New Cable Company Coming to Pine Falls

-Digital TV to be available this summer

SkyCable, a Brandon company, licensed by the CRTC to distribute MDS (Multi Channel Distribution System) TV in Manitoba has announced that it will be making available digital "Cable" TV to 80% of the population of Manitoba by mid summer.

"Cable" is not quite the right word. The company calls it wireless cable, but there is no cable involved. SkyCable's customers will be receiving microwave transmissions from a transmission tower in the area, via a small antenna on the roof or under the eaves of the house.

SkyCable is owned by

Craig Broadcast Systems which also owns Brandon TV (a CBC affiliate) Brandon Radio, and MTN. It is the first company in North America to use digital technology for television transmission.

The technology was developed by a Winnipeg Company - Broadband Network Inc. who are selling it throughout the world. First over seas sales were to a Japanese company.

The advantage of digital television transmission is in the quality of reception, there is no interferences, and picture definition is superior to normal TV.

SkyCable began trans-

mitting digital TV at the end of October in Brandon, December in Elie, Winnipeg will be covered by the end of February. By mid summer they expect to have 10 transmission towers covering 80% of the people in Manitoba.

SkyCable Vice president Miles Craig said he does not expect to put local cable companies out of business but will be offering them stiff competition.

There will be \$100 installation charge, and a \$200 refundable deposit on a decoder. A basic package of 17 channels will cost \$19.95/month. The company will be offering up to 33 channels.

Three Sagkeeng Men Die in Tragic Accident

RCMP press release

At approximately 2:03 a.m. on January 26th, 1997 members of the Selkirk highway Patrol and Rural RCMP Detachments along with St. Andrews Fire Department, and the Selkirk Ambulance Service responded to a two vehicle head on collision on PTH #8 approx. one mile south of Meadowdale Road in the Rural Municipality of St. Andrews.

A northbound Ford Tempo car carrying three adult male occupants collided head on into a southbound Mazda MX3 Precidia car carrying two male and two female occupants. The following three occupants of the Ford Tempo succumbed to injuries sustained in the collision, Douglas Christian Eaglestick age 24 of Fort Alexander, MB; Julius Peter Letander age 32 of Ft. Alexander, MB; and Adrian Merlin Abraham age 21 of Ft. Alexander, MB. Both male occupants

of the Mazda succumbed to injuries sustained in the collision. Dead are Cheung Sham age 19 of Winnipeg, MB and Plato IP age 18 also of Winnipeg, MB. One adult female in the Mazda was transported to the Health Sciences Centre in Winnipeg, MB in serious condition. As of 8:15 p.m. January 26th, 1997, her condition has been upgraded to stable. A second female in the Mazda was treated and released from the hospital with minor injuries.

The collision occurred when the northbound Tempo crossed into the southbound lane subsequently colliding head on with the Mazda. The Mazda was in its own lane of travel. Alcohol is believed to be a contributing factor in this collision. The investigation is continuing; however, it is unlikely that charges will be laid as both drivers are deceased.

"The Internet is becoming an increasingly important medium that supports lifelong learning in that people of all ages, not just students enrolled in formal education programs, can learn to acquire, process and apply knowledge and skills that are crucial in an increasingly knowledge-based economy," said McIntosh.

No progress in Northern dispute

The rest of the goods on the shelves of the Northern Store in Pine Falls have been removed.

This led Union representative Dan Oswald of the Retail Wholesale to say "I don't think they have any intention of reopening that store at all". He said the Union, through a mediator have asked the Northwest company if the store is for sale.

Ian Sutherland, president of the Northwest company said the goods were removed for resale rather than paying interest on the money tied up in the stock. He said some of the goods were for the seasonal market.

"Our intention is to settle this dispute and get back in business" he said.

McIntosh announces 1997-98 public school funding levels

Funding Level Maintained, Provides Two Year Funding Plan

Education and Training Minister Linda McIntosh today announced the government will provide public school funding at the same level as last year. For the 1997-98 school year, the province will provide \$746.5 million compared to \$745 million in 1996-97.

The minister also noted that once again this year, there will be no increase in the Education Support Levy, which is the provincial portion of property tax collected for education purposes.

As well, in a move designed to assist school divisions with planning for the future, the minister announced that the provincial government will, at the very least, maintain this overall funding level for 1998-99, barring any unexpected reductions in federal funding to the province. Individual funding levels for school divisions will continue to be determined based on a formula applied to each division's enrolment for the school year.

"This should assist school divisions with multi-year planning and enable them to make the most efficient use of tax dollars," said McIntosh. "Although individual divisions may see changes in funding levels from year to year due to enrolment and other factors, announcing overall funding intentions for this year and next should help divisions with their budgeting decisions."

The minister noted that education continues to be a spending priority of government, second only to health care in overall expenditure. Approximately 18.7 per cent of the provincial budget went to education in 1996-97 compared to 17.2 per cent in 1988.

