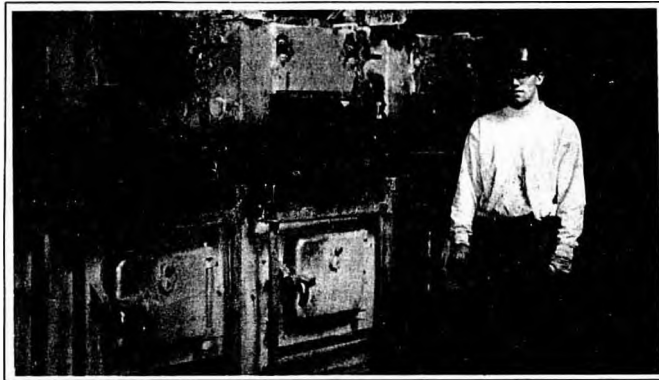

## Expansion planned for successful internship program

Agassiz's successful Science, Trades and Technology Internship Program (STTIP) is expanding for the 1997-98 school year.

### Adult Students Now Welcome

Beginning now, adult students seeking to combine academic learning with career experience will be eligible to apply for the internship program. Formerly, Agassiz Division program.

With the support of Human Resources Development Canada, the STTIP will be adding new career internship areas. Internships in the areas of financial services, agriculture, medical services, heating, ventilation and air conditioning, and office technology are being developed. This year, internships in computer technology, power engineering and in the electrical trade were developed and offered.

### Unique Program

This unique program partners academic education with science, trades and technology training and "real-life" work experiences to prepare participants for careers in science, trades or tech-

nology areas and/or for further education at college or university.

### Jobs for the Future

As the "global economy" becomes a reality and technology continues to grow, the workplace is changing. Jobs for the future will be centred in science, technology and trade areas. Analysts predict that many positions will remain vacant due to a shortage of skilled technical people. High retirement rates of entering these highly skilled areas will create a shortfall.

### Many Options

Graduates from Agassiz's Science, Trades and Technology program will have a variety of options. First, because they hold a regular high school diploma, participants are able to continue on to university or college. Second, students can seek an Apprenticeship and upon becoming indentured, the employer may apply to their 500 or 1000 hours of job experience credited towards their first year of apprenticeship. Third, the student may be hired by their Internship employer based

on their good understanding of the trade or technology.

### Program

Science, Trades and Technology interns attend one of the Adult education centres in Beausejour, Lac du Bonnet or Pine Falls for part of the regular school year, completing their core academic credits. Next, 500 hours are spent working and studying in the trade or technology they choose. One-on-one sessions are held weekly with a technical instructor with the rest of the week spent interning under a qualified journey person or technical expert.

### Partners

The STTIP program would not be possible without the partnership of Eastman business and industry. Ten area businesses and one Winnipeg firm are involved with the Internship with many others indicating their interest in participating.

## Cops take no nonsense approach to road safety

Powerview RCMP would like to provide the following by way of an update to a previous press release issued on April 4, 1997. In that press release, police advised of a new program at Powerview Detachment pertaining to dedicated Highway Traffic Act enforcement days. On these designated days, members of Powerview RCMP conduct dedicated traffic enforcement throughout the day in an effort to make the streets and highways in the Powerview Detachment area safer for motorists and pedestrians alike. This initiative is in addition to regular traffic enforcement carried out

daily by all members of Powerview RCMP. On the dedicated traffic days for April 1997, police issued a substantial number of traffic offence notices in all areas of Powerview Detachment but, the real success of the days rests in developing an attitude of safe usage of our streets and highways. This cannot be measured in tickets or fines but is a constant and ongoing process.

Powerview RCMP announce that the dedicated traffic enforcement days for May, 1997 are Monday May 12th, and Friday, May 23rd. The first day's

enforcement will focus on speed related offences and moving violations while the latter day's enforcement will focus upon vehicle equipment relocations and vehicle occupant restraint usage.

While Powerview RCMP urge the motoring public to always drive safely and obey all traffic rules, compliance on these dates is especially imperative as no warning will be issued.

Let's all work together to make roadways safer for motorists, pedestrians, and civilians alike.

## PFPC offers payroll deduction plan for flood relief

The employees of PFPC have come forward in the spirit of concern and good citizenship to help those who have lost their homes and belongings in the flood. They have suggested that a payroll deduction be established for those who want to contribute to the relief fund and we are pleased to advise the necessary arrangements have been made to set this up. Donations to the flood relief fund can be made by payroll deduction, to include 4 pay periods

only, commencing the second pay period in May. All donations over \$10 will be issued a charitable receipt (in our case this charitable donation will be reported on our T4 slips). Employees wishing to donate through this means should see their department supervisors to complete the payroll deduction forms.

