferred to the Pine Falls District Ambulance due to the more advanced skill level of the PFD A crew.

In the event of a necessary transfer to a Winnipeg Hospital, the journey is approximately one and one half hours duration. In these instances Provincial guidelines require one basic first aid trained driver, and a First Responder. The Pine Falls District Ambulance attempts to provide a first Responder and one EMA (Emergency Medical Attendant) on primary call, but the backup crew may be two First Responders, if no EMA is available.

This service coordinates with the Victoria Beach First Response Crew who operate a vehicle containing oxygen, splints, immobilization equipment. The Victoria Beach Responders can stabilize a patient until the Pine Falls Ambulance crew arrives, normally in approximately twenty minutes. This service is a boon in the summer months (particularly on long hot weekends) when the population of the beaches areas swells by as much as 80,000 people.

Dispatch is done by the hospital, with all active crew carrying handheld radios. There is no 911 dispatch in the foreseeable future. However, one member has taken the Emergency Medical Dispatch course should the need arise.

All Pine Falls Ambulance crew are trained to operate a semi automatic defibrillator, provide IV maintenance, and do glucose determinations. Two of the crew, Ken and Irene Gunter are North Dakota trained paramedics as well as EMAs, and have a transfer of function to start IV's and give certain medications. Those transfers of function are: IV starts, Intubation, First Line cardiac drugs, such as Epinephrine, Atropine and Lidocaine; Nitrospray and Lasix for Pulmonary Edema, Diazepam for seizures, Narcan, Ventolin face mask treatment, Epinephrine and Benedryl for Anaphylaxis, Nitrous Oxide, and 50% dex-

trose. Both Ken and Irene are also ACLS instructors.

Currently there are seven EMA's and twelve First Responders. As with most rural services, the casual crew changes with the seasons, depending on jobs and availability. Some crew are from out of the area who provide whis assistance when necessary.

The Pine Falls District Ambulance utilize seven instructors who provide all the First Aid/CPR training for the area. The PFDA also provide crews for public relations activities such as the Terry Fox Run, Festivals, and other activities where expertise may be required.

All crew are encouraged to attend and benefit from conferences such as North Dakota AMT Conference in Bismarck, Manitoba Interact, Interphase Sask. and Onscene Conference. Continuing education is provided with monthly training classes on various subjects as requested by the crew.

To become a crew member of the Pine Falls District Ambulance one is required to take a sixteen hour standard First Aid and Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, and hold a valid Class IV drivers license. Within a year, training will commence in the First Responder. The 1994-95 class will test in Selkirk on March 31. Students spend one day in the hospital for experience and to develop a rapport with staff. They spend at least five or six calls as a 'third' attendant before being sent out alone. A course is also held in Selkirk to become a very necessary EMA.

The Gunters feel very strongly that it is an absolute necessity that rural services must have better trained members to care for the acute patient while enroute to the distant urban hospitals. One crew member who cannot be excluded, Bev Zunti, is currently taking the First Responder Course, but was unavailable for photo or thumbnail sketch. 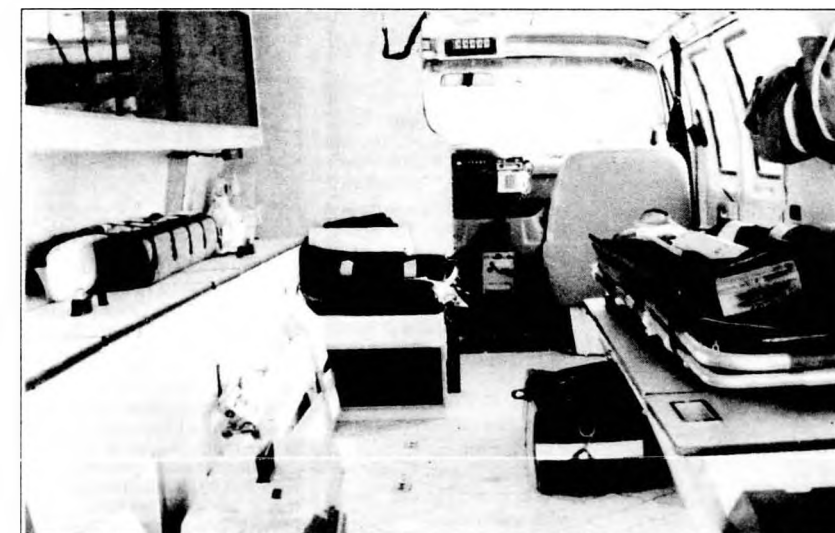

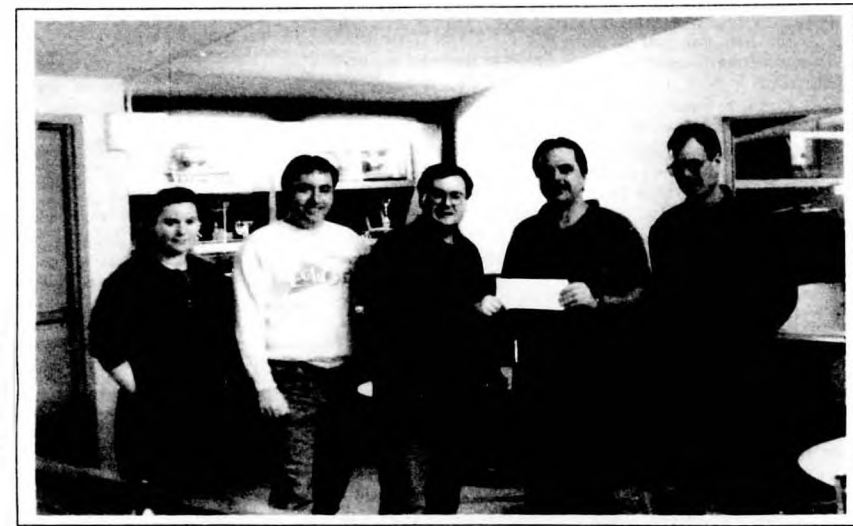
