MERGER COMPLETED!!

Vancouver, British Columbia - Rea Gold Corporation announced that shareholders of Rea Gold Corporation and American Resource Corporation ("ARC") today approved the merger of ARC with Rea Gold's wholly owned United States subsidiary with the merger becoming effective shortly thereafter. Rea Gold now has mineable gold reserves of approximately 1.7 million ounces from three geographically diverse operations. Total production from all three properties is scheduled to reach an annual rate 200,000 ounce of gold by the end of 1997, joining the ranks of "Intermediate Gold Producers". Cash and investments in equity securities at fair market value, is approximately \$72 million, and market capitalization is approximately \$265 million based upon current shares prices.

Along with the merger comes a new look for Rea Gold.

Mr. W. James Hogan formerly President and CEO of Rea Gold is now the new Chairman and Mr. Ian B. Smith formerly president of ARC is the new President and CEO of Rea Gold. ARC shareholders will receive 2.47 shares of Rea Gold for each ARC share held. Under the terms of the merger, Rea Gold will be issuing approximately 38,470,000 common shares to bring its issued and outstanding total to 91,490,000 common shares (96,614,000 fully diluted).

Rea Gold is a Canadian mining company engaged in the acquisition, exploration, development and operation of precious metal properties. Rea Gold operates the Mt. Hamilton Gold Mine near Ely, Nevada and is developing the Bissett Gold Mine in Manitoba and through ARC the San Gregorio Gold project in Uruguay, both of which are scheduled to be in production in

early 1997 at average annual gold production rates of 80,000 ounces and 70,000 ounces respectively. In addition Rea Gold controls 25 square miles in the southern end of the Battle Mountain Gold Trend in Nevada and controls gold exploration concessions over some 1,200 square miles (3,000 square kilometres) in Uruguay, covering the major prospective Greenstone belts in that country.

With one mine in production now and two more coming on stream early in 1997 Rea Gold will become a well financed intermediate sized gold producer with excellent potential for continued growth through acquisitions and exploration on ground it controls.

The common shares of Rea Gold are traded under the symbol "REO" on the Toronto Stock Exchange in Canada and on the American Stock Exchange in the United States.

