deliberately set.

No further detail were available at press time.

Eastman Mental Health Self Help Service

We are pleased to announce the opening of the Eastman Mental Health Self Help Service located at 220-449 Main Street (Oaks Plaza), Oakbank, MB. It is a shared initiative of:

- Anxiety Disorders Association of Manitoba
- Canadian Mental Health Association - Eastman Region
- Manitoba Schizophrenia Society
- Society for Depression and Manic Depression of Manitoba

The Centre will provide education, support, and information to the Eastman Region and is for mental health consumers and their families, health care providers, educators, and the general public.

Mental illness is a profoundly serious problem in Manitoba and directly affects more than 20% of the population during their lifetimes. Annual costs range well into the hundreds of millions of dollars. The human cost is even more serious and far reaching. Lives are ruined or lost, families are devastated, careers are ended. The impact of these disorders touches so many people. The largest single challenge to be overcome is the age old stigma against disorders of the brain. For in-

stance, in the treatment of depressive disorders, it is estimated that two thirds of all people with the disorders do not seek treatment, primarily because their illnesses are blamed on personal weakness, not recognized, misdiagnosed, or because they are too socially stigmatized to seek proper help. But the irony is that there has never been a more hopeful time for people with this disorder. Advances in medical science and human understanding over the last twenty years have revolutionized the treatment of these disorders and the success rate for effective treatment is astonishingly high. The vast majority of people with serious mental illness can be effectively treated and can lead successful and productive lives.

In order to continue to overcome these challenges, the four organizations have banded together to create a shared self help centre to serve the Eastman Region. Staffed by people with a strong knowledge of the illnesses, many of whom have experienced the disorders themselves, it will act as a resource centre as well as a base for extensive outreach activities across all Eastern Manitoba. Self help is a vital part of dealing with

these disorders effectively. The benefits for people, both those with the disorders and their loved ones, coming together to find support and understanding, knowledge and acceptance is very important. Of special importance is education in order to dispel the myths and erase the fear regarding disorders of the brain. An extensive education role is planned and inquiries are very welcome.

The Honourable James McCrae, Minister of Health, will formally open the centre on behalf of the four organizations at 12:00 noon, Thursday September 12, 1996. The public are welcomed, and refreshments will be served.

INFO FOCUS HEALTH CARE DIRECTIVES

What is the Purpose of a Health Care Directive?

As a Manitoba citizen you have the right to accept or refuse medical treatment at any time. The new Health Care Directives Act allows you to express your wishes regarding the amount and type of health care and treatment you wish to receive in the event you become unable to speak or otherwise indicate your wishes. It also allows you to appoint another person with the power to make medical decisions for you, if you are not able to make them.

Why Should I Fill Out a Form?

Due to accident or illness, you may become unable to say or show what treatment you would like, and under what conditions. If you have signed a directive, those close to you and the health care professionals treating you are relieved of the burden of guessing what your wishes might be.

How Do I Make A Health Care Directive?

The Manitoba government has prepared a form for your convenience. The form acts as a guide for providing the appropriate information. However, any paper which is signed and dated, and provides the same information may be used. A directive may be made by anyone capable of making a health care decision and understanding the consequences of that decision.

Who Do I Talk To About These Decisions?

It is strongly recommended you talk to your doctor before completing the di-

rective. This will ensure your instructions are clear and easily understood by those who provide treatment. Your choices should then be clearly typed or printed.

It may also be useful to talk to your lawyer to understand any legal issues/terms involved. For example, if you spend time outside Manitoba, you may wish to ask your lawyer about the validity of your living will in another jurisdiction.

What is a Proxy?

A proxy is someone you choose and name in your directive to act for you in the event you are not able to make such judgments and speak on your own behalf. Because it is not possible to anticipate every set of circumstances, your proxy has the power to make health care decisions for you based on talks with you and the information in your directive.

Who Do I Choose As My Proxy?

Because the choices you make in a directive are very personal, the people you choose to represent you should be close friends or relatives who are willing to accept this responsibility. You should also be able to discuss your wishes freely with them. It is wise to name more than one proxy in case one is not available when

he or she is needed.

Can I Change My Mind About My Directive?

A Health Care Directive should be a record of your current wishes. If at any time you wish to change the content or the proxies, all copies of your old directive should be destroyed and a new directive written.

What is the Effect of a Health Care Directive?

The wishes you express in your directive are binding on your friends, relatives and health care professionals (unless they are not consistent with accepted health care practices) and will be honoured by the courts. However, health care professionals treating you are not obliged to search for, or ask about a signed directive. Therefore be sure family, friends, your doctor and your proxy know you have one, and where it can be found.

