Great day for fishing

The St. Georges Voyageurs hockey team, hosted their fourth annual ice fishing derby this past Sunday. Fishing enthusiasts couldn't have asked for a better day, the weather conditions were perfect and the fishing was great. Despite the perfect ice fishing conditions, there were only 212 entries at this year's derby. The tournament brought many fishermen/women from out of town from as far as, Kenora, Scantbury, Woodridge, and Gimli. The number of local participants was down this year, however the many who did come out and fish were treated to a beautiful day and some competitive fishing. This year's fishing action was swift and ongoing. All 212

competitor's dropped their fishing lines at precisely 12:00 noon. Not two minutes into the derby, the fish were being hauled out and fishing enthusiasts were running to the big tent for their weigh-ins. There were 70 fish caught and weigh-ins ranged from 12:12 lbs. to 2:30 lbs. to take the first 25 payout spots.

This year's lucky winner was John Sas who pulled in a 12:12 lbs. Jack to take first prize of \$1,600.00 and a new auger. Second place winner was Wayne Berezowski (8:18 lbs.) who won \$1,050.00. Conservatives nominate Hawranik

Close to 200 people braced icy conditions to get to the PC nomination meeting in Beausejour Monday, February 11.

Nominated to contest the Lac du Bonnet by-election was Hawranik in an uncontested election. Supporting Hawranik was Provincial Progressive Conservative Leader Stuart Murray, Provencher Reform MP Vic Toews and six provincial MLAs.

In a rousing speech, aimed at developing enthusiasm in election workers Stuart Murray told the crowd that he was sure that the Tories could win the riding again in the upcoming by-election.

Hawranik focussed on some of the issues, highlighting economic development. "We have to ensure that the necessary infrastructure is in place, especially roads, sewer and water and internet access. "Small

business develops most of the jobs, we should really be focussing on our entrepreneurs." He said. Like all three candidates he believes rural drainage has been neglected and should be a priority.

He is fully in favour of a road on the east side of Lake Winnipeg, especially in view of the huge cost of the winter road system. "Not just for newsprint and lumber, but for mining potential that we don't know about because of lack of access." He said It would have an enormous impact on the communities of Sagkeeng Pine Falls, Powerview and St. Georges.

He said school division amalgamation would be a major issue. The inclusion of part of the Springfield School Division in Agassiz would cost \$400,000 a year just to harmonize salary schedules under the existing union contracts. He

pointed out that the mill rate is two points higher than Agassiz.

He said school taxes should be taken off farm property. He pointed out that the government had spent a billion dollars in the last two years over and above spending by the previous government. He said there is little to show for the extra spending, and for only half of that. (\$250,000 per year), school taxes could have been removed from all property.

Hawranik said he is working hard on door to door canvassing throughout the constituency, and PC Leader Stuart Murray would be joining him at least three times a week.

Hawranik has campaign offices in Lac du Bonnet at the corner of First Street and McArthur, in Powerview at the old Mar's Hair Salon on Highway #11 and Beausejour at 624 Park Avenue.

By-Election Quick Facts:

Get Your Name on the Voters List



Enumeration will be held from Monday, February 11 to Saturday, February 23. An enumerator will come to your door to collect the names of eligible voters in your home. Enumerators will be wearing photo identification from Elections Manitoba. You will be asked for your phone number. However, if you don't wish to give it (if it's unlisted, for example), you will not have to do so.

If no one is at home, the enumerator will leave a "Sorry We Missed You" card. The card explains who to call to arrange to have your name added to the voters list.

Landlords are reminded that the law requires them to provide access for enumerators to all apartment buildings and condominiums.

A revision period is held following enumeration to add or remove names from the voters list. Revision will be held from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Wednesday, February 27 to Saturday, March 2 at the returning office in Beausejour.

Revision will also be held from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Thursday, February 28 at the Golden Leisure Club in Pine Falls. If you were not enumerated, this is your opportunity to get your name on the voters list.

