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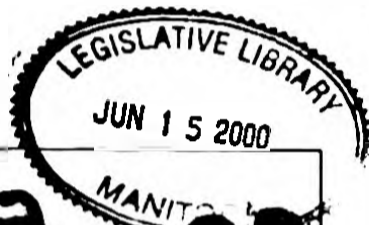

## LdB Landfill site to close

The operating licence for the R. M. of Lac du Bonnet's 313 Disposal Site will not be renewed when it expires at the end of June, however the provincial government's Department of Conservation has given the RM verbal assurances that the licence can be extended, on a month-to-month basis, while the RM makes alternative arrangements.

The municipality has a short-term and a long-term solution. For the short term, garbage will be taken to the St. Clements landfill site on highway 59 close to highway 317. Construction of a transfer station at the intersection of Highways 313 and 520, (across the road from the existing disposal site), is underway. When the transfer station is completed RM residents will dump their garbage in large bins which will be taken to the St. Clements site in special trucks. The municipality is hoping to complete the transfer station by the end of July.

The transfer station will be part of the long-term solution. Residents will continue to leave their garbage in bins at the station, and special trucks will continue to remove the bins, but

the destination will be a recycle plant and generating station, north of Selkirk

At the plant any recyclable material will be removed by hand. What is left will move on to a thermal gasifier where combustible gasses are produced. These gasses will provide the fuel for a 3,500 HP internal combustion engine driving a 2.5 MW generator. The electricity produced will be sold to Manitoba Hydro.

The cost of this "Mixed Solid Waste Processing Facility" is expected to be in the range of ten to fifteen million dollars. Eleven municipalities are cooperating on the project.

Several years ago the provincial government announced the introduction of more stringent landfill licencing requirements. Some land-

fills would have to close.

In response, municipalities in eastern Manitoba, from West St Paul near Winnipeg, to the RM of Alexander, met on March 1, 1996, to discuss the possibility of producing energy from solid waste. The Outcome was a cooperative, initially with 29 members, the Eastern Interlake Regional Recycling Cooperative Ltd. Several municipalities have since withdrawn, the most recent being the RM of Alexander. Reeve Harbottle said the RM was supportive of the concept but could not see an energy-from-waste facility being completed in time to meet the provincial government's deadline of December 31, 1999. By the end of June, or early July Harbottle expects to receive

final approval of revised operational procedures, and Class II licences, for its three landfill sites.

Spokesman for the Coop. East St. Paul Reeve Phil Rebeck, said the cost of the recycle facility would be about \$12 million. He said the Coop would probably be calling for tenders, hopefully within three or four months. The Coop has received a "draft" environmental licence for the facility at the proposed site north of Selkirk on Highway 4, but Rebeck said the Coop still has a few things to iron out with Manitoba Conservation. The only waste products from the facility will be the exhaust from the engine driving the generator and an inert ash that can be safely landfilled.

# Brokenhead short-listed for casino

A proposal for a destination casino from the Brokenhead First Nation on Highway 59 near Libeau is one of five recommended by the First Nations Casino Project Selection Committee. The committee was set up by the provincial government and the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs. It is the result of a commitment by the New Democratic Party during the last provincial election. The other four proposals recommended by the committee are from Thompson, Flin Flon, Headingly, and Sifton in Southwest Manitoba. (This Casino may be located in Brandon.)

The committee's report says that a recommendation by the committee does not mean the project will become a reality, but

that it contains a sound business plan and will meet the objectives of the government's casino policy. The major objective is that the casino provides sustainable economic benefits and opportunities to the First Nations People of Manitoba.

A "destination" casino is a tourist destination as opposed to VLTs in the neighbourhood bar.

Critics have pointed out that Flin Flon and Thompson are unlikely to be destination casinos in that they are unlikely to attract gamblers from outside the immediate area, and will merely recycle income in the region.

In the provincial legislature Wednesday afternoon, (June 7) the conservative opposition attacked the government for not

putting in place a plan to protect first nations from exorbitant management contracts. Lac du Bonnet MLA Darren Praznik said concerns have been raised that casino profits may be consumed by excessive management fees. He said he had heard that some management contracts will take up to 30% of profits. "Every aboriginal person who is supposed to benefit from this money should be concerned." He said.

All five of the proposals list out of province management organizations.

Praznik said the casinos could be managed by the Manitoba Lotteries Corporation and warned that private management of casinos may be in violation of the criminal code.

### Comments, Questions and Queries

No new questions this week, in fact I didn't receive anything, zip, zilch, nada, zero, the big goose egg. Can anyone tell I'm trying to fill space here? Actually I'm not without a topic as the Canada / Manitoba Business Service Centre got back to me on last week's question. That question referred to businesses and whether or not they were mandated by law to have handicapped access. The response is that it is protected by the Human Rights Code, as failing to have such access is considered discrimination. There are exceptions, for instance if making a building accessible would bear undue hardship on the owner. This is the case where the cost of making a building accessible is excessive or the age of the building does not make it practical. This can easily happen because once you have an access ramp, then you must make the rest of the building compliant to the building codes that pertain to handicap access. All doors must be larger, bathrooms must be modified, emergency exits modified and automatic doors installed etc. The long and short of it here is that while handicap access is mandatory for government offices, private business is strongly encouraged to have access and not necessarily forced to. If you have a complaint about a specific business not having handicap access, you can direct it to the Manitoba Human Rights Com-

mission, 175 Hargrave, 7th Floor, Winnipeg, MB, R3C 3R8, Ph# 1-888-884-8681. Once they receive your complaint they will investigate and address it on your behalf.

