Research could lead to new mines, jobs for Bissett Region

Government funding, new technologies make for renewed gold rush around Bissett

Energy and Mines Minister Darren Praznik announced approval of eight new exploration projects totalling \$321,000 through an interim offering of the Manitoba Mineral Exploration Assistance Program (MEAP).

"We are committed to ensuring a business climate that makes Manitoba the best place in Canada to invest in mineral exploration and development," said Praznik. "Through MEAP, we can increase exploration of our vast mineral resources and attract new companies."

Exploration expenditures for the projects are valued at \$1.2 million, the minister said. Since October 1995, MEAP has allocated \$3.7 million in financial assistance for proposed exploration expenditures of \$15.9 million.

MEAP was instrumental in the research and development that resulted in Rea Gold's Bissett Mine going back into production earlier this year. Not coincidentally, three of the eight projects approved for funding are located in the Bissett Region.

Of these three, the one with the greatest potential appears to come from Mid-North Resources of Calgary. Their research could spur the re-establishment of Central Manitoba Mines, which in its heyday was the province's number four producer of gold.

Mid North's claims in-

clude the Central Manitoba Property consisting of 11 contiguous mining claims totalling 1941 hectares, and the Cryderman property consisting of 5 contiguous mining claims totalling 600 hectares. The properties are located about 25 km south of Bissett, and both are crossed by highway 304.

Mid-North's president Robert Dunlop said the MEAP was a vital factor in his company's decision to focus on this area. "I can't [stress] enough the importance of the program," he said. They hope to get started on drilling projects within the next week or so. They are confident that an economic deposit can be discovered on the properties.

The other two projects to affect the local area include a proposal by Asquith Resources Inc. of Toronto to

research the viability of a small, yet high grade gold mine which was in operation in the 1930s. This project is located 50 km south of Bissett in the Rice Lake area. Their drill program is scheduled to begin on July 1st and it is hoped that they will find a larger deposit. The other project is to upgrade geophysics research started in the 1960s to determine the quantity nickel and copper deposits in an area near Bird Lake. The numbered company 2411181 Manitoba Ltd. intends to use new equipment to cover more ground than previous explorations covered. Work is expected to begin in the Fall.

The closing date for the next offering is Nov. 15, 1996. This represents a change to the planned January 1997 date to better accommodate winter projects.

BEAT THE HEAT, BBQ A ROAST

Roasting Tips:

Select an evenly shaped, boneless roast which has some outer fat to prevent the roast from drying out during cooking. Rolled rib and tenderloin roasts can be barbecued without any preparation. Medium tender cuts such as round (inside, outside, eye.), rump and sirloin roasts are great cuts for the barbecue, especially if they are marinated for increased tenderness. Season tender cuts, but do not salt. Marinate medium tender roasts for at least one hour. Roast can be marinated overnight for extra flavour and tenderness. If using a rotisserie, insert spitrod lengthwise through the centre of the roast and check for balance. Tighten holding forks, inserted at right angles to each other. The roast must turn with the rod and not the slip. For non-rotisserie cooking, lightly grease the grill and place roast directly on grill. Cook over indirect heat, at medium temperature. To use indirect heat, move coals from directly under the roast.

If using a gas barbecue, heat grill on one side only and place roast on opposite side. To prevent flare ups, place a drip pan below the meat. A disposable foil pan is ideal and can be kept from burning by adding about an inch of water in the bottom of the pan. Keep water topped up as it evaporates. The small amount of steam produced also helps keep the roast moist. Roasting times will vary depending on barbecue temperature and weather/wind conditions. As a guide, roast 20 min/lb (45 min/kg) for rare, 30 min/lb (70min/kg) for medium, and 35 min/lb (85min/kg) for well done. For medium tender cuts, it is preferable not to cook to the well done stage. However, for accurate doneness, check internal temperature by inserting a meat thermometer into the centre of the roast after three quarters of the cooking time has elapsed. For rare, the internal temperature will be 140°F, medium 160°F, and well done 170°F. For easier carving, allow roast to rest about 15 minutes before carving. This will allow the juices to be re-absorbed and distributed evenly. Carve across the grain.

