## Tragic Accident at Hollow Water



### 5 year old girl dies in hit and run

**P**owerview RCMP report that five year old Channell Williams of Hollow Water was struck and killed by a minivan while walking with her mother along the main road of the Hollow Water First Nation at approximately 1:00am on Friday, July 10.

Channell's mother, 25 year old, Melanic Williams suffered multiple bone fractures and was transferred to a Winnipeg hospital for further treatment. She was released for the funeral and is to return to Winnipeg for surgery on Friday, July 17.

The driver of the minivan failed to remain at the scene of the accident. Both mother and

daughter were found by the driver of the next car along the road.

The Hollow Water resident and driver of the minivan, Hughie Seymour, is reported to have left the scene of the accident, driven to the home of a relative and told what had happened. The relative then went to the scene and took the RCMP back to the home where Seymour was arrested.

He is facing charges of refusing to provide breath samples, impaired driving causing death, impaired driving causing bodily harm and failing to remain at the scene of an accident. Hughie Seymour has since been released on bail and is back in Hollow Water.

## Don Burnstick wows teenagers

Cree comedian uses humour to get alcohol and drug message across

The eighty or so teenagers who assembled in the Little Black River Community Hall last Tuesday were already in a happy, cheerful and carefree mood before comedian Don Burnstick began his "Sex, Alcohol and Drug" workshop.

"I'm not going to tell you to 'just say no,'" he told them. "Young people don't listen to that." But he went on to tell them why they shouldn't say yes.

Burnstick is a natural leader, he has energy, enthusiasm, and charisma. He also has the timing, delivery and acting ability of a natural comedian. He never lost the attention of his audience. Because body language is so much a part of his delivery it is impossible to do justice to it in print, which is unfortunate. His message deserves a wider audience.

"Don't be in a hurry to grow up" he told them. "The problem with teenagers is they want to grow up too fast."

He began by describing the

impact of popular music on teenagers, and on being "cool". He said "teenagers" started with Rock and Roll in the 1950's and gave a hilarious take off of Elvis Presley. He drew a small circle on a clip board to graphically indicate the impact on youngsters at that time. Every decade the circle got bigger. In the 60's came the Beatles, then the Rolling Stones. The music changed, drugs came into the lyrics. Along came Jimmy Hendrix, Woodstock and the hippies.

"Teenagers changed again in the 70's" He said. Disco entered the scene along with angel dust, magic mushrooms and LSD. In an aside he commented, "in those days these guys sang, today, no talented guys can't sing - they swear and fart."

"In the 1980's, when most of you were born, people rebelled against disco, the music changed again, Heavy metal and Judas Priest came in. In 1984, in came break dancing, but when people

started breaking limbs they went back to dancing upright."

"In 1988 along came The Police and the F word. F the system, F school, F parents. What it's really saying is F you." He said, pointing to the teenagers in his audience. "Then the gangster rap came in."

"The crap moved from the inner cities. AIDS started in San Francisco, people are now getting this disease on the reserves."

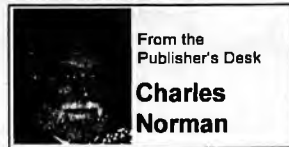
## Apples and Don Burnstick

When I was very young, about fourteen as I recall, I read a newspaper column in which the writer was complaining that apples did not taste as good as they did when he was young. He was referring to the time before the First World War. "Stupid old goat", I thought, "apples haven't changed, he has, he's just getting old."

In 1980, English apple growers were fighting a rear guard action against a flood of Golden Delicious apples being imported from France. The most popular English Variety, Coxes Orange Pippins, cost twice as much to produce, but the difference in flavour was like the difference between commercial and wild strawberries.

I was reminded of this a month ago when I had the opportunity to taste a New Zealand apple (it cost a dollar) which made a Mackintosh apple taste like Pine Falls Paper Company pulp.

The old writer was right to mourn the loss of a better tasting apple. Not everything that has hap-

pened in the last 100 years has been progress.

I was reminded of this again this week. At Little Black River, Don Burnstick was describing how the culture of young people has changed in the last fifty years, and it has certainly not been progress. Young people continue to ridicule their elders, as I did fifty years ago, but their culture cannot be said to be an improvement.

Anishinabe elders can mourn the loss of a culture, so can the rest of us, those old enough to remember anyway. Don Burnstick deserves credit for finding a way to bring the contradictions to the attention of a new generation of youngsters. Maybe enough of them will listen.