That's all I have this week, start sending your questions in or I may be forced to go to a bi-weekly publication, as I can only ramble aimlessly so long.

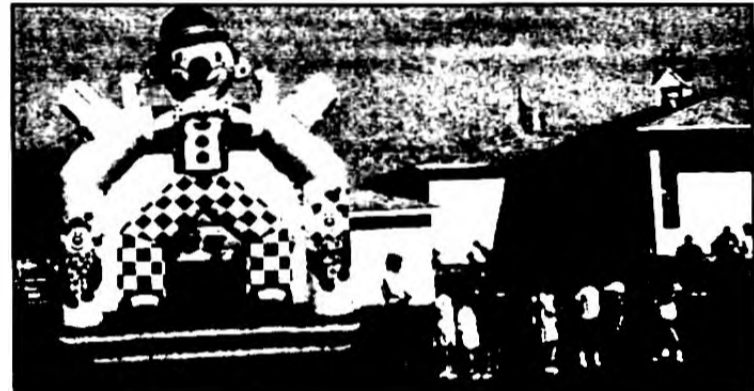

## Notice of Public Hearing and Pre-Hearing Conference

### Applicant: The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation

**APPLICANT:** The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the Corporation) has applied to The Public Utilities Board (the Board) for approval of the Corporation's 2001 rate bases and premiums for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance. The application is being filed pursuant to the Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act and The Public Utilities Board Act.

#### RATE IMPACT:

The Corporation is requesting approval for basic Autopac rates effective March 1, 2001 incorporating the changes which are described below and which would have the following impact, for each major vehicle use category.

| Major Use         | Number of Vehicles | Increase/Decrease |
|-------------------|--------------------|-------------------|
| Private Passenger | 596,573            | -5.4%             |
| Commercial        | 33,603             | 1.8%              |
| Public            | 7,571              | -4.7%             |
| Motorcycles       | 6,815              | 9.2%              |
| Trailers          | 83,285             | -0.8%             |
| Off-Road          | 20,270             | -5.0%             |
| <b>OVERALL</b>    | <b>748,117</b>     | <b>-4.8%</b>      |

The overall impact of rate adjustments on the total vehicle population will be as follows:

- 508,087, or 67.9% of vehicles will receive a rate decrease. Most decreases will be less than \$50
- 202, or .03% of vehicles will receive no change in rate.
- 140,461, or 18.8% of vehicles will receive a rate increase of up to \$20.
- 62,873, or 8.4% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$20 and \$50.
- 29,429, or 3.9% of vehicles will receive an increase between \$50 and \$100; and,
- 7,065, or 1% of vehicles will receive an increase greater than \$100.

The actual change in an individual's premium will vary depending on the owner's claim experience, driving record, insurance use, territory and vehicle rate group. The cumulative effect of these variations on individual rates will all fall within the dollar amounts described above.

No changes are proposed to fleet rebates and surcharges, existing time payment fees or existing service and transaction fees.

#### PARTICULARS OF THE APPLICATION:

- The following rate adjustments are proposed for policies issued between March 1, 2001 and February 28, 2002.
- Experience-based rate increases and decreases to individual classes ranging between +15% and -15%, resulting in no overall change in vehicle premium revenue.
- Classification offset changes ranging between -1.6% and +28.2% to achieve revenue neutrality from the changes to vehicle rate groups.
- The Corporation is applying for a one-time 5% surplus dividend to reduce the amount that would otherwise be payable, according to the applied-for rates. The effect of the surplus dividend is included in the rate adjustments by class, which appear above.

#### New Insurance Use for Courier Cars

The Corporation has established a new insurance use for courier vehicles, Common Carrier Passenger Vehicles (Local) to bring the insurance use for these passenger vehicles into line with light trucks and is applying for rates that are 5% higher than the all purpose passenger vehicle use in all territories.

#### Seasonal Rating for Motorcycles

Premiums will be adjusted from an annual basis to a seasonal basis, appropriate to the actual use of most motorcycles.

#### Adoption of Motorcycle Vehicle Type Differentials

The Corporation has established different categories for motorcycles, based on type of motorcycle and is applying for rates per category as follows:

| Touring     | 90% of the average motorcycle rate  |
| Sport Bikes | 120% of the average motorcycle rate |
| Motorcycles | 70% of the average motorcycle rate  |
| All others* | 100% of the average motorcycle rate |

\*includes Custom, Dual Purpose and Others

#### Permits and Certificate Fees

The Corporation proposes that decreases to fees for permits and certificates be limited to the one-time surplus dividend.

