## Biggest Fall Migration in Recorded History

Look up! Look way up! Ducks Unlimited Canada is giving people a heads up about this year's fall flight of ducks estimated at a record-breaking 105 million birds.

"There will be more ducks in the sky this year than we've ever counted before," said Brian Gray, DU's director of conservation programs and chief biologist.

The record-high migration this fall will fill the skies. Ducks are already starting to arrive at Oak Hammock Marsh, Manitoba, the site of Ducks Unlimited's national office.

Since the 1950s, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service has been generating the population estimates based on sur-

veys in Canada and the United States. Last year, an estimated 84 million ducks flew south, slightly less than the previous record of 92 million in 1997.

"In the past few years, we've been cycling through some wet conditions especially in the Prairie Pothole Region of North America where the majority of ducks are produced," Gray said. This region spans the southern Prairies and reaches as far south as Iowa. "The great amounts of precipitation we received this spring and summer helped to create the ponds that nesting hens and ducklings need to survive."

On the West Coast, a cool wet spring decreased waterfowl pro-

duction slightly in British Columbia's interior. Habitat conditions across the province are generally good for both migrating and overwintering waterfowl.

In Ontario and southern Quebec, habitat conditions have been dry and water levels are low but waterfowl production has been good to fair. Major migration habitats are in good condition and will be able to support waterfowl travelling through. In Eastern Canada, a strong spring breeding population and good production should result in a good fall flight.

Migrating geese have already arrived at Oak Hammock Marsh in Manitoba - a sure sign

## High speed internet network proposed

### Download 1GB in 2 seconds

The Internet has become the fastest growing industry in the world. In the United States, the Internet is a \$300 billion dollar industry. In Canada, Bandwidth requirements are growing at 100% per year and Internet usage is increasing at 300% per year.

In Eastern Manitoba, as in much of rural Canada, the data transfer requirements are not being met. The cost of accessing high bandwidth is prohibitive. There are several major organizations with immediate needs for high bandwidth access.

Several proposed projects in the Eastman region become economically viable with a high-speed network. These include a Call Centre in Pinawa, an Internet based radio station in Pine Falls, a Research Centre at Whiteshell Labs, Video Conferencing for the Winnipeg River Brokenhead CFDC office, cable modem access in various locations for high speed home use and a Red River Community College satellite location.

Granite is proposing a partnership arrangement between Manitoba Hydro, North Eastman Health Authority, Whiteshell School District, Agassiz School Division, Granite Internet Services Inc., the Provincial Government and the Federal Government to build a high speed fibre optics network with technology that allows for expanding the capacity of current fibre optics data transfer rates, private network capacity using different wavelengths for different networks (a requirement for many of their proposed customers) and future expansion as technology develops the ability to split the fibre into ever-expanding wavelengths.

Manitoba Hydro is currently installing a fibre backbone in this region. NEON will extend this backbone to the towns of Pine Falls, St. Georges, Lac du Bonnet, Pinawa, Whitemouth, Beausejour and Oakbank and the *partners facilities* located in those towns. This will allow schools, health facilities and government offices access to the high-speed network. Granite Internet will offer high-speed cable modem access to home users from these locations.

**When Peanuts turn deadly**

Consider the lowly peanut butter sandwich. For some children, it's the staff of life. But for others, it can mean sudden death. These children are among the one or two percent of the population, with a life-threatening allergic response called anaphylaxis. Within seconds of exposure to a "classmate's" peanut butter sandwich will do the trick - an anaphylactic child will break out with itching, hives or swelling of the lips or face. Their throat may begin to close, choking off breathing. The symptoms progress rapidly, and death can occur in mere minutes. Pretty scary stuff. While peanuts are the most common culprit in this rare but deadly allergy, some people will react violently to other triggers such as nuts, sesame seeds, shellfish, or venom from bees or wasp stings.

**Treatment**

Currently the only treatment that can reverse the symptoms of an anaphylactic reaction is adrenaline (also called Epinephrine) in the form of a pre-loaded syringe. Anaphylactic children must carry some form of epinephrine with them at all times, the most common being an auto-injection device called an EpiPen.

**Prevention**

Avoidance is the first line of prevention, according to the Canadian Society of Allergy and Clinical Immunology. A growing number of school boards and day care boards are

developing policies to help protect anaphylactic children in their care. These policies can become controversial however, when they involve limiting what foods non-allergic child can bring to school or day care. For instance, in some settings an outright ban on peanuts, and all peanut products is in effect. Some schools or day cares send letters home to all parents, explaining that a child in the school/class has a life-threatening allergy to peanuts (or other allergen), and asking them not to send the offending product to school with their children.

