## Winnipeg River gets clean bill of health

About eighteen months ago Sagkeeng asked Health Canada to check the recreational quality of the Winnipeg River within the borders of their community. The study was undertaken last summer, and the report completed in January this year. It was released last week. Following is the executive summary of the report

### Executive summary

The Winnipeg River has played a significant role in shaping the lifestyles of the residents of Sagkeeng First Nation. Traditional uses of the river include a source of drinking water, fishing and swimming activities.

Health concerns have been raised by the community with respect to drinking water quality and recreational water quality. These concerns have been

based, in part, on the activities of the pulp and paper mill which borders the reserve and the fluctuating river levels as a result of the operation of Manitoba Hydro's dam upstream of the community.

In the late autumn of 1993, Sagkeeng First Nation requested Health Canada, medical Services branch, to conduct a survey of the recreational water quality of the Winnipeg River within the confines of the Fort Alexander Reserve. This survey, which took place over the summer of 1994, was comprised chiefly of microbiological and chemical water analyses, site specific physical terrain analyses, and an epidemiological survey of selected community residents. The focal point of this survey was to assess existing site conditions vis-a-vis the Guideline for Canadian recreational Water Quality. All

microbiological parameters analysed were derived from these Guidelines. It was not the intent of this survey to establish any cause and effect relationship between observed conditions and industrial or commercial activities along the Winnipeg River.

Based on the statistical analyses of the data collected during the epidemiological study, there was no increased incidence of gastroenteritis, eye, ear, nose, throat infection, or skin rash from swimming or other recreational activities on the Winnipeg River. Further, this conclusion is supported by the microbiological data which indicates that the microbiological water quality of the Winnipeg River below the Pine Falls Pulp and Paper Mill is generally good.

There is no indication of the potential for human illness

due to exposure to chemically contaminated waters. All parameters tested were within

the safe limits prescribed by the Province of Manitoba's, Surface Water Quality Guidelines.

## Model Forest twins with forest in Mexico

Mike Waldram and Gary Raven represented the Manitoba Model Forest in Mexico last month where they heard that the land of the monarch butterfly was to be incorporated into Canada's Model Forest program.

Towards the end of an international Model Forest workshop held in Morelia in the state of Michoacan, Mexico, February 20 - 23, Dave Brand, Director of Sustainable Development for the Canadian Forestry Service, announced that the Basque Modello Mariposa Monarcha, (Monarch Butterfly Model Forest) would become part of Canada's Model Forest program.

The new Model Forest covers 600,000 hectares SW of Guadalajara in the state of Michoacan. Every year 220 million monarch butterflies migrate 4,500 km. from Canada and the Northern United States to this region of Mexico where they cover trees on hill slopes with a blaze of orange and yellow, giving the appearance of a northern forest in the fall.

This migration, discovered less than 20 years ago, (1976), takes the monarch butterfly four or five generations. The new Model Forest is one of the very few areas where the monarch butterfly overwinters. It is under intense development pressure.

190,000 people live in the region, (Compared with

15,000 in the Manitoba Model Forest, almost twice the size). The population is increasing. The economy is based on subsistence agriculture and there is no welfare. The local indigenous people live by growing corn and beans, primarily for their own consumption. There is a very limited cash economy. The result is a continuous and increasing pressure for more land to feed the growing population. Agricultural land in the region's valleys is gradually spreading up the hillsides, and threatening the winter home of the monarch butterfly.

The role of the Monarch Butterfly Model Forest management will be to coordinate development of the region while ensuring the preservation of the remaining forest. A measure of the scope and size of the problem, and the poverty of the local people, is the announcement by the Mexican government that heads of families who participate in conservation and forest management projects, (tree planting, fire fighting, etc.) will be eligible for a donation of 30 kg. of corn and 10 kg. of beans per family per month. 7,660 families are expected to participate.

The Monarch Butterfly Model Forest will be twinned with the Manitoba Model Forest. The Manitoba Model Forest will be providing technical and administrative assistance. No funding from Canada is planned.

Police Report

Sagkeeng Multiplex to celebrate first anniversary

Look for Red Story, hockey aficionado and storyteller magnifique to be headlining a fundraising dinner at Sagkeeng First Nation Arena Multiplex. Storey, a long time hockey personality, will be relating some humorous stories from his years in the sport.

