## Truck driving school opens



Last Monday, Bill Ward began taking applications for the "LOGHAULER" Log Haul Commercial Vehicle Operators Course. By Wednesday he was getting 10 applications an hour.

Ward, operating from the Community Voice office in Pine Falls, placed advertisements in the local papers, and distributed fliers and posters in Lac du Bonnet, Beausejour and Pine Falls at the beginning of the week. He said he was overwhelmed by the response.

Applicants are hoping to qualify for one of the 150 log haul positions expected to become available locally in the 1995 - 1996 logging season. But those 150 positions are only the tip of the iceberg. Pierre Deschamps of the Canadian Trucking Human Resources Council expects Canada to need 24,000 to 38,000 drivers over the next ten years. A survey by Trucking West Magazine indicates there will be a minimum of 840 new trucking jobs for qualified drivers in Manitoba every year for the next five years. The companies surveyed indicated that transcontinental carriers will require between 50 and 70 new drivers a month, local express and delivery fleets, 20 to 30, and specialized hazardous material and flat deck operators 5 to 10 per month. Private fleets will also be hiring new drivers. Salaries are expected to be in the \$44,000 per year range.

Ward attributes most of the rapid increase in demand for trucking to the increase in cross-border transport caused by the increase in trade since *See Model Forest page 2*

## Provincial Campgrounds Opening

Natural Resources Minister Albert Driedger has announced that the majority of Manitoba's provincial park campgrounds are open.

"We are continuing a tradition of providing affordable family fun in our campgrounds, while at the same time improving services and value," Driedger said.

The minister announced three new services for this camping season:

- the expansion of the credit card payment program, offering campers the convenience in eight more campgrounds;

- a new self-guiding na-

ture trail north of Black Lake in Nopiming Provincial Park;

- new camping opportunities at Bell Lake in the Porcupine Provincial Forest.

Park visitors will also see improvements to various facilities and services in parks throughout the province, Driedger said. Improvements at boat launches, camp sites with electrical service, playgrounds, recycling depots and beaches have been made for the convenience of our park users.

Some campgrounds including Grand Beach, Spruce Woods, Hnaua Beach, Lundar Beach, St. Ambrose

and those in the north will open on Friday, May 19th.

Daily camping fees remain unchanged at \$7.00 for basic service, \$10.00 for semi-service (electrical) and \$15.00 for full service (electrical, water and sewer) sites. Park entry fees are \$5.00 for a three-day permit and \$17.00 for an annual permit.

Camping fee payments by Visa and Mastercard will be offered at 16 campground sites this season, including eight new sites. Credit cards will also be accepted when making reservations for Family Vacations Cabins at Hecla Island and Camp Morton.

The Dial-A-Site campground reservation line will begin May 15th. Reservations will not be accepted at Birds Hill during Folk Festival week (July 6th - 9th), at Falcon Lake and West Hawk Lake for the May long weekend and any long weekend at Grand Beach.

"The department is dedicated to continuing to make our provincial campgrounds a place of enjoyment and entertainment for all park visitors," Driedger said. "We will be taking the necessary steps to ensure campgrounds remain peaceful and quiet on the May long weekend and throughout the season."

Model Forest initiates logging truck driver training

the inception of the North American Free Trade Area. He also expects that the ending of the Crow Rate rail subsidy on the movement of grain will cause an increase in agricultural products being shipped by truck.

Model Forest Initiative

The "LOGHAULER" training program was initiated by the Technology Transfer Working Group, a Manitoba Model Forest Sub-Committee. The Model Forest, in cooperation with logging companies and transportation companies, hired a consultant to develop the course with direct input from loggers, cutters, contractors, drivers, and the Pine Falls Paper Co. It is the only tractor trailer training course in Canada aimed specifically at logging. The course covers Log Haul A, B, Super B Tractor Trailer Trains, Winter/Ice Operation and Loader

Operation.

The course is funded by the JUST Training Corporation, Human Resources Development Canada, and the Selkirk Employment Centre. Students will be expected to pay for course material and tests costing about \$100.

International regulations for the registration of drivers are becoming more stringent; drivers must be over 21, have a drivers licence with no demerit points, have no alcohol problems and free of a criminal record. A medical examination is required.

Applicants will be required to buy a study package to prepare for a written test for a Class 1 Learner Permit and Air Brake Endorsement. Interview will be held prior to final selection of candidates.

