Curtis Dancyt on the job at Riverview Self Serve Wednesday

New owners at Lazaruk's

Curtis Dancyt, from Lac du Bonnet took over the Riverview Self Serve from the Lazaruks Monday November 8.

Renovations are already under way. Dancyt will be putting in a 48 foot case for fresh and smoked meat, an eight foot full service deli counter, and will be adding a sixteen foot dairy case. He will also be adding a five door frozen food case and a twelve foot case for boxes of frozen meats. Additional shelf space will allow for a 50% increase in the range of groceries carried. Depending on how business develops he may be looking at expanding the store's floor space.

It is not the first time Dancyt has taken on a similar challenge. When he took over the family store in Lac du Bonnet 21 years ago it was a little smaller than Riverview. It is now a full service grocery store serving Lac du Bonnet and the surrounding area. The Dancyt store in Lac du Bonnet was started in 1946, by Curtis' grandfather Alec.

Dancyt will be commuting to Powerview from Lac du Bonnet. He will be helped in the Riverview store by his nephew Peter Clark. Clark worked for the Eaton's Foodateria for 14 years prior to joining the family firm.

A new sign will be going up this weekend. The store will be closed for renovations Saturday, November 20, and Monday November 22. A grand opening is scheduled for early in the new year.

Dancyt said he welcomes suggestions from customers on products they would like to see the store carry. He said pricing will be competitive, especially on everyday products like milk and bread. "I don't think anyone beats us in Lac du Bonnet on everyday products." He said. The main thrust of the business will be fresh meat and produce.

Community 2000 update

Pine Falls Advisory Council to be formed

Negotiations for the amalgamation of the communities of Pine Falls and Powerview have been going on for some time. Due to unforeseen delays the original target date of January 1, 2000 is not achievable. Discussions with Powerview will therefore continue into 2000. As an interim step, Pine Falls Paper Company and the Community 2000 committee have agreed to establish an elected Advisory Council to administer town services and funds for the year 2000.

Effective January 1, 2000 there will be a separate budget and accounting process established for the purposes of operating the town. All service charges collected, including that from the company, will be accounted for in a separate bank account and all expenses related to the normal operation of the town will be paid out of this account. A separate Town Office off the mill site will be established and a Townsite Clerk will be hired to perform necessary duties associated with administering town services. An advisory Council to consist of four community representatives and a chairperson will be elected using basic procedures set out in the municipal elections act. The Advisory Council will take over the administrative responsibilities effective February 1, 2000. Further information including the availability of nomination papers will be made available in The Voice and at a community meeting to be held on Thursday, November 25, 1999 at the Pine Falls School Gym at 6:30 pm.

In order to prepare for this new administration and amalgamation, a new service charge system (in lieu of taxes) will be implemented effective January 1, 2000. It will be based on:

I have a few comments and concerns listed below that I would appreciate your reading. At present the Powerview Arena is in great shape thanks to the tremendous effort put in by the Powerview Oldtimers hockey team. The entire ice surface has been completely rebuilt. Thank you fellows.

I can't say the same for the Pine Falls Arena. This has got me very concerned.

My main concern is our antiquated fluorescent lighting. It is bad because we can't get the adequate voltage lights anymore, so the arena is dark. This is the comment of visiting teams that use our arena. For example Sagkeeng has sixteen Halo-gens lights, we have 80 fluorescent lights and our arena is dark. Steve Gogo is looking round for estimates. This is my number one priority! I hope there might be a grant available, ha ha. I want to thank some people who have done great jobs at the arena through the years. Marcel & Giselle Guay and Mel Jaster.

More needed items:
 We have to hard top area north of ice

condition shed as Arnie has to dump snow outside now. Presently I have a piece of mill felt there.

We have to paint the complete inside of the arena. Install a fan in the ladies wash-room, wash the arena ceiling - optional if new lights are put in, repair boards at west end of arena. Last year myself and Tony Moss repaired boards at waiting room end, now we have to look at all boards, mostly at far end.

Comments, Questions and Queries

Well, we're still without snow and a lot of you out there probably think that's just dandy. Although the people waiting to pick up their Year 2000 Millennium snowmobiles are probably a little antsy about this lack of powder. Fear not, it will come soon enough. A couple of more questions wandered my way this week and here they are.

