Million dollar Hole-in-one starts Wednesday

Northeastern golf tournament this weekend

There will be lots of activity at the Pine Falls Golf Club this weekend. The Million Dollar Hole-in-one competition begins Wednesday, August 5 - not Friday as announced in last week's Voice - and runs until Sunday. Saturday and Sunday golfers will compete in the sixty-ninth Annual Northeastern Golf Tournament.

All of them on number six hole. Mike Oman, Denis Cyr and the latest Doug Hanson who shot a hole in one last Friday, July 31. It was witnessed by Thelma Hanson. If any of these three or anyone at all can repeat the feat on Sunday they could be \$15,000 richer.

The Million Dollar Hole-in-one event is open from 11:00 am to 8:00 pm for each of the five days. Golfers pay a dollar per ball. Five dollars for six balls, or \$20 for 30 balls. Contestants tee off on the driving range at a pin 100 yards from the tee.

Northeastern longest running tournament

The Northeastern golf tournament began the year the Pine Falls Golf Club opened, in 1929, and has run continuously ever since. It is the longest running tournament in Manitoba.

The top ten closest to the hole each day are eligible for various prizes, and go on to the semi-finals, held on Sunday beginning at 4:30 pm. Each semi-finalist is given three shots at a distance of approximately 150 yards. If any of the semi-finalists make a hole in one on their first shot, they win \$15,000, on the second shot, \$10,000, and on their third, \$5,000. The five closest to the hole go to the Winnipeg Semi-finals for a chance at a million dollars. The golfer with the shot closest to the hole in Winnipeg, (if there is no hole in one winner), wins a trip to Whistler BC, to compete in the National Championship.

Club Pro, Dwight Reinhart, is expecting at least 300 golfers will be competing this year. Last year 329 teed off - a record. He said Ed "Thumper" Thompson, who has won the event four times, will be competing again this year after a lay off of a few years caused by back problems.

Net proceeds from the event will go to the Multiple Sclerosis Society.

It is sponsored by the Blue Water Chamber of Commerce, the Pine Falls Paper Company, and the Northwest Company.

There will be four shot gun starts, at 8:00 am and 2:00 pm on both days. Contestants will be divided into eight flights of about 25 golfers each.

A party in the club house is planned for Saturday evening. Putting and long drive competitions will be held on Sunday evening. Reinhart said there is still lots of room for entries.

Three people have already got a hole in one in Pine Falls this year.

This year, for the first time, breweries will be sponsoring the tournament, Labatts on Saturday, and Moosehead on Sunday. It will be covered live on radio, 94.3 FM all weekend.

Blue Water Aviation restores 1959 DHC-3 Otter

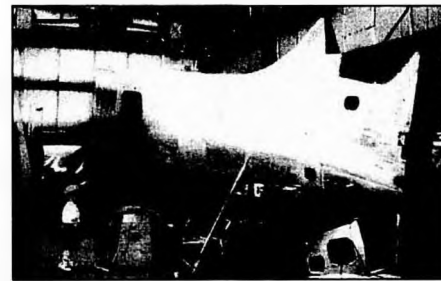
Blue Water Aviation introduced a new companion to the waters of the Winnipeg River Monday morning as they took their totally restored DHC-3 1000 horse PZL Otter for its first test run since competition early last week. The Otter was purchased by Blue Water Aviation Air two years ago, beginning full force restoration of the 1959 aircraft last summer. Previous owners had just recently purchased the craft themselves, saving the day from useless misery as they lay untouched on a deserted field in India.

Worldwide, only 466 Otters were ever built, all of which were put into service between 1951 & 1967. Known to date, there have been 213 since destroyed. The massive 9 passenger multi purpose utility aircraft is rare in not only the aspect that there are only 135 Otters registered in Canada, but also because it has a 1000 horse PZL conversion. That may not mean a whole lot to us here down on the ground, but given the information that a normal DHC-3 Otter is designed with a Pratt and Whitney 650 horse engine,

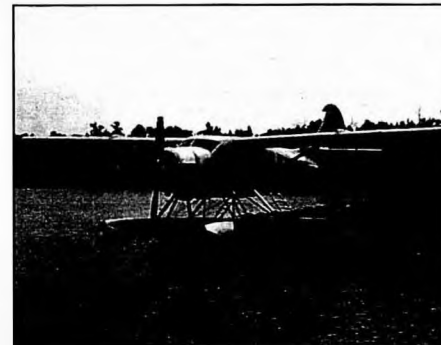
it gives us a little bit of an indication that this machine has a lot more power than making the ride a little more safe and reliable. There are only 14 or 15 Otter aircrafts with this engine conversion in the whole world.

Known as the "Work horse of the North", today the Otter is generally used as a bush plane, flying cargo and passengers in and out of the most remote destinations our country has to offer. According to most local Bush Operators/ Charters it is the favourite type of aircraft in the area. Blue Water Aviation itself, now with it's new family member just about ready to go, has 3 Otters running out of their base to service their business alone.

Amazing does not even justifiably describe the difference between the aircraft that was near death only a couple of years ago and the strength of it we see today. Thousands of Blue Water Aviation hours went into its mass restoration and after the engine approval of AirTech Canada, the incredible machine flew again. Lifting off the water with grace and stability, the DeHavilland DHC-3 Otter passed it's first flight test with flying colors.

MANITOBA ELECTORAL DIVISIONS BOUNDARIES COMMISSION

PUBLIC HEARINGS

In accordance with The Electoral Divisions Act, the 1998 Electoral Divisions Boundaries Commission will hear public representations regarding the boundaries and names of the preliminary proposed provincial electoral divisions. Once every ten years, the independent Commission is required to review and make recommendations for the province's 57 provincial electoral divisions with respect to both their boundaries and names. In completing this task, the Commission relies greatly on the comments and concerns of the public.

For the past several months, the Commission has reviewed numerous option maps for the North, Rural South and Winnipeg while taking into account population size, communities of interest, means of communication, physical features and existing boundaries such as rural municipalities. These option maps were prepared on the principle that discrepancies between the populations in the various electoral divisions should be minimized.

Approximately 800 maps displaying names, boundaries and populations (using the 1996 census) of the preliminary proposed electoral divisions will be sent across the province. Locations will include each rural municipality, local government district, city, town, and First Nations community. Maps will also be accessible via the Commission's Website or by calling the Commission Secretary at 945-7732 or 1-888-477-2427. All maps will be available free of charge.

Persons wishing to make representations are invited to do so either in person or in writing. Those intending to appear in person are asked to advise the Commission Secretary by Thursday, August 20, 1998. Energy sales are subject to lengthy interruption in the event supply is unavailable or market prices are high.

Manitoba Hydro is seeking confirmation of Interim Ex Parte Orders No. 2/98, No. 6/98, No. 8/98, No. 9/98, No. 12/98, No. 14/98, No. 82/98 and No. 83/98 which orders establish weekly spot market replacement energy rates together with any further interim ex parte orders establishing weekly spot market replacement energy rates issued by the Board subsequent to issuance of this notice and prior to commencement of the hearing.
