THE SOUTHEAST BLADES picked up their second win in a row knocking off the Dauphin Kings 5-1 to move them into a tie with the St. Boniface Saints after an overtime 4-4 tie result between Winnipeg South and St. Boniface. The win gives the Blades 10 points.

Southeast had another spirited effort and controlled the game from the outset. Steady goal trending from Darryl Tinney and

a much improved Blades defence keyed the team to their fifth victory of the season. This young hockey club has started to gel and coach Bruce Schmidt has his team playing as a unit as Southeast seems to have put an 0-9 start to the season behind them.

For the second game in a row the Blades allowed just one goal against them, which should give goaltender Darryl Tinney some containerisation for player of the week honours in the MJHL.

Tembec offer expected soon

A formal offer from Tembec for the Purchase of the Pine Falls Paper Company is expected very soon.

A revised date for the offer was scheduled for Wednesday, November 5. The deal is now in the hands of lawyers for the two companies. Because it is not known how long the legal work

will take a date for presentation to shareholders has not been fixed. The Voice understands that the formal offer will not be substantially different from the tentative price mentioned in a letter of intent presented to employee shareholders at the beginning of September.

Lakes named in honor of WWII fatal casualties

More than 4000 lakes, river, creeks, etc. have been named after Manitoba's World War II casualties. This application of casualty names is a fitting memorial and affords society a means of recognizing the contribution which these brave Canadians made so we could live in

peace and human dignity.

The Manitoba list is titled: Fatal Casualties of World War II who, on appointment of enlistment gave their addresses within the Province of Manitoba. The list is divided into three divisions - (Royal Canadian) Navy, Army, and Air Force, and lists 153, 1982

and 1579 names respectively, making a total of 3714 names. The information included in these lists is confined to place of enlistment (according to 1931 Census Divisions); Regimental Number; Name (Surname, given name and initials); Date of confirmed Death (Day-Month-Year).

When initiated, this naming program, included advising the next of kin of the naming of a feature after their relative. The then Canadian Board on Geographical Names used the addresses given by the service personnel on the date of enlistment but, as these addresses became

more and more out of date over the years, this practice had to be discontinued.

To coincide with the completion of the naming project, a special effort to contact the families has now been undertaken by a corps of volunteers. If you See **PROGRAM** pg. 4

in cash and the balance in Tembec preferred shares redeemable in three years, or convertible to Tembec common stock at \$16 per share. The letter of intent gave a date of September 30 for a formal offer to give Tembec a month to carry out their "due diligence", i.e. to examine the books and the mill to assure Tembec that they were getting value for their money. That investigation took longer than anticipated, hence the delay in making a formal offer.

During that time the PFPC has been looking at ways to structure the deal to minimize the tax effect on employee shareholders. The Papermakers union, the UPIU, has also retained a consultant to carry out its own due diligence. The UPIU consultant has not yet completed his work.

The PFPC needs a month after the formal offer to allow time to call a shareholders meeting. According to the shareholders agreement currently in place, two thirds of the shares must be voted in favour of amending the agreement for the sale to take place. Employees own 44% of PFPC shares and could block the deal if they voted 75% against the offer. Since 15% of shares

are held by an employee trust, and if these shares were voted against the offer, the employees would then have to vote 60% against changing the shareholders agreement, and thus blocking the sale.

Among PFPC employees there is a great deal of ambivalence towards the deal. On one side there is the more secure fu-

ture for both the mill and the community by becoming part of a major, and diversified, forest products company. On the other there is the loss of local control over the future progress of the company. Most employees interviewed by The Voice have indicated that they will wait until they see the formal offer before making a decision.

Ron Halpin appointed Ambassador to Czech Republic

Ron Halpin, who was born in Pine Falls in 1949, and graduated from the Pine Falls High School, was appointed Ambassador to the Czech and Slovak Republics, in July. He is stationed in Prague, Capital of the Czech Republic.

Halpin served in the Canadian Armed Forces from January, 1967 to January 1975, rising to the rank of Captain. During this time he served with the Canadian peacekeeping operation in Cyprus. He graduated from the Royal Military, with a BA (Honours) degree in International Affairs, in 1971.