Q - If someone doesn't have a licence and they drive someone else's car even though they don't and they're drinking too, what can happen to them? Can the guy who owns the car be in trouble? - Worried

A - You've covered a lot of ground here, but I'll try to clarify things for you a little bit. First of all if a person is found driving without a licence they will be charged for that under the Highway Traffic Act. Second, if they are drinking they will most likely be charged with Impaired Driving and Driving Over .08 under the Criminal Code. As far as the owner of the vehicle goes, if he knows the person he lent his vehicle too is unlicensed, he can be charged under the Highway Traffic Act for permitting an unlicensed driver use his vehicle. Now for the really bad news, the vehicle will be towed and impounded until a sober driver can pick it up, until December 1st. As of the 1st of December 1999, all vehicles being operated while impaired will be towed and impounded for a mandatory 30 day period. Driving while impaired

is quickly becoming the most expensive drunk you'll ever be on.

Q - Last week a RCMP vehicle turned in front of my car without using a signal. Is it compulsory to use turn signals? If so, are the RCMP exempt? - L. MALO

A - The RCMP are bound to operate by the same rules of the road as the general public, unless they are responding to emergency or high priority calls. The reality of the situation you are describing is that the RCMP members who work at Powerview are just as human as you and sometimes will have minor slips, such as forgetting to indicate to signal. Technically, it is an offence to turn without signalling, but it is a minor offence in the big picture and I don't think I've seen tickets for it more than a half dozen times in the last four years. I realize that some people hold the RCMP to a higher standard than the general public and that is understandable considering our job, but nobody's perfect.

That's what piqued a couple of reader's curiosity this past week, now take a moment and let me know what you're curious about.

 Even though the weather has been unseasonably mild, I don't suggest anyone plan a trip to the beach. CST. Rhea GRAVEL, CST. Lisa BOTHE and yours truly jumped into the lake this past Sunday taking part in the Dockside Resort's 1st An-

It's a very good cause and the water was a balmy 36° F, or 1° C, perfect for a swim. \$1.2 million deficit at Agassiz School Division

During the 1998-99 fiscal year the Agassiz School Division spent \$1.2 million more than it had - and School Trustees did not know it was happening. They still don't know all the details. Former Board Chairman, Lynne Champagne said, "Every day we are finding more information about what happened."

The board began to use new, "Y2K compliant", accounting software in 1998. While the program was free of

the millennium bug it apparently had bugs of its own. For one thing, for some reason, the program did not allow for a manual record. School Board Secretary Treasurer Lynn Braiden was unable to provide the board with either manual or computer records on a monthly basis.

Some documents indicated that Braiden realized there was a growing deficit, but failed to bring this to the attention of the board. It was

not until Lynn Braiden resigned and a subsequent financial audit revealed the deficit, that the board became aware of the situation. (An audit is standard procedure on the resignation of a Secretary Treasurer.)

At public meeting in the Edward Schreyer School November about 60 angry taxpayers could not understand how the situation could get so far out of hand. They could not understand why the board would continue to authorize purchases without knowing how much money was available. One person present contrasted the approval process with a municipality, where all bills are approved by the council before cheques are issued. With the Agassiz School District approval for expenditures

follows looking at cancelled cheques. One example given was the purchase of Xerox equipment for \$98,000 without prior board approval.

The crowd was also upset that a "gag order" had been placed on the board by lawyers for Braiden and the school division so that full details could not yet be made available to the public. Trustee Erin Feilberg said they could only talk if taxpayers wanted to add extensive legal costs to the already massive deficit.

New Board Chairman, elected prior the public meeting said the board was reviewing policies suggested by the auditor to ensure that it does not happen again, and are trying to change the accounting system so that monthly reports can be obtained.

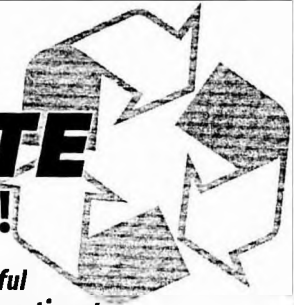
A person who drops, throws or deposits upon a highway any substance or thing likely to injure a person, animal, or vehicle shall immediately remove or cause it to be removed.

November and January are my least favourite months of the year. November is usually overcast and dismal, with very little sunshine and early evenings. January is usually a very long month after the long wait for Christmas, which at that time has come and gone, and the festivities of New Year are over.

This November, after the blustery way it came in, has been a delightful month, so far. The trees are bare, but if you look closer, the birches still have their tiny seed pods hanging from the branches. Hidden nests, where the summer birds have raised their little ones, are now in plain view. Some are so close to the

road, that if the nest hadn't been obscured by the abundant leaves, the little ones would have been visible to all. The weather has been warmer than previous years, and we've broken the old record.