SNAP SHOTS

Some know "Slim" as the guard at the local jail, others know him from his 1940 logging days when he first came to Pine Falls. For those of you who have never met the man, Slim's real name is Richard Horn and he currently resides in St. Georges. He was born in Vancouver in 1912, and moved to Winnipeg with his family at six years old. After finishing school in Winnipeg, Slim proceeded to work for various railroad, construction, and dock loading companies throughout northern Ontario and British Columbia. Mr. Horn commented that: "In those days, you went wherever the work was." Then in February, 1944, Slim found himself in Pine Falls scaling logs for the mill with Stan Brewster. At the end of that summer, he briefly left to take another job for a short time then returned to Pine Falls in November of that same year. This time, Slim was hired as the foreman at Camp Eight, which was one of three World War II Prisoner of War (P.O.W.) logging camps near Bear River. The men at Camp Eight were German P.O.W.'s that had been captured by England in the Sahara Desert. First they had been sent to England, then Medicine Hat, then some volunteered to work at Camp Eight. Slim's job as foreman was to scale the logs that the men had cut and make sure they got transported safely back to the mill wood's department. The Germans lived in a bunk house, the cook lived in a cook shack, and Slim had his own small cabin. Among the P.O.W.'s was a butcher and a baker, who were also assigned to help the chef in his duties. Slim remembers the prisoners as a fairly tame bunch who

worked fairly hard, ate good food, and didn't complain about much. After the war, the P.O.W.'s were shipped back to Europe. Slim still gets mail from one of the Germans that he supervised during that time. Slim continued working in the bush until 1949, when he took a job as truck foreman on the construction site for the new powerhouse that was being built at the mill. In 1952, Slim moved on again, this time to work in Quebec, and on the D.E.W. line in Baffin Island and Cambridge Bay. In October of 1959, in the midst of moving around, Slim took time out to marry Margaret Willcott from St. Georges. In 1960, they bought a house on Ave. Chateaugay. St. Georges became their home base where they lived or visited for brief periods for the next 16 years in between jobs until he retired in 1976. 1987 was a hard year for Slim because in this year he lost his wife and his only son. In 1988, Slim decided to keep himself active, so he began working as an on-call guard for the Powerview R.C.M.P., and he's been there ever since. On November 15th, 1993, Slim married May Anderson at the St. Georges Parish. They still reside at his home in St. Georges. The Horn's enjoy taking road trips across Canada and down to the States. Richard Horn has led a very interesting life, full of adventures and cross-country travels. Slim is one local citizen who literally helped build this country from coast to coast.

Canadians who think they own computers with the year 2000 glitch, take heart: there are six easy diagnostic steps to see if your computer system date can roll over properly to the year 2000 or if it needs to be upgraded.

Most computer operating systems written before 1995 rely on antiquated computer code that prevents them from crossing over into the year 2000 or makes the systems roll back to another year. For example, some programs will revert to 1980 or 1984, while others may go back to the year 1900 instead of 2000.

Ignoring the Year 2000 glitch—known in the computing industry as the Y2K or Millennium problem—can lead to minor inconveniences like incorrect dates on documents and appointment calendars. It could cause more serious problems like erroneous calculations in home finance software, spread-sheets, and databases. And it gets even worse for companies, particularly financial institutions, that calculate loans, mortgages and life insurance policies.

While the impending problem is likely to affect about 80 per cent of the world's computer systems an estimated cost of \$600 billion, a little trouble shooting today can go a long way in solving problems tomorrow. Royal Bank has been working on the Y2K challenge for a year and is offering Canadians some tips to find out if their PCs will accept the year 2000.

Try this diagnostic test on the Windows based computer:

1. In your program manager window, click on the control panel icon and then on the date/time icon. Set the date to 12/31/99.
2. Then set the time to 11:59:30 p.m.
3. Power off, wait a few minutes, and then power on again.
4. If the date show 01/01/00, you should be OK. To make sure, use the date/code function on your PC to automatically insert the date into a blank document. The correct date should read January 1, 2000.
5. If the date in the document reads January 1, 1900, or some other incorrect date, you can do one of the following:

Work around time sensitive documents by manually inputting dates;

Search the Internet for sites offering home made solution. Some even offer corrective software that can be downloaded;

Call your operating software manufacturer to see if they've developed a corrective patch;

If you can't solve the problem on your own, call or take

Country Cooking
Shepard's Pie Casserole

- 1 cup peeled, sliced carrots
- 1 med. onion, peeled and sliced
- 3 cups diced cooked roast lamb or beef
- 1/2 cup frozen peas, slightly thawed
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup leftover gravy (or 1 cup canned gravy)
- 2 cups thick mashed potatoes
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons milk

Place carrots in small sauce pan; barely cover with water. Cook until fork-tender; drain. Meanwhile, in separate saucepan cook onion, barley covered with water, until tender; drain. Combine beef, vegetables, salt, and pepper in 2-quart casserole; mix well. Heat gravy; thin with boiling water if very thick. Pour over meat and vegetables; stir to combine. Bake, uncovered, at 350 F 20 minutes. Place potatoes in pastry bag; pipe over top of meat mixture. (Can mound over top of casserole with spoon.) Beat egg and milk together; brush potatoes with mixture. Return to oven; bake 20 minutes. Turn on broiler unit; cook until potatoes are lightly browned. Serve hot. Yield 4 servings.

correct date and time.

Royal Bank was one of the first companies in Canada to recognize Y2K and is on schedule to have all of its 600 computer systems reprogrammed by the end of 1998. A six-member team, nicknamed Project Daybreak, has been working hard to remedy the problem at Royal Bank for over a year now.

