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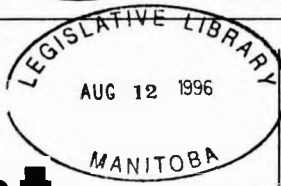

## Tragic accident claims life of teen

Shortly after 7:00 a.m. on Sunday morning, August 4, 1996, Grand Marais RCMP Police were called to a Motor Vehicle accident which occurred just off Highway 12, on the access road to Grand Marais.

The vehicle, a 1994 Mustang Convertible, purple in colour had been traveling south on Highway 12 from Grand Beach Provincial Park when it exited the roadway and struck

a Hydro pole. Six occupants of the vehicle, ages 16 to 21 were injured.

Michelle DeBoeck, 16 years old, of Winnipeg, died instantly upon impact. Jared Kirby, William Carson, Jeff Rerie, Nicole Leveque, Tod Goetz and Darren Wolochatiuk were the other occupants of the vehicle.

Further details are still under investigation.

## SAGKEENG GATHERING - WOW!

### Buffie Saint Marie - C'est Magnifique!

Sagkeeng First Nation presented to the region, its summer gathering, with a traditional Pow Wow respecting Mother Earth August 3rd to 5th. There was much in the way of activities and entertainment. Only lack of interest would hinder anyone from having a great time. There were pony rides for the children, a slo pitch and fastball tournament on Saturday and Sunday, a mini monster Bingo, jiggling, old time music, square dance contest and several concert presentations as well as the traditional Pow Wow. These are only a few of the many events taking place at Sagkeeng during the gathering.

Friday evening's concert at Sagkeeng Multiplex, very ably MC'd by Jim Compton of C B C fame, featured Buffie Saint Marie, and Floyd "Red Crow" Westerman.

It was not Saint Marie or Westerman who stole the show, it was Jason Tuesday, a very talented classical guitarist. Tuesday gave a stunning solo performance with four wonderful pieces. One of them was "Romance" by Paganini. It's unfortunate that as Jason was announcing the title of the tune, the noise level in the Multiplex was too high to hear what it was. However whether we heard the title of the piece or not, Tuesday's performance was fabulous. Jason Tuesday is a name the musical world will soon hear more about. The talent this twenty one year old possesses attests to this.

Jason, who is a native of Big Grassy River First Nations, gained recognition in June, 1990, when he graduated from Sisler High in Winnipeg at the

age of 15. His scholastic achievement earned him the Elijah Harper Award a few months later. A third year university student, he has to increase his repertoire. This young man is far too talented to sit on any back burners. His father Percy, also a musician stated that plans are in the works to cut a CD early in 1997. The world awaits his exciting music.

Westerman is best known for his excellent portrayal of Ten Bears in the movie "Dances With Wolves." However Floyd Westerman is also a renowned musician with a powerful voice. He has an exciting stage presence and is obviously quite at home playing to the crowd. He's an accomplished singer, having cut his first album in 1970. He is also one of the driving forces

in the American Indian movement, which is trying to gain sovereignty in the U. S. Westerman won the hearts of his audience with his song to the Department of Indian Affairs (in Canada) or the Agency of Indian Affairs (in the U. S.) which protests the never ending rules and regulations. He also talked about the missionaries who tried to bring Aboriginal spirituality into European religions.

Westerman played a harmonica, his guitar and sang about the cause of Aboriginals world wide. His haunting "Where Were You When We Needed Help My Friend," certainly gave cause for some soul searching. He spoke about the traditional ways, the Sun Dance and praying to the Creator through the tree circle. It's part of a culture

that is thousands of years old. He was at his best in a song about the Lonesome Coyote, and another about the Mayan Indians in Chiapas. His music has strong messages.

In a surprise presentation, Chief Jerry Fontaine who was celebrating his 41st birthday, was given several gifts, a plaque, a beautiful piece of Aboriginal art done by a local artist, and a blanket. He also received words of encouragement and praise from Elder Jack Starr.