## Drive carefully - very carefully - October 2.

Powerview RCMP detachment, along with every other police force in Canada, will be out in force Saturday, October 2 - for the whole day - all twenty-four hours of it, with spot checks, looking for impaired drivers, salty belt infractions, checking driver's licences, and registrations, and any instances of dangerous driving.

The program, with the code name "Operation Impact" is part of a continuing program to make Canada's highways the safest in the world. There is a long way to go, last year 3,000 people died in crashes on



Canada's Roads, and an additional 19,000 were critically injured. An RCMP press release says the trauma resulting from these tragedies is immeasurable, the impaired driver is the most serious threat to public safety, and seat belt use is the most significant method of preventing deaths and injuries.

"Operation Impact" is a 24 hour, coast to coast traffic safety program, working to educate and inform the public about high-risk accident causing behavior. "Operation Impact" also encourages police services and their communities to work together to stop high risk behavior.

that migration has started. The best time to look for migrating waterfowl is when windy, cold weather starts moving in. "Winds from the north tend to kick migration into high gear," Gray said.

In over 60 years, Du's wetland and upland programs have conserved more than 7.5 million hectares (almost 19 million acres) of land across Canada.

"This base of conserved habitat is critically important to wildlife. Its importance will grow as we move through the wet cycle we're experiencing right now in Western Canada into the dry cycle that will inevitably follow," Gray said. "No matter how great our duck populations may become in good years, we know that in many regions of the country our conservation efforts are exceeded by habitat loss. Our conserved habitats need to see waterfowl and other wildlife

through both the good years and those where conditions aren't as favorable."

Ducks Unlimited is a private, nonprofit, charitable organization dedicated to conserving wetlands and associated habitats for the benefit of North America's waterfowl, which in turn provide healthy environments for wildlife and people. ## Coping with arthritis

Beginning October 6, in the Pine Falls Hospital, the Arthritis Society will be sponsoring a six week course the self management of arthritis.

The Arthritis Self Management Program is designed to help arthritis sufferers better understand arthritis, teach ways to deal with chronic pain, and to take a more active role in arthritis care.

The course offers information on preventing tiredness, managing pain, exercising, healthy eating, taking arthritis medications, dealing with stress and depression, and working with health care professionals. The program will assist anyone with any of the more than 100 forms of arthritis, (osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, fibromyalgia, lupus and others).

The adrenaline that flooded my veins was beginning to relent as my car slowed into the back alley of the art gallery where Jess had worked. I loosened my grip on the wheel and wiped the sweat from my forehead. Hideout number two, I figured would have to be in Jess's warehouse.

The clock on the dash of my car read midnight. I sat in my car and looked around before getting out. All appeared to be clear. With my vehicle hidden in the shadows of the building, I walked

toward the cargo entrance. Nobody was in the streets at all downtown. The absence of activity allowed me to calm down and rationalise. In one hand I carried my duffel bag and in the other, Royce's booby-trapped satchel.

The corrugated metal door unlocked easily and I disarmed the alarm. Jess had me carry up new works through the cargo entrance so many times that the code was no secret to me.

The door to the stairway was open and I lugged my tired body up the two flights to the finely decorated art gallery warehouse. The computer lit up. I opened the disc drive and put the CD inside. I clicked on the icon for the E drive. That's when everything went black. The desk lamp went out and the computer was dead. I looked out the window above Jess's desk. There were no other cars in the parking lot. Mine was still there. I tossed the disc's jacket onto the couch and felt around for my duffel bag. I had to get out of there. This was no coincidence. There was no time to waste. I was helpless in the dark. I turned towards the cargo elevator door. The last thing I remember was the eerie buzz of electricity as the shock burnt my skin. Someone had found me.

## Blades off to quick start

The Southeast Blades have jumped out of the gate and are 3-0 after an impressive 6-2 victory over the St. James Canadians on September 22. The Blades thrived on speciality teams, scoring two shorthanded goals and the power play chipped in with a goal in leading the upstart Blades to their third consecutive victory. Matt Suchodolski was a standout for the Blades and Chris Fontaine also had a strong game with two goals. Blades captain Norm Fay continued his early season success with a goal and an assist upping his team leading point total to 10 after just 3 games. Goalender Bill Flett was solid between the pipes in winning his third straight start for Southeast.

Despite a sluggish start the Blades opened the scoring at 9:11
