## Mother relieved now that charges have been laid

Family feels healing process can now take place

A 41 year old woman of Lac Du Bonnet, Manitoba has been charged with three criminal offences in connection with the death of two year old Katrina Guimond-Morrisseau whose life was ended on the afternoon of August 27th, 1996 after a fire was deliberately set at the Three Bears Day Care centre in Pine Falls.

I've had the opportunity of interviewing the mother and grandfather of Katrina and would like to share their thought and feelings on the investigation and the charges laid.

As we sat in the office Laurie (the mother of Katrina) showed signs of stress and lack of sleep after hearing of the charges being laid on the suspect Mrs. Martin. Anger was felt after some com-

ments she read in the Winnipeg Sun on Tuesday. She felt that too much emphasis was put on Mrs. Martin's acts of heroism in getting the children out of the fire, and that Sergeant Jennings (RCMP officer in charge of media relations for this case) diminished the charges laid on her by doing so.

I asked Laurie and her father (the Grandfather of Katrina) if it brought a sense of relief knowing that a person has been charged for this crime. Both agreed that it did bring some relief to them, however Laurie added that "no matter if she's (Mrs. Martin) convicted or not, it still won't bring my little girl back." As for the Grandfather, he worries that the accused may be cleared of the charges. The question of motive still lingers in the minds of the family.

Laurie found out on Friday June 6th of the charges being laid by the investigating officers. She was also thankful for how the police officers (Cpl. Dave Lower and Constable Wilson) handled this investigation. The officer involved with the investigation stated that he and his partner have built a friendship with Laurie and her mother but feel unfortunate that it had to be under these circumstances. Ms. Guimond also feels that the justice system seems to be protecting the criminals rather than the victims.

After a long awaited investigation and a suspect finally charged in connection with this crime, maybe now the beginning of the healing process can commence. Mrs. Martin is to appear in court on Wednesday June 11 in Pine Falls. This case is expected to be remanded for up to a year.

## CHARGES LAID IN ARSON CASE

A Lac Du Bonnet woman has been charged in connection with the August 27th '96 fire at the Three Bears Day Care Centre in the Pine Falls United Church. The fire resulted in the death of two year old Katrina Guimond-Morrisseau.

Three charges have been laid against 41 year old Norcen Mary Martin of Lac du Bonnet - Manslaughter, Criminal Negligence Causing Death, and Arson, with Disregard for Human Life.

Martin lived in Pine Falls and worked at the Three Bears Day Care Centre prior to the fire. She moved to Lac du Bonnet, commuted for a while, and later resigned. At the time of the fire she had been asked to return to fill in for a vacationing employee.

At the time of the fire the heroic efforts of the Pine Falls and Sagkeeng Fire Departments, and the day care workers, including Martin, were praised.

office found that the fire had been deliberately set shortly after the blaze, and the RCMP investigation came up with a suspect soon after. The investigation was not complete until two months ago when the RCMP handed their evidence over to the Crown. It was another two months, (last Friday) before the Crown laid charges against Mrs. Martin. She was released on bail by a Winnipeg court on Saturday. Under the bail terms she is to remain in her home, and is to stay away from Sagkeeng and Pine Falls.

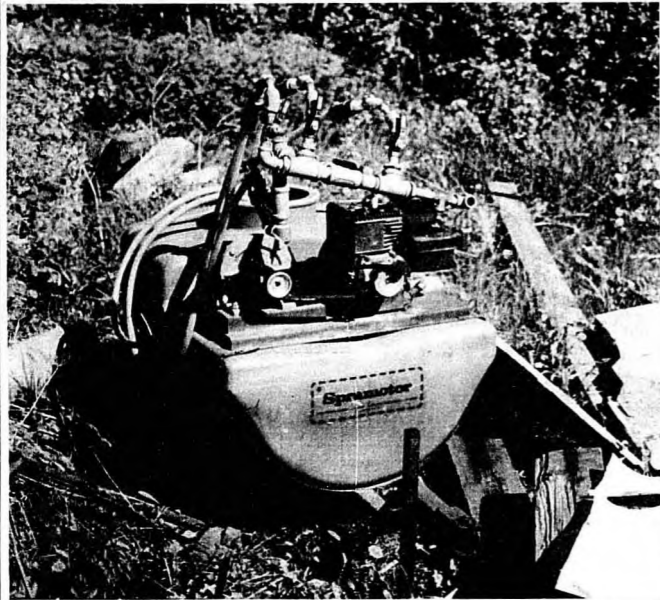
Laurie Guimond, Katrina's mother said after hearing of the charges, "No matter if she's convicted or not, it still won't bring my little girl back". One close friend of Martin, who did not wish to be named, told The Voice that the charges were incomprehensible to her. She said she could not possibly imagine Martin being capable of the things she is charged with.

