Agassiz School Division has major shortfall

The Agassiz School Division has posted a shortfall on revenue over expenses of \$1.5 million.

The shortfall comes as the Division wrestles with how to rectify the deficit situation. A public meeting, held February 28th, at the Edward Schreyer School saw approximately 50 people attend to discuss this and other issues with the school board.

In the proposed 1995-1996 budget, the shortfall is recorded as \$1,567,265.00. Board members and school

division chairman Egon Hartwich were disappointed with the low audience turnout at the meeting, particularly because they were looking for possible solutions to the situation.

Those in attendance not only discussed the deficit, but also funding cut-backs, amalgamated classrooms, administrative costs and the possible problems with the proposed school division boundary changes.

"We have a lot of work to do and only so much time to do it in," said Hartwich.

Flett chosen Liberal candidate

A closely fought race between Liberal nominees for the Lac du Bonnet constituency resulted in Bill Flett being chosen as that party's candidate.

Flett won the contest on the third ballot.

A large crowd turned out to the Lac du Bonnet Legion Hall, on March 1st, to help select the candidate. Party

organizers feel the strong turnout shows how much interest there is in the upcoming election. While the ballots were being counted, St. Boniface MLA Neil Gaudry addressed the audience and brought greetings from Manitoba Liberal leader Paul Edwards.

An election is expected sometime over the next two months.

Hepatitis closes Sagkeeng schools All schools closed

An outbreak of hepatitis "A" caused the closing of Sagkeeng schools Tuesday, March 7. A teacher and a student are reported to have contracted the disease which Winnipeg Medical Officer of Health Dr. Richard Stanwick said is very contagious, but not nearly as serious as the hepatitis "B" strain which has been getting a great deal of press coverage lately. He said the "B" strain is rare in Manitoba, but common in Asia where it is associated with a high incidence of liver cancer.

Hepatitis "A" is comparatively mild. In young children it causes a little nausea, and the youngster is "out of sorts" for two or three days. In older people symptoms are more severe; it starts out rather like a stomach flu, after about 24 hours urine turns very dark - and indication that bile from the liver is being passed - skin and eyes turn yellow, and the sickness lasts for seven to ten days. Full recovery often takes two weeks or more.

Stanwick said the disease is caused by a virus which attacks the liver, causing the

jaundice symptoms, it migrates to the bowel and is passed in bowel movements. Stanwick said the disease occurs in Winnipeg most often in day care centres, especially among children in diapers. He advised against sharing things like toothbrushes which he said children often do. He said the most important thing is to wash your hands, especially before handling foods. Uncooked foods like salad vegetables should be thoroughly washed.

"Meticulous attention to hygiene will stop this thing in its tracks" Stanwick said.

Violence on F.A.

-RCMP Powerview detachment

On Feb. 23rd, a resident of Fort Alexander advised that her unlocked residence had been broken into and a video game player taken. She has no insurance and no serial number for the game. Security measures were discussed with the complainant.

A mother reported her son took her vehicle without her consent and rolled it causing damage. Charges are pending for the juvenile.

A person reported seeing a male jump off a snow machine in a ditch by Pedden's and run toward Dufour Trailer Court. A suspect was later located but there was not enough evidence to prosecute for theft of the snow machine.

Feb. 24th, three youths were arrested for shoplifting at the Northern Store in Pine Falls.

A resident of Hillside Beach reported a break and enter. A large ghetto blaster, pellet gun and liquor was taken.

Feb. 25th, Complainant advised neighbour asked him to watch their house while they were away. When he returned he accused the complainant of breaking in and the neighbour punched him in the mouth.

A suspect was stopped south of the dam, the driver showed signs of impairment. He was arrested, chartered, and breath demanded. He failed Breathyser.

A citizen called to advise of a vehicle hitting a hydro pole, knocking out power to the immediate area. One of the 6-7 callers advised that the seat belt was hooked up to the steering column. No one in

the vehicle. Investigation found that a 15 year old female was responsible. She will be charged under the Highway Traffic Act.

A resident of Fort Alexander said her house was entered when unoccupied. Stereo and jewellery were taken. The Pawn Shop is advised. The house was uninsured.

A cottage owner from Traverse Bay reported his cottage broken into and damaged.

A person entered a residence with a rifle and threatened he was going to kill someone tonight. The person was later located at another residence, rifle was seized. Investigation continuing.

Feb. 26th, Powerview RCMP continue to investigate a number of assaults that resulted from fights that broke out at two separate locations on the Fort Alexander Reserve this past weekend. Police were advised of the first situation at a residence on the North Shore and while responding came in contact with a group of males that were attempting to flee to the South Shore. At this time a short car chase took place which ended with one of the suspects vehicle leaving the road and the second one being stopped by police. Arrests were made and a number of items used in the assaults were seized. Investigation has revealed that the second assaults were in retaliation after the first assaults took place. A number of charges have been laid. Most injuries were treated at the Pine Falls Clinic but one male was transported to Winnipeg due to more severe head injuries.

A resident in the LGD of Alexander reported her trailer was broken into, the door kicked in, and a VCR taken. There were no serial numbers or make of the VCR.

On Feb. 27th, a Manitoba employee reported that a high powered rifle was shot at a pay phone. Investigation continues.

Feb. 28th, the principal of the North Shore High School reported the theft of a CD player from the school.

March 1st, an employee of the Fort Alexander Band Office reported money stolen from her purse while she was away from her desk. Many persons were in the area at the time and no suspects could be determined.

The deepening father-daughter relationship between Carol-ann and her dad, Boone, has Joanie worried. Unwilling to let Carol-ann go back to Toronto to live with her dad, Joanie does everything in her power to hold on to her daughter.