Canada's Information Highway: Jobs and Growth Through Innovation

Around the world, economic growth depends increasingly on knowledge and innovation. Of the 12 Canadian industries with the strongest records of growth and job creation between 1986 and 1991, nine were knowledge-based industries. This new economy relies on the worldwide electronic networks that make up the information highway. Last month, the Liberal government released its plan for building Canada's information highway, to ensure that Canadians can take advantage of its jobs and growth potential. A number of Liberal government initiatives are aimed at increasing access to the information highway, and ensuring that Canadians have the skills to use it. An example is the new Student Connections Program. Over the next three summers, the federal government will hire 2,000 students to set up Internet access and provide training for 50,000 small and medium sized businesses.

The information highway is a powerful tool for Canadian businesses working to become more competitive and to find new markets. The federal government offers electronic information and expertise to Canadian businesses, through the Strategis web site (<http://strategis.ic.gc.ca>). Strategis was launched in March 1996 to provide business with information on new markets, new technologies and opportunities for expansion in certain industries. The site includes 60,000 reports and 500,000 pages of research documents. The new federal strategy for science and technology, released in March 1996, includes a plan to make the results of federal government research available to the private sector through the information highway. The government also plans to gather and make available information on international science and technology developments. To ensure that Canadians have broad access to the information highway at a reasonable cost, a national access strategy will be unveiled by 1998. The government has funded initiatives such as Community Access and SchoolNet, to bring Internet access to 1,500 rural areas, 16,500 schools and 3,400 libraries in Canada by 1998. Some Canadian businesses

and individuals are concerned about possible misuse of confidential personal and business information on the information highway. The Liberal government will protect Canadians' right to privacy with framework legislation to protect personal information in private sector databases. Federal government initiatives are helping Canadian individuals and businesses take advantage of an indispensable tool for creating jobs and boosting economic growth in Canada. Technology is changing rapidly and we as Canadians must keep pace if we are to succeed in a highly competitive, global marketplace. Sun - Skin Sense - Preventing Skin Cancer

It's Up to You...
The skin, being the largest organ in our body is essential to survival. Skin protects us from dehydration, from natural elements such as the sun and bacterial infections, and from other aggressors such as pollution. Skin is constantly under attack and is adaptable to a variety of stresses. It has several layers of specialized tissue. The outer, more mature layer sheds continuously (every four to six weeks in persons who have not been sunburned.) However, skin has limitations as it undergoes changes in

response to internal or external conditions. Sometimes skin becomes damaged and skin cancer develops.

There are three main varieties of skin cancer: basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and malignant melanoma. Basal and squamous cell carcinoma develop on skin that is exposed repeatedly to the sun, while malignant melanoma can develop anywhere on the body.

Areas of the body that are exposed to the sun repeatedly, such as the face, neck and hands are where cancers occur most often, particularly on white skinned people. These cancers appear on the skin surface in later years and progress slowly. These cancers do

not spread to other parts of the body, therefore are not generally known to cause death. Local surgery removes them easily.

Malignant melanomas account for only one or two percent of all skin cancers, but they are the type most likely to be fatal.

Skin cancer is caused mainly by exposure to UV rays. Ultraviolet light is invisible to the naked eye and is given off by the sun or certain kinds of lamps. Fair skinned, freckled, and red haired people are vulnerable as they have small amounts of pigmentation which increases penetration of ultraviolet rays.

Children and infants should never be exposed to the rays of the sun. Their skin is very thin, more sensitive and therefore less protected against penetration of ultraviolet rays. Even a brief exposure between 10:00 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. can result in serious sunburn.

Most people can prevent skin cancer by simply not over exposing themselves to the sun and to ultraviolet (sun) lamps. A suntan and a sunburn are different, but both are evidence of skin injury. When acquiring a tan,

ultraviolet rays have darkened the melanin, or pigment in the skin. Tanning does protect somewhat against sunburn, but not enough. Skin damage has already occurred.

Suntans are not evidence of good health!

To avoid the harmful effects of ultraviolet rays:

- Conduct outdoor activities in shaded areas.
- Wear a broad brimmed hat, long sleeved shirt, long pants and gloves when working in the sun.
- If you can't cover up, use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15.
- Avoid tanning altogether, or at least during the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 3:00 P.M. during summer.
- Avoid sun lamps.
- Take care with medications. Some prescriptions such as tetracycline can make your skin more sensitive to UV rays. If in doubt consult your physician.
- Protect your eyes with sunglasses that filter out UV rays.

