Rea Gold's Bissett Gold Mine

BISSETT MINE TO BE IN PRODUCTION IN EARLY 1997.

Rea Gold, owners of the Bissett Gold Mine, have stated that they expect the mine to be producing gold sometime during the first quarter of 1997.

Rea Gold acquired the property (then known as the San Antonio Gold Mine) in 1989. Four years later, with gold prices stabilized in the US \$380/oz. range, the Manitoba government introduced the Mineral Exploration In-

centive Program. This program enabled the company to raise the necessary capital to finance a \$3 million exploration program which identified sufficient gold reserves to render the property viable.

This year, two feasibility studies, one by Rea Gold, and another by independent mining consultants H. A. Simons, of Saskatoon, identified one million ounces of reserves

which could be mined at a cost of U.S. \$238. The cost of putting the mine back into production was estimated to be approximately \$50 million dollars. This will provide for an increase of milling capacity from 700 to 1000 tons per day, and the installation of a "leach circuit" to allow for the production of dore gold (bricks containing 85% gold

and 15% silver)

The mine has sufficient reserves for at least ten years of production. Continuing exploration is expected to identify enough reserves to keep the mine open considerably more than 10 years. The company's consultants have identified areas to the Northwest and Southeast of "D" shaft and below the main ore

body as regions for future exploration.

240 people will be employed at the mine when it is in full production. An underground mining training program is to be established, in conjunction with Canada Manpower, to train local people, especially from Wanipigow, Manigotagan and Little Black River.

INTERNET TO COME TO PINE FALLS

Local residents who are interested in taking advantage of the Internet are being asked to sign up at Pro Hardware. A node in this area would eliminate long distance charges to

Winnipeg. Costs are expected to be \$150 per year, which includes 40 hours of free on-line time. Subsequent on-line time would be approximately 3 cents per minute. Full details in next week's issue of The Voice.

The bottom line is still.....mark your valuables, if you are a cottager, take all your valuable property back to your home. Do not leave anything of value in your cottage. Record the serial numbers of your property. Become involved in your community policing.

If you've been a victim of a property crime you will feel violated and angry. Write down your feelings in a letter to the Crown Attorney expressing your feelings...and mail it. (The address is available from your local detach-

ment.)

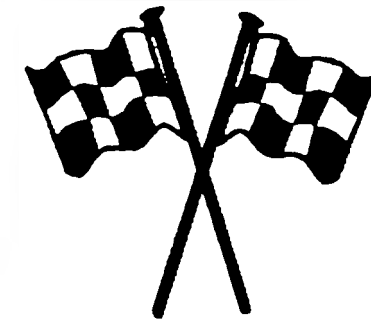

Community Health Watch

Material used in this column compiled and edited by Lorraine Neal. Source of todays topic - Safeway Nutrition Awareness Program. Child Care...What to Feed a Child of 1 - 5 years...

Parents and child care providers are all to familiar with the actions of a small child who is determined he/she will not eat the food offered. Who among us doesn't remember the spilled food, milk and the spit out carrots? The advice to follow is merely a guideline as to how and what to feed your child.

Make Mealtime Happy:
• Serve small portions - let children ask for seconds. Introduce new foods along with favorite foods.

• Relax - don't bribe or reward with food.
• Use finger foods, it's easier for a child.

• Helping with meals can be fun - children may eat foods they help to prepare.

• Don't force a child to eat.
• Young children are easily distracted - keep the T V off during mealtime.

• Offer foods with a variety of colors and textures.
• Children like to eat with the rest of the family.

Exercise is Important
• Fat children tend to be less active than normal weight children.

• Active play and exercise should be encouraged every day.

Bottle or Cup After One Year?
• A child should now be drinking from a cup.

• Too many bottles may decrease a child's desire for solid food.

• Offer milk, fruit juices and water in a cup - the earlier the better.

• Prolonged bottle feeding can lead to dental problems.

Growth and Appetite
• A child's growth and appetite will slow down around the age of 2 years.

• Appetites differ from day to day, from year to year, from child to child. Let your child's appetite be the guide.

Problem or Normal Behavior?
• Holding food in the mouth is often a way of "tasting" foods.

• A child may want to eat the same food for several days -

don't worry.
• Tastes change - foods once refused may later be accepted. Keep trying!

• Playing with food could mean a child is not hungry, wants attention or is not feeling well.
• Some messiness is normal - after all, a child is just learning to eat.

Children as young as one year can be fed using the four basic food groups. Remember to include snacks...they are needed by the very young child and should be planned as a part of the daily diet. Include such foods as: fruits and vegetables, cheese, crackers, peanut butter, hard cooked eggs,

milk, 1/4 cup of hot cereal, (not too hot) and half a banana. A mid morning snack might be 1/4 cup orange juice, a hard boiled egg and a graham cracker. Lunch could be 1/2 peanut butter sandwich, two tablespoons of peas, 1/2 a peach or other fruit, and 1/2 cup of milk.

Dinner could consist of 1/4 - 1/2 cup cooked long grain rice, 2 tbsp of carrots, 2 tbsp of applesauce or other pureed or chopped fruit, and 1/4 cup of chopped chicken or other cut up meat.

