Winnipeg River CATV has applied to the CRTC for a license to transmit 15 cable channels to Sagkeeng.

Marc Fenez of Winnipeg River CATV will use microwave transmission from the tower in Pine Falls to transmit to antennas on the North Shore & South Shore of the Sagkeeng First Nation.

Fenez, and Kirby Fontaine of Sagkeeng will

be doing a survey of the community to determine the level of interest. Basic monthly service fee will be \$25/month.

Sagkeeng Chief Jerry Fontaine has written to the CRTC to support the application. He says the CRTC has no jurisdiction in Sagkeeng but Fenez says he's "going by the book" for his application. He is confident that it will be approved.

Pine Falls Sales & Savings to Close

Victim of the Northern Strike

Brenda Boriskewich - Kuzyk has announced that the Pine Falls Sales & Savings store on Pine Street will be closed by the end of February.

"Everything is on sale right now" she said "we will be moving out by the end of the month."

The store opened August 1st, 1995 and is closing because of a drop in sales since the strike at the Northern Store.

"There has been at least a 50% drop in business", she said. Many of her customers were from Northern communities and Sagkeeng, who are shopping in Lac du Bonnet, Selkirk, and Winnipeg since the strike began.

"I'm very sad doing this - but I don't have the money, I don't have the time and I don't have the patience to wait this out" she said.

The Pine Falls Sales and Savings is not the only local business to feel the impact of the strike Keith Clark at Pine Pharmacy says his business is down 20% - but the real crunch will

come in summer"

Mel Smitzniuk at Pro Hardware said their business is certainly down. "Saturday trade is basically non-existent" he said.

Sonny Sleeman, at Sonny's Chicken House said "It's hurting the community badly. I don't understand why this is happening. Either you're open or you're closed. If Northern doesn't want the Union then sell the store."

Gold Resources increase at San Gregorio Gold Mine in Uruguay

Reserve expansion drilling conducted in the fourth quarter, 1996 at Rea Gold's 100 percent owned San Gregorio Gold Mine in northern Uruguay has added 10,000 in situ ounces to the mine's resource base.

A total of 6,800 meters, (4,300 m core and 2,500 m reverse circulation) were drilled at the Santa Teresa West and North targets, located approximately two kilometres west of the San Gregorio Main Pit. An interim mineral resource estimate identifies 1.33 million tonnes @ 2.34 gpt or 100,000 contained ounces of gold in the Measured Resource category, at a 1.0 gpt cutoff and an in situ density of 2.8 tonnes per cubic metre. This gold resource has been drilled defined at 25 meter centers, over a strike length of 250 m and a maximum depth of 80 m.

The physical and metallurgical characteristics of the Santa Teresa mineralization appear identical to those of San Gregorio and would be processed in the existing San Gregorio mill. An additional program of core and reverse circulation drilling is planned for 1997 to determine the strike and down dip limits of the Santa Teresa deposits.

Four additional gold targets,

all located on the San Gregorio Shear and potentially additional feed sources for the San Gregorio mill, will be drilled in 1997.

Rea Gold's 100% owned Bissett Gold Mine in Manitoba, Canada is also under construction. Bissett is scheduled for start up before the end of the second quarter 1997 and is estimated to produce 30,000 ounces in 1997 and 80,000 ozy at full production in 1998.

A 30 hole, 13,000 foot reserve confirmation drilling program commenced on January 22, 1997 at Rea Gold's 100% owned Centennial deposit at Mt. Hamilton, Nevada. With these reserves confirmed, pre-production stripping would start in May, and gold production from the Centennial Mine would commence in December, 1997 at an annual rate of 50,000 ounces. Gold production for 1997 from the Seligman Mine at Mt. Hamilton is estimated at 20,000 ounces.

Rea Gold's total 1997 gold production from all three properties is estimated at 110,000 ounces.

Rea Gold is a Canadian mining company engaged in exploration, acquisition, development and operation of gold properties in the Americas. The com-

mon shares of Rea Gold are traded under the symbol "REO" on the Toronto Exchange in Canada and the American Stock Exchange in the United States.

Emergency Deer Feeding Program Announced

The provincial government will participate in an emergency deer feeding program this winter to prevent large scale starvation of deer populations, Natural Resources Minister Glen Cummings has announced.

Early and heavy snowfall, combined with very cold temperatures, are resulting in difficult conditions for deer, particularly across southern and southeastern Manitoba," said Cummings. "Through an emergency deer feeding program, we will assist by identifying areas where feeding is necessary and then provide funding for feed."