Protect your children by doing the following:

- Never allow infants or young children to play or sleep in

a carriage, stroller or playpen in direct sunlight.

• Monitor children's activities in the sun, even when using sunscreen.

• If children must be outdoors for long periods protect them with clothing that covers their skin, and ensure they wear a hat and sunglasses.

Get children used to wearing sunscreen lotion, particularly on their face, neck, shoulder, back, knees and tops of the feet.

• Never allow children or teenagers to use sun lamps.

Detection.....

The best way to detect skin cancer early is to examine your skin often. If you notice any of the following signs, contact your doctor immediately:

- Any abnormally dark or discoloured patches or spots.
- Bleeding, crusting or change in the colour, size or shape of a mole.

Subscribers to Victoria Lifeline are monitored by a team of staff members who answer the call 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Life-

line subscribers are seniors who may live alone, but like the assurance that help is only a button away.

Quick intervention is often critical, particularly when a person is suffering a stroke, heart attack or fall. Minutes count. When a call comes in to Victoria Lifeline, information is instantly displayed on a computer monitor. If help is needed, Lifeline sends a family member, friend, neighbor, or emergency responders (ambulance) if it is an emergency situation.

Lifeline services are not only about support for the elderly, they are about maintaining dignity by helping people remain independent in their homes and circle of family and friends. Sometimes Lifeline responds to calls from people who just need the reassurance there really is someone there.

A model of simplicity, Lifeline is a telephone, with a check button, and a button worn by the subscriber. The button worn by the subscriber activates Lifeline the instant it is pressed.

Although the calls go to Victoria General Hospital in Winnipeg, there is no long distance charge when using Lifeline. Even if the system is activated accidentally, or if the subscriber is just checking.

Lifeline enjoys wide usage in Winnipeg and other areas of the province, for it gives peace of mind to both the subscriber, and to the family of that subscriber. Aging parents often do not live close to other family members. Lifeline staff-

ers are trained to stay with the subscriber until they are sure everything is taken care of.

This service is available in this area. Thelma Hanson, Resource Coordinator for the Winnipeg River Senior Services Inc., has been trained to install and explain the units. Each

unit requires a standard MTS phone jack system, and an electrical outlet. There is an installation fee, as well as a monthly monitoring fee. The calls made to Lifeline are NOT long distance. SNAP SHOTS

Jean Dupont is one of 10 children born into Albert and Febronie Dupont's family. He was born and raised in St. Georges and knows much about the town and its history. Currently Jean is the St. Georges Museum curator and also works as a pea farmer, along with some of his brothers. Jean has an interesting hobby, he silk-screens all the bags for the peas he sells, plus the T-shirts and sweatshirts sold in the museum. He sets up his frame right in the museum and works in the evenings. This keeps Jean very busy because he has to meet his quota of 1,500 pea bags per season, plus over a hundred clothing items. Usually, the season for the museum runs from the long week-end in May to the Labour Day week-end in September. The average number of visitors per summer is 1,500-1,800. Jean has two favorite items on display: the St. Georges peas - because he grew up on them and still loves eating them, and the St. Georges Ferry - because

it is such an important artifact in preserving local history. I asked Jean how they came across some of their museum items. Many are donated, some are bought, and others are discovered by luck. He proceeded to tell me a story about how one day in the late 1960's, he was out seeding in a field while his brother Andre was harrowing. Andre saw a grey spot of some type of rock in the field, so he went to see what it was. The oddly shaped rock turned out to be a Tomahawk head which was in excellent condition. Now this artifact is on display in a case at the museum. The St. Georges Museum opened up in 1970. Jean enrolled in a curator course at the Winnipeg Museum of Man and Nature from 1975-76. In 1992, Jean received an award called the Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of Canada. His comments on that award were: "The medal

actually belongs to the entire Board of the St. Georges Museum, not just to me, because we all worked hard at getting the museum started and making it work." This man has had the good fortune of living a life that combines both his many talents and interests. St. Georges is an historically rich community and Jean Dupont is one man who is committed to working hard at preserving those memories.