#### Driver's License Premiums

Demerit point additional premiums (Charge 1) increase \$50 for each level, with the new levels ranging from \$200 to \$999, depending on the number of demerit points.

Accident surcharges (Charge 2) increase as follows:

- 1st at-fault accident increases to \$200, from \$150
- 2nd at-fault accident increases to \$400, from \$300
- 3rd at-fault accident increases to \$800, from \$600
- 4th and subsequent at-fault accident increases to \$1200, from \$900

#### CLASSIFICATION CHANGES, AS ESTABLISHED BY THE CORPORATION:

##### Changes to Vehicle Merit Rate Discounts

Vehicle owners who are 6 or more years claim free and have an at-fault accident will no longer lose the vehicle merit discount but will instead pay the first accident surcharge. The first accident surcharge will also continue to apply to non-owners.

Rates for services by The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation shall be reviewed by The Public Utilities Board under The Public Utilities Board Act and no change in rates for services shall be made and no new rates for services shall be introduced without the approval of The Public Utilities Board. Rates for services means in the case of The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation, rate bases and premiums charged for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance provided by that Corporation. Upon any application to it, the Board may make an Order granting the whole or part only of the application or may grant such further or other relief in addition to or in substitution for that applied for, as fully and in all respects as if the application had been for such partial, further or other relief.

#### HEARING:

The Board will hold a public hearing on the Corporation's application at the Public Utilities Board Hearing Room, 4<sup>th</sup> Floor, 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, MB, commencing at 9:00 a.m., October 2, 2000.

# Winners on tour at Fire Centre

Invitations were sent out to Grade 3 students in the Eastman area this past April, to participate in a coloring contest sponsored by the Eastern Region Fire Centre, Department of Conservation at Lac du Bonnet. Eight schools took part with a total of 140 entries. The contest's theme was *Smokey & Friends*. Resource officers visited schools to make presentations on fire prevention.

The three winners were: Lauren Andrews of Lac du Bonnet, Sheldon Palmquist of Powerview and Jared Taylor of Bissett.

The three Grade 3 students were invited to the Fire Centre Thursday, June 8 for a tour, and to accept their prizes.

Shar Pochinko started the tour by explaining that the Fire

Centre was responsible for coordinating the man power, equipment and aircraft that is sent into forested areas to fight fires in the eastern region, the east side of Lake Winnipeg from north of Berens River all the way down to the US border, a huge area.

An airplane called a Cessna 337 flies around the perimeter of the region when the fire levels are high. When a fire is spotted a call is made to the Fire Centre and crews are dispatched from Pine Falls, Bissett, Lac du Bonnet, Hadashville, Rene, Marchand and/or Piney, depending on the location of the fire. The Fire Centre is in constant radio contact with the aircraft and crews. They have 12 initial tac crews who are brought to the area, find the fires and are the first to start fighting the fires.

Pochinko then showed us the weather monitor, the lightning detection system and the radio room.

Colleen Liske, the backup radio operator and fire ranger on the fire tac, took us to the where supplies and equipment were stored, from fireproof coveralls and air mattresses to cook kits and hose. The three winners were able to chose a "boil a bag" meal to take home and try.

Roger LeBlanc was waiting at the dock to show us the Otter. He explain how water was picked up in the floats of the plane and released over the fire. All of the children on the tour were able to board the Otter and a couple even got to sit in the "drivers" seat.

The highlight of the tour was meeting members of the tac crew, and SMOKEY BEAR! Everyone got to shake hands and pose for pictures after the tac crew members explained the equipment in their initial attack load, and how it was used.

# 2000 Recreational Fishing League in Lac du Bonnet

Nine teams of youths, aged nine to 15 years, have been registered and are participating in a recreational fishing league, a pilot project developed by a steering committee comprised of Mid-Canada Marine Dealers Association, the Manitoba Wildlife Federation, Recreation Connection of Manitoba and Manitoba Conservation (Fisheries Branch). Teams of six to eight children from Lac du Bonnet, Dauphin, Neepawa, Peguis, Riverton, Selkirk, Shilo, Swan River and West St. Paul, along with their coaches, have been angling since May 22.

Lac du Bonnet team members are: coaches Pat Lennox and Peter McKenzie, Joey Champagne, Ian Smith, Anthony Worona, Tim Halbert,

Nick Voth, Joey Enright, Mitch Enright, Bradley Maxwell and Adam Gorrie (spare).

The season runs from May 22 to June 26. Teams may fish any amount of times per week but only one 2.5 hour session may be submitted to the league coordinator as their weekly entry towards league standings. Fish caught will be measured and listed by species and team member. Bonus points are awarded when all team members attend and fish; if all members catch at least one fish; if three or more species are caught during the same session; if three or more species are caught by any one team member; for any team that catches six or more different species; and for any Master Angler Award regis-

tered fish.

Peter McKenzie says the team has been out on the Winnipeg River, at Crescent Bay a couple of times, where they reeled in a sauger, a pike, a walleye and a salamander. This coming weekend they are scheduled to travel to Cats on the Red at Lockport for cat-fish and carp.