The celebration dinner is scheduled for 5:00 P M on Sunday, March 19th, 1995. A reception begins one hour earlier. A hockey game featuring the Greatest Hockey Legends will begin at 2:00 P.M. Tickets available by calling 1-204-367-2383. The dinner will cost \$30.00 per person, with a ten percent discount for seniors and students. The game itself will cost \$15.00 for adults, \$10.00 for seniors and students, and \$5.00 for children under 10. Sounds like a terrific event lined up for our communities.

La Verendrye Trail starts marketing initiative

The La Verendrye Trail Association successfully completed its first public exhibition-the March 1-5 Mid Canada Boat Show at the Winnipeg Convention Centre. Manned by volunteers from Lac du Bonnet, Beausejour, Pinawa and Whiteshell Provincial Park, a colourful feature of the exhibit was the attendance of Pierre Gaultier, Paul Chapman, wearing period costume.

Several thousand visitors from Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan previewed plans by the Association to encourage increased tourism traffic through northeast Eastman communities. The La Verendrye Trail will wind through four major tourism/historic zones, including the Red River, Beaches, Winnipeg River and the Whiteshell Park corridors.

Supported by a provincial government grant, the As-

sociation is proceeding to implement its marketing plan. Shortly, in response to a tender invitation, a successful design/advertising company will be engaged to produce the marketing tools necessary to promote the region, including a new exhibit, brochures, and a line of souvenir items.

Initially sponsored by Winnipeg River Brokenhead Community Futures Development Corporation, the Trail Association is now a fully-incorporated body with representation from fourteen municipal governments and regional economic development and tourism associations, including the Tourism Industry of Manitoba - Eastern Zone. Communities are being encouraged to coordinate their tourism strategies with those of the Trail Association so that the impact of marketing activities can be minimized.

Funding to rural Municipalities increased

The Manitoba budget, tabled in the legislature by Finance Minister Eric Stefanson, identified several initiatives to support job creation and strengthen the rural Manitoba economy in 1995.

"Recognizing the very important role local governments fulfil in the province," the budget stated that unconditional grants have been increased \$2 million and that provincial-municipal tax sharing payments are up 6%.

Stefanson also said the government will continue to

support programs such as Grow Bonds, Business Start and the Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) to create jobs and economic development in rural Manitoba, noting that the youth component of REDI is expected to generate 1,100 part time positions in 1995.

"Manitobans are building their communities, their regions and their province," said Stefanson. "They are creating jobs for today and development opportunities for a strong tomorrow."

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## Crime Watch

### RURAL CRIME WATCH

#### Operation Provident

What is Operation Provident? There is a definite concern for the annual loss of millions of dollars from businesses, government, schools and facilities such as churches, community centers and municipal buildings. In addition to deterrence, Operation Provident can assist in the recovery of such property.

A central numbering system, from which a sequential identifying number will be allotted to your organization or business, has been estab-

lished. An application card is readily available through your local Police Department.

To avoid duplication in this nationwide program, the numbering system is broken down into eleven main numbering blocks. The Manitoba Police Commission has been allotted a specific block of numbers, identified as belonging to Manitoba by the first three digits (OP4.) The Commission will systematically assign your number.

This national numbering system will assist any police officer in the country to quickly determine the ownership of recovered property.

#### Hints on Program Development - Marking Tools

Marking tools could consist of an engraver (heavy duty type,) a set of metal

stamping dies or other instruments required to meet your particular needs.

Method of Marking. Where practical, particularly with heavy machinery or tools, it is suggested that stamping punches be used. Delicate equipment such as typewriters, calculators, etc, can be readily marked with the engraver.

When marking property, it is recommended that the number be placed in a conspicuous location to deter theft. Where time and space permits mark articles in two or more locations.

It is also advisable to make an inventory of the items which have been marked, noting the location(s) of the identification number on each item.

You may also be asked to show this inventory before warning decals are supplied.

Program Awareness. It is essential to develop the program with an emphasis upon its deterrent value.

This approach can be facilitated in many ways:

- Use of bulletin boards to explain the goals and procedures of the program.