## Where are you when we need you Denis?

### Pine Falls infested with huge mosquitos

It wasn't like this before Denis Perex retired.

Perex combined the jobs of buyer for the Pine Falls Paper Company, and Townsite Manager for the community of Pine Falls. He seemed to do both jobs with very little effort. At least nothing much ever seemed to go wrong. But it seems the job was not as easy as it appeared. When he retired the functions under the title of Townsite Manager were divided up amongst six different people.

It appears that not everyone of those six was really clear as to what part of the job was up to them and what was up to someone else. In any event, spraying for mosquitos was someone's job.

An attempt by the Voice last week, to try to find out why Pine Falls is swarming with mosquitos this year met with a bureaucratic run-around that would have done a major metropolitan proud.

However, for the benefit of

our Pine Falls readers we have been able to glean some information.

The two mill employees who had licences to spray, have given them up. They would be personally liable for any legal challenge. If someone claimed their asthma was made worse by the spraying they could find themselves in court. Thus - with complete disregard for the greater good - they decided not to risk all their savings to protect the rest of us from the voracious hordes, and gave up their licence to operate the company's spraying equipment.

So the company gave the equipment to the golf club, so that the course could be sprayed, they requested in return, that the club also spray the town of Pine Falls.

It seems the issue of liability came up again. Do we need a permit? For the golf course? For the town? No one seemed to know, and no one seemed to know who should find out.

Perhaps because of phone

calls from the Voice, more likely because absolutely everyone was getting fed up with the irritation associated with providing blood for the next generation of mosquitos, someone did discover we needed a permit. And managed to delegate getting the permit to another person. (Not one of the original six Perex replacements) It was discovered that getting the permit would take at least a month.

It appears unlikely that Pine Falls will get any mosquito spraying done before the end of July, and who will actually do it still has to be determined. No one seems to doubt that, by the time the mosquito season is over, all of these issues will be resolved.

We can only hope that the company will have got it's act together by next spring.

Perhaps it is time for Pine Falls to begin to look at incorporating. The last time this was suggested it met with fury from residents, but in those days someone was taking care of the mosquitos every summer.

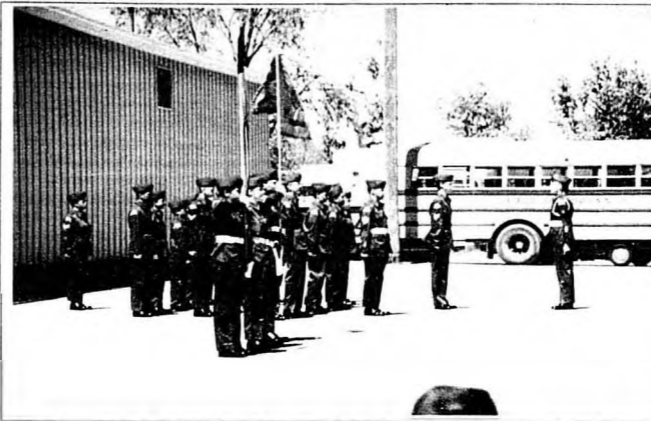

from industry leaders and will be placed in new entry level positions in the private sector. The principal objective is to develop working relationships between educational institutions, Aboriginal organizations and the business community.