The crowd had come to see and hear Buffie Saint Marie, and she ascended to the stage to the sound of deafening cheers. Clearly Buffie is an entertainer loved by Sagkeeng! She fills the stage with an excitement, an energy that seems boundless. Saint Marie was dressed in a beautiful red jacket in which she must have been warm, the arena was hot and stuffy. She performed like the champion she is.

Her first song, a bouncy one called the "Pine Wood Hills" barely touched on the amazing vocal range she has. She then performed "Fallen Angels" which was a little slower in tempo. Her next number was performed on a mouthbow. She played that in-

strument and sang one of her hits, "Cripple Creek."

Buffie had the crowd eating out of her hand when she sang "That's What Little Kids Do." The song is filled with truth, and any parent can relate to it, for it is funny.

The next one rang through the rafters as Buffie and her band played and sang "Indian Cowboy in the Rodeo." This is the perfect vehicle for her amazing voice. It just seems to get better and better. Her final numbers were "Relocation Blues," "Up Where We Belong" a hit she wrote, which became popular from the movie "Officer and a Gentleman" "The Big Ones Get Away," "Time for You to Go," a very haunting "Windigo," "Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee." Last but not least, in honor of all of those who have gone before, those who have helped the Aboriginal peoples to get to where they are now, Buffie sang a rousing rendition of "StarWalker." This tune is so upbeat, it's impossible to sit still. It was a wonderful concert, and one of which Sagkeeng should be proud.

Following the concert, there was another show. It was an old time Dance with Larry

and Company. Most of the crowd left and the arena cooled down a little. Larry and Company, (with a little help from Carmine) put on a wonderful show of fiddling and old time music. It is great to see small children getting right into the music and dancing and jiggling on the arena floor. They seem totally oblivious of people watching them. It's also fun to watch the dancers.

Part way through the old time dancing, it was announced that a youth square dance troupe from Waterhen were going to dance. And did they dance! Those feet all in perfect time, with the rhythmic tapping of toes and heels was an absolute delight to watch! It would sure be great to see and hear from this group again. They had perfect rhythm and were so graceful. Their age range (I'm guessing) was probably ten to fourteen or fifteen years.

Another great dancer was from Little Black River, just a bit closer than Waterhen. She is Melissa Bird. Her feet fly across the floor too as her taps pound out her musical story.

It was a great gathering, the region now looks forward to Pow Wow on the Labor Day weekend.

HIGH HUMIDITY SPOILS VICTORIA BEACH SALE

Heat and high humidity became the recipe for fast fried Northern Lights Artisans at the Victoria Beach Sports Club on Sunday, August 4th, 1996. Participants and customers alike suffered as the oppressive heat sapped energy from everyone. Heavy clouds hovered over the clubhouse during much of the day, threatening storm and rain. Just as the show closed, the rain finally began falling, accompanied by deep rumbles of thunder and sky splitting lightning.

In spite of uncooperative weather the sale was a resounding success. The crafters of Northern Lights Artisans are all crafters of fine reputation, whose quality products display and sell well. In writing this account of the craft sale, it should be stated, that your reporter was in attendance as a salesperson for a friend who is part of the Northern Lights Artisans. If some of the accounts are sketchy, it is only because of the difficulty in moving around the clubhouse to investigate other crafters while manning my friends table. The room was crowded with people most of the day.

Bearly Angelic Creations was in attendance with her wonderful bears and other items. Unfortunately it was difficult to return to this table, but what I saw was impressive.

Linda Daher, another crafter whose product is simply beautiful was also in attendance. Linda's artistic talent shows very well in her dried flower displays, swags and wreaths. She does most, if not all these displays, herself. It's great just to stand and look at the colors.

We haven't seen Lorne Sullivan for a while, but he was at Victoria Beach with his unique wooden ware, and folk art. He does painted scenes on cans and canisters that has to be seen to be believed.

Bridgehill Pottery, owned and operated by Joanne Graydon from Woodmore MB., is new to this show. Graydon shows a very nice product. Her table was quite busy most of the day.