Having your name on the voters list will make voting more convenient for you on election day.

Personal Security Protection

Voters lists are no longer posted. For reasons of personal security, you may apply in writing to your Returning Officer to have personal information about you omitted or obscured from the voters list.

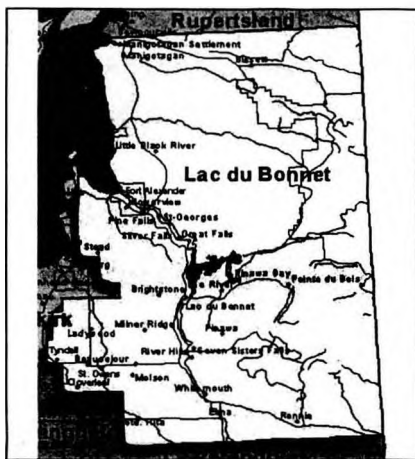
Nominations

Candidate nomination must be received before 1 p.m., Tuesday, February 26 at the returning office in Beausejour. Nomination papers are available from the Returning Officer.

Advance Polls

Qualified voters who are unable to attend regular polls can vote at advance polls. Advance polls are open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the returning office in Beausejour from Monday, March 4 to Saturday, March 9.

Advance polls will also be held from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the following locations: Monday, March 4 at the Golden Leisure Club in Pine Falls; Wednesday, March 6 at the Band Office in Sagkeeng First Nation in Fort Alexander; Thursday, March 7 at the Community Centre in Whitemouth; and Friday and Saturday, March 8 and 9 at the Pioneer Club in Lac du Bonnet.



Voting at Home

Voters unable to go in person to the polling place or an advance poll because of a physical disability may apply in writing to the Returning Officer to vote at home.

Absentee Voting

If you are travelling, working, studying or otherwise away from home, you may be able to vote by mail as an absentee voter.

To qualify, you must be:

- a Canadian citizen
 - 18 years old on or before by-election day
 - a resident of Manitoba
- and
- away from home and therefore unable to attend advance or regular polls there

If you know a qualified voter who is currently away from home, tell that person to contact Elections Manitoba for more information.

Polling Day is Tuesday, March 12

Regular polls are open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Election results will be announced Friday, March 15 at 4 p.m. at the returning office.

Where do I vote?

Descriptions of polling places in the Lac du Bonnet electoral division are now posted at the returning office and on the Elections Manitoba Web Site (www.elections.mb.ca). Your polling place is also written on the enumeration record given to you by the enumerator.

RM of Alexander roads wins road maintenance award

Reeve and Liberal nominee Harbottle pushes for better provincial management of highways

The Rural Municipality of Alexander has won a major award from the Manitoba Good Roads Association for the maintenance of roads within the RM.

"This is a great honour for our municipality. It shows a lot of dedicated people have done a great job," says George Harbottle, Alexander's reeve and the Manitoba Liberal Party's candidate for the March 12 by-election to replace Progressive Conservative Darren Praznik.

Terra Van Deynze, Good Roads Association executive director, said the award was given in the Division B category for rural municipalities based on assessment and square kilometers. Approximately twenty-five RMs were considered for this award. Van Deynze said the numerous criteria for the award include surface conditions like comfort and safety, a smooth surface and dust control, along with maintenance of structures like bridges and culverts.

Harbottle also says that

while he's personally delighted with the Award, that the provincial government has a long way to go to improve the province's approach to highways.

"The Manitoba Heavy Construction Association produced an extensive report at the end of last year describing the crisis in the industry as a result of the government's poor management. With my experience here, I believe that the Manitoba Heavy Construction Association is right, and one of the reasons I am now running to be the MLA in Lac Du Bonnet is to push for improvements in highways management at the provincial level."

The Good Roads Association represents 64 rural municipalities and 30 towns and cities. It also has eight supporting corporate members.