- Standard 2 1/4" x 4" decals should be placed on office doors, windows and vehicles.

- Smaller 1 1/4" round decals could be placed on larger items such as power tools, typewriters, lawn equipment, fans etc.

- Large decals, 12" x 18" in size, are effective when applied to construction site tool sheds, offices, etc.

With these implementation suggestions, a thief may be less inclined to steal and an employee less inclined to "borrow."

An awareness approach, to facilitate a deterrent factor, it is essential to the success of the program. The more methods used to involve employees or members of the organization, the more effective the program will be.

#### PROTECT YOUR BELONGINGS Who pays for Crime Losses?

We all do. Thefts, break-ins and vandalism costs us millions of dollars each year. These costs are reflected in higher insurance premiums, replacement or repair of equipment and lost production time for the farmer or rancher. And these costs affect us all.

#### Protect Your Tools and Equipment

Lock up your vehicles. Don't make it easy for a thief to steal your truck and trailer from you.

Don't leave major farm equipment out in the field. Anyone can hot-wire a tractor and drive it into a covered truck... or strip a combine of expensive parts.

Store all valuables near occupied buildings. Light up your house, yard, and corrals. Thieves always prefer to work in the dark.

Tools should be locked up too. Small expensive tools, like electric drills, are best kept in the house.

#### Protect Your Grain

If you are a farmer, check granaries frequently; once a week or at least twice a month.

Lock granaries. Mark grain with grain marking agents like "Crop guard" "Grain guard," or "Grainfetti."

Take note and advise police of any suspicious vehicles or people.

Check for fresh tire tracks around bins and entering fields.

Outdoor activities - high kicking, tug-of-war, snowball throw, and snowshoe racing - were set up on Powerview's playground for the day. Students warmed up with hot chocolate and bannock after the games of skill. They filled their morning before and after the games by visiting Joanne Niedermayer's fur display and browsing through an informational table set up by Deloris Abdilla from the Manitoba Metis Federation. As well students participated with their classes in art activities, folk dancing and in the singing of traditional voyageur songs.

Volunteers doled out pea soup and more bannock at lunchtime. Elementary and high school students and staff enjoyed the hot meal.

Powerview students and staff were honoured to be entertained by Aboriginal dancers and drummers in the afternoon. Members of the drum group - Eric Sinclair, Jim Fenner, Chum Sinclair, Frank Sinclair and Blaine Kent - and the dance group - George "Rocky" Abraham, Freda Abraham, Edna Johnston, and Sarina Sinclair - are all from the Fort Alexander area. All volunteered their time to show and explain the meaning of several traditional dances native to this area. Students were thrilled (and exhausted) after participating in a "Friendship

Dance" with the dancers. Much goodwill was evident throughout the activities. A big thank-you from the heart to the dancers and drummers from Fort Alexander. And thanks to Pat Letander for arranging it all!

At the end of the day the playground was decorated with snow sculptures - for example, a loaf of bread with food on top by the grade 7-F class, a bowl of fruit completed by 5-E, a pizza created by 2-E and others.

A great day was had by all. Students went home tired but full of a spark about what was many years ago. Canadian Parents for French thanks all participants, volunteers, and donors of food and supplies.

## Technology

### Computers by Doug Donahue



There is nothing as frustrating as accidentally deleting a file. The MS-DOS 'DEL' command can be a little too handy at times. Although DOS does have a 'reverse' to the DEL command (it is called the UNDELETE command), there is a better way to ensure that your files are not accidentally deleted. This command is the 'ATTRIB' command.

By typing ATTRIB and pressing the ENTER key, you may display the file names in the current directory along with a listing of the file attributes assigned to each file. When a file is created or saved, it is given a default attribute by the operating system. The most common attribute is 'A', which stands for archived file.

If invoked in the root directory of your C: drive, the ATTRIB command will display a few surprises. You will see that there are a few files shown that were not visible before. This is because of the 'H' attribute, which hides a file from view. An example of these hidden files are the IO.SYS and MSDOS.SYS files. The reason that these files are hidden are so that you cannot accidentally delete them from your disk.

These two files, along with the COMMAND.COM file, are essential to your operating system. Delete these and you are in big trouble...unless you have a plan of recovery as mentioned in an earlier column.