Despite the winter weather, nature is on course with its plan for its creatures. The last of the robins have finally headed south. Yesterday I had the first of the nuthatches come looking for food. I have yet to put out the feeder since there is still a young bear foraging for food. He looks well fed and I gather has just been deserted by his mother after wintering with her last year. He is going around knocking over bird feeders, so we'll have to wait until he hibernates. The birds still have lots

of food out there for them since it has not yet snowed.

One of my neighbours feeds all manners of creatures. She puts out food for the usual birds and has several families of Pileate Woodpeckers, whom she has named. The Yellow evening grosbeak and the rose coloured pine grosbeak, chickadees and nuthatches dine along with squirrels on her excellent repast. There is a continual coming and going during the daylight hours. It is almost busier than O'Hare Airport in Chicago.

Some of the cottages and houses have their Christmas tree lights up. On Lakeside, there is a competition between the houses, although one is the clear winner, he has decorated four huge pines with colourful lights. Another house, an A-frame, is decorated with red and green lights, outlining the shape of the house. It goes well with the

brown colour of the house. Others have wound garlands, interspersed with lights, on the railings. More and more houses utilize the lights which are clear and look like icicles. This makes the area look lovely when I take my evening walk.

The last few evenings we have had the most lovely sunsets. Too bad it is happening at 4:30 p.m., but I'll gladly go out to see this spectacular view at any time. I stand and watch as the sun sets into the distance and the sky is turned first a bright gold and then it becomes blood red. While I am walking the colours fade to faint pink and then to the most delicate lavender. The moon right now is just a small crescent and is rising as the sun is setting.

There is a first star which appears in the east. I usually make a wish upon it. Maybe someday soon it will come true. (Then I won't have to spend Winter here, unless I want to!) The sky then changes to a beautiful dark blue, studded with stars.

Yesterday morning, I felt a few flakes of snow on my face. It will be here soon, but we can't wait. I know our neighbours with skidoos are anxious, and they will probably have their way before long. The Farmer's Almanac has predicted a fairly warm winter, with heavy snow falls. I guess we'll see.

Soon it will be time to start the Christmas baking and shopping. It's not too long now until the man in the red suit will be getting out his sleigh. Our Choral group has started practicing Christmas songs and 1250 Steinbach radio has started playing Christmas songs this morning. It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas.....

What is FAS/FAE?

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome/ Fetal Alcohol Effects are terms used to describe symptoms in children that result from exposure to alcohol during pregnancy and conception. Some of the symptoms include: growth retardation, neurological abnormality, developmental delays and, complicated physical problems. Children with this syndrome exhibit a wide variety of symptoms. They may have difficulty following instructions. Many have great difficulties understanding certain situations. FAS/FAE children often experience extreme difficulty in understanding the nuances in human behavior and expression. Feeding problems and hyperactivity are commonly associated with FAS/FAE. School is a challenge and these children often have learning problems.

Understanding the Problem
If you are worried that your child or a child you know is FAS/FAE your first step would be to get more information. It would be helpful if you can determine this child's prenatal alcohol history. A place to start might be talking to your family doctor or sharing your concerns with the public health nurse. If your child is already in school then talk it over with his/her teacher or principal. There are community resources available but we can always use more. If you are currently dealing with an FAS/FAE child, you might want to share your experience and wisdom with other members in our community.

Learn effective behavior management techniques (develop strategies to avoid crisis, teach and learn effective communication).

Try and have some fun together with your family. Every one needs to relax and enjoy life. Arrange some respite for yourself.

Try to work on choices and responsibility but start with small goals.

Coping

Does this child need a therapist or specialized programs? What help is needed at home by the parents or siblings? How can you help to plan the best future for this child. The first step in dealing with FAS/FAE is talking it over with someone! Some helpful hints for dealing with an FAS/FAE child at home:

Maintain consistent structure and supervision.
Try to work on choices and responsibility but start with small goals.

Learn effective behavior management techniques (develop strategies to avoid crisis, teach and learn effective communication).

Try and have some fun together with your family. Every one needs to relax and enjoy life. Arrange some respite for yourself.