George Harbottle will be available to meet the press at 12:30 pm Thursday February 14, for the official opening of his campaign office across the street from the Tembec plant in Pine Falls.

Liberal candidate George Harbottle took the opening of his campaign office in the Manitou Lodge in Pine Falls to hammer away at the issues he concentrated on at his nomination.

On health care he mentioned the disparity between the east and west of the province. He said the western part of the province gets \$1,145 per capita hospital funding, and this area only \$645 and

pointed out that this region has to deal with a large number of summer visitors. He also questioned the allocation of federal funding for First Nation's medical care. He said it is impossible to find out where that money goes.

He said Highway 304 needs to be straightened, Highway 317 repaired and Highway 59 needs to be twinned to Grand beach to accommodate ongoing development along the highway, and the additional 2,000

trucks a year hauling chips to the Tembec newsprint mill. He also emphasized the importance of an all weather road to the east side of Lake Winnipeg to the local community and to the communities in the north.

He said school taxes have to be taken of property. "The are only two provinces left which still lev school taxes on property," He said.

He said drainage, especially in the Stead and Beausejour areas had been badly neglected and were in need of immediate attention. He will also push for highspeed internet access for the entire region.

Chris Tomlin (nee Johnston) of, Lac du Bonnet, has her family roots in mixed farming near Portage la Prairie. It was there that she instinctively returned when the brother she idolized, Allan, and his wife and young son died in a private airplane accident in January of 1989. The magic of the horses on her uncle's farm somehow gently healed the unbearable pain for her during her week riding and working with them. As she speaks, one can feel her intense gratitude and love for these noble animals. "Being with the horses just made the release of the memories and the pain easier in some way. I would not understand how until many years later". I know now that what I felt can be felt by others."

Since that time Chris has traveled extensively, becoming a certified instructor (Level II Western and Level I English) and a practitioner of Equine Assisted Psychotherapy. Most recently she has completed a program at Success Centered Riding Training in Springfield Missouri. She has been invited back to intern in July under Marry Charlotte Sealy, who holds a PhD in Health Communication and has published

many books on the subject of horse management and health related issues.

Chris's dream of bringing the healing magic of horses to others has begun to come true. In 2000 she and her husband Dave established Pine Rock Stables. Here she offers riding lesson programs that emphasize horse care and handling, cleaning and nutrition, horse breeds and types, stable and herd management, and most importantly,

knowledge of horse language and how to communicate with your horse. The emphasis at Pine Rock Stables is on safety. This is the main reason why trail rides are not offered.

"My husband Dave and I also enjoy driving our Percheron team (George and Nelly) in winter time and giving sleigh rides into the woods on our property. People enjoy the ride a wiener roast and hot

chocolate, but George and Nelly always steal the show."

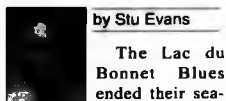

From Munich to Vienna

Part II

On another day, we went on a day excursion to the Bishop's Mansion a few kilometers to the south of Salzburg. This was the private residence of one of the Bishops of Salzburg who was quite eccentric and known to be a practical joker. He would soak his guests with water sprayed from nozzles cleverly hidden throughout the premises. At the entrance to his garden terrace, guests would be surprised by jets of water shooting from elk antlers which hung on the walls of the house. On the terrace was an elegant marble dining table and benches fixed permanently to the stones of the terrace. During an outdoor banquet, the Bishop would sit at the head of the table where, at his feet, was a hidden lever. When he stepped on it, water would shoot out of small holes on the benches startling his guests (to say the least). Within the mansion was a magnificent mechanical menagerie of dancers and musicians who pirouetted, banged drums, and marched to a lively tune. The hidden water jets, the music, and the movements of the figures were powered by streams of water channeled into the house from a mountain stream which flowed beneath the

house. After a half hour trek up the steep mountain side, we came to the Bishop's hunting lodge, a two story log building nestled in a stand of pines. In the distance, far across the valley, we could faintly see the town of Salzburg.