Breakfast for a 2 - 3 year old could consist of basically the same as a one year old, but could now include dry cereal

hard cheese (cheddar).
A nourishing lunch would be 1/2 cup of milk, one half cup of soup, 1 slice of bread and a half apple sliced. A mid afternoon snack of 1/2 cup yogurt and 3 or 4 crackers would be great.

Dinner should consist of 1/8 cup of ground beef well cooked in a patty, 1/3 cup cooked noodles, 1/4 cup broccoli or other vegetable, 1.2 cup milk and 1/2 cup lettuce salad.

Menu planning for the 4 - 5 year old includes basically the same foods as earlier, but adds new foods.

Breakfast can include 1 scrambled egg, 1 slice of toast, or dry cereal, 1/2 cup orange

juice and 3/4 cup milk. Mid morning snack of 1/2 cup pineapple or other juice and 3 or 4 crackers, cubes of cheese.

Lunch 3/4 cup milk 1 tuna sandwich, and 3 or 4 carrot sticks. Mid afternoon snack of milk and celery sticks with peanut butter.

Dinner could be 1/2 cup salad with spinach, 3/4 cup milk, 1/3 cup chopped chicken or other lean meat, 1 slice of bread, and 1/2 fruit.

Meals can include raw vegetables and fruits. Children introduced to salads and other raw fruit early generally do not become picky eaters.

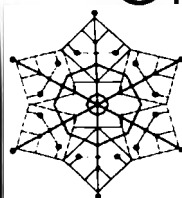

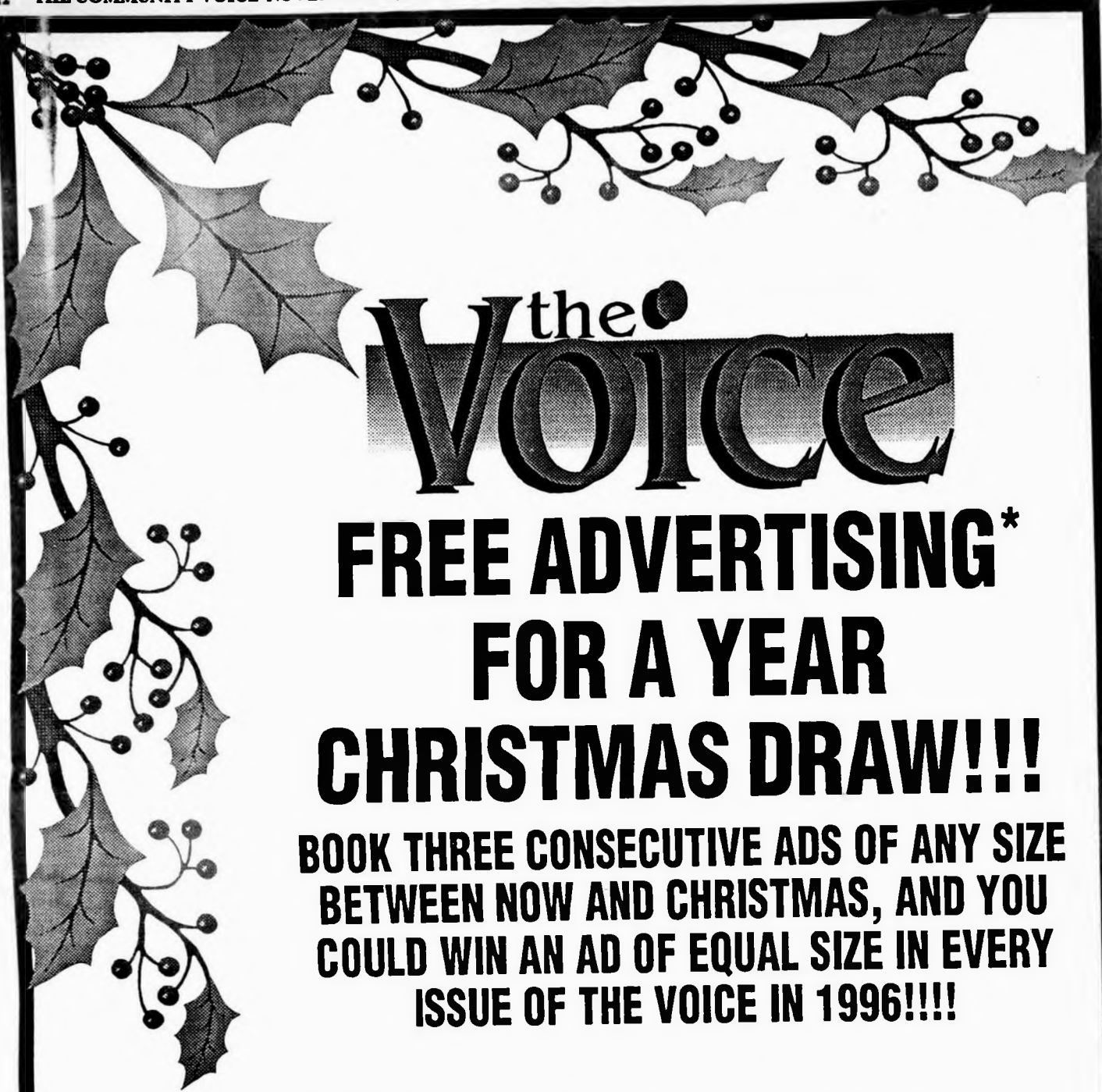
