## Circus for the new millennium

The Starr Bros. Circus will be in Powerview next Saturday, September 25. It is being billed as a "sneak preview of the twenty-first century circus".

Following closely along the lines of Le Soliel out of Montreal, which uses no animals at all, the Starr Bros. uses no wild animals, but does have horses, ponies and dogs in the line up.

In a press release Starr Bros. said, "Today, with modern electronics dominating our lives, the public seldom experiences the traditional tented circus that brings animals, fearless aerial and acrobatic performers to audi-

ences. This, combined with the natural evolution of circuses will present a futuristic circus performance for the 21st Century.

- For the first time in a thousand years...all under one giant three ring circus tent".

The circus will be playing in the Powerview School grounds at 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm, Saturday, September 25. They will begin setting up at 9:30 that morning, having performed in Winnipeg Beach the night before. They will be playing in Pinawa Sunday, August 26.

Starr Bros. put in roughly 300 different locations every year. They

welcome anyone to turn up at the Powerview School and watch how they do it. Complimentary popcorn and soft drinks will be available.

Advance tickets for ten years old and under are free, adult tickets are \$10.00 youth (11 to 14 years old) and seniors, (65 and over) are \$8.00. At the gate adult tickets will be \$16.00, youth and seniors \$12.00, ten and under \$12.00.

## Katrina Rae inquest began Monday

An inquest into the death of Katrina Rae Guimond began Monday in the Mamou Lodge in Pine Falls. Katrina died in a fire in the basement of the Pine Falls United Church August 26, 1996. The fire broke out in a thrift shop, also in the church basement, which it shared with the Three Bears Day Care Centre. She was one of sixteen children in the care of the day care on the day of the fire.

The Fire Commissioners Office initially concluded that the fire had started in three different places and was deliberately set. Some time later, one of the child care workers present, Noreen Martin, was charged with arson.

At the preliminary trial, the Fire Commis-

sioner could not confirm that the fire had started in more than one place. Since no other evidence of arson was presented, charges against Martin were stayed. To determine what actually happened, and what actions can be taken to prevent similar tragedies happening in the future, an inquest has been called. It is now more than three years since the fire. The United Church has been rebuilt, but there has been no closure for the parents and family of Katrina.

Tuesday, September 14, two day care workers, Suzanne Gautier and Debra Houston, gave evidence. There were only minor differences in their testimony.

Both of them are non-smokers, and stated cont'd on pg. 7

**Throw the money changes out of the temple**

There have always been statistics gathered which can predict the cynical surpluses and shortages of nurses and doctors in this province and this country. Statistics Canada provides this information all the time. Other predictors surely have been evident in recent years that would lead one to assume that a shortage was looming. The extension of the R.N. nursing program and the campaign to eliminate L.P.N.s from acute care hospitals should have alerted the powers that be that there was trouble ahead but the slash and burn policies continued. I heard Jim McRea, who was a guest on a phone-in show tell an L.P.N. who called in to protest her layoff from St. Boniface Hospital, "Quite frankly, you L.P.N.s have priced yourselves right out of the market." This remark pointed out the Tory obsession with the bottom line rather than any common sense appraisal of any current or future conditions. Also, the only statistics the present government pays any attention to are the ones they intent to manipulate to suit themselves.

The government has also restricted the number of medical school enrollments and residency spaces so that there are less Manitoba doctors graduating and less foreign doctors able to access residency programs in order to qualify for practice in Manitoba.

One also has to look to free trade and the increasing influence of the corporate

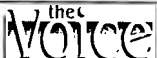
agenda on how hospitals are managed. A pervasive business philosophy has transformed health care delivery. Over the years there has been increasing emphasis on management and we have been flooded with people who have a two year mail order diploma in health care management and have been given inordinate decision making powers. Between 1981 and 1986 the total number of administrators in medicine and health grew by 67% (Statistics Canada, Nov. 1988) nurses and doctors have seen increasing restrictions on their practice as management sought to rationalize the system, intensify labor and increase control over workers. It is one thing to work within the constraints of your professional organization but quite another to be told when you have to discharge your patients, there's a lengthy waiting list for diagnostic test and the kicker was "its time to retire to make room for younger doctors".