Example: If you wish to make a total donation of \$10 - you will be deducted \$2.50 per pay.

If you wish to donate \$100, you will be deducted \$25.00 per pay.

At this time, PFPC is helping to prepare for the possibility of accepting 2000 plus evacuees into our local communities, along with the R.M. of Alexander and the Village of Powerview. Food, lodging, shelter, transportation, showers, bathing supplies, etc. will be required and we are committed to assisting the flood victims.

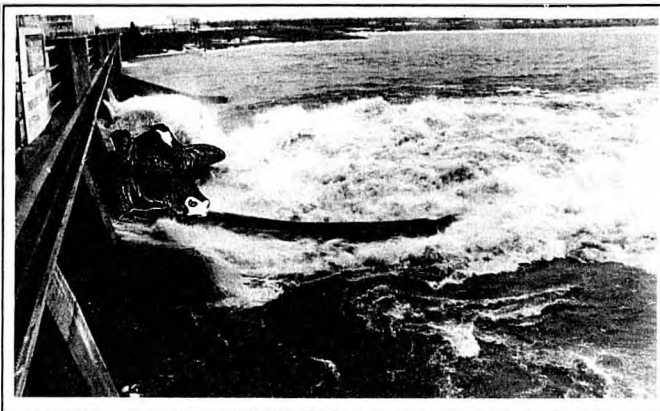
Memories of the people that have already passed on are the only things that are on your mind during this period of your life, as

## Drivers license, registration deadline extension announced by Findlay

**Move to Accommodate Evacuees, Red River Flood Workers but will apply to all**

Manitoba motorists have been given an extension for driver's licence and vehicle registration deadlines to accommodate those who have been evacuated or are working on the Red River flood.

Highways and Transportation Minister Glen Findlay announced today that due to the exceptional circumstances sur-

rounding the flood emergency, a revised deadline of May 23 has been set for driver's licences expiring on April 30 and vehicle registrations through Manitoba Public Insurance expiring between April 18 and May 22.

"We are granting this extension to give flood evacuees and workers ample opportunity to have their driver's licences

and vehicle registrations renewed, without distracting their attention from the emergency at hand," said Findlay.

The minister added that while Manitobans not directly involved in the flood fight are still expected to renew by their regular deadlines, for the sake of simplicity and enforcement, this extension will apply to all.

## MPI Warns of Flood Fatigue

As flood dikes and human endurance are being taxed to the utmost, the fatigue and emotions that result can affect motorists' ability to make good driving decisions.

Darryl Hammond, Manager of Road Safety for Manitoba Public Insurance (MPI), said Manitoba's extended battle against rising flood waters could increase the risk of collisions because of stress and fatigue.

"Almost one out of every 20 fatal crashes is the result of driver fatigue," Hammond said. "During a crisis like this - when people are emotionally drained from working extraordinary hours to save their families and

friends - the risk of drivers losing their focus on the road or falling asleep at the wheel is that much greater. The answer is for all of us to make an even greater effort to drive safely."

Hammond also reminded Manitobans of some of the dangers of driving in water.

"We can't emphasize enough that everyone should avoid driving in flooded areas," he said.

If, despite all precautions, motorists find themselves faced with deep water on a street or road:

\* The best choice is to back up and try another route.

\* If there is no other choice but to drive into water, drive slowly and cautiously, watching carefully for signs of a moving current that may have affected the safety of the road ahead. Always respect the power of water. If you have any doubts, don't proceed.

\* After driving through deep water, always test your brakes. They may pull to one side or may not work at all. You can "dry" your brakes by driving slowly and applying them lightly.

\* If your vehicle stalls in water, be prepared to abandon it and retreat, always being careful to watch for signs of a moving current that may put you at risk.

## Fatigue, The Hidden Disability...

How many times have you heard a friend or family member say, "I know you have arthritis, but you look so good!" They don't understand why you can't do all the things you would like to, in part because they can't "see" anything wrong with you. Whether or not they actually say it, they seem to be implying that you are over reacting, perhaps even that your problems are more mental than physical.

But as a person with arthritis you know all too well how real the disease is in the physical sense - pain and limited range of motion are daily reminders of arthritis. Yet even you may not be fully aware of the important part fatigue plays in your disease. It is a symptom whose effects can be destructive and deceiving.