Praznik Responds to Phil Cyr's  
Erosion Letter

Dear Editor,  
I am writing to you in regards to your article Cruising on the Winnipeg River concerning the issue of bank erosion on the Winnipeg River between McArthur Falls and Pine Falls.

It is important to note bank erosion streams is a natural phenomenon which is dependent upon soil conditions as well as water flow conditions. It happens on regulated streams and on unregulated streams. As bank erosion is an act of nature, Manitoba Hydro cannot prevent this phenomenon from occurring. Where Hydro water regulation has affected natural process, Manitoba Hydro has played a role in mitigating adverse effects.

In doing so, Manitoba Hydro does have a program to protect eroding banks along the

Winnipeg River system. Work is done on a priority basis, with the first priority given to areas where private land is at risk. The program of monitoring the erosion and rehabilitation of the Winnipeg River banks has been ongoing for a number of years and, to date, approximately \$7.5 million has been spent on this work. Manitoba Hydro has a further long term plan in place to spend approx. \$8 million over the next 10 years to address concerns as they impact this river system. The program is not restricted to any one area, but covers points from Pinawa to downstream of the dam at Powerview.

As M.L.A. for the Lac du Bonnet constituency and as former Minister responsible for Manitoba Hydro, I have used this program and continue to use it to have various riverbanks

stabilized along the Winnipeg River. Regrettably, all work cannot be done at one time but over a period of years I expect we will be able to accomplish a significant amount of work.

As a further matter of note, it was Jim Downey, my predecessor as Hydro Minister, John McCallum, Chair of the Board of Directors; and Bob Brennan, the CEO, who changed the Hydro policy of buying more land where erosion was taking place to a policy of stopping the erosion where practicable. This change occurred after a boat tour of the Winnipeg River which the RM of Alexander and myself arranged for those individuals several years ago.

I trust the foregoing addresses your concern.

The Manitoba youth Job Centre has been very busy this last week. Hire a student week for Lac du Bonnet (June 29th to July 5th) was a tremendous success. The purpose of this week was to promote the hiring of students/youth, one of our greatest resources. There were several organized events for the Odd Job Squad (students age 12 to 16) to participate in. These included a donut drive, car wash, student labour raffle, two hot/dog sales and faccapping.

These activities helped to provide casual work during the week for younger students who generally have a hard time in securing regular employment positions. All proceeds from the events were divided between those students who participated and helped to make the week a success. The community also responded by placing various casual job orders with the centre in order to help provide between those students who participated and helped to make the week a success. The MYJC operates as a community job referral and placement service designed to assist rural youth in securing summer employment. The centre gives students (age 12 plus) and youth (under 24) the opportunity to gain work

experience, learn job search techniques, earn a salary, fulfil the employment needs of the community, while demonstrating to employers the value of hiring youth. The MYJC actively campaigns to encourage local employers to hire young people by providing a free matching and referral service, raising awareness of the skills and employment potential of youth, and providing information on employment and community assistance programs.

The Lac du Bonnet MYJC office, which is responsible for providing services to 37 towns/communities/parks has so far succeeded in placing 58 students/youth to employment positions (casual/full and part-time). The centre currently has 79 registered students on file and has had 61 job orders from various employers. The centre is still looking for more students to register, especially from Powerview and Pine Falls. If any students would like to register with my office, please call Dave at 345-6916. Any employers (homeworkers/businesses) who would like to help in finding a student/youth to fill a vacant job position can also call the centre. Now that the warm weather is here, I expect the phone to be ringing off the hook with casual job orders (grass cutting, raking, weeding, etc.) Please feel free to call me or drop by my office located in the Lac du Bonnet Senior School.

### New Minister for Church of the Advent

The Reverend Brian Rountree became the new minister at the Church of the Advent in Pine Falls at the beginning of July.

Rountree was born in England, in Wallsend, near Newcastle, and baptised into the Church of England.

He came to Canada in 1955, at the age of seven, grew up in Windsor Ontario, and graduated from high school there. He studied at the University of Windsor, and Windsor teacher's college.

He began teaching in Ontario in 1967, and after ten years (eight of them as a teacher) he moved to Thompson Manitoba in 1977, to teach grade three students. In 1987, he spent a year in Tasmania, Australia, teaching grade four students in the town of Launceston, under a teacher exchange program.