"Being young in Manitoba should be a time of hope and promise and excitement for the future. It should not be a time of despair and disillusionment for those who have stayed in school, worked hard to get their education and are now trying to get a job," said Filmon. "This new program is a positive step in helping to ensure our young people get the help they need to become full participants in today's workforce."

"This program will be the catalyst for Aboriginal youth to use the skills they have and access valuable experience while working within the private sector," said Pettigrew. "The support from our community leaders is evidence of the commitment to the future of these young people. This program meets the needs of Aboriginal youth while providing the potential for further educational and long-term employment."

"Partners for Careers is intended to help address the unemployment rate in Manitoba's Aboriginal community, which is estimated to be three times higher than the provincial rate," said David Newman, Manitoba min-

ister responsible for Native Affairs. "Close to 50% of the Aboriginal population is under the age of 20."

Aboriginal organizations currently providing training and job placement will receive funding for the program to assist with client selection, placement and pre-employment training and mentoring for up to 300 Aboriginal young people a year. Candidates will be offered career path assessments and workplace orientations.

"This is a win-win program for both Manitoba businesses and young Aboriginals," said Manitoba Education and Training Minister Linda McInosh. "Business will be able to access an invaluable resource in our community while our Aboriginal youth have a positive future to look forward to."

This project supports the federal government's Youth Employment strategy to help Canada's youth make the transition from school to work and get their first job, in partnership with business, non-governmental organizations, communities, and other levels of government. The strategy has three main elements: improving access to youth information and services; building on what works through existing programs such as Youth Internship Canada and Youth Services Canada; and new internship programs in science and technology, international trade and development, and Aboriginal communities.

## Pine Falls Mill Employee-Owners Retire \$30 million credit line

Just three years after saving the mill from closure, the new employee-owners of the Pine Falls Paper Company have been able to retire the \$30 million government line of credit that helped make the buy-out possible.

Industry, Trade and Tourism Minister James Downey hosted an event at the Legislative Building Tuesday to celebrate the early retirement of the credit line, a full seven years ahead of schedule. In honour of the occasion, the minister presented a plaque to Fern Pitre, president of Pine Falls Paper Company.

"More than a thousand jobs were saved when the mill was purchased by the management, staff and investors in 1994," Downey said. "We were glad that the government could help leverage the private financing that helped make the buy-out possible, and are even more gratified by the early repayment. Today the mill is able to operate totally on private financing. That's an important turning point for the company, and a great vote of confidence in its future."

A group of employees, managers and investors purchased the mill in September 1994 when the newsprint industry was in recession and the former owners were no longer willing to make large capital expenditures to keep the mill competitive.

Closure of the plant would have had a devastating impact, Downey said. "The mill employs 500 full-time staff and provides more than 700 seasonal jobs in harvest and forest renewal work," he said. "The total annual benefit to the province was estimated to be about \$75 million in 1994, and is certainly higher than that now."

The mill also operates and funds many community services such as the elementary and high schools, recreation centres, garbage collection, road and sewer maintenance and fire protection.

To help the new owners keep the mill open, the Manitoba government provided a \$30 million line of credit over a 10-year term. Because of the mill's successful performance over the past few years, the company borrowed only \$5 million on the credit line and was able to repay the funds seven years early through financing arrangements with private lenders.

The government financing helped the paper company leverage \$53 million in credit from private sources and financed two major projects: a waste water

treatment plant to meet federal and provincial environmental standards, and a new de-inking facility to produce recycled paper.

"Pine Falls Paper Company has experienced tremendous growth and change since 1994, and we are very proud of our achievements, especially in the area of the environment and in positioning ourselves as a competitive player in the global marketplace," Pitre said. "This interim line of credit helped make it possible."

Pitre presented a cheque to the Manitoba Government for \$5,451,575 to cover the amount borrowed from the \$30 million line of credit the government extended the company. Praznik Quipped that it was the first time the Voice had taken a picture of someone presenting him with a cheque.