When all is said and done, will Joanie let Carol-ann go, or, like those frozen footprints in the moon, will she attempt to freeze time, keeping her daughter with her forever? Combat auto theft

A few weeks ago, as part of the ongoing promotion of police services available in Manitoba, an article on the C A T program (Combat Auto Theft) appeared in the Community Voice. At that time the stickers and registration forms may not have been available from the Grand Marais detachment...well they are now waiting for all who wish to register. The program is simple, and so is registration. Questions are basic, concerning the make, year, model and license plate number of your vehicle, also your name and address.

In a nutshell the C A T program registration says...

"I am the registered owner of the vehicle(s) as described on the reverse side of this form. I volunteer to participate in the Combat Auto Theft (CAT) program. I understand that I will receive a C A T decal which will be placed inside the upper left (driver's side) corner of the rear win-

dow or the driver's side passenger window of the described vehicle(s.)

By participating in the program, I am certifying that the described vehicle(s) is/are not normally operated between the hours of 1:00 A.M. and 5:00 A.M. I understand that the presence of the CAT decal on my vehicle(s) indicate(s) this fact. If the police observe a person operating my vehicle during these

hours, they will reasonably suspect that such person is in possession of said vehicle without proper authorization. This knowledge permits the police to make an investigative stop of the vehicle. I understand that in order to withdraw from participation in the program, I must fully remove the decal from my vehicle(s.) I further agree to remove the decal prior to the sale of transfer of ownership of my participating vehicle(s.)

I realize that persons

operating my vehicle(s) between the hours of 1:00 A.M. and 5:00 A.M. with my consent are subject to a police stop. In these instances, police action will include the necessary precautions generally taken to protect officers when approaching a potentially stolen vehicle.

I understand the advantages and disadvantages, if any, that might occur from these procedures which are designated to reduce the occurrence of automobile theft.

I hereby consent and agree to abide by these procedures. I confirm that I have fully read and that I understand the above, and all information has been completed prior to signing."

Street Proof Your Children:

Helpful Rules to Keep Young People Safe

Most parents want to educate their children about sexual abuse, but they don't know how. These guidelines will help parents to teach their children how to keep safe. Remember, you can't tell a child too much. Knowledge doesn't stimulate inappropriate behavior - ignorance does. Parents who talk openly with

their children will be "askable" parents, and children will feel free to bring their worries and concerns to them in the future.

1. An unattended child is a child at risk. Arrange with your child an alternative place to wait if you are delayed, especially in the darker winter evenings. Suggest a well lit store or inside an arena or school.

2. Always, where possible, have children walk in pairs or groups.

3. Children should always travel the same way home.

4. Use a secret family code. Children should never go with anyone, not even a close family friend, unless they are able to give the child the code. Once the code has been used, it should be changed.

5. Don't allow your young child to go to a public washroom unattended.

6. Check your baby-sitter's credentials thoroughly. In your absence, they are guardians of a priceless treasure.

7. Tell your child it is not rude to ignore an adult who is asking directions on the street. Another adult could be asked for more accurate directions.

8. Tackle the subject of sexual abuse prevention with the same honest, matter-of-fact manner you would attach to road safety. Remember, the only time a child will ask you about sexual abuse is after it has happened. Open the subject and your child will remember that you are askable.

9. Introduce your child to the "hot and cold" game. Describe a situation which is "cool" - "imagine you are walking home from a friend's house..." then make it "tepid" - "you hear footsteps and think someone is following you..." Request the child to make the situation "cool" again and suggest that it would be appropriate to cross the street. Now make the situation warmer by indicating that the footsteps also have crossed the street. Suggest that the child cross back again, and

explain that if the footsteps cross the street for a second time, then the situation is "hot." Ask for ways to "cool" down the situation. You might help with ideas such as going into a lighted store, going into a neighbor's house, looking quickly for a Block Parent, or because it is a "hot" situation, they might yell.

10. Discuss with your child the difference between fact and fiction so that they may understand the nature of taking an oath. (This may be necessary for a court appearance.)

11. If you suspect that an abuse has taken place:

DO encourage the child to talk about it.

DO establish in the child's mind that he/she is not to blame.

DO NOT correct the child's story; listen to the original words, even those which are babyish or family words.

DO NOT suggest or modify what the child is trying to say. Your ideas might confuse the truth.

DO NOT SHOW horror or anger; however if caught by surprise and unable to control your emotions, be clear that your anger is meant for the offender, not the child.

12. When you are aware of an incident of sexual abuse, call the police or the child welfare authorities immediately. Ensure that a social worker, a police officer and someone supportive to the child is present when the evidence is given.

Polaris sweeps Power Toboggan Race Powerview Rink Schedule

First place in every event at the St. Georges Power Toboggan Cross Country Race held Saturday, February 25, went to riders of Polaris machines.

It was a tough, challenging 112 mile course, consisting of two laps beginning and ending on the Winnipeg River outside St. Georges. It began with a very fast stretch of almost two miles on the Winnipeg River and another four miles due East on the Bear River. At the Maskwa club house the course took to the bush on the South side of the Maskwa, crossed the river and followed the North bank of the Maskwa for another 11 miles. This section of the

course was rough, narrow and challenging. It was possible, but difficult, to pass.

The Maskwa was crossed again as the course went South to Bear Creek, Then South East to Coca Cola Creek through the black spruce and cattails of a muskeg swamp. On this flat, wide open stretch, four or five sleds wide speeds of up to 85 to 90 mph could be reached.

The course crossed Coca Cola Creek twice, and returned to Bear Creek perhaps two miles from the Maskwa Club House. For about five miles of this section the course followed a recently graded logging road. The frozen mud and ice allowed speeds of up

to 95 mph. The balance of the lap returned down the Bear river and the Winnipeg River to St. Georges.