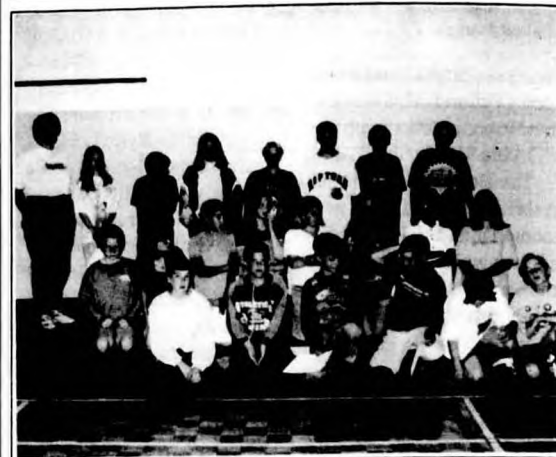

Graduates of the 1996 Babysitting Course

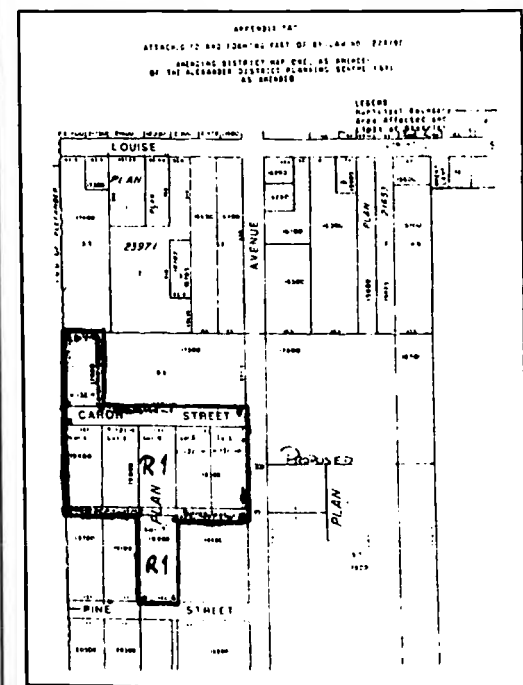

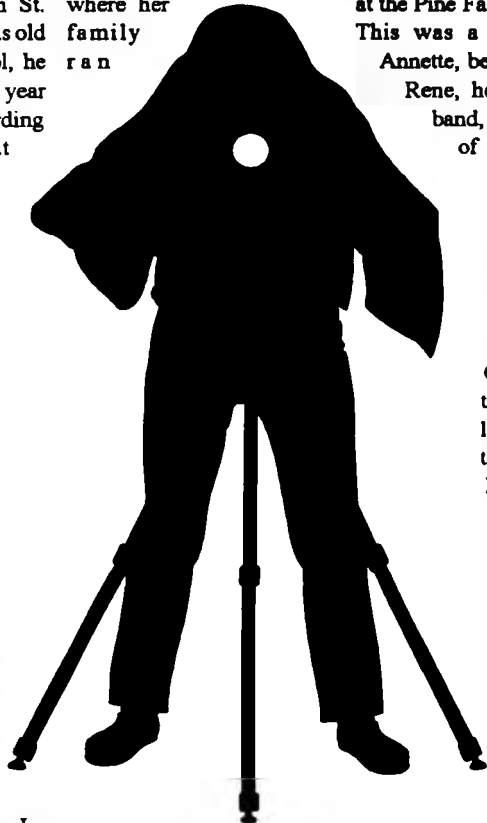

Rene and Annette Papineau are well known in the surrounding communities. I sat down to talk with each of them about their lives as singles, then as a married couple.

Rene was born in St. Georges but when he was old enough to attend school, he spent most of his school year away at Catholic boarding schools and later, at Provencher school. He says his mother was determined to make one of her three sons into a Priest, which never did happen. He received a very thorough education, anyhow, and learned Latin, Greek, and translation on top of his regular subjects. At the age of 15, he completed school and then stayed to work on his fathers farm for two years. From 17 yrs. until he joined the army, Rene went west in the summer to help farmers with thrashing, and in the fall and winter months, he worked in the bush for Abitibihauling lumber to Bear River. In April, 1943, Rene began his training with the army then joined a Lake Superior Regiment and went overseas to England and Germany. He

was discharged in May of 1946, and soon after, met Annette Coulombe.

Annette was born in Fannystelle, MB and in 1942, her family moved to St. Georges where her family ran



help support her family. Annette worked as a switchboard operator at St. Boniface Hospital and lived in a residence there. The same year, she moved back to the area when she got a job working at the Pine Falls Restaurant. This was a big year for Annette, because she met Rene, her future husband, in the Spring of 1946.

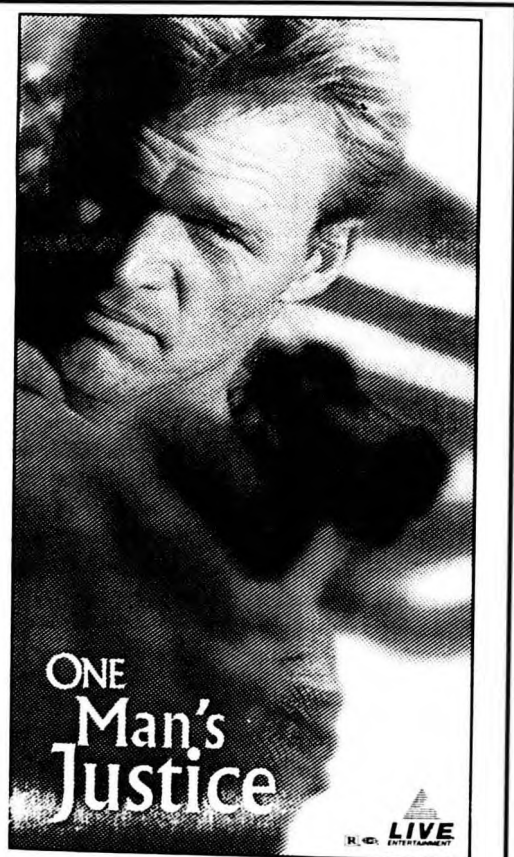

In 1989 he was also President of the Winnipeg River Lion Seniors' Manor where he and Annette now reside. Three of their children, Ron, Ed, and Linda live in Powerview and Rachelle lives in Richer.

The Papineaus have had a full and interesting life and they plan on enjoying many more years together.

- 4 c. mini marshmallows

- 1-14 oz. angel food cake, cut in 1/2 inch cubes

Coping with Arthritic Pain....

Pain is a normal consequence of most chronic diseases. In arthritis, it's a sign your body is reacting to inflammation and swelling created by activity of the disease on the joint lining and cartilage.

Nobody welcomes pain, but it does have a valuable purpose. It tells you something is wrong and is one of the most elementary and effective diagnostic tools of the physician.

Pain is like a sign post for your physician when you explain where it hurts. The where of your pain often indicates to the physician the what and the why.

When you suffer pain, be sure to write down exactly where it is, often by the time we see the doctor we can't remember. Talk specifics to your doctor, state precisely where and for how long the pain occurs. For example, "The pain in my right elbow is excruciating from 'here' to 'here' but only in the mornings."

This makes it easier for your doctor to be more precise in determining the type and extent of your arthritis. The next step is the right treatment followed by recovery.

During your treatment

program, pain is also useful to warn you if you're moving too quickly, especially during exercise periods. If pain decreases with exercise, this may indicate an increase in the amount or type of exercise. Conversely, if the pain increases sharply, you're doing too much.