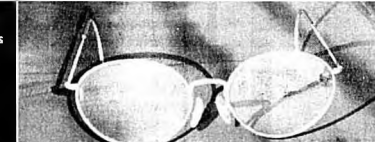

## Ground Beef Your Guide to purchasing

You may be surprised to learn that ground beef is the most popular meat eaten in Canada. Whether served as a hamburger, in a pasta sauce, taco or casserole, it's not only delicious, but also quick and easy to prepare, economical and nutritious.

Q. What is the fat content of the different forms of ground beef?  
A. Federal government labelling regulations require that ground beef maximum fat content be labelled as:

Extra lean: 10%, Lean: 17%, Medium: 23%, Regular: 30%

The fat percentages are regulated by law and government inspectors regularly check retail samples to ensure the meat is labelled correctly.

Q. How does the fat content of ground pork, chicken and turkey compare?

A. If labelled 'lean', whether it's ground chicken or ground beef, the fat content cannot exceed 17%. At the present time, ground

pork, chicken and turkey do not have to be labelled as to type (i.e. lean, medium, etc.) therefore, their fat content is unknown. If they are labelled 'lean', for example,

they must not contain more than 17% fat - the same as for ground beef. Look for the terms lean, medium, etc. on all ground meats and poultry.

Q. What is the fat content of different forms of ground beef when cooked?

A. Although regular ground beef contains more fat than medium, lean and extra lean, when cooked and drained of excess fat, the fat contents are not significantly different.

Q. Why is the meat on the outside of the package sometimes bright red, while the inside is darker purple in color?

A. It is natural for the beef in the center of a package of ground beef to be a darker color than the meat on the outside. The difference in color is due to oxidation. The ground beef on the surface has been exposed to oxygen in the air so it stays red; the interior is a darker purple color due to lack of oxygen. When exposed to air, the darker color will turn red.

Q. Is it illegal to add any coloring, additives or preservatives to fresh beef?

A. Government regulations prohibit the use of coloring, additives or preservatives in fresh beef.

Q. How many servings should I get from a pound of ground beef?

A. One pound (500 grams) of ground beef provides four 3 oz (90 gram) cooked servings.

Q. Some ground beef packages have a "best before" date. How do these packages differ from the regular store packages?

A. Some newer types of packaging allow for longer storage times and contain a "best before" date similar to other packaged products, for example, fresh pasta.

## HERE'S YOUR HEALTH

### Your Back Exercise.....

Strong, flexible muscles are essential to a healthy back. They support the spinal column and determine posture, which is the key to a healthy back. If your muscles are weak or tight, back injuries are more likely and recovery is more difficult. Exercise is the only way to keep your muscles healthy. Exercise will:

- Build strength and endurance for more efficient support and better posture
- Stretch shortened muscles that are causing imbalances
- Maintain mobility of joints.

Stay fit by exercising regularly to maintain a proper balance of flexibility, strength, and endurance. On the following pages you will find exercises designed to improve and maintain

the overall fitness of your back. This information is not intended as a substitute for medical attention. If you are receiving professional care, do only the exercises you have been instructed to perform.

**Exercises**

- Pelvic tilt (this is a stretching exercise and should be done before the strengthening exercises)
- Lie on your back with knees bent, feet flat on the floor and arms at your sides. Tighten your stomach muscles and flatten the small of your back against the floor without pushing down on the feet. Hold for five seconds, then slowly relax.
- Kneec to Chest

Starting in the same position as the pelvic tilt, grasp your right knee and gently pull toward your right shoulder. Hold for five seconds. Return to the starting position and repeat with the left leg. Alternate legs.

- Lumbar Rotation

Start with your back, shoulders, and arms flat on the floor. With your knees together roll them to one side as far as you can without lifting your shoulder off the floor. Hold for five seconds and repeat on the other side.

- Hump and Hollow

On your hands and knees, relax your abdomen and let your back sag downward. Then hump your back. Repeat.

- Side Bending

With your feet shoulder width apart, drop your head and shoulder while sliding your hand down your leg. Bend sideways slowly, as far as you can. Hold for five seconds and repeat on the other side.