The course will consist of 8 weeks of classroom and practical, hands-on in-vehicle training, followed by 12 weeks of on-the-job training.

By the end of the course students will be certified as fully qualified in the operation of Tractor Trailer A, B, and Super Train Units, Tractor Trailer Collision and Skid Avoidance Control, Lift Truck and Material Handling Equipment Operation, Transportation of Dangerous Goods, WHMIS, First Aid and CPR, and Winter/Ice Road Driving Skills.

Deadline for applications is 12 noon May 31, at the Community Voice Office in Pine Falls.

Emergency Preparedness Week May 14 to 20

Manitobans are invited to prepare a personal emergency plan for their homes and families during Emergency Preparedness Week May 14 to 20.

In proclaiming the week, Brian Pallister, minister responsible for the Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization (MEMO), said this year's theme is "Family Emergency Preparedness" with a special emphasis on emergency preparedness for people with special needs.

"Flood, severe weather and hazardous materials emergencies can occur without warning and the best protection is knowing what to do before help arrives," said Pallister. "MEMO has a series of family emergency preparedness publications that outline emergency response information and provide guidelines for developing personal and family emergency plans."

MEMO has developed a handbook entitled "Emergency Preparedness for Persons with Special Needs" and it, along with other emergency preparedness materials, has been distributed to seniors' residential complexes, community health and social services offices and municipal offices throughout Manitoba. **Two Honourable Members**

In the last month, two honourable members, David Ifody (Provencher) and Ron Fewchuk (Selkirk - Red River) have sent releases to the media addressing the new Federal Gun Control legislation. The release from Fewchuk mimicked Ifody's lead in questioning some aspects of the legislation.

"I have some serious concerns about some aspects of the bill. I am pushing for the removal of the criminal penalty for failure to register a fire arm. I do not believe that someone who fails to register their shotgun should go to jail or have a criminal record for not registering it," Fewchuk said.

The release from Ifody said essentially the same thing but added that the Honourable Member abstained from the vote in the House when the bill was introduced and therefore did not support it. Gentlemen, it is time to give your collective heads a shake to restore the common sense your supporters thought you have. It is the useless and expensive registration of all firearms that your constituent's object - not the criminal aspects of it.

I can appreciate David Ifody abstaining from the vote. Three Members of Parliament who voted against the government are penalized with removal from all house committees and are relegated to permanent anonymity in the far reaches of the back bench. I think they can do very little in the House because of this censure and Ifody was threatened with the same fate had he voted against the bill. I had hoped that government solidarity and the dictates of Alan Rock would not take precedence over the wishes of the ordinary Canadians. Ifody can be pleased that he has temporarily dodged a bullet in abstaining rather than voting against the bill and his Liberal government. However, removing the criminal aspect of the registration will not mollify irate constituents and will not make the legislation acceptable to most constituents.

One further note, Ron Fewchuk gave the following advice: "The bill is now headed to the committee stage for review. For those people interested in sending their concerns to the Justice Committee, please send a written brief to Ron Fewchuk, M.P. at Room 182, Confederation Building, Ottawa, Ontario, KOA OA6 or Richard Dupuis, Clerk, Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs, Room 622, Wellington Building, 180 Wellington Street, House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario, KOA OA6."

My advice would be to call Messieurs Fewchuk (1-800-668-2485 or 204-984-6703) and Ifody at (613-995-1605, FAX 613-995-1049) and let them know directly how you feel about the gun control legislation, about how well the government is listening to your explicitly stated wishes and about their representation of your concerns.

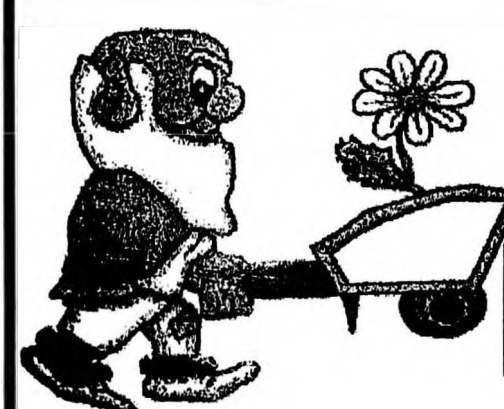

**What is Operation Identification?**

With the increase in summer population in the eastern beaches and Winnipeg River region, all citizens, both permanent and seasonal must prepare their homes for the possibility of break and enters. This means marking all your valuables.