One morning, I returned to the train station and set off eastward in the direction of Vienna, first passing through the town of Linz (Hitler's birthplace), where the rail line meets the Danube River. Ten miles east of Linz is the village of Mauthausen, the location of one of Nazi Germany's

concentration camps of World War II. Continuing eastward along the Danube, we saw the picturesque towns of St. Pölten, Melk, Dürnstein, and Krems. Melk, with its beautiful pale yellow baroque abbey and extraordinary view of the Danube, is an enchanting medieval town. In the 12th century, while returning from a crusade to the Holy Land, Richard I, Coeur de Lion, of England, was captured by Leopold, Duke of Austria, and imprisoned in Dürnstein Castle which stands high on a

tender was selected. Indian and Northern Affairs have confirmed that funding is available and the project is approved for construction.

The architects and project managers are in the process of developing a final agreement for signature so that the project expected completion for the school is scheduled for January, 2003.

Final construction schedules are being developed and will be available next week. Community members interested are urged to make application for employment to Ron Fontaine or Phillip Henderson at 367-2240.

Bird Construction has been selected as the general contractor for the new Early Years School.

Construction should start in the next couple of weeks on the site of the old powwow grounds at the east side of the community.

The site area as drawn is a bit over 11.0 hectares.

Natural site drainage flows along Hwy. 11 and flows from east to west. School site drainage will build on the natural system in place. Additional drainage will be required to drain water from the south side of the school. The final site drainage system will address the spring melting drainage, particularly around the building areas. Site fencing will be along highway 11, half way down the east side of the property, and the full distance along the community road on the

west side of the property. Fencing will not include the old foundation in the school property.

School playfields are full size. The soccer field will allow two cross-fields for smaller children to use. The track is included for both school and community use. One baseball field is included.

The large field is located in the south-east corner of the site. This enable the ideal orientation for summer evening use. The school access road leads directly to the field which will be visible from the highway.

A paved play area is located to the north west of the school, directly outside the multipurpose room. This area is accessible from the multipurpose area and includes outdoor lockable storage. An earth berm with planting and rain shelter is located on the north west side of the play space, which will control snow accumulation and control roof to site drainage at this corner of the building.

A separate playground for sliding hill.

the school with the same equipment as the Kindergarten area will be designed to the south of the west wing of the school.

A paved surface will be located in the same area, which will provide play space for games like tether ball, hopscotch, kids basketball, etc.

Provision will be made or a

combination of photographs, stories and ancestral history of the community. Room will be available for the continuing recording of new aspects of community development. Additional space will be available for display of children's work and a general activity novice board area.

The school is designed around the circular form of the Elders/story telling area.

An extension of the curve at the center of the curve at the center of the entry circle becomes the curve of the gym space on the north side. It also becomes the curve of the harbour at the entry to the school. The Elders space is visible from all corridors and forms a core, a heart, an orientating visual element in the school.

The central core area will be designed to be transparent and translucent providing a series of spaces which you can see into and through. Corridor spaces will have windows for people travelling along the corridors to see the activities in the classrooms as well, to see outside through the classrooms. The relationship between inside and outside is very important.

The staff areas and administration spaces are located here to provide control and orientation. The core areas are intended for after hours community use. Gym access, library and computer access is close by; classroom corridors can be locked to prevent access.

Corridor spaces will have special places for display of student work. Natural light will make the connection inside to what is happening outside.

Children of the age going to this school spend much of their lives relatively free. The school should enable them to see outside in several places in the main corridors. They should be able to see into

spaces and observe activities going on during their travels along the corridors.

Materials will be colourful and easy to maintain. There will be room for murals and craft project display. Each classroom wing will have a distinct flavour and identity.

Classrooms will be designed with a storage space for all class materials and teacher work space between each two classrooms. A central storage space is provided at the delivery service entry to the school.

The main entry to the school is at the center of the structure. This entry serves for all students and for after hours access.