The cost of the project to the bank could reach \$50 million, but that is considerably less than companies that were slower to get started. While most businesses are aware of the problem, only about 25-35 per cent are doing anything

about it, Project Daybreak team leader Ron O'Donoghue said.

Studies show that only 50 per cent of companies will be ready by the end of 1999 and that the cost to the international business community is pegged at more than \$600 billion. Most consumers aren't aware of the problem either, he noted.

"This is not just a main-frame problem," O'Donoghue was responsible for development and implementation of a system allowing bank clients to access their funds with both their personal computer and interactive voice technology.

Forest Treevia:

Q. Is buying a real Christmas tree better for the environment than buying artificial?

A. According to the Canadian Council of Forest Ministers, buying a real Christmas tree may be better. Christmas tree plantations remove tonnes of pollutants from the air around them, they also provide wildlife habitat, prevent soil erosion and flooding and create jobs.

Management of Chronic Respiratory Disease Proper Care of Your Lungs...

Most lung problems particularly when there is cough and phlegm are related one way or another to irritation of the bronchial tubes. Proper care means avoiding the irritants and improving the elimination of phlegm from the bronchial tubes. The following should help avoid problems.

1. Avoid irritation of the lungs such as is caused by:

a) Smoking. This is dangerous for any patient with bronchial trouble, for it causes the production of phlegm, and is an important factor in the development of chronic bronchitis.

b) Infections. (At first sign of fever or chilliness or if your phlegm becomes yellow or green, seek medical attention.)

c) Most patients with chronic bronchial disease suffer from chronic sinusitis. This leads to a chronic discharge down back of the throat, which may drain into the lungs, particularly during the night causing bronchial irritation. The nose should be washed out with normal saline (salt in water) every morning and night. This procedure should induce a cough to help eliminate the phlegm.

d) Avoid dusts and strong fumes.

e) Chilling. (Always dress warmly from head to foot; avoid sitting in front of fans or air conditioners. Be prepared for temperature changes. If you go out into cold air, cover your mouth and nose with a scarf or buy a mask for this purpose.)

f) Avoid the things which cause allergic reactions.

g) Avoid excessive emotional tension. Stress and excitement may cause fast breathing - keep calm.

2. Keep your bronchial tubes cleared.

a) Use your nebulizer four times daily, including each

morning and night, no matter how well you feel. Always carry your nebulizer at all times.

b) Always take your bronchodilators (breathing tablets) 1/2 hour before meals and before bed.

c) Drink lots of fluids, at least 10 glasses of juice or water daily. This will help loosen mucus and keep the bronchial tubes clear.

d) Do postural drainage if it was advised for you as long and as often as necessary.

3. Learn how to breathe with your diaphragm, inhale slowly through the nose, and exhale through pursed lips, while contracting the abdominal muscles.

4. Don't overbreathe. Relax, slow down. Don't force yourself to breathe hard. Overbreathing wastes energy and makes you feel tired. Remember to relax.

5. Keep the nose, throat and teeth clean.

a) Don't blow your nose hard out of habit.

b) Brush your teeth regularly. If gums are inflamed or infected see the dentist. Clean dentures regularly.

Warning Signs of Impending Respiratory Disability in Individuals in Good Health....

1. Coughing induced by smoking.

2. Coughing or sneezing

induced by a dusty atmosphere.

3. Coughing induced by cold, frosty, or humid air.

4. A persistent or recurring morning cough with or without sputum production which continues for more than a few weeks.

5. Frequent episodes of acute lower respiratory infections during the year.

6. Breathlessness during periods of activity, which did not cause breathlessness on prior occasions.

7. Periods of respiratory infection caused by wheezing and breathlessness.

8. The sudden onset of wheezing or a "choking" sensation.

Warning signs in those known to have some form of chronic respiratory disease:

1. An unusual increase in the amount of sputum.

2. An unusual decrease in the amount of sputum.

3. A change in the consistency and stickiness of sputum.

4. A change in the color of the sputum, to either brown, yellow, or green.

5. The presence of blood in the sputum.

6. An increase in the severity of breathlessness.

7. A feeling of general ill health.

8. Sudden swelling of the ankles.

9. Having to increase the

number of pillows in order to obtain a comfortable sleep.

10. A sudden increase or decrease in weight.

11. Increase in tiredness or lack of energy.

12. Increase in frequency of morning headaches, dizzy spells, restlessness or insomnia.

13. Development of confusion, disorientation or slurring of speech during an acute respiratory infection.

Treatment Includes an Aerosol Bronchodilator....

To those suffering from a disease which causes an obstruction to the bronchial tubes, improvement of this condition may be obtained by the use of a bronchodilator.

A bronchodilator is a

drug which when inhaled, causes expansion or dilation of the bronchial tubes, allowing air to flow in and out of the lungs more freely. It is not habit forming and will not lose its effect due to continued use. It is a safe drug when used according to instruction.

If you suffer from a disease causing obstruction of the bronchial tubes, you are advised to consult a physician as soon as possible in order to receive the best possible care.