McIntosh outlined a number of innovative changes in this year's funding formula: - Support for Students at Risk will be better targeted to students in divisions with the

greatest need.

- Urban school divisions will now qualify for transportation funds supporting bus purchases. In the past, with the exception of special needs students, urban division bus purchases were not funded by the province.

- Divisions will be given greater flexibility in deciding how best to manage school bus fleets. Past practice has been for the province to give new school buses to divisions. The province will now forward the funds and let the divisions make their own decisions regarding buses and will consider the divisions to be the outright owners of the buses. In addition to support currently provided to Kindergarten to Grade 6, funding will now be provided to Grade 7 to Senior 4 pupils in cities, towns, and villages who live more than 1.6 kilometres from school and a public transit stop. The province will continue to ensure safety standards are maintained, and will buy buses on behalf of divisions ensuring lower prices through bulk purchasing.

- The transportation grant for wheelchair pupils has been expanded to include pupils using handi-transit type vehicles, as long as they are approved and licensed. Previously, the grant was available

only if a pupil was transported on a school bus modified for wheelchairs.

- A change in funding calculations will result in some additional support for small elementary schools in very sparsely populated rural school divisions.

- Funding coverage will be expanded for students, including adults, studying regular curriculum courses outside of standard school hours.

- Increased co-operation and recognition for home schoolers and school divisions by providing support for those accessing public school programs.

Consistent with the government's commitment to encourage increased efficiencies, divisions will be able to keep surplus funds resulting from cost savings in the areas of operations and building maintenance, and central administration. Funds from such savings could be redirected to the classroom.

"Maintaining the funding level for 1997-98 and offering predictability for 1998-99, as well as increasing financial flexibility, will help each school division better plan for the future," said McIntosh. "These changes are designed to ensure that the education system continues to meet the needs of Manitoba students."

Gerald Wilson Charged and Released

First Nation Women from various women's groups are currently protesting the release of Gerald Wilson. More than 40 women are keeping a 24 hour vigil at the courthouse in The Pas. It is expected women from across Manitoba will be joining them. Wilson, charged last week with four offences including 2nd degree murder, is free on his own recognizance.

Katherine Green, Dorothy Martin's aunt says, "So far as I am concerned, there is no justice. We lost our niece and her children have lost their mother. The family's grieving and suffering began when Dorothy's life was taken by Gerald Wilson. The justice system waited 9 months to charge Gerald Wilson. When he was finally charged he was let free."

Chief Phillip Buck states

that the zero tolerance policy should apply here explaining that Wilson was allowed free because his father is of good standing in the community.

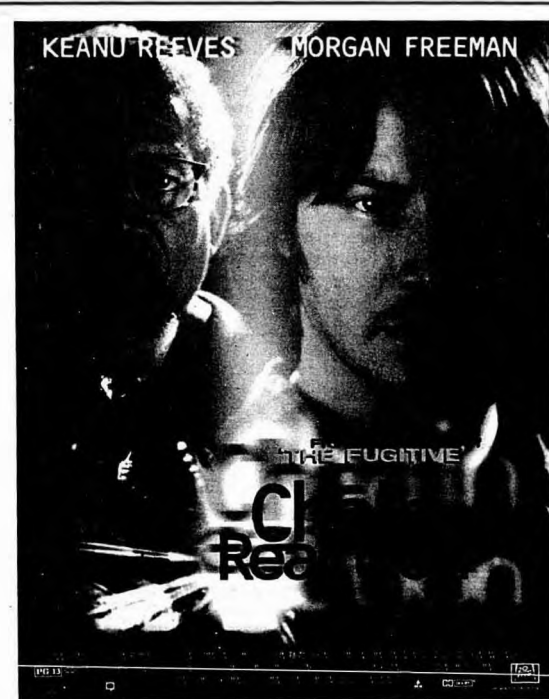
In which community is Gerald Wilson Sr. in good standing? As the sheriff of The Pas he withheld evidence in the Helen Betty Osborne case for 16 years. Does his conduct as an officer of the court not put his standing in question? He is in good standing within the incestuous justice system. If the First Nation community counts as a part of the community in the North, then Gerald Wilson Sr. is not in good standing," explained Black.

The Swampy Cree Chiefs fully support the women's initiative and will be requesting other tribal councils and nations to become involved. Chief Buck says, "My full support goes to the people in The Pas."

The Swampy Cree Chiefs including Opaskwayak Cree Nations Chief Francis Flett have attempted to secure a meeting with Justice Minister Vic Toews with no success. They have also attempted to reach the Crown Attorneys in both The Pas and Thompson with no response.

The women are determined to see a response to their concerns. The SCTC Chiefs are working with them to secure a response from the Minister to avoid another march.