Team members will be developing skills such as fish identification, cleaning and preparation, care of equipment, knot tying, casting, etc.

The team with the highest

points at the end of the season will be declared Top Fishing Team of 2000.

Dave Forsythe at Lakeside Sports volunteered to put new line on the reels of all members; Bob Hampshire donated live bait; Woody's also donated live bait; and the Lac du Bonnet Wildlife Association has taken care of the \$20 per member registration fee. The Lac du Bonnet team would like to express their appreciation to the businesses and individuals who have helped make this experience possible.

### June is stroke awareness month

#### What is a stroke

Simply put, a stroke occurs when a blood clot travels to the brain, interrupting the supply of blood, and the oxygen it carries to the nerve cells in that area. As a result, cells may die, and the parts of the body they control stop functioning. A ruptured blood vessel supplying the blood to the brain, may also cause a stroke.

#### Who is Most Likely to have a Stroke?

A stroke can occur at any age, but is more common in older adults. The following factors may increase your risk of experiencing a stroke:

- High blood pressure
- Hardening of the arteries
- Heart disease
- Diabetes

#### • Smoking

Anyone with these conditions should see their doctor regularly, and follow their recommended treatment very carefully.

#### The 5 Main Warning Signs of a Stroke

- Sudden weakness, numbness & or tingling of the face, arm, or leg. These sensations may be brief.
  - Temporary loss of speech, or trouble understanding speech.
  - Sudden loss of vision, particularly in one eye, or double vision.
  - Sudden, severe, and unusual headaches.
  - Unsteadiness or sudden falls, especially with any of the above signs.
- If you experience any of

these problems, immediate medical attention is crucial. In fact, how quickly stroke symptoms are recognized and treated, may mean the difference between a speedy recovery, and a life-sentence in a wheelchair.

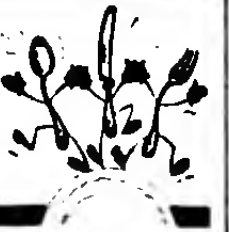
#### How to prevent a stroke

## Cupboard



### Rhubarb Cake - Donna Carriere

- 1 cup butter
- 3 cups sugar (white)
- 2 cups of buttermilk
- 4 cups of flour
- 2 eggs
- 2 tsps. vanilla
- 2. tsps. baking soda
- 4 cups rhubarb, diced

#### Sauced Topping:

- 1 cup sugar (brown)
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup cereal cream

Cream together butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla. Mix milk and baking soda, add flour evenly with milk mixture to butter mixture, fold in rhubarb, bake at 350°F oven for approximately one

hour.

To mix the topping boil ingredients together for three minutes, spread over cake and place under a broiler for a few minutes, enjoy.

### Strawberry-Rhubarb Jam

- 5 cups chopped rhubarb
- 3 1/2 cups sugar (white)
- 1 pkg. strawberry jello
- 2 cups crushed pineapple

Mix sugar with rhubarb and let stand four hours or longer, boil for ten minutes, mix in jello and pineapple and bring just to a rolling boil, remove from heat, let stand a few minutes and seal in sterilized jars.

# Ask your Pharmacist

#### A Medication Timetable

It's important to take your medicine, but sometimes that's easier said than done, especially for people who are on several medications, or for those who don't immediately feel a reaction when they forget to take their medication.

Here are some hints on how to make it easier to stay on track:

**Make it routine:** Link your medication schedule with something in your daily routine, such as brushing your teeth or having your morning coffee. Another obvious link is mealtimes, if your medica-

tion is compatible with or required to be taken with food.

**Write it down:** If you take more than one medication, ask your pharmacist to develop a schedule with the timetable for each medication, its description and what it's for. Leave the schedule someplace where you can't miss

it; maybe on the refrigerator at home, or the telephone at work.

**Use visual cues:** Sometimes it's easy to forget whether or not you actually took your medicine - some people find it useful to set out their entire daily requirement in the morning, and then they can see at a glance what has or hasn't been taken. Holders are also available from your pharmacist with separate compartments indicating the time each tablet or capsule is to be taken.

**Keep a record:** If your out and about all the time, you could take a diary or calendar with you to record your intake. Compartmentalized holders are also useful here.

It's important to gauge your reactions to medication, and report any changes or unusual effects to your physician or pharmacist. Be sure they are aware of all prescription or nonprescription medications you are taking, because these may interact with each other and cause harmful side effects.

If you are concerned or unsure about any aspect of your medication schedule, be sure to ask about it, your pharmacist will be glad to assist you. The more you understand about the drugs you take, the easier it will be to remember to take them.

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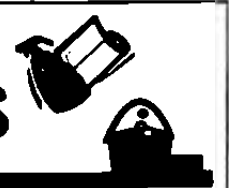

#### Laundry Helpers

A hamper full of hints to excite even the most experienced launderer. Washing away those laundry drab blues. Before cleaning/washing anything sort laundry into piles and wash separately, use very hot water for whites and cooler water for synthetics, silks, wools, and non-colourfast fabrics. Avoid overloading your washing machine. The clothes will wash a lot better if there is room for them to circulate. Remember to always dissolve powdered detergents in warm water before placing clothes in washing machine, to avoid soap scum. Remember to wash coloured sheets and towels separately for the first few washes to remove excess dye. Cleaning the uncleanables even the filthiest of clothes can be cleaned by adding 5-6 tbsps. of household ammonia to the wash water.