Halpin joined the Department of External Affairs in 1975, and served in the Canadian embassies in Pretoria, Moscow and Warsaw. In Ottawa he served in the Political and Strategic Analysis Division, The USSR and Eastern Europe Relations Division and the Personnel Division. He was senior Advisor for Security and Counter-terrorism from 1992 to 1995. Until his appointment to Prague he was director General of the Resource Planning and Management Bureau.

Ron Halpin speaks German, Russian and Polish. He is married to Francoise Lacasse, they have two children Sarah, born in 1978, and Henri, born in 1984

Dear Editor,
The Manitoba Nurses Union has launched Phase II of the "Standing Up for the Front Lines of Health Care" Campaign. Due to Health Care Reform (Cutbacks), many Nurses throughout Manitoba have been laid off and replaced by less qualified workers (that is, Health Care Aides). Nurses realize that we have to become more active and vocal to emphasize the value of Nurses in the Health Care System.

In response to patients, who have said that at times they can-

not distinguish Nurses from support staff (housekeeping, dietary, etc.) unionized Nurses across the province are proud to be wearing pins identifying them as a nurse. RN (Registered Nurse), LPN (Licenced Practical Nurse), or RPN (Registered Psychiatric Nurse). These pins indicate that the Care Giver delivering care to our patients is indeed licenced and qualified to deliver safe, efficient care. Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day Remembered

Pine Falls School students, bundled up against the cold, filed out of the school into the deep, freshly fallen snow, and trudged off, class by class to the cenotaph at the corner of Pine and Tamarac Streets. I remember this particular November 11 well as it had snowed during most of the night, and large fluffy flakes still fell as the citizens of town gathered in front of the old mercantile store to remember those who had fought and died in the wars. Inclement weather did not prevent the assembly or the progress of the remembrance service.

After the singing of O Canada and the prayers and poems from clergymen and legion members, wreaths were laid by Mrs. John Dean, and Mrs. Pat Lalor while the drone of the bagpipe lament, played by Mr. Bill MacLeod, reverberated through the crisp November air. Then, at exactly 11 a.m., the mill whistle blew to mark the beginning of the two minutes of silence. The crowd stood silent, hearing only the whispering of the wind through the trees until, once again, the mill whistle blew to signal the end of silence. Finally, Mr. Earl Manson raised

his trumpet and sounded the Last Post. A benediction and God Save the Queen ended the service.

The Great War of 1914-18 had come to its grim conclusion at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. In the early days in Pine Falls, an annual Armistice Banquet was held in the old construction camp dining hall, and in 1929, the dinner was attended by 70 legion members and their guest. The banquet had been arranged by Mr. Fred Gray and the staff of the camp dining hall.

After the banquet, the formalities proceeded as follows: The Toast to Fallen Comrades - Comrade Bert Clements, Two minutes of silence, The Toast to the King - Mr. D. McCulloch, Message from the Canadian Legion - Comrade Hardyman, Reply - Colonel Baxter, O.B.E., V.D., Toast to the Guests - Comrade B. Hay, Reply - Mr. C.C. Irvine, Message from the Pine Falls Branch - Mr. J.F. Thibideau, Reply - Comrade D. McCulloch.

When the official speeches were completed, there was a program of entertainment which began with songs from Com-

rades J. Webb and J. Cringle. This was followed by an amusing skit entitled "The Awkward Squad" which was performed by Messrs. J. Wood, J. Taylor, A.B. Robinson, Fred L. Gall, Stan Pottinger, and Ken Daniels, with Comrade Tanner at the piano. According to the Abitibi Magazine reporter, "This act had the audience rolling with laughter."

Prior to the banquet, the Pine Falls Legion Branch had sent a cable to the Prince of Wales and the Victoria Cross winners at the Banquet held in London, England, extending them every good wish from the members.

The Pine Falls Branch No. 64 of the Royal Canadian Legion received its charter on Oct. 16, 1928. As well as the Armistice Dinner and Dance, the members always had a Vimy Dinner to commemorate the Battle of Vimy Ridge, in which Canadians played the major role. On April 9, 1917, the 4 Canadian Divisions attacked the ridge.