To change the attributes of a file or a group of files so that they cannot be deleted, you would add the 'R' at-

tribute. The 'R' attribute will make the files 'READONLY'. If you attempt to delete any of these files, you will receive an 'ACCESS DENIED' message. Although the attribute may be changed so that the file is no longer READ ONLY, the READ ONLY attribute will stop the casual user from changing your files.

To change all of the files in a directory to READ ONLY status, you would enter the following command: ATTRIB \*.\* +R. To remove the READ ONLY attribute from a group of files, you would enter: ATTRIB \*.\* -R. The valid attribute switches are R (sets the read-only file attribute), A (sets the archive file attribute), S (sets the file as a system file), and H (sets the file as a hidden file). A word of caution: DO NOT change files that have the S (system) attribute to any other type of attribute. These files are designated as system files for a good reason.

The ATTRIB command has been an integral part of DOS beginning with the 3.X versions. Although it will not be a cure-all for accidentally erased files, it will alleviate the fear of someone accidentally wiping out all of your hard work.

In the case of an accidentally erased file, you may recover the file using the UNDELETE command. But, more words of caution. If you do accidentally erase a file, do not make the mistake of thinking that you can UNDELETE that file later on. When you delete a file, you are telling the operating system that it may use the space previously taken up by that deleted file. If you

save anything to disk, there is a chance that it will overwrite the file that you wish to undelete, and you will never be able to recover the file. UNDELETE your files immediately if you wish to be certain that you can recover them.

Finally, PLEASE backup your information to floppy disks. In most cases, this is as easy as copying your files to the floppy, labeling the disk, and putting it away for future use. Hard disk drives seldom give any indication that they are about to crash. And when your hard disk crashes, it will most certainly take some or all of your information with it.

You do not have to back up entire directories. In most cases, when you back up an entire directory, you are also backing up the actual program (such as WordPerfect or Microsoft Windows). You probably have the original disks for these programs, which you can use to re-install the programs if necessary. Only back up your data (or information) files. It will save you a LOT of time in the long run.

One final word regarding the backing up your information. It only takes a small amount of time to back up your information to disk or to a tape drive. It takes days (if not weeks) to re-enter lost information if you have not backed up your system and you suffer a disk crash. Please back up your information often. And get in the habit of backing up your information on a regular basis.

### Province and MTS sign information highway contract

The government of Manitoba and the Manitoba Telephone System (MTS) have announced the signing of a major contract to provide a backbone for Manitoba's information highway through-

the province. MTS, which tendered the lowest bid, will build and administer a data transmission network, with the government being the principal customer. The government's volume discount on the network will be extended to the private sector to ensure affordable access for all users.

The network will stimulate economic activity, generate employment opportunities, improve productivity and assist Manitobans to complete in a global economy by removing barriers of distance and time.

The network will provide Manitobans with access to one of the most sophisticated communications networks in Canada, "said Glen Findlay, minister for MTS. "Its development is consistent with a continuing effort to enable a pathway to prosperity by fostering the climate for economic growth.

The government anticipates savings on the cost of data communications of about \$2 million over the course of the five-year contract while providing Manitobans with increased access to govern-

ment, medical and distance education services, the Internet, home shopping, telebanking and entertainment options.

"Manitobans and Manitoba businesses will have a world of opportunities at their fingertips," said Findlay. "An expanded capability to communicate worldwide will increase our competitiveness and provide expanded marketing opportunities."

Findlay also noted that the announcement of the contract marks a major milestone in a process the government started in 1988 to modernize the telephone system province wide that includes the phasing out of rural party lines and establishing a widespread state of the art fibre optic network.

The new network will use fibre optic lines (which can move much more data much faster than conventional telephone lines), digital technology, and cutting edge Asynchronous Transfer Mode (ATM) equipment which is being provided by a Canadian company called Newbridge Networks Corporation. ATM technology will enable a new generation of enhanced telecommunications services for all Manitobans.

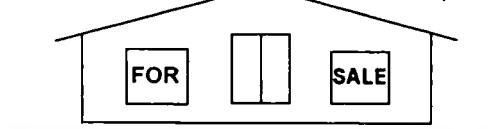