Another newcomer to the Victoria Beach scene were Mr. And Mrs. Renville of Winnipeg. Mr. Renville does beautiful woodburning art pictures on particleboard. All his pictures are framed and under glass. They are all of animals, such as fox, wolf, tigers and such, and quite remarkable. Mrs. Renville had a very nice display of lacy, frilly air fresheners.

The best known artist in this

part of our world, who works in both water colors and acrylics, is Nancy Lou Ateah. No show could ever be complete without her. Nancy Lou's work is so beautiful, it can be seen in the National Gallery in Ottawa, and many of her paintings are hung in homes and galleries around the world. Many of her best paintings were displayed at this show.

Shirley and Grant Boulden had a great display of children's sweaters and other crafts, including lovely dream catchers, earrings, and lots of plastic canvas art. Shirley spends many an hour crafting smaller items just for the children who attend these sales. Some of these items are children's size necklaces, finger puppets, and other "stuff" that kids love.

Merrilee and Rick Green, of Fiddlers Green always have a terrific display of hand crafted wooden ware. They have picture frames, clocks, mug racks, casserole carriers made of wood, bird houses and feeders and of course Merrilee's own beautifully carved birds and ducks. She had a bluebird and a bluejay on display that attracted lots of attention.

Dave Finley was on hand with his very attractive oil paintings, fridge magnets and other items.

Bozica Murphy, another newcomer, is a very energetic young woman from Altona who does work in wood too. Her wood work is slightly different though, and very nice. She does primitive folk art and wire art. The wire art is in the form of napkin holders, towel holders etc. The wood work is in the form of welcome posts for yard or garden with interchangeable tops, also wooden plaques with 'funny sayings' painted on them. Bozica was my immediate neighbor at the sale, and a lot of fun to work beside.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Dale, were returnees to the show with their unique for of wood works. They have those attractively decorated racks for hats or coats, as well as lots of other items.

Newcomer Dameon Wall, also from Winnipeg had a very

different display of decorative wrought iron work. He displayed a well made planter that I could so easily see in my own home...it'll have to wait till next time though. He also had some very lovely and different candelabra which could easily grace someone's home. Dameon is a charming young fellow who showed something not often seen anywhere - a shoe scraper! Great display.

Dennis and Wendi Foreman, who operate DWF's Wood 'n Things out of Grand Marais had some truly great wooden furniture and wooden household accents. They showed wooden benches that would be just great to place at the door to assist in putting on boots and shoes. They also had stacking tables, and coat or hat holders. A nice new addition to the Northern Lights.

Huda Haddad, a sparkly,

bubbly young lady, always has a good showing of scented bottled oils, and Victorian candles. Her table always smells so nice too.

T. Beach from Grand Beach showed well constructed summer casual pants and shorts, scented hot pads, wonderful stress balls, jewelry and tapestry and leather handbags. Val also has a good product which shows well.

Anita's Ceramics, a mother - daughter team from Winnipeg had some beautifully crafted items on display. They showed ceramic animals, candles, snow babies, hand drawn painted decorative bird houses, trinket boxes and statuettes. These ladies were also here for the first time.

Lots of newcomers to the show, another was Nadine Short who showed laminated paper clocks, jewelry, bookmarks, interesting necklaces etc. She

showed clocks made from favorite greeting cards, or photos of children, grandchildren, or pets, which have been laminated then made into clocks. This would certainly be a unique gift.

Watercolors by Irene Monchak was a very individual kind of display. The watercolors were immensely beautiful, some with an ethereal quality about them. Most were of women's faces. The very depth of the picture made me think of Olympian goddesses. They were truly lovely.

It was a great show!

There were more crafters at the show that you read about here, but work prevented me from seeing the rest. I apologize to all who were missed. I'll see you next time.