"This demonstrates that the justice system is not taking the loss of Dorothy Martin seriously. They are just going through the motions. The only reason they laid charges is because the whole Nations saw Gerald Wilson getting special treatment within the justice system. The protest will not end until justice is served for the late Dorothy Martin."

What To Do About Con Artists, and Frauds...

Although we are now securely wrapped in the grip of winter, soon it will be spring, and with spring comes a proliferation of "con artists and fraud artists." Their methods vary from time to time, and from town to town, but have basic similarities. These include....

Con Artists....

These can be male or female, they're friendly, clever actors hiding behind the "friendly person" image. They are shrewd operators whose schemes, based on trickery and deceit, are aimed at swindling you out of your money or your property.

Con artists often regard older persons as easy targets. Every senior citizen should be aware of them and take note on how to avoid them.

The con artist is usually a stranger to you. You could be approached on the street, by telephone, or in your own home. Usually you are alone when approached. The con doesn't want anyone to hear the conversation. The method of approach takes many forms....he/she may pretend

to be lost, and ask for directions. He/she may claim to be selling some product or other. He/she may claim to be a salesperson or an inspector of a utility company. He/she may even tell you they are a distant relative. But one thing common to all con artists is the language and the expressions used in the "pitches."

The following key words can signal you to be cautious or suspicious of the person trying to con you.

* Cash Only. Question why the transaction requires cash only. A legitimate business person would not refuse a cheque as payment.

* Last Chance/Today Only....Why is this offer so limited? If the offer is that good, it will very likely be available tomorrow and the day after.

* Too Good To Be True... Be suspicious of offers that are "too good to be true." Most likely they are neither good nor true!

* Something For Nothing... anytime you're offered something for nothing, what you usually get is nothing!

* Confidentiality.... Be suspicious of secrecy and the

pitch that you are not to tell anyone. What is the reason for all the secrecy?

* Get Rich Quick.... Any "get rich quick" deal should be looked into carefully. They often are a bad deal for you.

* Contests... Beware of the "you have won" pitches. Generally, the contests are fake and are used as an enticement to part you from your money.

* Left Over Material... Be extremely careful of the "just passing by" home repairman. The left over material offered may be stolen or defective. For information on hiring repairmen contact your Better Business Bureau.

* 1 - 900 Telephone Numbers... Be cautious when using these numbers, they are not free and usually charge fees in excess of normal long distance calls.

* When in doubt contact your local detachment of the R. C. M. P. In Powerview area, the number is 367-2222, and in Grand Marais area, the number is 754-2300.

* If you aren't sure about something or someone, please remember to call the police and ask. If you feel foolish asking for help, remember it is better to feel like a fool, than to go ahead and be one.

Natural Resources officers have the authority to shoot dogs they see chasing animal life. Dogs lack the killer instinct of wolves and other predators, they only maim their prey, usually ripping at flanks, legs or underbellies, leaving the hapless animal to bleed to death, or freeze to death. Either way it's a horrible way to die.

There are many people who have begun feeding programs to preserve our deer population in this the second year of hard winters. Please keep your domestic dogs at home, that's where they belong.

Keep yourself Safe - Information for Everyone

Soon it'll be spring (it will, it will) and we'll resume, or step up our daily walks for exercise and fresh air. The following are some timely tips for all riders and walkers. Remember if you happen to be driving your vehicle, picking up hitchhikers (or being one yourself) places you in an assault risk category. If out for the evening, the offer of a ride home, or even the offer of a drink from someone you have just met at a private party, lounge or other public place could be an invitation for trouble.

Keeping Safe When Walking...

- Avoid carrying large sums of money and unnecessary credit cards. Carry a small change purse and only bare necessities rather than a handbag.
- If you must carry a purse, don't dangle it by your side in a way that a thief can run by you and grab it away. Carry the purse close to your body, preferably in front.
- Never leave purses unattended in shopping carts, etc. The contents of your purse, if stolen, can be traced to you.
- Walk on the side of the street facing traffic.
- Walk near the curb to avoid passing close to shrubbery, doorways and other places of concealment. Confine yourself to well lighted areas and avoid shortcuts, such as alleys.
- If a driver stops to ask directions, avoid getting close to the car.
- If a car approaches and you are harassed by the occupants, scream and run in the opposite direction of the vehicle. The driver will have to turn around to pursue you.
- Walk with someone whenever possible.
- Always be alert and

aware. If someone bothers you, don't be embarrassed to attract attention to yourself. Scream, yell, or whistle.

• Always try to let someone you trust know where you are going and when you expect to return home.

SAFETY FOR CHILDREN Prevention for Children..... a timely topic

Children are especially vulnerable. They are trusting, crave attention, and fear adult punishment. In the vast majority of sexual abuse cases involving children, the offender is known to the child and the child's family. In other words, the abuser is often a relative, close family friend, or parent.