**"Why Am I So Tired?"**  
People with some forms of arthritis become tired more

easily for several reasons:

- Sore or stiff joints require much more energy to move. Even small, simple movements may take a lot of effort when arthritis has reduced your flexibility and range of motion.

- Weakened joints put an extra workload on normal joints and muscles. The unaffected areas must "take up the slack", causing them to tire more rapidly.

- Arthritis is cyclical in nature, causing a person to have good days and bad days. This brings with it uncertainty and stress which may increase fatigue. Many people with arthritis tend to overdo when they are feeling well, causing even more fatigue on the bad days.

- The depression and frustration which often accompany a chronic disease like arthritis can result in fatigue, which in turn may heighten feelings of depression when you find you can't complete a favorite activity or keep up

with friends as in the past. Thus, a vicious cycle is created.

- People with arthritis experience normal body fatigue like anyone else, but because their energy is sapped by their disease, this normal fatigue is more common, may occur more quickly and is more noticeable.

## Coping.....

Once you and those around you accept fatigue as a very real part of life with your disease, you can take steps to help yourself cope with it. One way to reduce your fatigue is to begin an exercise program to strengthen muscles and increase range of motion in the joints. Within a few months, you should be able to do more without getting as tired. Your doctor or a physiotherapist trained in arthritis can show you the best exercises to help keep your muscles strong and your joints as flexible as possible. Begin your exercise program gradually and build up slowly. A little pain may occur from the exercises, but if the pain persists for more than two hours, cut back.

## Plan Your Activities...

Another way to cope with fatigue is to carefully plan and organize your activities

so you make the most of your energy. Don't try to fight your fatigue, instead learn to recognize it early and work to control it. Pace yourself and try to plan your day so that you can alternate periods of activity with periods of rest. When you know you have a large task to do, such as preparing a meal or cleaning a room, plan ahead and break the job into smaller tasks. Then work on completing the tasks one at a time, and follow each with a rest break.

Arrange your day's activities to conserve energy. For example combine shopping trips, eliminate or minimize stair climbing and share family chores. There are many modifications you can make in your home to simplify your lifestyle and make daily chores easier for you.

## Pay Attention To Your Body

Pay attention to what your body is telling you. Notice if there are certain times of the day when you always tend to feel fatigued, and plan around these times. For example, if you find that you usually become very tired in mid afternoon, plan your day's activities so that you can rest or at least slow down during that time.

It is wise to take advantage of the good days when

you are feeling better to accomplish things you may have been putting off. However, remember not to overdo on these days. By engaging in too much activity on the pain free days, you may cause yourself increased pain, decreased energy and limited activity for many days to come.

## Dealing With Depression...

The best way to deal with the frustration and depression you may experience as a result of your arthritis is to come to terms with the disease and accept your limitations. Be realistic about the things you can do, and work to create interesting alternatives to those you cannot do. For example, if your arthritis prevents you from enjoying outdoor activities like hiking and camping, you might try nature photography as an alternative. Keep your doctor informed about how you are doing. Sometimes small changes in treatment can make major differences in how you feel and how you cope. During times of depression, your most important allies can be your friends and family members. Enlist their help and understanding. Educate those close to you about fatigue being a part of your arthritis, and explain to them the "ups" and "downs" you experience. Fatigue can be controlled, but it depends on you. With careful planning and organization, plus the understanding of friends and family members, you can successfully overcome this "hidden disability" of arthritis.

## Baking with bread machines

In her capacity as Manager of the Robin Hood Test Kitchen, Jill Snider, members of the company's Consumer Services Departments handle hundreds of consumer queries about bread machines each month. Here are some of the questions asked most often:

Cornerstone News column

7) Why is my loaf as heavy as lead, just like a hockey puck? You may have forgotten the yeast or used old yeast. Or, extra salt, sugar or hot liquids may have killed the yeast and inhibited rising.

8) Why does my bread look misshapen? If a loaf looks caved in on top, there may have been too much liquid or moisture from added fruits, vegetables or cheese. If the top looks lumpy or uneven there may not have been enough moisture. Sometimes heavier textured bread looks like this.

1) Why do U.S. bread machine recipes ask for an addition of gluten? In general, U.S. all purpose flours tend to be much lower in natural protein than Canadian flours. Gluten is often called for to add protein to American flour. Robin Hood's Best For Bread Flour and Bread Machine Mixes both contain the right amount of gluten. Bread Machines Mixes, and formulated for use in all bread making machines. Consumers can use these products without adding gluten.

2) What type of yeast should I use? Most recipes call for Quick Rise Instant Yeast or the new Bread Machine Yeast. Use whatever your bread machine manufacturer recommends.