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
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SNAP SHOTS

Some of you may know the St. Georges resident Philip Lacharity by the size of his gigantic pumpkins and beanstalks. Although Born in Makinak, Manitoba, Philip moved to Pine Falls with the rest of his family when his father took a job at the mill in 1928. A few years later, in 1932, Philip's father bought a farm in Broadlands where he grew a little bit of everything. The 12 Lacharity children helped on the farm and it is here where Philip began to take interest in gardening. He continued to farm with his father until he joined the army. Philip trained with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles then continued to train in England. From there

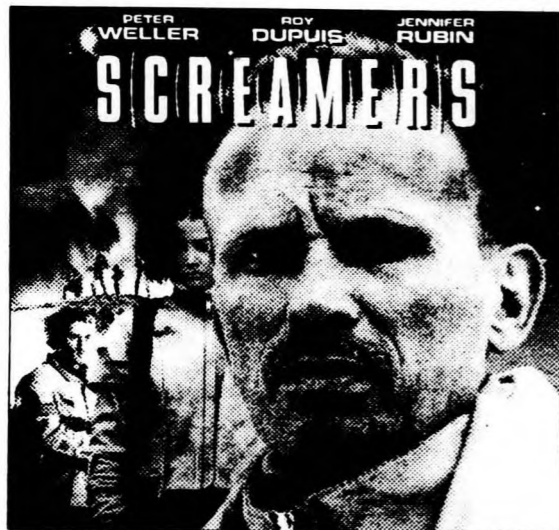
he was stationed in Wolfesy, Holland where he was assigned caretaker for the army camp, which was previously an abandoned asylum. The history behind the asylum was that during the early part of the war, the Germans came into that particular Mental Institution and gathered all the patients. They built trenches, killed every asylum resident, then bulldozed dirt over the trenches filled with dead bodies. Later, British and allied troops moved into the old asylum and used it as a barracks. After the war, Philip returned to the Broadlands farm then, in 1946, purchased his own mixed farm. Philip grew a beautiful garden, had fruit trees, and

built many bird feed stations. One of his favourite past-times has been growing huge vegetable species such as pumpkins and castor beans. Philip even grew a geranium plant to 79 inches high. He also enjoys carpentry, building, and cabinet making. Mr. Lacharity has always been single. He says he's never been sick a day in his life, which he suggests could be partly due to the fact that he never married. Throughout the years, Philip has enjoyed taking many bus tours across North America. His favourite trip was to Alaska. The gardening tip he learned there was that cabbages can be grown to monstrous sizes in Alaska because 24 hour daylight creates ideal conditions. Presently, Philip lives at Foyer Chateauguay in St. Georges. In addition to tending the flower court there, he still keeps a large garden at a friend's property. This man has led a quiet and content life. Philip's pleasant manner and horticultural contributions, to this day, are very much appreciated.

### New regional health board formed in North Eastman

Following creation of ten regional health authorities (RHAs) in January, 1996, under the provincial Corporations Act, including one for the North-Eastman region, the Minister of Health, the Hon. James McCrae, confirmed the appointment of chairpersons and initial members of the ten boards in late January, 1996.

Tony Lefko of the R.M. of Springfield will chair the North-Eastman RHA. Joining him from the R.M. of Springfield are Margaret Janzen and Ralph Kennedy; Donald Mazur, William McGee and Edna Kozyra of the Town of Beausejour; Bradley Robertson of Pine Falls; Ken Cowie and Lorraine Neal of the L.G.D. of Alexander; William Boonstra of the R.M. of Whitemouth; Jeanne Kozak of the L.G.D. of Reynolds; and Peter Cliche and David Studham of the L.G.D. of Pinawa.

Additional board members are expected to be appointed by the Minister shortly to round out the fifteen-member board and to ensure that the population of the region is represented.

Board members were nominated by existing health boards or at large and subsequently appointed by the Minister. The positions of chairperson for the ten regions were filled by the Minister. Board members are ineligible to serve as providers of health care services or as members of existing health facility boards. The appointments are for an initial two year period. A decision on whether board members will be appointed or elected in future has yet to be made by the government.

The RHAs are expected to assume full operational responsibility in 1997. Until then, all ten boards will operate according to interim Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws. These are designed to enable RHAs to evolve into effective decision-making bodies, while ensuring accountability and appropriate consistency in their operations throughout Manitoba.