## The importance of our history

As I sit down to write this article, it is June 6, 2000, the 56th anniversary of the Allied invasion of Normandy in 1944, better known as D-Day. I wonder how many Canadians took note of the anniversary of this great event or how many even heard of it? On Sunday, May 28, Canada's Unknown Soldier was laid to rest at the National War Memorial in Ottawa after resting for 80 years in the Canadian War Cemetery at Vimy, France. The crowd in attendance was estimated at 15,000 people and thousands more lined the route to honour the Unknown Soldier and the hundreds of Veterans who marched in the procession. Many more Canadians watched this historical event on a live television broadcast.

Not many Canadians, mostly young people, are aware of Canada's role in the two World Wars nor of the sacrifices made - so the question is - why are they not aware of these highlights of Canadian history? Significant events such as the Canadian victory at Vimy Ridge in World War I, or the liberation of Holland by the Canadian Army in World War II, just to name two of the great achievements by Canada in our military history, are not emphasized by educators. Every year, on June 6, I make a point of asking my classes in the school where I happen to be substituting that day, if they know the importance of June 6, 1944 and I find that most, of the students have not even heard of it. I obtained the same result when I asked

questions about other significant events in Canada's history. For example, they didn't know about the courage of Manitoba's Andrew Mynarski or the valour of Tommy Prince.

The population of Canada is changing rapidly with a growing number of people of diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds and because of this, some are saying that our traditional Anglo-Franco history is becoming less important. What nonsense! This country was founded by the French and English 400 years ago and forms the basis of this dominion, and, with the longer history of the First Nations People is the main fabric of the Canadian historical tapestry. How can anyone question that fact? All Canadians would be proud of their past glories and more recent arrivals to Canada should learn of the brilliant past of the land that they have chosen to be their own country and take pride in it. We need only to compare our national pride with that of our American neighbours to the south. Think of the heroism of Andrew Mynarski who was awarded the Victoria Cross for trying to save the tail gunner during a bombing mission, but died because he stayed on the plane too long causing his parachute to catch fire. He jumped to his death, but ironically, the tail gunner, Pat Brophy, survived the crash and lived to tell of Mynarski's heroic act. The Americans would have made a move about his act of bravery and erected monuments across the land. On Yonge Street in Toronto, there is a plaque

which commemorates his brave deed, but of the hundreds of thousands of passers-by, how many even know who he is?

Who is to blame for the lack of interest in our history? Most of the blame should be directed at our provincial governments who control education and who do not stress the importance of history. They must take the initiative and foster the teaching of Canadian history in our schools. It should be a priority!

How many Canadians know of Dr. Norman Bethune, General George Kitching, the liberator of Holland or Tommy Prince, our aboriginal war hero, or Sir Arthur Currie, said to be Canada's greatest soldier? How many know that at the end of World War II, Canada had the third largest navy in the world? Canada's history has been sadly neglected for many years. It's our history and let's be proud of it. "Without a sense of history, no man can truly understand the problems of our time."

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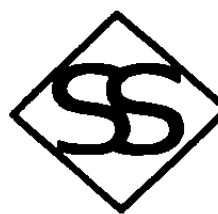
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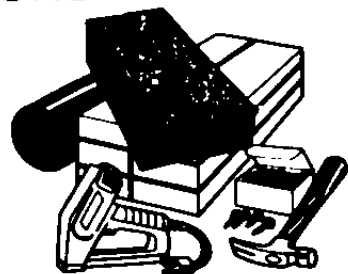

fore I entered the store I noticed the manager was there. I was too embarrassed to go inside because I had never paid her back and I wasn't carrying my wallet.

So, I decided that I would just stand outside the store and flag down the first person I saw and ask him or her to buy me a paper.

I needed a newspaper so I gave in and told him.

Suddenly he said "hold on", and in one fell swoop whisked me up into his arms and carried me into the store, right over to the counter where the manager was. I was laughing the whole way. With his free hand he reached into his pocket and pulled out a five dollar bill and said, "I'd like to pay for the nylons this person owes you and for a newspaper."

I later learned that the strong gentleman not only was the owner of that store, but soon was to become the owner of my heart.

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# Sun Safety (Part 2)

## Use Sunscreen Consistently

There are lots of good sunscreens available for kids, including formulations for sensitive skin, brands with fun scents like watermelon, long lasting waterproof and sweat-proof versions, and easy application varieties in spray bottles.

What matters most in a sunscreen is the degree of protection from the sun it provides. When faced with the overwhelming sea of sunscreens choices at drug stores, concentrate on the SPF (Sun Protection Factor) number on the label.