Try to plan for the future. These children sometime need long term supervision. So some long term planning may be in order to maintain your peace of mind

Eleven Facts

1. Having FAS does not mean the child is mentally retarded.
2. The behavior problems associated with FAS/FAE are not the result of poor parenting or a bad environment.
3. These children will not outgrow "it". FAS/FAE is a life long struggle.
4. To admit a child is FAS/

FAE does not mean giving up on them it means that you are willing to try to deal with this child's disability.

5. Diagnosing a child as having FAS/FAE is not about "branding them for life."

6. When an FAS/FAE person misses appointments or acts in a way that we consider irresponsible or fails to understand our meaning it is **NOT** for lack of motivation or to be spiteful.

7. FAS/FAE is a concern for the whole community. We all need to educate ourselves and others.

8. This problem is not going to just go away. This problem cannot be solved with existing knowledge.

9. It is not for us to sit in judgment of a parent or caregiver of this child.

10. Our community will be a better place to live if we all take

some time to learn about Fetal Alcohol Syndrome and its effects.

11. Tell those you love not to drink during pregnancy or conception!

• Property values as determined by the assessments conducted in early 1999.

• 1999 Powerview mill rate for municipal taxes.

• 1999 Agassiz/Powerview mill rate for school taxes.

The process for appealing property assessments will be determined by the elected Advisory Council. In early December you will receive a Statement and Demand for Service Charges (similar to a municipal Statement and Demand for Taxes) which will outline the above. 2000 service charges can be paid using the same method currently available; either by payroll deduction or by monthly payment.

A community meeting will be held on Thursday, November 25, 1999 at the Pine Falls School Gym at 6:30 pm. to provide further information regarding these plans. Pine Falls Paper Company, the Community 2000 Committee and the Pine Falls School Board will be in attendance. The format of the meeting will be a presentation and question/answer period.

Pine Falls School may form separate public school district

In the spring the school District of Pine Falls embarked upon a process to explore all the options available to ensure a viable future for Pine Falls School, and the quality education of its children. These options are to amalgamate with a neighbouring school division (Frontier, Lord Selkirk, Agassiz) or stand alone as an independent school.

Prior to entering into negotiations the Board held preliminary discussions with all neighbouring divisions. During these preliminary discussions each division was notified

of Pine Falls intentions to seek amalgamation, as well as the desired goals, as put forth by Pine Falls. These goals are as follows:

1. To maintain a school facility within the town of Pine Falls.
2. To maintain or improve the quality of education which presently exists at Pine Falls School.
3. Governance representation from Pine Falls.
4. Security for our staff.

Since May of this year, a joint board steering committee formed with Agassiz School Division No. 13 has held 15 meetings. The following areas were discussed at length: i) program options, b) facilities, c) finance and taxation, d) board representation. No final recommendations were agreed on at this time while the Agassiz School Board dealt with other pressing issues. (See page 4)

The School District of Pine Falls will now proceed into discussions with Frontier School Division No. 48. The first exploratory meeting was held November 7, in Winnipeg.

At the same time the Pine Falls School Board has been working with the Company and the Department of Education to review the implications of moving from a private, company sponsored school to a public school district. Whether the School District of Pine Falls amalgamates with another school division or changes its status to a stand alone public school district, funding sources will change. The Board is confident that as a result of the review process, the local education mill rate levied to Pine Falls property owners will be in close proximity to the present mill rates of neighbouring school divisions and to the provincial average.

An information profile of the Pine Falls School District is available on request at the district office.

Term Position for Townsite Clerk/Administrator Pine Falls, Manitoba

The Townsite of Pine Falls is currently in the process of re-organization.

Due to unforeseen delays, the re-organization process has been delayed and in the interim Pine Falls Paper Company is transferring the authority of administering and servicing the community to an elected Advisory Council to be in effect February 1, 2000. Initially the position will take over the townsite administrative duties from PFFC, however the position of Townsite Clerk/Administrator will then report directly to the Pine Falls Advisory Council and will be responsible for, but not limited to, the following:

- Setting up office systems and files • Bookkeeping accounts receivable, payables, billing, reconciling, bank deposits • Attending meetings taking minutes, record resolutions • Handling inquiries • Preparing service charges and utility billings, collecting same • Carry out directives of the Advisory Council including conducting business as may be required for townsite operation and maintenance
- Research and apply for provincial or federal funding, may be available for townsite operations • Office management: reception, records, correspondence, etc.

- Ability to work with municipal and provincial guidelines and legislation as they may apply to townsite planning and operations
- Must work well with people - excellent written and oral communication skill
- Must project a positive public image of the community