### Regional health authority - what is it?

In a restructured health services delivery system in northern and rural Manitoba, the Regional Health Authority (RHA) is the body having sole statutory respon-

sibility to arrange the delivery of, or access to, the full continuum of health services for the citizens of an approved region.

The RHA - or regional health association as it has become known - has responsibility to develop and implement regional planning for the integration and delivery of health services, including health promotion and alternative approaches to service delivery, with principles of sharing, co-operation and quality improvement.

Within this context, the RHA plans, sets priorities, develops policies, negotiates and allocates resources for programs and services within the region, based on needs assessments, health determinants, geographic area, demographics and available fiscal and human resources.

The establishment of RHA's arose out of the Provincial Government's desire to reform health care in order to provide better services at lower costs, while protecting the five principles of Medicare - universality, accessibility, comprehensiveness, portability and public administration.

The reforms the government envisioned were set out in a May, 1992, document entitled, Quality Health for Manitobans, The Action Plan. At the same time, the government established the Northern/Rural Health Advisory Council to provide advice to the Minister of Health on issues relating to the renewal of health services in northern and rural Manitoba.

The Council's recommendation to move towards a regional governance model was accepted by government. Guidelines were circulated and, by spring 1993, twenty northern/rural health association proposals were submitted. These were reviewed by the non-government appointed members of the Council and recommendations were forwarded to the Manitoba Health Board. Following the Board's review and recommendations, eight Northern/Rural Health Associations were announced in October, 1993.

An appeal process allowed any of the original proponents to appeal to the Manitoba Health Board. Five appeals were received and heard at public hearings. Subsequent to the appeal hearings by the Manitoba Health Board and their further recommendations, ten Northern/Rural health associations were approved by the Government, including North Eastman Health Association.

In October, 1993, the Northern/Rural Health Advisory Council held a special meeting to discuss goals, principles, roles, mandates, governance, administration and service delivery for health associations. The consensus reached on the various issues was detailed in a discussion paper that was widely circulated throughout the province.

Through direct mailing and newspaper advertisements, the public was invited to provide input at public hearings. These hearings were held during October, 1994, including one within North Eastman at Lac du Bonnet. In all, one hundred and nineteen presentations were received.

The presentations were reviewed by a Working Group of the Council, which finalized its recommendations in mid May, 1995, and forwarded them to government. Following consultation with senior management staff of Manitoba Health, the government approved the recommendations in principle. Four proposals were identified as requiring further consideration, including

capital planning, health provider eligibility for board membership, district health councils/advisory health councils, and evolution of existing boards.

In January, 1996, ten regional health associations were incorporated. The board chairpersons and initial board members were appointed from nominations requested by Manitoba Health from individuals, communities and existing boards.

The new regional health association boards have since been involved in intense orientation and planning. While funding for the regional associations during the 1996/1997 fiscal year is based on the current system, Manitoba Health is working on a new population health based funding formula. As of April 1, 1997, Manitoba Health will begin the transfer of funds to the regional health authorities based on this new formula. At the same time, the authority of the RHA's will be changed under new legislation now being drafted as Bill 49.

Additional objectives of Manitoba Health for the regionalization process include: \* developing a regional health business plan; \* using a planned approach to collect information about the health needs and strengths of the communities, in order to carry out evidence-based health planning; \* developing a labour relations strategy for the transfer of human resources to regional health authorities; \* developing a collaborative capital planning strategy to facilitate effective use of health care facilities; \* developing provincial standards which encourage quality regional programs and services to be delivered in an efficient and effective manner; \* developing an integrated plan which facilitates a full continuum of health services and programs which are accessible and available to regional communities.

### Board operational - first meetings held

The North Eastman RHA board is off and running, having held its inaugural meeting at Beausejour Eastgate Lodge on February 19.

Basically a housekeeping session, the board chose the official name of the organization - the North Eastman Health Association - with its bilingual counterpart being l'Association de Sante du Nord-Est, Inc.

Since this first meeting, the board has met in regular session in Beausejour on March 18, in Lac du Bonnet on April 15, in Whitemouth on April 29, in Beausejour on May 13, in Pinawa on June 3, in Lac du Bonnet on June 24, in Victoria Beach on July 8 and in Beausejour on July 29.