The first paragraph: "No accessory building shall be located nearer to the main buildings on the same site than a distance of thirty (30) feet, clear of all projections." is hereby repealed and replaced with the following: "No accessory buildings shall be located nearer to the main buildings on the same site than a distance of ten (10) feet clear of all projections."

(2) SECTION D7 "SR1" SEASONAL RESORT DISTRICT

Section D7 . 3 . 6 Accessory Buildings as follows:

The first paragraph: "No accessory building shall be located nearer to the main buildings on the same site than a distance of thirty (30) feet, clear of all projections." is hereby repealed and replaced with the following:

"No accessory buildings shall be located nearer to the main buildings on the same site than a distance of ten (10) feet clear of all projections."

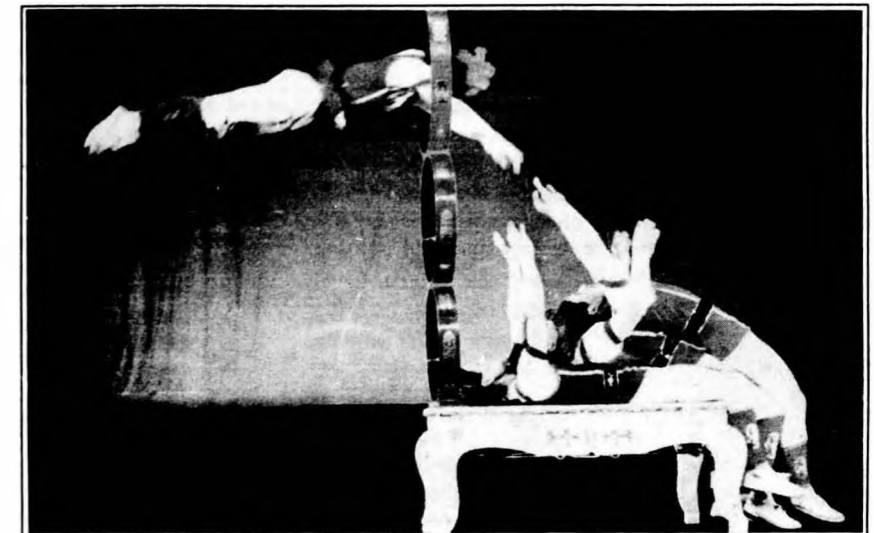

Embodiment of a Traditional
Chinese Art

More than just a show, the Chinese Imperial Circus is the embodiment of a traditional Chinese art form which can trace its history back over 2000 years to the Qin and Han Dynasties. It has influenced the development of Chinese opera, drama, acrobatics, theatre and ballet. After the founding of the People's Republic of China in 1949, the circus in China was guided by the principle of "Letting a hundred flowers blossom and weeding through the old to bring forth the new". Chinese circus developed into a thoroughly entertaining art form which appeals to all ages and all walks of life. 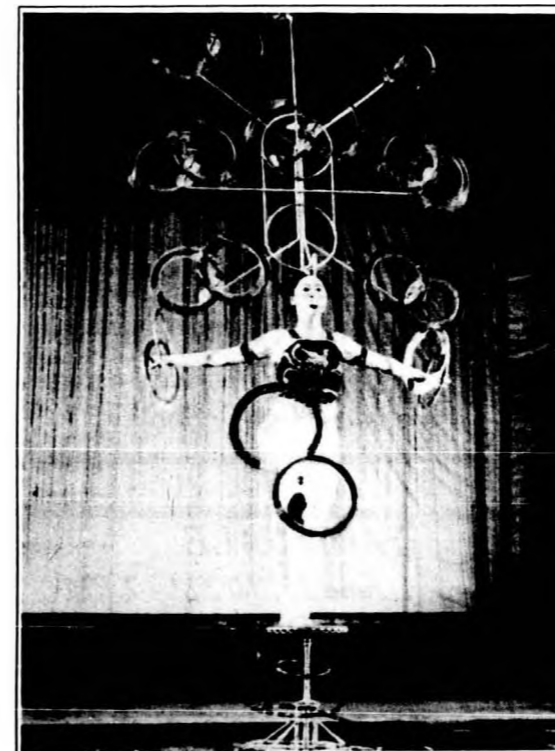
Since 1950, the circus in China has been designated the

The students are judged not only their physical ability to perform the act, but on their "interpretation" of the act. The

young artists also learn how to make and repair props and wardrobe for their acts. When the students are judged to be of performance calibre, they are integrated into an established troupe within China.