Pain treatment usually involves medication. Medication choices are vast, ranging from simple "ASA" types to potent and powerful medications which are administered only under the close supervision of a physician. Strong pain killing medication containing codeine, can control even the worst pain signals. However, while they bring temporary relief, they can also bring associated problems. Often strong medication will mask true symptoms of your disease, but worse, some medications contain narcotics which are addictive. Excessive use of even simple drugs may build up your body's tolerance to it, resulting in the need for larger doses than required.

One cardinal rule of good medicine is to never take any drug in combination with another without first discussing it with your primary doctor even if it has been prescribed by other physicians. Drugs are chemical compounds and react with each other inside the body. Some combinations could be lethal. Make sure each doctor you are seeing knows exactly what the others are prescribing, plus tell them all over the counter medications you are buying from the drug store.

Never take pain killers which are prescribed for anyone else. Prescriptions are individual, particularly those with arthritis, who sometimes suffer more pain than others. Take your medication exactly the way and at the times indicated on the label.

Teaching Your Body to Help... Anticipation of pain can make us cringe. It causes us to withdraw, hold back or even will keep us from doing some of the things people with arthritis have to do, such as exercise. Anticipation of pain may give someone an excuse not to do needed exercise.

There are some tricks we can use to help raise our pain threshold. One is to concentrate on "holding out" against the pain for just a little longer. We can hold out for just one more hour can't we? Focus your energies just a little bit ahead in time. You may surprise yourself. Arthritis will not condemn you to a life filled

with pain every day. Take it one day at a time.

Exercise is one of the best ways you can help yourself. Do as your physiotherapist tells you on a regular basis, even if your arthritis has gone into remission. Movement will become easier, and stronger muscles will give better support and keep joints stable and in place.

Sometimes arthritic people feel they have to be stoic or heroic about their pain. While no one likes a chronic whiner, don't be afraid or ashamed to tell people you're in pain. Remember, in most cases you've got a disease no one can see. Ask for help if you need it, especially with routine tasks that cause serious strain on affected joints. People don't mind lending a hand with groceries or household or yard chores. Ask the children to pitch in, they'll love the added responsibility and it will teach them to help others. Lessons in helping others are valuable character builders, so two things will be accomplished.

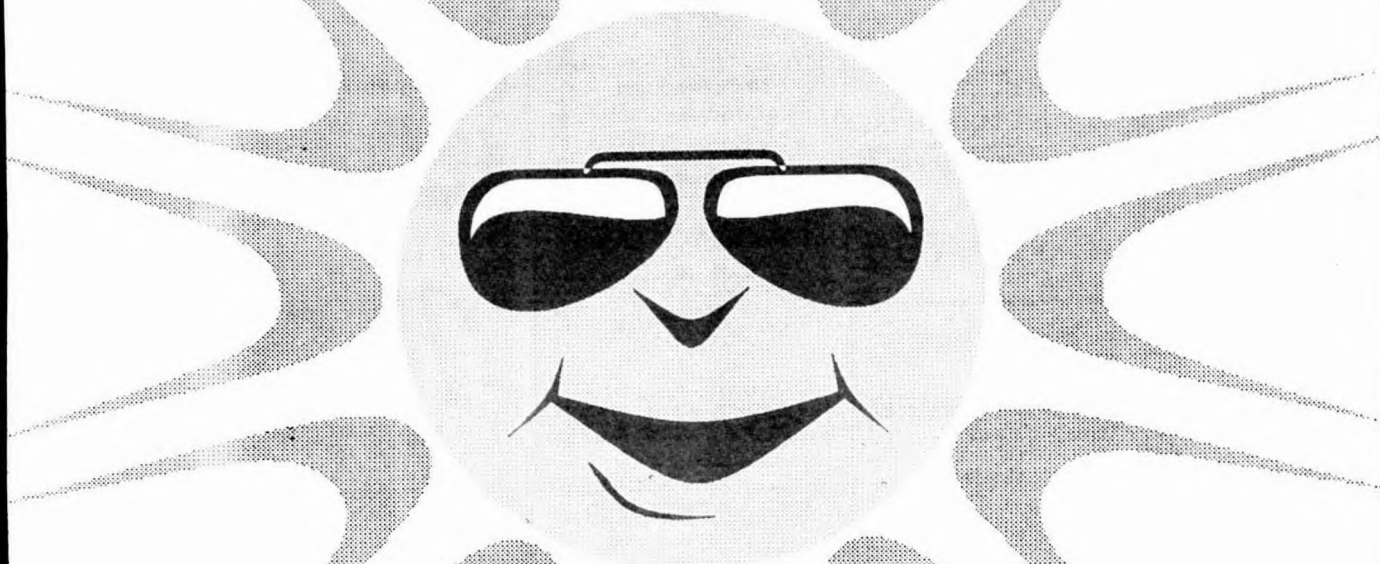