- Trunk Extension, Prone

Lie on your stomach. Push up with your arms. Keep your hands on the floor. Let your stomach muscles relax and your back sag. Be careful not to bend back too far. Hold for five seconds. Return to the starting position.

the floor.

- Wall Squat

Lean against a smooth wall with your feet pointing straight ahead, heels about 18 inches from the wall. Slowly slide down the wall until your knees are bent to 90 degrees. Hold for 5 - 10 seconds and slide back up. As you become stronger, increase the time you hold the squat.

- Step Ups

Stand facing a 12 - 18 inch step stool. Step up with one foot, then slowly lower with the other. Do one set starting with one foot, then another starting with the other foot.

- Partial Sit Up

Do the pelvic tilt. While holding this position, curl your head and shoulders up and forward until your shoulder blade is off the floor. (Don't "lead" with your chin - keep it tucked in.) Hold briefly. Return slowly to the starting position.

- Rotational Sit Up

Do the pelvic tilt and, while keeping your hips flat, rotate your upper body so that the weight rests on your left shoulder. Then curl your head and shoulders upward, raising your right shoulder higher than the left. Keep your chin tucked in. Hold briefly before returning to the starting position. Rotate your upper body to the right and repeat the movement, this time raising the left shoulder higher than the right.

When exercising, remember to start with 5 repetitions of each exercise.

Progress slowly to 15 repetitions, but use your own judgment and don't advance too quickly.

A minimum of 20 minutes should be set aside daily to do exercises.

If the exercises cause pain for longer than 15 minutes, alter them or reduce the frequency.

**More Tips For a Healthy Back...**

Rest and Activities after Back Injuries...

If you are suffering from a strained back, take a hot bath or shower followed by stretching exercises. If you have a very sore back, bed rest may be appropriate for a few days - not weeks. Find the most comfortable position and apply local heat or ice for a maximum of 20 minutes at a time. When the pain starts to ease:

- Do some gentle stretching
- Walk around the room
- Walk around the house
- Walk around the block
- Keep moving a little further every day
- Swim and exercise your back if you can

**Your Diet and Your back...**

Excess weight places an unnecessary strain on the spine. Usually overeating is the cause. The remedy includes developing good eating habits that provide you with enough food energy without storing excess fat. Have your doctor or dietitian recommend a proper diet that suits your needs.

**Remember.....**

- Back injuries are caused by stresses placed on the spine
- Ligament and muscles are most vulnerable to injury
- Balanced posture while standing, sitting and sleeping is essential
- Exercise helps to prevent injuries and assists in recovery
- Gentle post-injury exercise is essential
- Stay fit and avoid overeating
- Keep a positive attitude.

## Notice of Public Hearing and Pre-Hearing Conference

### Applicant: The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation

**APPLICANT:** The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the Corporation) has applied to The Public Utilities Board (the Board) for approval of the Corporation's 1998 rate bases and premiums charged with respect to compulsory driver and vehicle insurance. The application is being filed pursuant to The Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act and The Public Utilities Board Act.

**RATE IMPACT:** The Corporation is requesting approval for basic Autopac rates effective March 1, 1998. Together with modifications to vehicle classification systems and other Autopac program components, as established by the Corporation, the proposed rate adjustments represent an increase in written premium revenue of \$9.4 million, or 2.5 per cent, for the period March 1, 1998 to February 28, 1999. This increase in revenue results from the following rate adjustments to policies issued between March 1, 1998 and February 28, 1999:

- 2.0% special increase to help fund the rate stabilization reserve;
- Experience-based rate increases and decreases to individual classes ranging between +15% and -15%, resulting in an overall average increase in vehicle insurance premium revenue of 1.0%;
- Classification offset increases ranging between +0.1% and +19.9% (average 3.6%) to achieve revenue neutrality from the implementation of changes to vehicle rate groups;
- Modification of the formula for calculating the short rate charge on policy cancellations, resulting in a reduction in vehicle insurance premium revenue of 0.25%;
- Changes to eligibility rules for the merit program to provide discounts to all qualifying individuals on vehicles owned by limited companies, resulting in a reduction in vehicle insurance premium revenue of 0.25%;
- The Corporation is also requesting Board approval for a continuation of the previously approved special rate stabilization reserve rebuilding increase of 4%, currently included in basic Autopac rates.