In 1989 he moved back to Thompson to work as a teacher librarian and continued until June of this year.

While in Thompson Rountree studied for the priesthood. He was licensed as a lay reader in 1971, when he gave his first sermon. He was ordained a deacon in 1996, and as a priest in March this year.

In Thompson he was involved in the Anglican mission at Pikwitonei, in the

Thompson Christian Council and the hospital palliative care committee.

Springfield, which includes Pine Falls and Lac du Bonnet, is Rountree's first parish as a priest. He sees his role as a support for what people are already doing in the parish, and would like to see more young people in the church, and will put an emphasis on Sunday School.

He said he would also like to see the parish more involved in the diocese of Keewatin, and in the wider church. He hopes to

continue to be involved in palliative care.

Rountree is secretary treasurer of the Canadian School Library Association, and a member of the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star.

He is married to Iris (nee Gold) from Pine Falls and has been a frequent visitor to the community. He has two children, Marina, who is taking a double major at the University of Winnipeg in Physical Education and Conflict Resolution, and a son, Ian, who will be entering grade eleven in Powerview in the Fall.

With all these great new ideas and programs, please feel free to share the Library with your family and friends..



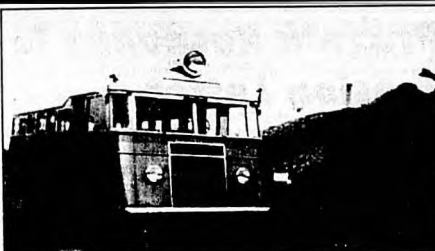

### Summer Exercise- Use Common Sense

You may not be going for the gold, but you can still try for higher, faster and stronger with hot tips from the Canadian Physiotherapy Association (CPA) on the top ten summer sport activities.

The first thing to realize, according to Canada's Olympic-veteran sports physiotherapists, is that "no pain... no gain"--the prevailing mantra of today's fitness buffs-- is a myth. A better motto, they say, is "train, don't strain."

"You should listen to your body and slow down when you feel uncomfortable," says Calgary physiotherapist Jackie St. George-Rennie, former member of the Canadian Olympic medical team. "It's fine to push yourself a bit, but you should err on the side of caution, especially when you're beginning."

Summer is terrific for outdoor sports and fitness, but we should choose activities carefully and combine them for an optimum all-around body workout. The fun factor is also important. After all, the idea is to get outside and have a good time doing something you enjoy.

"As experts in movement and mobility, physiotherapists can offer the best advice to look at when you're considering the benefits of any sport, add Bill Wilcox, a Toronto physiotherapist who has also worked with Canadian Olympians and is chair of CPA's Sports Physiotherapy Canada.

You want to look at any sport to determine whether it helps build body strength, improves flexibility, promotes coordination and balance and works the heart and lungs. Sports that offer all, or most of these benefits, rank highest. Combinations of activities that offer improvements in all of these areas are even better because you are working all of your muscle groups.

Based on this checklist, the top ten summer sports are:

swimming, soccer, roller-blading, cycling, tennis, yoga or Tai Chi, hiking, walking and golf.

For the recommended all-around body workout, canoeing, which improves upper body strength, teams up well with cycling for the legs, thighs and bottom.

Golf can be on par with other recommended activities if you walk the course. Be cautious of the repetitive swinging action, particularly if you're hitting a basket of balls, because it can cause back and shoulder strain.

Once you've decided whether to take the plunge or try out for the team, the first rule is to train for the sport so you'll feel good, enjoy it more and will likely stay at it. Taking lessons in any sport is valuable to learn the safe and proper techniques.

Like it or not, you have to take your age into account whether you're in-line cruising or working on your backhand.

"Sport which promote flexibility are good for the mature athlete," Wilcox advises. "Aging

results in reduction in joint and muscle elasticity and it becomes more important to work on proper warm-ups and frequent stretching exercises."

Here are more tips for outdoor summer work-outs:

- Bring along an ample supply of water or electrolyte-rich sport drinks to avoid dehydration which can cause muscle cramps and injury. The body needs and extra litre of water during every hour of outdoor physical activity.

- Use sunscreens and wear loose, protective clothing to avoid harmful UV rays and wear proper safety equipment such as helmets, knee and elbow pads and good footwear.