Problems in health care cannot be cured by throwing money at them. We need dedicated men and women who are committed to preserving our health care system and have the education and talent to assess and plan a program of genuine reform. The philosophy must change from one of "products" to one of "people". It's time to throw the money changes out of the temple. They are raking in big bucks and blaming the cost on nurses and doctors.

**Q** - If the cops came to my house for something minor and I had some dope sitting out, could they arrest me even if that's not the reason they came to my place?  
- Anonymous, Powerview

**A** - This is interesting because this is one area of the law not yet obscenely twisted by lawyers and still possessing a little common sense. It is called the "plain view doctrine" and it means that if the police note something obviously illegal, without having to search for it, they can act on it. In this case you would in fact be arrested for possession of a Controlled Substance and a search warrant for the rest of your house would more than likely be obtained, now that there are reasonable and probable grounds to believe there are drugs in your house.

**Q** - If I know that there's illegal stuff going on but don't want anybody to know I'm a rat, what can I do? - Unsigned

**A** - First of all, the term "rat" insinuates you are part of this illegal activity to begin with. If you have nothing to do with the illegal activity, you are not a "rat" if you call the police, you are simply taking an active role in cleaning up your own community. It sounds like you definitely do not agree with what is going on and if you are absolutely sure you don't want the police to have your name, call Crimestoppers. They do not subscribe to call display and have no interest whatsoever in knowing who you are, it would undermine the program if they did. The important thing to remember when calling Crimestoppers is to give lots of detail about the offence. We can't call you back if we have ques-

KEEPING YOU INFORMED

#### Election Day Information

Election day is Tuesday, September 21, 1999.

If you are a qualified voter, you will be able to vote at your polling place between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

**You qualify to vote if you:**

- Are a Canadian citizen.
- Are 18 years of age or older on or before polling day.
- Have resided in Manitoba for 6 months immediately before polling day.

The location of your polling place is written on the enumeration record given to you when you were enumerated. If you don't have an enumeration record, contact your Returning Officer to find out where you vote.

**If your name is not on the Voters List** and you are eligible to vote, you can take an oath at your polling place. You will have to show a driver's licence or 2 other pieces of identification that together confirm your identity.

In most cases, regular polls are accessible to voters who are physically disabled. Contact your Returning Officer to confirm that your poll is accessible.

Templates are available at the poll for voters who are visually impaired. If you cannot mark the ballot for any physical reason or if you have difficulty reading the names of the candidates, you can request that an election official help you at the poll.

that although the entire church was a no smoking area they had occasionally smelled smoke in the day care. On the day of the fire, Houston said the children had been given lunch shortly after 11:00 am when two Child care workers left for lunch, leaving only three workers, Noreen Martin, Suzanne Gautier, and Debra Houston, in charge of the children who were then put to bed for an afternoon nap. Four of them, four and five year olds in one room, with Gautier, the other twelve, from one year to three years old with Martin and Houston. Martin was the only one of the three with any formal day care training.

When the children were asleep Martin went into the thrift shop, Houston assumed she went for a smoke.

Houston broke down when asked to describe events immediately before the fire, after a five minute recess, she said she had

heard what she assumed to be a coffee percolator in the next room. Martin, who was back in the room with the sleeping younger children by this time, also heard the noise and went to the corridor to investigate. She saw flames through the window of the door to the thrift shop and called the alarm. The other two checked and saw the flames. Both Gautier and Houston said there was a general air of panic. Gautier got her four and five year olds out first, followed by Houston with six of the others. She was followed by Martin. Neither Gautier nor Houston were clear on how many children Martin brought with her.

Houston broke down again when she was asked, based on previous testimony, how Katrina was covered when she slept. She said she was completely covered by a blanket because she slept better that way. She wept as she

told the court that she did not remove the blanket when the fire started.

Outside the church all of them recognised that Katrina was missing. Martin tried to get back into the church but was met by a wall of smoke when the door was opened. They screamed for help, but help was slow in coming. Houston said the Pine Falls Fire Department arrived very quickly - in five or ten minutes.

Both Houston and Gautier were asked about fire drills, which they said took place about once a month. There had always been five child care workers present during drills, and they had never had a drill when the children were sleeping. Houston said a drill was nothing like the real thing and all the fire drills in the world would not prepare you for a real fire.

Pine Falls Fire Chief Wily Kemball will be testifying at 10:30 Wednesday. Noreen Martin will be testifying on Friday.