Application of the proposed rate adjustments will result in the following average premium revenue adjustments by major vehicle use category:

Major Use	Number of Vehicles	Increase/Decrease
Private Passenger	578,000	2.7%
Commercial	47,000	-5.7
Public	7,000	-8.8
Motorcycles	7,000	14.9
Trailers	80,000	15.2
Off-Road	24,000	14.6

The overall impact of rate adjustments on the total vehicle population will be as follows:

- 139,000, or 18.7% of vehicles will receive a rate decrease. Most decreases will be less than \$50 with the maximum decrease being \$605;
- 7,000, or 1.0% of vehicles will receive no change in rate;
- 312,000, or 42.0% of vehicles will receive a rate increase of \$20, or less;
- 203,000, or 27.3% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$20 and \$50;
- 54,000, or 7.3% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$50 and \$80;
- 28,000, or 3.7% of vehicles will receive an increase greater than \$80 to a maximum increase of \$374.

The actual change in an individual's premium will vary depending on the owner's claim experience, driving record, insurance use, territory and vehicle rate group. The cumulative effect of those rate adjustments will all fall within the \$ amount described above.

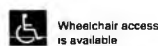
The Corporation is also asking the Board to approve rates for short term policies to be effective March 1, 1998. In addition, the Corporation is proposing to introduce a service fee of \$15 for document searches and requests for historical information on vehicles.

No changes are proposed to drivers licence premiums, fleet rebates and surcharges, time payment fees or existing service and transaction fees.

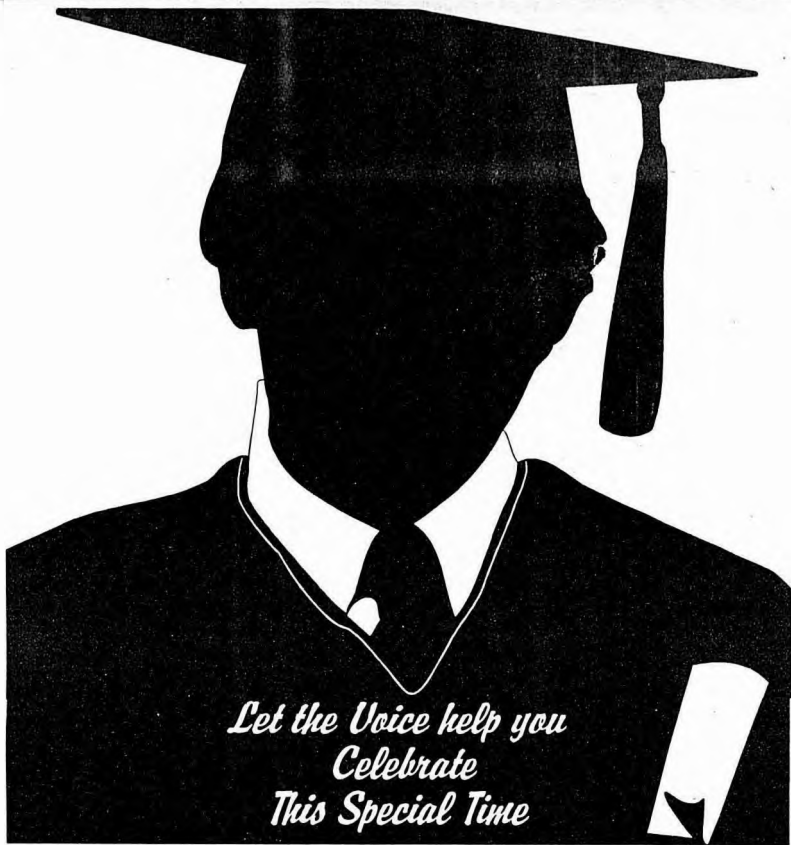