During normal winters, when deer mortality is expected in the range of five to 15 per cent, programs like this are not

necessary. However, when conditions threaten to cause large scale starvation, the province will organize an emergency feeding program.

Cummings noted that the extreme weather conditions have resulted in deer turning to farm hay supplies for food, causing substantial damage. He said while farmers expect some damage by deer to their stored feed, they are concerned about high losses this winter. The minister said it is anticipated that the emergency feeding program will help to reduce further damage to farmer's stored feed. The minister said this will also deter deer from wandering into residential yards in search of food.

"Efforts by the department, along with hundreds of volunteers will again save many deer," said Cummings. "However, we should not expect that our efforts will save every deer in troubled areas. Some winter losses are bound to occur."

Kindergarten Experiments With a Half Day Program

Powerview School moved ahead with half day classes for its English and French Immersion kindergarten classes. Beginning on Monday, January 20, 1997, students in the English class attended in the morning from 8:45 - 11:50 a.m. Students in French Immersion attended in the afternoon from 12:45 - 3:30 p.m. This is a change from the full day, alternate schedule that both classes had been following since September.

The change was promoted by comments from parents about the length of Kindergarten day and by teacher observations of tired and distracted students. A preliminary parent survey was done by teachers with positive response. A general meeting of Kindergarten parents, teachers and administration was held on Jan. 13th where pros and cons of the idea of a change in the program were discussed. All parents who attended the meeting supported the idea as it was in the best interest of the children. The change to half days for Kindergarten students supports provincial recommendations for Early Years programs.

Parents have agreed to pick up and drop off their children at noon times. Children continue to ride the buses before and after school at 3:30 p.m.

A review of the Kindergarten program by parents, teachers and administrators will take place at the end of February.

Abuse of the Elderly...

Most of Canada's elderly enjoy strong, healthy ties with their families, friends and caregivers. But a significant number of older adults are not happy or safe, and are being victimized by family members, caregivers friends and landlords.

Abuse of the elderly falls into three categories:

1. Physical Abuse - Inflicting pain or discomfort by physical assault, rough handling, restraint, coercion, sexual molestation, and under/over medication.
2. Psychological Abuse - Inflicting anguish by insulting, humiliating, intimidating, infantilizing, ignoring, frightening, isolating, removing decision making powers, withholding love and denying access to grandchildren.
3. Material or Property Abuse - Illegal or unethical exploitation of funds, assets or property belonging to an older person, such as coercing them to sign a power of attorney or stealing from an older adult.

Neglect is also considered abuse. Neglect can vary from active neglect such as denial of necessities such as food and health care to passive neglect, such as failure to

give proper care because of ignorance and infirmity.

Preventive Tips: Seniors should try to:

1. Participate in social activities as much as possible with friends as well as family members.
2. Maintain independence and self sufficiency as long as possible.
3. Prepare and revise your will before beginning your retirement years - preferable with the help of a lawyer.
4. It is unwise to bequeath a house or other possessions to relatives on the strength of a promise by the relative to "look after you".
5. Older adults (particularly widows) are vulnerable to abuse if they have little knowledge or understanding of their financial situation. It is important to assume some responsibility for knowing how to manage finances.
6. Older adults (particularly widowers) have a responsibility to learn self care such as shopping, meal preparation and house cleaning.

COMMUNITY HEALTH WATCH

The topic of menopause is not one that has been in the forefront of women's health issues until the last few years. It's important that all women recognize the signs, and know how it may affect them. Here is the first of a two part series dealing with:

Menopause...Another of Life's Changes.

Menopause is one of the major turning points in a woman's life. Some women dread reaching this stage, while others eagerly anticipate it. The women who dread reaching menopause most often feel it is an affliction, the loss of fertility and youth which makes them unattractive, helpless and useless.

Those women who anticipate the change often discover that menopause gives them a 'new lease on life' physically, emotionally, sexually and spiritually. Their enthusiasm abounds when considering the freedom of concern about pregnancy and premenstrual syndrome (PMS).

Today's women can look forward to living one third of

their lives after menopause. If you approach that portion of life with enthusiasm it can be one of the most enriching, rewarding times of life.

Menopause means the time of "mid life" when a woman's last period ends. This happens when the ovaries stop releasing eggs. Sometimes it's gradual, and sometimes the changes happen all at once.

Perimenopause...

Perimenopause is the gradual period of change leading into menopause. It affects a woman's hormones, body, and feelings. It can be a rocky, stop-start process that takes years. The word "menopause" is commonly used in place of "perimenopause." "Climacteric" is another word for the time during which a woman passes from the reproductive to non reproductive years of her life.