- Cool down in the shade with relaxing stretching exercises to reduce muscle stiffness.

Pine Falls Physiotherapist, Jenny Baturin, also wants to remind everyone to use their common sense in starting any new exercise--especially during this weather. If you feel dizzy or light headed, sit down and have a cold drink.

Fastball fans are encouraged to come out and support their teams. Thier will be an autograph signing session after the game at the Rusty Nail.

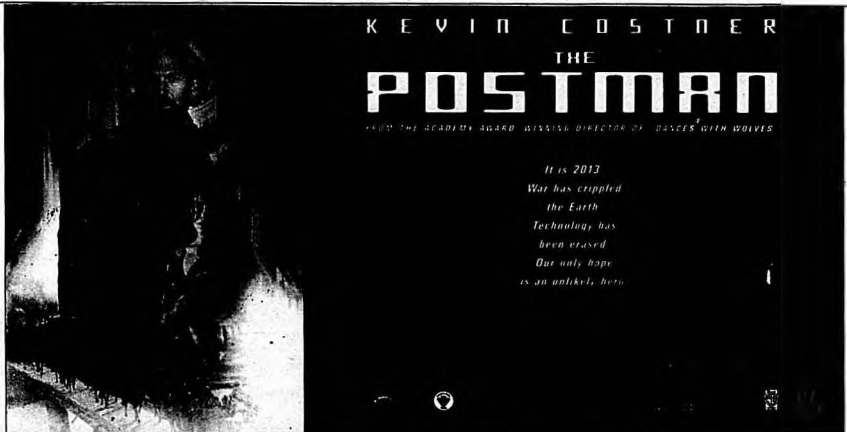

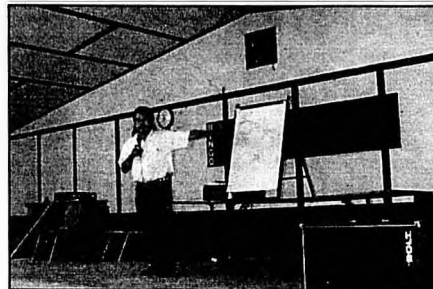

Burnstick describing the effect of pop music on teenagers

"In the 90's music changed again." He said, and went on to talk about the impact of all of this on television. "In the 50's, he said, violence on TV was someone getting shot and falling down. Now, your heads exploding and blood and guts all over. In the 50's sex on TV was a kiss."

Burnstick went on to describe how every generation rebelled against, and ridiculed the previous generation. He promised his audience that their children would do the same to them.

Then he went on to get to the real message. "Every generation did things to be cool." He said. "What cool represents to young people is acceptance." He said what young people do to be cool involves Sex, Alcohol and Drugs. SAD, the acronym for his workshop.

He began with marijuana. With the aid of the clip board, he described the fifteen minute high, followed by a much longer "down, or "burnout". "Your eyes get red, your mouth gets dry, your shoulders droop. Your spirit and energy are down. The THC has moved from your head to your body. If you light up another one you're not going to get high, your burnout will just last longer. He said.

"After about two months of regular use, you might get a five minute high, but your burnout will last ten hours, and after a year, you won't get a high at all. You are basically addicted to THC, and it's very hard to recover from this. You can't stay focused, and you forget. With solvents it's worse." He said.

"I can answer that, I am alcohol" Speaking to the audience he said I am a spirit, you know what a spirit is." The image was dramatically reinforced by his larger than life shadow thrown on the white backdrop by the floodlight.

"I want you, I will kill your pain, your shyness", were his weapons. His allies were spirits of drugs, and AIDS

Alcohol's only effective enemies were the Spirit of the creator, and the spirit of "my people".

It was a powerful drama, with a powerful message.

Later Burnstick performed a comedy routine, "You might be a Redskin" in which he effectively ridiculed the effects of drunkenness.

In an interview with The Voice, Burnstick said he had been heavily involved in drugs as a teenager and alcohol until about thirteen years ago, when he spent two years at the National University of San Diego studying Holistic Urban Youth Development. He said he has a "Triple E" learning concept - Entertain, Experience and Educate. He has worked all across North America, from Alaska to California.

Sixty percent of his work is with First Nation people, the balance in Caucasian and Black schools.

Burnstick is Cree, he is married, with two adopted children, and lives in Morinville Alberta, close to Edmonton.