Operation Identification is a program designed to discourage theft of valuables from your home and other locations and to provide a way to easily identify stolen property.

The program has dramatically reduced the profit in stolen goods. Marked articles are difficult to dispose of and easily traced. Thus, if it is advertised that your valuables are protected by Operation Identification, the likelihood of your becoming a victim is lessened.

Operation Identification works whether your property is stolen or lost. Proper identification makes it easier for police to return personal property.

How Do You Join Operation Identification?

Contact your local police or civic group. You will be loaned an electric engraver, free of charge. You will also receive Operation Identification record sheet and decals. The decals should be placed at main entries, to indicate that your valuables are marked.

As well, Selkirk Highway Patrol's presence will be more prevalent on Highway 59, and extra coverage will be given by Powerview Pinawa and Beausejour when needed. The police service dog and handler will also be utilized to assist when required.

Personnel in the police boat will be out enforcing the Small Vessel Regulations in

locks, and other security precautions can be taken to prevent crime in your community.

**Health Watch**

This week's topic is Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome, a potentially dangerous, if rare, disease.

**The Nature of the Disease**

Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome (HPS) is a rare but serious respiratory disease caused by a virus carried by rodents, in particular deer mice. First recognized in the southwestern United States, in May 1993, it was shown to be caused by a newly recognized type of Hantavirus, now called the Sin Nombre Virus.

HPS begins as a non specific flu like condition with fever, myalgia (muscle aches) and often headache, cough, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. The progression is then to respiratory distress and shortness of breath. HPS is fatal in more than 50% of cases. Treatment is non specific making pre-

vention the best defense against this serious condition.

The disease has been diagnosed in 102 cases, mostly in the United States. A few cases have been recognized in the states bordering Canada, also three in British Columbia, and four in Alberta.

It is known that the Sin Nombre virus is present in rodents in Manitoba.

The greatest risk seems to be in situations such as planting or harvesting field crops, when human beings occupy previously vacant cabins or other dwellings, cleaning barns and other out buildings. Danger also exists with the possibility of disturbing rodent infested areas while hiking or camping, inhabiting dwellings with indoor rodent populations, and residing or visiting areas in which the rodent population has shown an increase in density.

Hantavirus is spread to humans by exposure to the urine, droppings or saliva of infected rodents. Exposure

usually occurs by inhalation. A small number of cases appear to have resulted from rodent bites. Exposure by ingestion of food or water contaminated by viruses has not been ruled out.

There are three general strategies to prevent exposure to this virus:

- a) rodent control
- b) prevention of inhalation of contaminated air, and
- c) prevention of skin contact by contaminated material.

Exposed workers should wear goggles and a half mask, air purifying respirator with a high efficiency particulate (HEPA) filter or a powered air purifying respirator (PAPR) with HEPA filters, or a HEPA dust mask. Respirator practices should follow a comprehensive user program. Workers should wear rubber or plastic gloves. Before removing gloves, wash gloved hands in a general household disinfectant and then in soap and water.

Risk reduction for persons regularly exposed to rodents includes informing

workers about the symptoms of the disease, and giving detailed guidance and training on preventive measures.

Workers who develop a febrile or respiratory illness within 45 days of potential exposure should seek medical attention immediately.

### The Manitoba Home Renovation Program Notice of Deadline Extension

If you plan to renovate your home in 1995, you may be eligible for financial support through the Manitoba Home Renovation Program (MHRP). The deadline for submission of MHRP applications and the completion of eligible repairs has been extended to December 31, 1995.

MHRP provides a grant of \$1,000 to qualifying homeowners who complete a minimum of \$5,000 in eligible renovations and apply to Manitoba Housing before December 31, 1995. These renovations must have started after April 20, 1994.

You may qualify for MHRP assistance if:

- you own your home and occupy it year-round as your principal residence;
- your home was built prior to January 1981; and
- the market value of your property, including land and building, is under \$100,000 (based on market value assessed for 1994 tax purposes).

For more information or an application, call Manitoba Housing at 945-2300 in Winnipeg. Outside Winnipeg, call toll-free 1-800-282-8069.

For all eligible MHRP assisted renovations, homeowners must obtain at least two contractor estimates. These estimates must accompany MHRP applications.

Homeowners are encouraged to obtain estimates from contractors regularly employed in the construction/renovation industry. Before hiring a contractor, check with the Better Business Bureau and the Consumers Bureau of Manitoba Consumer & Corporate Affairs.