With an initial operating grant of \$240,000, the Association has chosen the South Interlake Credit Union as its official financial institution. This decision was based on consideration of several solicited proposals from other institutions in the region.

Other decisions made by the board during meetings held so far include initiation of an office space study, adoption of general by-laws, scheduling of board orientation and strategic planning sessions, adoption of board indemnity rates, a decision to join other RHAs in a cooperative search for a chief executive officer, made arrangements for interim secretarial assistance, formation of a C.E.O. recruitment committee, a decision to join the Manitoba Health Organization, and a decision on board committee structure.

### Pinawa chosen as site of association head office

The North Eastman health board has chosen the W.B. Lewis Business Centre in Pinawa as the best site for its head office. The centre, the site of a former elementary school, now houses the Whiteshell School District offices, a nursery school, and various other business and community association activities.

The advantages of this location include: (1) its central location - kilometer distance to each of the other communities within the health region is minimal; (2) provision of adequate space (~1,000 square feet) at competitive rates; (3) minimal renovation requirements; (4) no association with existing health facilities; and (5) proximity to airport.

An ad hoc committee of the health board was actioned to review all potential locations throughout the region for the health association's administrative headquarters, and to make recommendations to the full board.

While the administrative functions will be performed at the Pinawa head office, the board expects to move its meetings around the region to give all stakeholders an equal opportunity to attend meetings and input into decisions.

### North Eastman - regional profile

The North Eastman health region will service a population of approximately 41,000 people. It covers an area of approximately 9,560 square kilometers between the TransCanada Highway in the south and the 53rd Parallel in the north, to the Red River Floodway in the west and the Ontario boundary in the east.

Major communities within the region include Beausejour, Bissett, Lac du Bonnet, Pinawa, Powerview, Pine Falls, Oakbank (R.M. of Springfield), Whitemouth, several aboriginal communities and parts of unorganized territories, e.g. the Whiteshell Provincial Park.

Acute care and long term care services include surgery, medicine, obstetrics, obstetrical ultrasound, pediatrics, geriatrics, anesthesiology, dialysis, dietary, physiotherapy, rehabilitation and respite, occupational therapy, lab & imaging (five sites), pharmaceutical, activity programs and podiatry.

Community health services include public health (antenatal, postpartum/parenting, child health, adolescent health, health promotion, diabetes education resource, audiology, perinatal health, communicable disease control, including immunization and surveillance, environmental health and primary care), mental health, social services, home care, adult day and support services to seniors (seven delivery sites), pre-hospital care, and health education.

The region also includes four acute care facilities (hospitals providing a total of 81 beds), four personal care homes (with a total of 130 beds), and a health centre. Volunteer-based programs, like the Auxiliaries, add an important dimension to the health care and promotion capabilities of the region.

### Board agreed on mission statement

Among the many tasks the new regional health board has been addressing are a set of operating policies, guided by a vision of what members want the Association to achieve in future, a mission statement and a set of values.

While the board policies will take some additional time to complete, the Association now has in place its guiding principles.

Vision - Enhanced physical, mental and social well being in North Eastern Manitoba.

Mission Statement - North Eastman Health Association Inc. is a regional planning organization which will ensure that people in North Eastern Manitoba receive effective and comprehensive health care coordinated to meet their changing needs.

### Values - We believe in: \*

treating everyone with compassion, respect and understanding; \* providing quality services based on equal access and efficient and effective management; \* the value of life through the recognition of individual preferences while considering community and regional tolerances; \* developing trust through open and honest communication; \* the recognition of an individual's ethical and cultural heritage; \* taking a pro-active approach to health and life style education; \* community consultation for the enhancement of health care; \* the Board being involved in the process of continuous quality assurance (management).

### Working committees formed

The new health board recently elected its standing committees for the period February 1, 1996 to March 31, 1997.

Joining Chairman Tony Lefko on the Executive Committee is Vice-Chair Don Mazur, as Secretary, Peter Cliche, and as Treasurer, Bradley Robertson. The chairman is ex-officio member of all committees.