The production of estrogen by the ovaries, slows down during perimenopause. Hormones fluctuate during this period, much the same as during the period of adolescence. However, the changes leading

into menopause experienced by most women are much more intense than those of puberty. A woman's feelings about aging are also affected. The time after menopause is called postmenopause.

There are also two other types of menopause experienced by some women, they are:

Surgical menopause which occurs if the ovaries are removed or damaged, such as following a radical hysterectomy or chemotherapy. In both cases menopause begins immediately, with no perimenopause.

Temporary "stress menopause" can occur when women in their late 30's or older have no periods for long stretches of time. This can be caused by severe stress, chemotherapy, intense grief or illness.

Signs of Menopause...

Women approaching menopause often experience irregular menstrual periods - they happen closer together and/or further apart. There are other signs, and these are:

* difficulty in concentrating

- * crawling skin
- * depression
- * headaches
- * hot flashes
- * insomnia
- * early wakening
- * night sweats
- * conditions commonly associated with PMS

- * changes in sexual desire
- * extreme sweating
- * frequent urination
- * vaginal dryness

One, some or none of the above signs may be experienced by some women, but those that are experienced can be so unpredictable and disturbing that the women feel they are "going crazy."

There are also other factors that may be occurring in a woman's life which can influence her menopausal experiences. These are:

- * children leaving home
- * changes in domestic, social and personal relationships
- * changes in identity and body image
- * divorce or widowhood
- * retirement
- * increased anxiety about aging and death

- * loss of friends, loved ones, and financial security
- * increased responsibility for aging parents
- * increasing numbers of perimenopausal women also have young children to care for.

Whatever the cause or circumstance, the conditions women experience before and after menopause are very real and sometimes very serious. While ten to fifteen percent of women experience no signs of menopause, another ten to fifteen percent become physically or emotionally disabled for various periods of time by these conditions.

What pre, peri, and menopausal women must remember is that everyone is different. Forget worrying about it until you see how it affects you, then decide what to do.

"Safe Trails"

Initiative promotes safe and sober Snowmobiling in Manitoba

A unique partnership between Labatt Manitoba, the Department of Natural Resources, Snoman (Snowmobilers of Manitoba) Inc. and Bombardier Inc. Today unveiled "Safe Trails" - a new award and public awareness program aimed at increasing the level of safe snowmobiling activity in Manitoba.

"Snowmobiling is one of Manitoba's fastest growing and most enjoyable winter recreational

activities," said Cal Bricker, Director of Public Affairs, Labatt, Prairie Region. "So this initiative couldn't come at a better time."

Bricker said Labatt is searching for a snowmobile samaritan - an individual who has gone the extra mile to promote snowmobile safety in Manitoba. "Efforts to promote sober riding, develop trails, protect the environment or rescue someone in need, are examples of the kinds of safety initiatives Labatt

is looking for," said Bricker.

The Manitoba winner of the Labatt Safe Trails Award will be presented with a Ski-Doo Snogear snowmobile suit and helmet for their efforts. They will also qualify for the Labatt National Safe Trails Award and the grand prize - a new Ski-Doo MXZ 440F snowmobile.

"But the Labatt Safe Trails Award is just the beginning of the initiative," said Bricker. "We're also taking our 'don't drink and ride' message directly to retail outlets where Manitoba can win one of 25 Labatt winter jackets."

Further to that, Snoman Inc. President, Darren Grandbois said, "Our overall objective is to reduce the number of snowmobile accidents in Manitoba by encouraging 'safe and sober' riding on our more

that 7,500 km of groomed trails."

On average, six Manitobans die each year and 40 others are injured while snowmobiling. However, Grandbois points to the fact that, last year, not one death occurred on the marked, groomed trail system.

"To help spread this safety message," Grandbois said, "we plan to distribute Safe Trails kits province wide through our association and Natural Resources offices. As well, we'll be taking to the airwaves to deliver our 'safe and sober' message directly to Manitoba snowmobilers."

He said it is critical to remind snowmobilers that to remain groomed and signed as the designated trail system is, the off road environment is an ever changing one that still requires a rider's undivided attention.

Also on hand was Natural Resources Minister, Glen Cummings, to proclaim the last week in January as Snowmobile Safety Week in Manitoba.

"I am delighted to provide a springboard for the many Safe Trails activities," said Cummings.

"In so doing, I am told we are the first province in western Canada to dedicate a week exclusively to snowmobile safety."