The SPF number tells you how much longer you can stay in the sun without burning if you apply sunscreen, which blocks the sun's rays. For example, if your child would burn after 20 minutes of sun exposure, applying a sunscreen with an SPF of 15 gives him 15 times the protection. The child would be protected for up to 5 hours:

20 min. x 15 SPF = 300 min. (5 hours)

For kids age 6 months and older, select an SPF of 15 or higher to prevent both sunburn and tanning. Choose a sunscreen that states on the label that it protects against UVA and UVB rays. To avoid possible skin allergy, avoid sunscreens with PABA and if your child has sensitive skin look for a product with the active ingredient titanium dioxide (a chemical free sunblock).

In order for sunscreen to do

its job, it must be applied correctly: Use sunscreen whenever your child will be in the sun. Apply sunscreen about 30 minutes before going outside so that a good layer of protection can form. Don't forget about lips, hands, ears, behind the neck and shoulders. Lift up bathing suit straps and apply sunscreen underneath them as well. Don't try to stretch out a bottle of sunscreen; as a guide, apply the sunscreen generously. Reapply sunscreen often about every 2 hours and after swimming.

Apply a waterproof sunscreen if your child will be around water or will go swimming. Water reflects and intensifies the sun's rays, so kids need protection that lasts. Waterproof sunscreen may last up to 80 minutes in the water, and some are also sweat and rub proof.

## Purchase Protective

## Eyewear for Kids

Sun damages eyes as well as skin. Even 1 day in powerful sun can result in a burned cornea (the outermost layer of the eye). Daily exposure can lead to cataracts (clouding of the lens which results in blindness). The best way to protect eyes is to wear sunglasses.

Purchase sunglasses with labels ensuring they provide 100% UV protection. Darkened plastic or glass lenses without UV filters do not provide protection. Not all children enjoy wearing sunglasses, especially the first few times. To encourage kids, let them select the style. And don't forget, if you wear sunglasses regularly, your kids will follow.

## What to Do if Your Child Gets a Sunburn

A sunburn can sneak up on your child, especially after a long day at the beach or park. Often kids seem fine then they develop an afterburn that can cause pain and can even make them feel sick.

Burned skin typically begins to peel after a week. Encourage your child not to scratch or peel off loose skin because underneath the sunburn is vulnerable to infection. The

following tips will help you keep your child comfortable if he has a sunburn. To help alleviate pain and heat have your child take a cool (not cold) bath, or gently apply cool wet compresses to the skin. You can also give your child a pain reliever such as Tylenol or ibuprofen and spray over-the-counter relievers. (Do not give your child aspirin) To rehydrate the skin apply a topical moisturizing cream. Don't use petroleum-based products because they prevent heat and sweat from escaping the skin. And if your child has a sunburn keep them in the shade until it's healed.

## Heat Related Illnesses

Heat related illnesses such as heat syncope (fainting), heat exhaustion, and heat

stroke are far more serious than a sunburn. These conditions occur when kids become overheated and dehydrated. Contact your doctor if your child has an unexplained fever higher than 102 degrees Fahrenheit or 38.9 degrees Celsius, the skin looks infected, or he/she has trouble looking at light. (This may indicate a sunburn of the eye's cornea) If your child has nausea, vomiting, fainting, delirium, or diarrhea, contact your doctor for immediate assistance.

With a few preventative measures we can protect our children from all the dangers of the sun, and still enjoy ourselves outdoors. Any questions or comments please call Crystal at 367-9641.

## Career Options?

Have you ever considered a career in the field of wildlife research? A career as being a fisheries or wildlife technician? Environmental technician? Or Conservation Officer?

If you have, I've got news for you. There is a community college in Manitoba that offers a course that is a stepping stone for any of these careers. Keewatin Community College at The Pas Campus offers a two-year diploma

program called Natural Resources Management Technology (NRMT).

The NRMT program offers training with a great deal of emphasis on forests, fish, water and wildlife. The technical training includes surveying, botany, zoology, navigation (yes, you will actually learn how to properly use a compass!), G.P.S. (global

positioning system), GIS (global information systems), natural resource law enforcement, technical report writing, and water resources.

Another major component of the NRMT program is field work. In the first year, you spend approximately 40% of your instructional time in the field. Some first year field work includes plenty of navigation exercises, water resources labs, surveying labs and botany field trips.

In second year, you get to enjoy 60% of your instruction time in the field. This time is made up of a three week fall field school, a one week winter camp, and many other excursions relating to other courses. At fall field school you conduct wildlife studies in the area, fisheries studies of the lake, and forestry exercises around the area. You also learn the basic skills required for cold weather survival. Winter camp, which is carried out in the middle of February, is a time where you learn the basics of human trapping, skinning animals, and receive your Manitoba's Trappers License. You also get experience in quinzhee building.

As a graduating second year student the knowledge and skills that are gained are extremely valuable. Some of life's lessons learned and the friendships gained are irreplaceable.

After completion of the NRMT program you receive a diploma and certification with the North American Wildlife Technology Association (NAWTA).