Finance and Capital Planning Committee will be Bradley Robertson (chair), Ralph Kennedy, Bill Boonstra, Jeanne Kozak and Margaret Janzen

Human Resources Committee will consist of Ken Cowie (chair), Lorraine Neal, Bill McGee, Jeanne Kozak and Don Mazur.

Community Development Committee will be Don Mazur (chair), David Studham, Bradley Robertson, Ken Cowie and Lorraine Neal.

Policy and Programs Committee will include Peter Cliche (chair), Margaret Janzen, Ralph Kennedy and Don Mazur.

Communications/Public Relations Committee will be David Studham (chair), Tony Lefko and Peter Cliche.

Ad hoc committees were also chosen, including: the Space Inventory Committee (with Ken Cowie as chair, Peter Cliche, Don Mazur and Margaret Janzen), and the C.E.O. Recruitment Committee (with Tony Lefko as chair, Ralph Kennedy, Ken Cowie, Don Mazur, Lorraine Neal and Bill McGee).

Board member Edna Kozyra is yet to be appointed to committee positions.

### Search for C.E.O. underway

The North Eastman Health Association, along with most of the other RHAs, is searching for a chief executive officer.

Working with KPMG Consultants, applications for the position were advertised nationally in May. The closing date for the competition was June 15, with initial interviews conducted with applicants in late June from among the more promising applicants.

Over sixty applications were received for the North-Eastman health board position. Candidates placed on a short-list will be given final interviews as early as mid-July.

## Supplement

### Board in planning and consultative mode

The North Eastman Health Association board will not assume full operational control until April 1, 1997. That is when the provincial government will funnel all health care funding through RHA's for facilities and services.

While local boards are expected to retain ownership of their respective facilities, the RHA boards will contract facility and district health boards to maintain core programs yet to be announced by Manitoba Health.

During the interim period, regional boards have the responsibility to establish an effective operational structure. Toward this end, and with the capable guidance of Manitoba Health consultants and members of the Northern/Rural Regionalization Task Force, Arlene Wilgosh and Andrea Zajac, the North Eastman Health Association board has held two full days of orientation in Pinawa, April 13 and 14, two and one half days of strategic planning in Pine Falls, Oakbank and Lac du Bonnet, May 22, June 1 and June 24 and an evening session in Pinawa on June 27 on the governance model and proposed changes in legislation for the regional authorities.

As well, the board and the board chair have been busy meeting with various regional groups and health facilities, including the Winnipeg River Health District, the Whitemouth Health Centre, the Oakbank seniors housing committee, the combined Beausejour/Brokenhead health and ambulance boards, regional home care workers and the North Eastman Transition Committee and Working Group.

Until the Board is fully operational and funded sometime next year, it does not expect to be making any decisions related to program delivery in the region. A needs assessment and consultations with stakeholders would be required before any changes are contemplated or implemented.

### Logo contest announced

As a new incorporated entity, the North Eastman Health Association has need of a suitable logo to provide easily recognizable visual identity in its communications with the public and other stakeholders.

The logo would be used on letterhead, signage and other communications vehicles.

The board has decided to involve the public by way of sponsoring a contest. The North Eastman Health Association invites submissions for a new logo design which graphically incorporate the vision, mission statement and values of the corporation, and reflect the scope of services and facilities available within the region. There will be a \$250.00 prize for the winning entry.

### Additional contest rules are as follows: \*

entries must be simple in design and be clear when reproduced (enlarged or reduced in size); \* entries must be neatly sketched on 8 1/2 x 11 white bond in colour, mounted on rigid backing material for presentation purposes; \* entries must be accompanied by a narrative which clearly describes the symbolism of the logo, e.g. what the design represents; \* entries become the property of the Association once submitted and can be altered as required; \* entries must be accompanied by the submitters name, mailing address and telephone number; \* the Association reserves the right not to award a prize if no entry is selected as the winner; \* persons submitting the winning entry must reside within the North Eastman region. \* persons submitting entries must not be related to a Board member.