## History

### SOS: A Call For Help - Part Four

What was the result of all this effort, this huge network of help stretching all the way from the Selkirk Mine down to Fargo, North Dakota, back in the days when distance and isolation made life so much more difficult and hazardous than it is today?

Well, when Dr. Thompson finally reached the Selkirk Mine, on the evening of November 5th, 1923, he found Mrs. Symms in extreme pain. The baby was partly born, but was in the wrong position for a normal delivery. He was able to save Mrs. Symms' life. Unfortunately he wasn't in time to save the baby, which was born dead.

And what happened afterward to all these people, these unsung heroes who worked so hard and willingly to help a woman in distress?

About a year later, Frank and Mrs. Symms left the Selkirk Mine. It is not known if Mrs. Symms ever went on to have more children. The Symms whereabouts in later years are also not known.

Bubbins Baker, after making one complete round trip to fetch the doctor, made a second one a day later to take the doctor back to Manigotagan, after Dr. Thompson was sure his patient was out of danger. In four days Bubbins covered over 125 miles, at least half of

it on foot! He never received any thanks or monetary reward for his efforts. The toughness of body and spirit he showed at this time remained with him all his life, however. He carved out a successful career for himself as a prospector in Manitoba and Northern Ontario. In 1988 he was named Prospector of the Year by the Prospectors and Developers Association for his discovery of the site of the Hemlo Gold Mines north of Marathon, Ontario. He lived to a ripe old age, dying only recently.

Slim and Harry Drew eventually were jointly awarded the Popular Radio Medal for Conspicuous Service by Popular Radio Magazine in 1926, for their efforts in saving Mrs. Symms' life.

Harry Drew lived in Fargo all his life, working for the local newspaper, the Fargo Forum, in a mechanical capacity, either as a printer or on the presses. He continued his hobby of Ham radio. Slim and he met only once face to face, when Slim went down on a trip through the United States in the fall of 1936, and visited Harry on his way through Fargo.

Slim stayed on for another year at the Selkirk Mine, working as part-time radio operator and in the Assay Office. He left the mine in the fall of 1924. Encouraged by Frank

Symms and P.L. Smith, who were pleased with his work, he went back to university to train as a mining engineer, and went on to have a career in mining. In later years he dropped the nickname "Slim", and was known to everyone as George Reynolds. He is my father. I heard this story many times from him as I was growing up in Bissett. Dad also remained a Ham radio operator until the time of his retirement from San Antonio Gold Mines in 1966. Though he eventually made radio contact with Ham operators on every continent, he never sent another message as important as the one he sent on the evening of November 5, 1923.

The Selkirk Mine continued operations until 1925, when it closed suddenly around Christmas time, due to lack of ore. The mine employees and their families were forced to walk out to Manigotagan when this happened, retracing Bubbins Baker's route. The mine reopened and operated off and on for the next few years, eventually becoming known as the Poundmaker Mine. Today it is reachable by a pulp road branching off Highway 304 between Manigotagan and Bissett. A wooden bridge built over the Wanipigow River above Silver Falls is near the

spot where Bubbins and Dr. Thompson made their perilous crossing so many years ago. To reach the actual mine site you have to walk the last quarter mile over a rough bush road. Only traces of the original mine buildings remain, and the radio shack where Slim toiled for so many hours to send out his call for help has long since disappeared. On August 27, 1988, we walked in over this road with my Dad, to commemorate the 65th anniversary of his arrival at the mine.

One more person in this real life drama remains to be accounted for - the doctor.

Dr. Thompson eventually had four children, one of whom, Mrs. McIntosh, now lives in Winnipeg. She says that her father went on to have a long and successful medical career in Riverton. People as far away as Manigotagan still mention how well liked he was as a doctor. He also went on to be elected MLA for the district, and remained in practice as a G.P. until near the time

of his death at the age of 72. Mrs. McIntosh says her father never talked about the events described here, presumably because medical emergencies like this were such a common experience for him. He crossed Lake Winnipeg numerous times on errands of mercy, travelling in a variety of ways. Once he even skated across.