The Kindergarten children can use the main school entry, or use another entry directly from the bus drop off area through the projected playground space. Each Kindergarten room will have a separate door from the classroom to the outdoor play area. At the south end of the Kindergarten wing the exit door could also be used for the Kindergarten access.

The Kindergarten areas will have a fenced play area accessible from each of the classrooms. Gym time will be in the multipurpose space. Three gates are provided through the fencing.

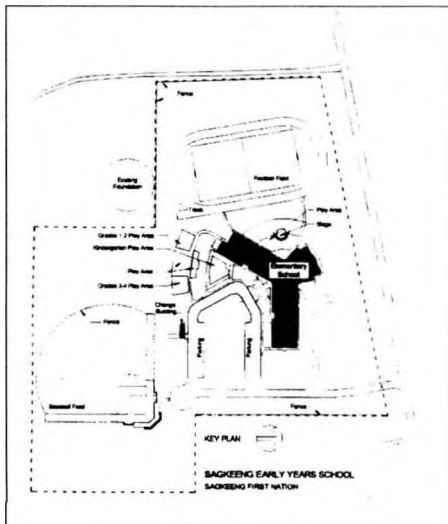
Receiving and storage spaces are located in the north east corner of the school. This will permit easy delivery for lunch program related deliveries and keep the mess and garbage away from the main areas of the school. All service access will be from these entry areas.

School playfields are accessible through the main gym space and from classroom corridor ends. There areas will be fenced.

The gym will be dividable by a movable curtain to permit two classes at a time to use the space. The corridor leading to the gym will enable access to each side of the gym, with the curtain in place. Gym support space, office and gym storage are located along the gym and is accessible from the gym space as are the gym support spaces and the gym office.

During special events a portable stage will be provided (storage space nearby).

The storage/kitchen area is located between the gym space and the multipurpose space with direct access to the delivery/service areas.



An unheated storage/change room building, is located along the school access road. A front/back garage door opening will be provided for storage of riding mowers and other site maintenance equipment. The change areas will not have any washrooms.

The building is designed in plan in the shape of a bird, wings spread. The roof will float above the exterior wall structure and overhang the building creating warm sheltered space on the warm southern side. A central structure or form will be the focal point of the school from the highway. It will be designed to bring natural light into the central areas of the school.

The "poetry of space" is used as a central theme for the design development. Spaces should provide a variety of light, of texture, transparency, and translucency. Children should perceive this school as a fun place to be, it is a place of learning which respects Sagkeeng tradition and rests between tradition and modern living.

An orienting history wall is designed into the main entry rotunda. It will encompass a

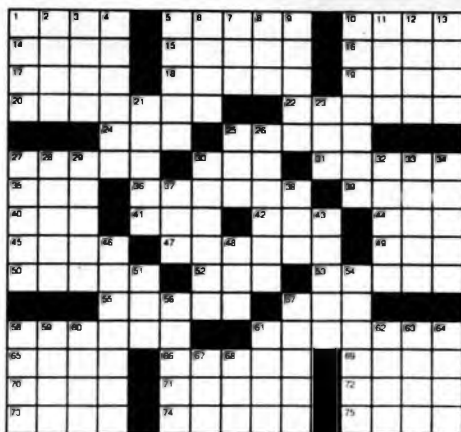

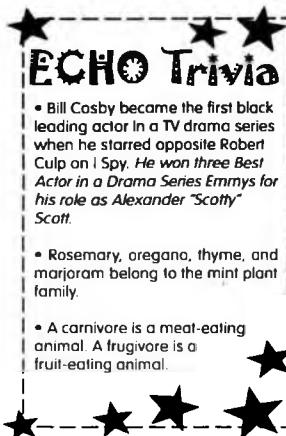

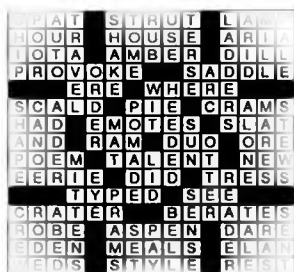

promontory overlooking the Danube River. It seems that Richard had disgraced Leopold's banner during the siege of Acre, near Jerusalem, and when Richard was journeying home to England, Leopold saw his chance for revenge. Heinrich VI (Henry), the Holy Roman Emperor, had Richard released two years later in 1194, after a huge ransom was paid.