Healthy Ways to Handle Stress...

Stress is sometimes good...

Stress is the physical or mental feeling people get when they're under pressure. A certain amount of stress is normal and good - stress caused by physical exercise, for instance. Like walking or sports activities. Drivers in busy city traffic, constantly on the alert for pedestrians, stop lights, cyclists and other drivers, are less likely to be lulled into careless driving habits than when they are on a long, straight and apparently empty highway. The working wife with an interesting job often finds she can organize her housekeeping more efficiently than her stay at home neighbor.

The minor mental stress from the pressure of learning is also beneficial. Without any stress we would all cease to be growing, alert individuals and our minds and bodies would soon deteriorate.

Most people, in fact, perform best with minor stress or anxiety to spur them on. At times, it can be exhilarating. Good or harm depends largely on physical and mental makeup and conditioning. If we are happy in what we're doing, long hard hours of effort will have no ill effects.

Emotions Play A Part...

Stress can be caused by emotions - feelings of love, hate, or simply irritation. It's

when these feelings get out of control that they are harmful. Stress is no longer beneficial when it stems from unresolved conflicts or decisions.

Major stress is likely to be brought on by immaturity - an unwillingness to accept the fact that certain parts of everyday living are never perfect. **How Strain Tells...**

Dangers and threats, or the fear of them can create a form of stress that can be damaging. When we get anxious or worried, our bodies react. We perspire, our stomach becomes shaky, our mouth and lips dry. Our heart beats faster and blood pressure climbs. All these are warning signals... telling us we're under pressure and it's time to cool down.

Under severe stress, or when tired from facing pressure over a long period, both body and mind tend to over react to the strain. Results may include nosebleeds, headaches, stomach aches, high blood pressure, ulcers, hemorrhage or other serious illnesses.

If stress cannot be controlled, or if it's leading to depression or physical problems, help should be sought from a doctor, health clinic or public health nurse.

Stress Can Have Many Causes....

The modern world with its increasing pace of change, new moral and cultural values, new social and family attitudes, puts us all under pressure from time to time.

Stress can affect older people facing retirement or people who don't know how to use their leisure time constructively. High school and university students are frequently under pressure during examinations, and parents sometimes add further strain in their anxiety to see their children achieve. Stress can take its toll on the housewife without creative or recreational outlets just as it can on the executive with problems in his career.

Putting things off or letting them slide can lead to stress, which builds up, eventually leading to depression. Idealists are sometimes unable to reconcile themselves to reality and they set unrealistic standards for their behavior.

Perfectionists are often unable to take advantage of recreational activities like golf, tennis or skiing, because they're afraid of looking foolish.

Letting Off Steam....

When children get out of school, they shout and run around. This allows them to get rid of the stress built up during classroom hours. Most adults might feel self conscious shouting and running around, but there are many other equivalent ways of relieving tension - physical exercise, sports, dancing, hobbies or crafts. In many cases, just recognizing what we're under stress at the moment, and what has caused it will allow us to

start unwinding.

Having the capacity to laugh at ourselves now and then allows us to relax and enjoy ourselves. Talking about our problems to others - to people we know and trust, but who won't blindly agree with us, can help to re balance ourselves both physically and emotionally. Lack of discussion can make matters worse. Family problems, in particular are best talked out sensibly and calmly to see if middle ground can be found.

Balancing Stress....

Nobody can go on indefinitely keeping stress at bay with tranquilizers, cigarettes or liquor. Recreation, constructive use of leisure time and rest are necessary for us to balance the stress we face from day to day.

Some of us become so caught up in our work we never get around to reaping the benefit of the leisure time we've earned. If we have worries or problems and can't get away, tackling something just a bit different, a change of pace, often lets us see things in a better light.

A complete change of scene, a vacation every now and then, is the best way to refresh and invigorate our minds so we can resume our normal routing with a new spirit. If our regular daily lives are crowded, hectic and rushed, a quiet, lazy vacation is best. But if we're aiming to get out of a dull, uneventful rut, a vacation can be a time to live up for a while.