And only the very best of the best are allowed into the international touring troupes, such as the Guan Xi Acrobatic Troupe, on the Chinese Imperial Circus.

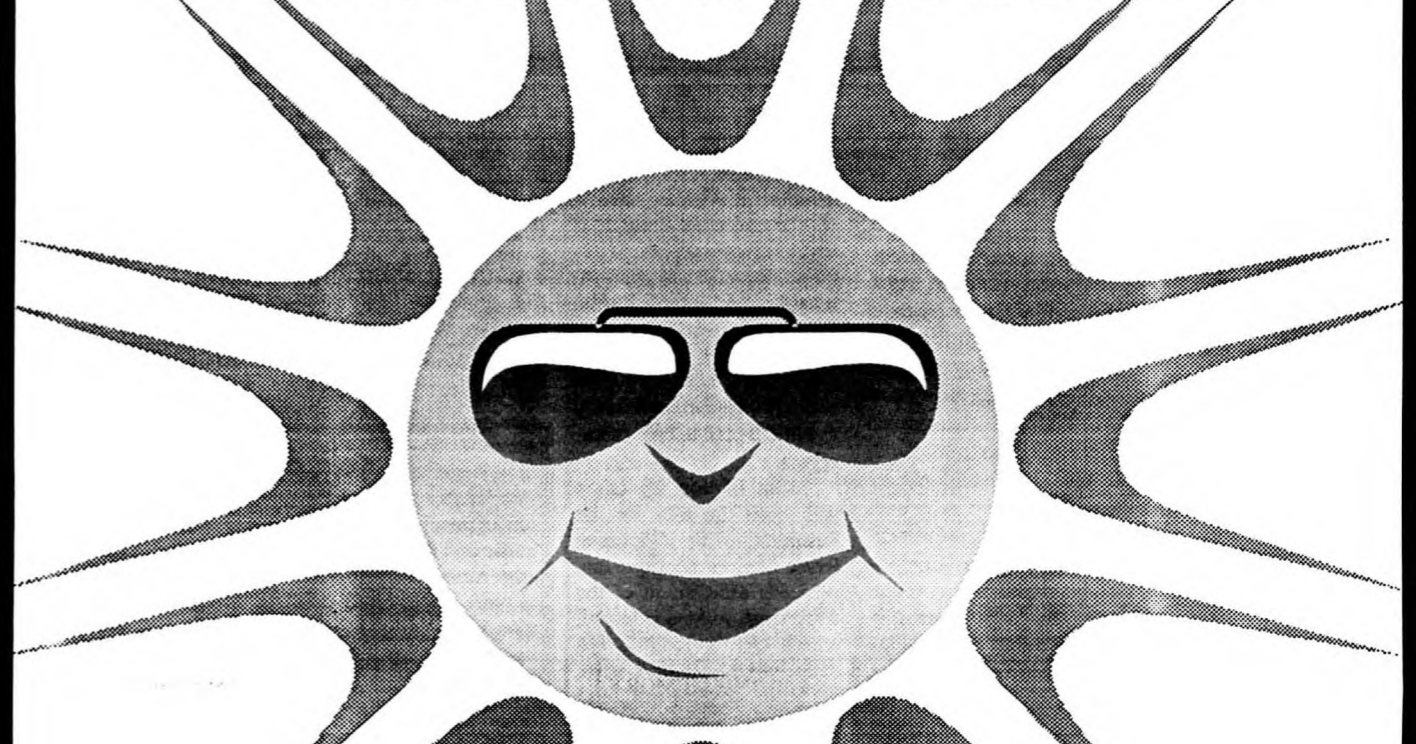
Baked Fish with Mushroom Stuffing

- Mushroom Stuffing
3 tablespoons butter
1 small onion, chopped
1/2 cup chopped fresh mushrooms
2 cups dry bread crumbs
3/4 cup chicken stock
1 egg, beaten
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
4-pound whole fish of your choice, dressed
1 teaspoon salt
4 strips bacon



Prepare Mushroom Stuffing. Put butter in saucepan. Add onion; saute until golden but not brown. Add mushrooms; cool until water from mushrooms cooks away. Remove from heat. Add bread crumbs, chicken stock, egg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and pepper; mix well with hands. Clean and rub inside of fish with 1 teaspoon salt. Stuff fish; fasten with toothpicks. Place, underside-down, in greased baking dish; layer bacon over fish. Bake in 350° over 1 hour or until fish flakes easily. Remove to hot platter to serve. Yield 8 servings.