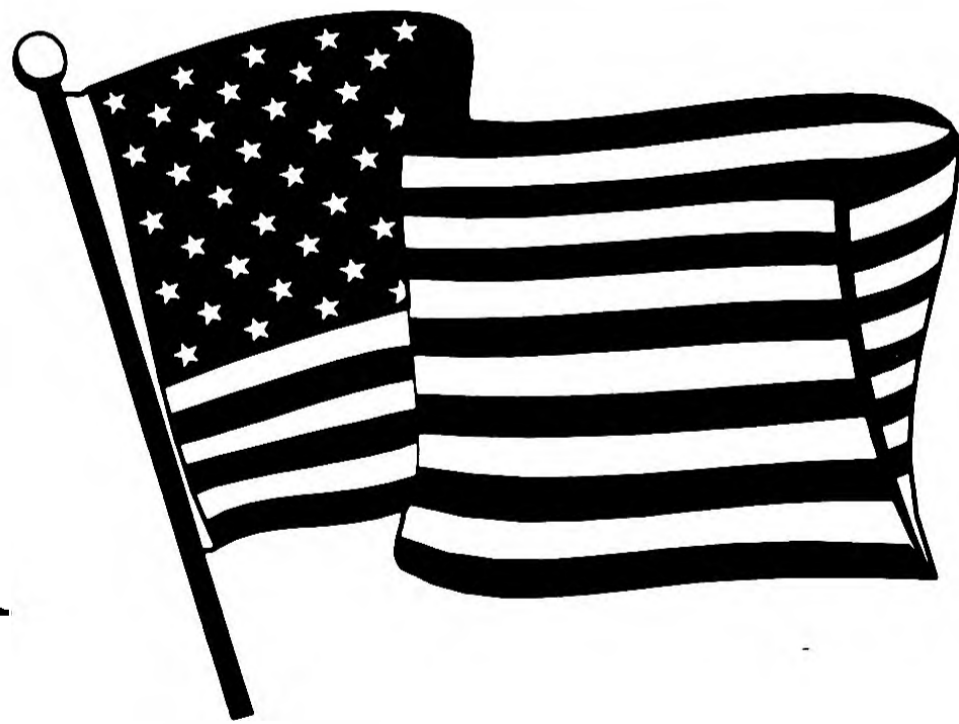

## Town of Pine Falls Scholarship

The Pine Falls Paper Company previously provided a \$500 scholarship for a graduating Pine Falls student. Council has decided to continue this educational opportunity. This year's deserving recipient will be recognized and awarded at graduation ceremonies on Saturday June 24<sup>th</sup>.

## Students and Education

The '99/2000 school year is quickly passing with only three short weeks before summer vacation. The next two weeks will be busy ones for students as they prepare for final exams, to be written on June 21-23. During the final week of school (June 26-30) students are expected to attend regular classes on Monday and Tuesday. Awards will be Wednesday, June 28<sup>th</sup> with closing ceremonies beginning at 9:30 A.M. Following the awards ceremonies students will be dismissed for summer.

Pine Falls school will be closing out the year with an enrollment of 108 students. In the new school year our twelve grade nine students will begin their Senior one-year of study at Powerview School. We are aware of ten new "School of Choice" students who will be attending Pine Falls School in the fall. While there is an expression of interest by many others, at the time of writing this has not yet been confirmed. Combined with the children from Pine Falls our enrollment for the 2000/2001 school year should again be in the 100-110 range based on commitments.

The future of our school continues to look bright as we begin our new life in partnership with the Pine Falls Community Council. Presently the School Board is continuing discussions with Lord Selkirk School Division #11 and are exploring a partnership arrangement for the new year where basically all services available from a larger division will be available to Pine Falls School.

In addition a joint effort between the community, Pine Falls school district, provincial adult education authorities and other government departments to address and acknowledge community needs in this area has been unfolding. When complemented by Empower, The Pine Falls School District feels that we have the resources, strengths and the best form of governance to deliver progressive adult training opportunities (academic, apprenticeship and trades). This will add to the education choices available to adult residents facing job displacement from the local paper mill and to prepare individuals for identified future areas of economic growth.

This is a very exciting time for our community as it opens many doors of opportunity to individuals within our area. These opportunities may be prove to be very beneficial for us and will have many positive implications:

It is the goal to have these programs running by the fall of this year thus ending the school year on an optimistic note.

Thanks to all Parents and Community Groups who have been so supportive of our school and its programs during the '99/2000 school year.

The new year will bring the usual challenges which together we will work through and overcome. Likewise it will also give birth to bold initiatives adding new venues for social interactivity, career related training and personal growth. We look forward to working with you in the new school year. Have a safe and happy summer, everyone!