With fixed bayonets, they advanced at the rate of 100 metres every 3 minutes, walking directly behind the artillery barrage. Many fell wounded into water filled shell holes and drowned. As they made their way up the slope, they trudged over a mass of mud, blood, and shattered corpses of the enemy, all mixed together by the artillery barrage. Within two hours, the Third Division occupied Hill 145, the highest point on Vimy Ridge. By April 12, after 3 days of fighting, the Canadians controlled all of Vimy Ridge - over 60 square kilometres of German Territory. 3500 Canadians died in the battle. It was Canada's finest hour and many historians agree that it was the birth of our nation.

Since 1925 when mill construction started, many World War I veterans settled in the Pine Falls area and as a youngster growing up on Cedar Street, a Great War veteran lived on each side of our family - Mr. Norman Walton on one side, and Mr. Felix Kolesnik on the other. Some World War I veterans from the St. Georges area were Omer Chevrefils, Omer Dupont, Henri Mariel, and Donat Chagnon.

On April 6, 1929, A Vimy ridge Ball was held in the town community hall, with Chairman

B. Clements and his committee of B. Dimock, N. Walton, and J. McSherry organizing the occasion. The Winnipeg Legion Orchestra journeyed from the city to provide members with a fun filled evening of dancing.

The names of every Canadian soldier who fell in Korea are etched on individual bronze plaques that hang in a neat rectangle. Canadians will now have a place to come and remember the soldiers of the Korean War.

\$3 million available to boost mineral exploration

Nov. 17 Application Deadline For Provincial Assistance

A further \$3 million is available through the Manitoba Mineral Exploration Program (MEAP) which will result in further growth and job creation in the industry. David Newman, minister of energy and mines, announced today.

"Mining ranks as Manitoba's second largest primary resource industry and therefore plays a significant role in the economy," said Newman. "MEAP has promoted growth, development and investment for the past two years with a better than four-fold rate of return on provincial dollars. The \$6.3

million in assistance already allocated by the province has leveraged \$27 million in proposed exploration expenditures.

"Since 1995 the program has assisted 56 companies involved in 120 exploration projects, including seven joint ventures, of which 32 are firms considered new to Manitoba. MEAP contributes to an increase in jobs and a boost to the economies of many Manitoba communities."

Previously approved projects include a wide range of exploration programs for copper/zinc, gold, nickel, diamonds

and various industrial minerals, located in the regions of Flin Flon and Snow Lake (52), Lynn Lake and Leaf Rapids (10), Southeastern Manitoba (24), the Thompson Nickel Belt (19) and Northeastern Manitoba (15).

MEAP offers financial incentives of up to 35 per cent of eligible exploration expenses incurred by companies on pre-approved exploration proposals. The program is designed to encourage grassroots exploration of Manitoba's mineral resources and stimulate activities that could lead to new mine developments.

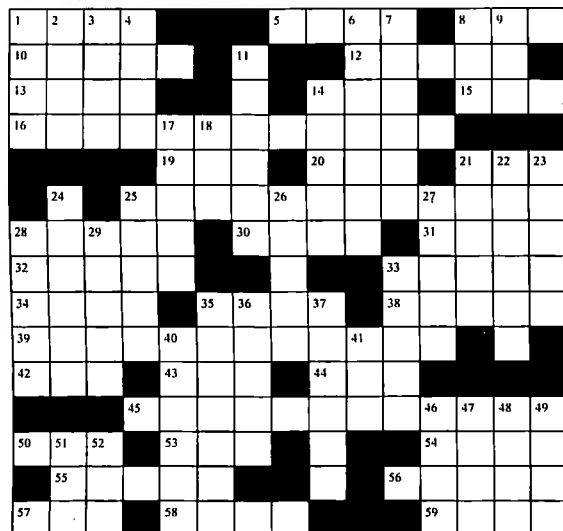

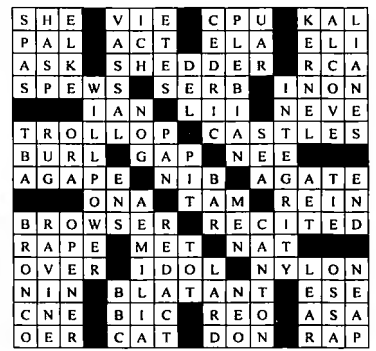