Getting Your Foot in the Door

Home ownership has always been, and continues to be, important to Canadians. For example, consider looking for a mortgage which offers features such as: a cash bonus to help with closing costs; additional access to credit to help with decorating and furnishing expenses; the ability to skip mortgage payments during a rough period; the payment stability of longer fixed rate mortgage balance, conveniently and inexpensively, as your priorities change over time.

So take the first step toward making your dream a reality. Discuss these options with a mortgage specialist or financial advisor to determine which plan might be the right one to help you get your foot in the door of your first home.

Before you even begin looking for a home, find out, in advance, how much you can afford to borrow. WINNIPEG RIVER SENIOR SERVICE HELPFUL COMMUNITY ASSET

At a community planning workshop for Seniors held in Pine Falls in November of 1993, several issues of importance were identified. One of these was to promote seniors health issues, another was to encourage caregivers to share resources, avoid duplication, improve communication, and establish relationships.

The main focus of the workshop was to encourage residents of the community to build a plan to help themselves.

Out of this workshop was born the idea for the formation of the Winnipeg River Seniors Services Inc. A needs assessment of the community was conducted, which clearly identified a need. Applications were made to government, and community fundraising was begun. Following many roadblocks, the service was implemented in February 1996. A Resource Co-ordinator, Mrs. Thelma Hanson was hired, and an office opened in the Pine Falls Health Complex.

The Winnipeg River Senior Service is completely non profit, operating initially from a one time grant obtained from the Pine Falls District Health Foundation.

Mrs. Hanson is very committed to her job as a Resource Co-ordinator. She matches seniors who have needs, to a fee for service worker. The needs identified are such things as snow shovelling in winter, grass cutting, window cleaning, house cleaning and other home related chores which become more difficult with age.

The principle behind seniors services is to keep seniors in a familiar environment ie. their homes for as long as possible. Health care services are becoming more cognizant of the fact that it costs significantly less for

seniors to remain in their homes, than to utilize hospitals or care facilities.

The North Winnipeg River Handivan is a service available to seniors anywhere in the Winnipeg River catchment area, which includes the beaches and our northern communities of Bissett and Manigotagan. The cost to a group would not be great for trips to Winnipeg or Selkirk if there's a need for special-

ized medical treatment or consultation, shopping, concerts or whatever. The van is for the use of everyone. Mrs. Hanson also co-ordinates the use of the van. It could be utilized by local residents wishing to go shopping at any of the commercial outlets in the Pine Falls - Powerview areas. For information, to book the van, or be matched with a worker, simply call Thelma at 367-9128.

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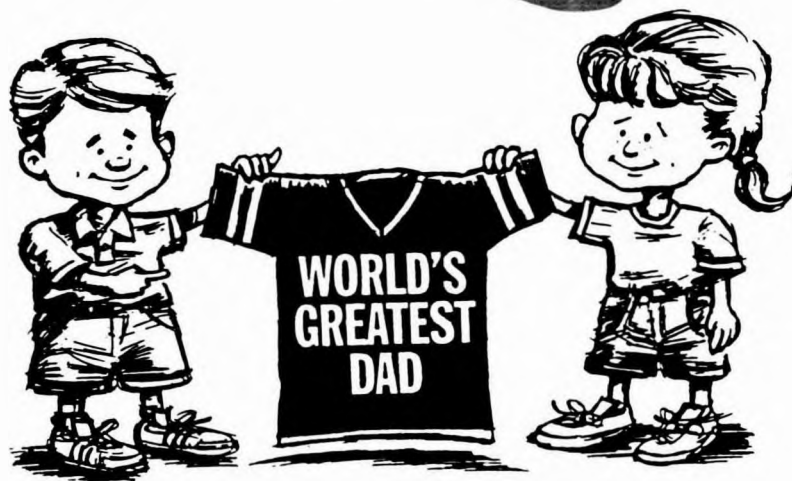
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