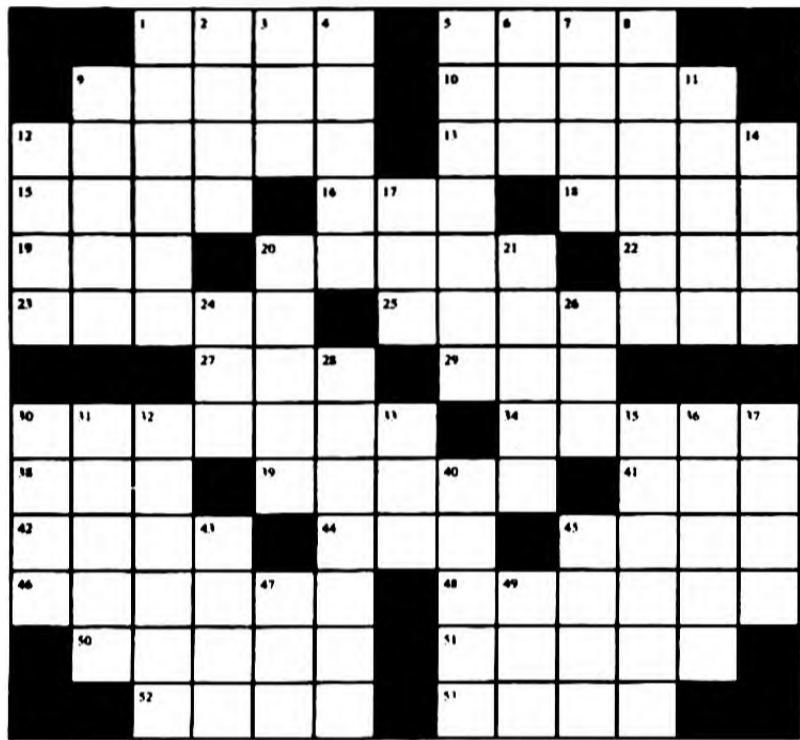

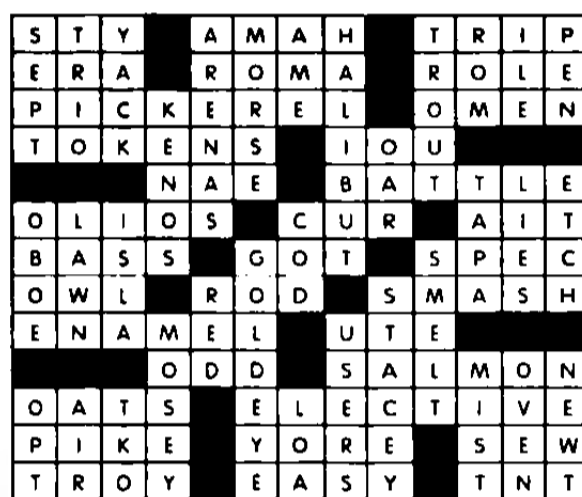

Please settle this argument. My wife and I went out for dinner the other night. The meal was excellent but the service left much to be desired. I left my usual tip, but swore we'd never return this restaurant. My wife does not agree with this. Who is right?

**Dear Disagree:**  
It may help if you remember where the word tip comes from. Innkeepers used to post signs that said "To Insure Promptness" with a collection box of some description beneath. Patrons who deposited money in these boxes received their drinks/food faster. In today's world, we tip someone who has performed a service for us. While tipping is a personal thing, here are a few general rules to follow when dining in a restaurant. Percentages may vary according to the type of restaurant you are in, but usually 15 - 20% is acceptable. The tip is calculated before any taxes or coupons/discounts have been considered. If possible, the tip should be left as cash when using a credit or bank card. Any exceptional service beyond normal duties should be rewarded. If the service is terrible, mention it to the server and then to the maitre d'/manager. If no attempt is made to improve the the situation, adjust your tip downwards from your usual percentage. If

your server is hostile and/or rude, you are justified in forgoing a tip. It has been suggested that leaving such a person a penny conveys your displeasure quite well. You may also wish to follow up the situation with the maitre d'/manager in writing, or in person to give the establishment a chance to redeem themselves in your eyes. It is unfair to punish a business without giving the people in charge a chance to rectify the situation first.

Tip the bartender 10 to 15% of the bill.

If you are receiving table service, 15 to 20% of the tab, before taxes, would be appropriate.

A 10% tip for the person who service your table would be appropriate.

If you eat at the counter, leave 10 to 15% of the bill as a tip. You may wish to be a little more generous if you just had coffee or something that was less than a \$2.00 .

As a rule of thumb, a minimum of \$1.00 would be considered appropriate for any food delivery person. Tip \$5.00 if a you have a very large order. If the weather is bad, add a dollar to the tip.

*Fine wine*

**Dear Fine wine:**  
If you request assistance from the wine steward or sommelier, tip the person 10 to 15% of the cost of the bottle of wine. This tip is given in addition to the normal tip you would give your server - 15 to 20% of the cost of the meal, including the wine, excluding the taxes.

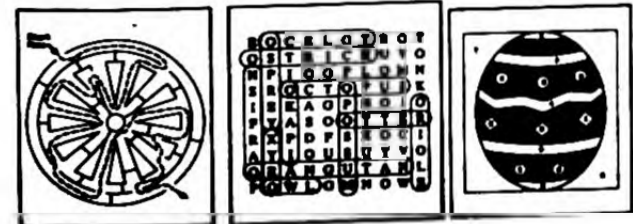

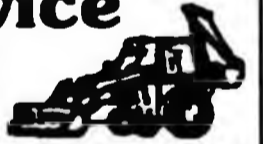