The new facts Mrs. McIntosh knows about this incident at the Selkirk Mine she learned from her mother, who told her that her father returned from his adventure very stiff and sore from the long horseback ride. She also said that Dr. Thompson was never paid for his efforts in saving Mrs. Symms' life. In those pre-Medicare days, people had to pay the doctor directly for any medical services he performed. Oak Hammock Marsh - The Interpretive Centre at Oak Hammock Marsh is pleased to announce the opening of an exhibit of the work of Colleen Nelson. It represents 40 years of drawing and painting - Colleen Nelson's life work.

Back in 1962 at the renowned Delta Waterfowl and Wetlands Research Station, Colleen commenced her study and painting of live day-old waterfowl. Downy young are notoriously difficult to identify and no one had taken up the challenge to create an illustrated key on the subject. It became Colleen's work for three decades.

"I started with drawings of Kinglets that stay about 50 feet above the ground," said Colleen with a smile, "then someone suggested I do something with downy waterfowl." She meticulously drew newly hatched waterfowl from eggs brought from the wild. Packed in specially designed crates, the eggs were hatched at her home. The drawings were made while holding the babies in one hand and working with the other. The birds were

weighed, measured, sketched, colours noted and recorded. One tiny bird could be studied for 5 to 7 days from hatching. By that time, the downy coat was lost. "Most were fairly calm," said Colleen, "but every once in a while, in a clutch of 7 or 8, there would be a runner."

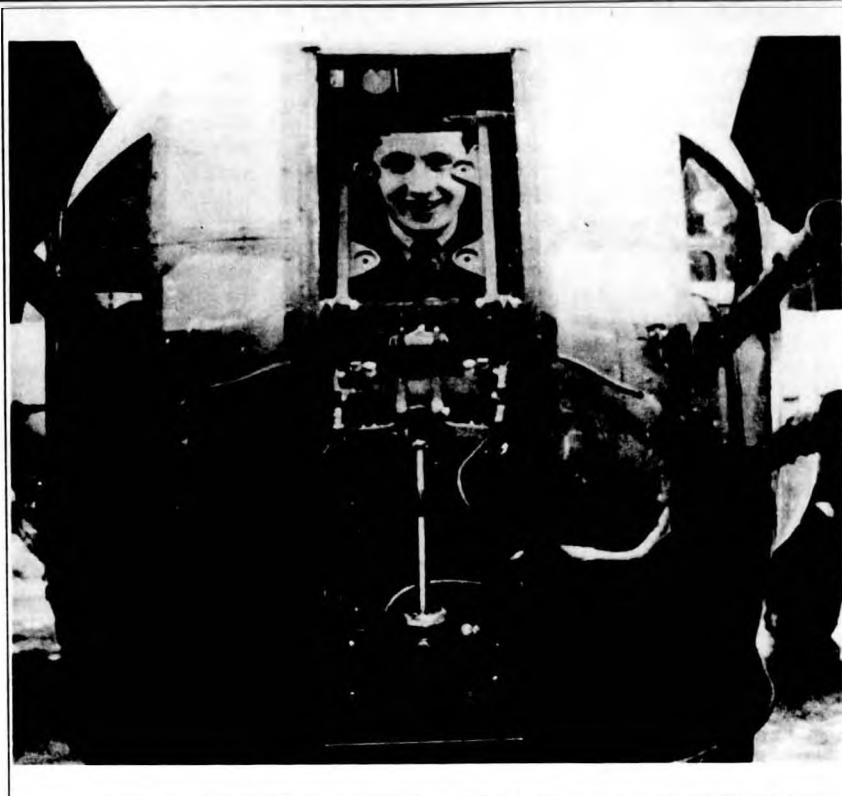
Her paintings and sketches (that were finally published after years of trying) are on exhibit at the Centre. The work is breathtaking and overwhelming at the same time. The detail is flawless. The technique Colleen perfected brings the downy, coated hatchlings to life. It defies description. Her specimens, tools and field and studio equipment are on display, along with the finished drawings and paintings.

This exhibit is worthwhile. Because of her health, there will be no more sketches from Colleen Nelson. While it is available, please take advantage of this opportunity to see this excellent work and honour Colleen for her contribution. The exhibit will be open to the public until June 26, 1995.

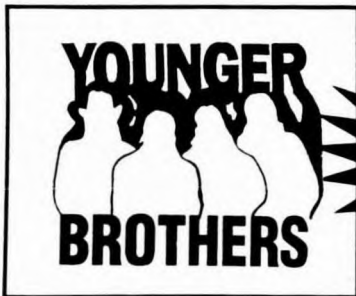