As the train sped on towards Vienna, I noticed the deciduous forests in the river valley which were painted in beautiful fall colors. At about three o'clock in the afternoon, the train began passing through the west suburbs of Vienna and a few minutes later, we arrived at the Westbahnhof, the west station of the city. During the

last leg of the journey, I met an Austrian, Peter Grant from Melbourne, and with a map in hand, we set out to find the Stradtherberge, the hostel which is located in Esterhazy Park. It had been a World War II air raid shelter used by the Nazi officials during air raids, and later converted into a hostel. When we arrived at the hostel, we found that it was closed for renovations so we hiked back to the vicinity of the Westbahnhof and found a student hotel, the "Ruthenstein" where we checked in for 70 Austrian schillings per night.

A highlight of my stay in Vienna, was the evening performance of the Classical Art of Riding at the Spanischreiterschule (Spanish Riding School) attached to the

Royal Palace (Hofburg) in the city centre. This is the classical movements, steps, and quadrille performed by the world famous Lippzanner horses, all done to beautiful waltzes and marches by composers like Strauss or Schubert. These magnificent and wonderfully trained animals are born black and turn white years later.

The old city of Vienna was once enclosed by a great wall, but in 1860, the Emperor Franz Josef had the fortifications demolished and replaced by an elegant Boulevard, the Ringstrassa, which encircles the city center. On the Ringstrassa you will find the massive Opera House completed in 1861, it's magnificence rivaling that of the Paris Opera. The Academy of Art and the Stock Exchange are

here as well.

On the last day of October, we visited the great summer palace of the Hapsburg Rulers, the Schonbrunn Palace, on the southern outskirts of the city. This sprawling 400 room residence, the epitome of luxury and extravagance, was visited by Mozart who played his first concert in it's Great Salon at the age of six, the guests of Empress Maria Theresa. The spacious halls and rooms are embellished with gold leaf and tapestries which took 12 years to weave.

On other days we saw St. Stephen's Cathedral, it's 450 foot spire, the focal point of Vienna. In the catacombs underneath the cathedral are the eerie Black Death chambers holding the skeletons of thousands of victims of that dreaded plague. In one vault you can see skulls, in another rib cages, and another stacks of leg and arm bones.

One day we devoted to visiting the parks on the Danube, the Donau Park with it's giant ferris wheel, and the famous Prater. To get there, we strolled along the Praterstrasse, past the house where Johann Strauss lived and composed the "Blue Danube". A plaque on the building commemorates

his life and work. In Vienna, it was a tradition to stroll through the Prater to listen to Johann Strauss and his orchestra playing a Sunday concert in the park. While in Vienna, we made a daily stop at a Konditorei, an Austrian cake and pastry cafe'. Of the many kondetoeien in the city, the most famous is the "Sacher Torte" cafe' where the chocolate cake giving the cafe' its name, was invented.

On October 31st, many residents of the hotel went out to celebrate Halloween, dressed in some very original costumes. We went to a nearby pub called "Hitler's", in this bohemian quarter of the city. As a young art student, Adolf Hitler frequented this cafe'-pub and I suppose that the owners named it "Hitler's" to attract tourists. A bust of Hitler sat at one end of the bar glaring menacingly at the patrons.

On November 2, 1974, I said farewell to the travelers that I had met, walked to the Westbahnhof station, and purchased a ticket to Innsbruck. From there, I would begin my journey southward to the boot of Italy, to Sicily, and eventually across to Africa.