3) What size loaf does a bread machine produce? A 2-cup (500 ml) machine yields a 1 lb. (500 g) loaf; a 3-cup (750 ml) machine yields a 1 1/2 lb. (750 g) loaf and a 4-cup (1 L) machine yields a 2 lb. (1 kg) loaf. Robin Hood's Bread Machine Mixes are formulated to work in both 2-cup and 3-cup machines.

4) What is the correct order for measuring and adding ingredients? Always follow the manufacturer's instructions. This is vital. Order depends on the mechanics of the machine and varies with different machines.

5) Why is it important that the yeast not touch the water? If the liquid rehydrates the yeast too soon, the result may be an over-fermented and under-risen loaf.

6) When and how should raisins, or nuts be added? If your machine has a fruit setting, add as directed. To prevent sticky fruits like raisins or dates from clumping at the bottom of the loaf or getting too finely chopped, try air-drying them overnight on the counter.

Lawrence has a nice easy pace, showing outfits to their absolute potential, and the whole time she keeps a warm light patter.

Joanne Klassen, President of Heartspace Associates, was the first of a series of speakers. She spoke about "Motivating Yourself For Life." Klassen asked the roomful of women what motivated them. The answers were as varied as the women themselves. Things like fear, freedom, encouragement, independence, desire, health, recognition, service, the need to be needed etc. She gave us the message that "we can achieve whatever we want by tackling the job five minutes at a time." We need to set goals and try to make our goals a little at a time.

Sandra Willman, Physical Development Consultant and creator of No Bounce Aerobics completely energized the women with a zesty presentation of her recipe for life. Willman called it the cake, and the ingredients of the cake are: the physical body, or the house, the mental self which harbors the logical side of the self, the emotional side where feelings like anger, pride, resentment and excitement reside, and the spiritual self where the truth lives. Willman told the group that we must give all four parts equal attention, that truth and respect live together. She gave every woman food for thought with statements like "however you treat all four parts will determine your quality of life."

The next part of the program featured a hair makeover with a live model. Tracey, a hair

Consultant with Edward Carriere Salon in Winnipeg, did the makeover with draw winner Cathy Halgren. As she scrutinized for the cut to best enhance Cathy's pretty face and features, Tracey kept up a commentary on what she was doing as well as enlightening the ladies about what to expect in a salon. When the cut was complete everyone agreed that Cathy looked wonderful.

The only male on the program, Edmond Beaudry, Rem, MT gave a wonderful message of relaxation and how to do it. As soon as he began to speak, he had every woman in the room in a state bordering on sleep. His method of achievement (it's not easy to have all fifty women in one room so silent a pin drop could be heard) was to play very quiet background music and talk quietly. It was so wonderful to be in that state, it was given up reluctantly. He told us about relaxation exercises and what body aches in various parts of the body meant. For instance, aching shoulders refers to responsibility, aches in the pectoral muscles of the chest refer to sorrow, these are called Body Metaphors. Beaudry's presentation told us about the signs of burnout. Some indications are sleeplessness, waking with a sudden jolt, and depression. Beaudry said we must recognize and take ownership of pain, only then can we

have control over it. We must love ourselves and be able to shed the guilt of the small transgressions of our lives. Only when we forgive ourselves will we be able to forgive others.

Loiri Vialoux and organizers of the Health, Wellness and Beauty day are to be congratulated for their efforts to bring the program to women of the eastern beaches. Every woman in the room appreciated the efforts. Perhaps it can be an annual event.

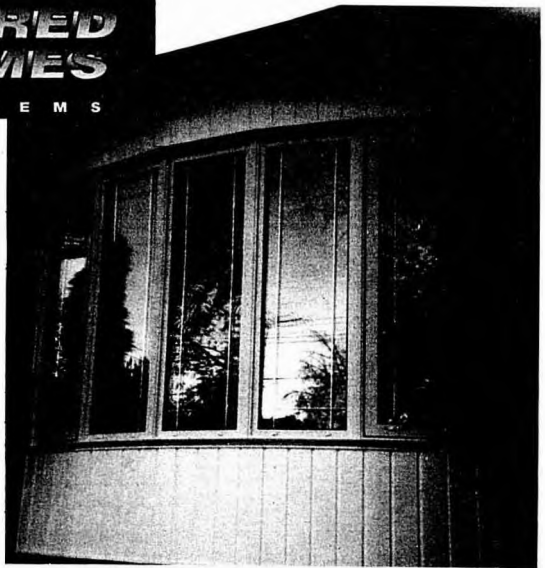