Concluded Bricker, "The bottom line in this climate is that riding a snowmobile requires a rider's full and unimpaired attention. That's what Safe Trails is all about."

- 1 5-millimeter-by-59-millimeter green ring
- 7 6-millimeter antique-ivory rounds
- 7 6-millimeter plum rounds
- 11 6-millimeter-by-9-millimeter hunter-green ponies
- 11 10.5-millimeter antique lacquered copper corrugated rings
- 1 medium colonial copper star concho

- Brown suede lace
- Scissors
- Pencil

Note: There are a variety of beads and suede-lace colors from which to choose. Pick the colors that best suit your taste.

Instructions

Top of box

1. Wrap the suede lace around the band of the box top, tying a knot and leaving an extra length to hang down. Cut an additional length of suede lace, and slide into knot before tying. This will create a tassel. Apply a dot of Quicktite Super Glue, in the Gelmatic dispenser, along the suede lace to secure to the box top. Slide two hunter-green ponies on end of the tassel, and apply Quicktite to secure. Do this, as well, with two copper rings.

Chocolate Liner Hearts
Makes 3 dozen sandwich cookies

- 1 cup (2 sticks) margarine or butter, softened
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup hazelnuts, toasted, skinned and ground

Valentine's Day Cookies
Makes about 4 dozen cookies

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup (2 sticks) margarine or butter, softened
- 1 tablespoon vinegar

- 1½ teaspoons ground cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½ ounce semisweet chocolate, finely chopped
- ½ cup raspberry jam
- 1 ounce semisweet chocolate, melted

Beat margarine and sugar in large bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla until smooth. Add remaining ingredients except jam and melted chocolate. Beat until well blended. Cover and refrigerate dough 1 hour. (Dough will be sticky.)

Heat oven to 375 F. Roll one-fourth of dough at a time 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured surface. (Keep remaining dough refrigerated until ready to roll.)

Cut with 2-inch heart-shaped cookie cutter. Cut out centers of half the cookies, if desired. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until light brown. Remove from cookie sheet. Cool completely. Put cookies together in pairs with about 1/2 teaspoon raspberry jam in each. Drizzle with melted chocolate.

- 2 Cups all-purpose flour
- 1½ teaspoons ground ginger
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 1½ teaspoon salt
- 6 drops red food color

Heat oven to 400 F. Mix powdered sugar, margarine and vinegar in large bowl. Stir in remaining ingredients except food color. Divide dough in half. Mix food color into one half. (If dough is too dry, work in milk, 1 teaspoon at a time.) Roll dough 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured, cloth-covered surface. Cut into various size heart shapes with cookie cutters. Mix and match sizes and colors. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 5 to 7 minutes or until set but not brown. Cool slightly. Carefully remove from cookie sheet. Cool completely. Decorate with white and pink frosting, if desired.

Peanut Butter - Chocolate Kisses
Makes about 3 dozen cookies

- ½ cup granulated sugar
- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- ½ cup creamy peanut butter
- ½ cup (½ stick) margarine or butter, softened
- ¼ cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 1½ cups all-purpose flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda

shortening and egg thoroughly. Stir in flour, baking soda and baking powder. Mold dough into 1-inch balls; roll in sugar. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake until edges are light brown, 8 to 10 minutes. Immediately press candy kisses firmly in each cookie; cool.

About Valentine's Day

One thing is nearly certain: Valentine's Day has nothing to do with either of the two third-century martyrs who share the name Valentine and share February 14 as their feast day.

This date is heavy with the scent of coupling. A medieval folk belief held that wild birds choose February 14 to begin their spring mating. The ancient Roman custom, enacted every year at February 15's Lupercalia, or "lovers' lots" drawing partners' names at random from a box enjoyed enduring popularity through the ages. In mid-16th-century France, Saint Francis de Sales struggled to abolish the custom. As a contemporary described it, Francis tried to interest his flock instead in the practice of "giving boys billets with the names of certain (female) saints for them to honor." One can imagine how well that went over.

Another old tradition held that the first person seen on the morning of the 14th (except blood relatives) would be that day's "valentine." So Shakespeare has Ophelia chirruping to Hamlet:

Good morrow, 'tis Saint Valentine's Day,
All in the morn betime,
And I a maid at your window,
To be your Valentine.

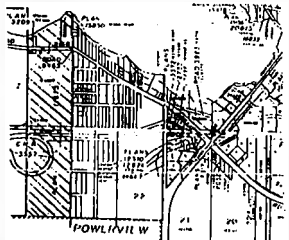