By emphasizing caution, NOT fear, and being understanding and supportive, you can teach your children the following preventive techniques.

• Instruct your children to always inform you of their whereabouts, when they should be expected home, and of any changes in their planned activities.

• Instruct your children that NO One has the right to touch their body. (Note that a family physician may need to examine

them from time to time, and this is an exception.)

• Explain to your children the difference between physical affection and physical abuse. Support your children's decision to refuse to hug and kiss family members. This will make it easier for them to also say NO if they should be in an undesirable situation where another relative or friend wants to touch them.

• Instruct your children not to keep secrets, especially from you. Before employing a babysitter, if the person is unknown to you, get to know the person and request and check references.

• Instruct your children never to accompany a stranger nor anyone they don't trust or with whom they feel uncomfortable. Also instruct them not to accept gifts or other treats from strangers or people they don't trust.

• Instruct your children to look through the peephole before opening the door to a visitor. If they do not know the person, tell them to check with you or an adult who is taking care of them.

• Instruct your children not to take shortcuts through alleys,

dark streets, or wooded areas, and not to play in abandoned buildings or new construction sites.

• If your child is going door-to-door for a school or club project, accompany the child and make sure that all business is conducted on the outside.

• whenever possible, accompany your children to public rest rooms. If not possible, be sure to monitor the length of time they are in there.

• Always provide open avenues of communication with your children. If your children come to you with personal problems, don't respond to them with anger or embarrassment. Instead, let them know you will help solve the problems.

Be alert for unspoken danger signals of child sexual abuse:

- aversion to a relative, neighbor, or baby sitter
- change in eating patterns
- sudden lack of interest or achievement in school
- sudden desire for privacy or marked separation from family activity;
- trouble sleeping, waking up with nightmares, or bedwetting;
- irritation of the genital areas; and/or

• signs of increased anxiety or immature behavior.

If you suspect that your child has been sexually abused or approached, report it to the police immediately. Keep calm, reassure the child that they've done nothing wrong, but try to find out anything you can about the incident. An injured child should be taken to a doctor or emergency room immediately.

Most child abuser, like rapists and sexual offenders, are repeat offenders. They don't stop with just one.

COMMUNITY HEALTH WATCH

Bladder Infections, or Cystitis....

Cystitis is an infection of the bladder. It isn't a sexually transmitted disease, not is it contagious. Bladder infections are common in females because the female urethra is relatively short when compared to the male urethra. Cystitis is rare in males.

Causes of Cystitis (Bladder Infections)....

There are several contributing factors, but bacterial organisms commonly found in the area of the anus, vagina and urethra are the main causes. Bacteria introduced into the urethra during sexual activity can multiply rapidly and then move up the urethra into the bladder. The result is inflammation. Symptoms include pain and/or burning on urination, frequency and urgency of urination, cloudy or bloody urine.

Treatment....

For some women with bladder infections, studies have indicated that a shortened course of antibacterial medication is sufficient treatment. This medication may be taken with liquids and/or food. Symptoms are generally improved within 24 - 48 hours.

Other women need medication for longer periods of time. It is important if you and your physician determine this is the best course of action for you, then be sure to take the full amount of medication, for the full period as prescribed. Often discontinuing the medication before the prescription "has run out," results in the bacteria surviving, and reoccurring along with the symptoms. When taking medication, try to space the dosage at even intervals.

caution...antibiotics can interfere with the effectiveness of birth control pills. It is wise to add an additional method of contraception during the present pill cycle.

Measure to Help Relieve Symptoms....

Drinking at least six to eight glasses of water daily is good for kidney function and also cleanses the urinary tract. During an infection however, fluid intake should be increased to at least ten to twelve glasses of water daily. This will dilute the urine. Do not drink alcoholic beverages or caffeine, as these are irritants to the already inflamed bladder. Your symptoms can intensify.

Sexual activity during the course of the infection

may cause an increase in, or a continuation of symptoms. It is wise to avoid intercourse.

Research....

The use of oral contraceptives, tampons, urination before intercourse, and frequency of washing the genital area, as well as the direction one wipes following a bowel movement does not necessarily predispose one to develop cystitis.

Drinking vitamin C and fruit juices, including cranberry juice has, according to recent studies, not been shown to be of value in the treatment, suppression or prevention of cystitis.

Prevention of future Infections....

The best preventive medicine for sexually active women is to urinate immediately following intercourse. She should then drink two

glasses of water. The water will provide additional flushing of bacteria which was introduced to the urethra during sexual activity.

A woman who suffers repeated urinary tract infections, and who is using a diaphragm as a contraceptive may require another method of contraception.

Women who suffer from repeated sessions of urinary tract infections, must remember that there's always the possibility of bacteria ascending from the bladder to the kidney, causing further infection. Always complete the prescribed amount of medication.
