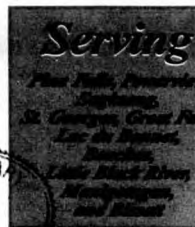

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## MBTelehealth launches their official site

MBTelehealth Network increases rural, northern access to care. This will mean less travel for patients, more access to medical specialists, and better contact for health care providers.

Doctors and patients in the Pine Falls area and 19 other northern and rural communities in Manitoba now have faster access to clinical specialists in Winnipeg through the MBTelehealth video conference Network. Official opening of the MBTelehealth site at the Pine Falls Health Complex, was held on

Wednesday, April 17 by local Regional Health Authority officials and Network representatives.

Health Minister Dave Chomiak officially launched the new Network, which uses state-of-the-art communications technology on February 25, 2002. "This means less travel for patients, more access to the variety of medical specialists located at Winnipeg hospitals and the launch of an excellent communications network that can link medical personnel from around the province into one circuit for educational and consultative purposes," said

Mr. Chomiak.

"This initiative further expands our ability to deliver quality health care services to residents of the North Eastman Health Region," Stated Jim Hayes, CEO, Regional Health Authority.

The initiative includes 23 Telehealth sites across the province and is funded as a two-year, shared-cost incentive with \$1.5 millions from Manitoba Health and \$3 million from Health Canada through the Canada Health Infrastructure Partnerships Program (CHIPP). Each of

## Body identified

This is a follow up to the April 15th, 2002 report of a body found just outside the town boundary of Lac du Bonnet, Manitoba. The body has been positively identified as Bruce Ronald Harkness, age 35, originally from Kingston, Ontario. Harkness was reported missing by a friend to the Lac du Bonnet RCMP detachment on September 10th, 2001.

A wallet was found in the clothing of the body at the time of discovery. RCMP could not release his name until he was positively identified Friday afternoon by the RCMP identification unit using a type of finger impression, rather than finger prints. Arrangements are being made by family for the return on the body to Kingston, Ontario. There is no overt indication of foul play being involved in this death, however it has not been eliminated. The investigation is still ongoing.

RCMP are asking anyone who may recall seeing him or who might have information to call them at 345-6311.

## Pine Falls council opposed to joining Powerview

### Tembec and Powerview meet without Advisory Council

At a public meeting in the Pine Falls School last Monday, (April 15), Pine Falls Advisory Board Chairman Darrell Parisian announced that the council would not be attending negotiations between Tembec and the Powerview Council on the amalgamation of Pine Falls with Powerview.

He said the council favoured the establishment of the wider Winnipeg River municipality proposed by a group calling itself the Grass Roots Committee. This committee is working for an urban municipality to include Pine Falls, Powerview and part of the RM of Alexander including St Georges, Silver Falls, Great Falls and McArthur Falls. They claim that the region is already one community and that, unified under one municipal govern-

ment would make the economic, cultural and social development of the area much easier to accomplish. It is not a new idea, but is being actively promoted because of the opportunity made possible by the fact that Tembec wants to divest itself of its company town, Pine Falls. (See separate article - the "Winnipeg River" option)

When Tembec purchased the Pine Falls Paper Company Tembec CEO Frank Dottori made it clear that Tembec had no intention of being the municipal administration business and expected that Pine Falls would become a regular municipality within one year of the purchase. That was four years ago.

Because, under provincial legislation, a municipality has

# The urban municipality of Winnipeg River

Almost everyone you talk to seems to favour the concept of one municipality which includes Pine Falls, Powerview, St Georges, Silver Falls and Great Falls. They will tell you that the whole region is essentially one community and might just as well have one municipal government instead of three.

The municipality, dubbed "The Urban Municipality of Winnipeg River" would have a population of close to 3,000 and tax base that includes the Tembec mill and three power dams. One municipal government for the area, with a solid tax base and large enough population would be in a much better position to develop the economic, social and cultural potential of the region than three governments attempting to work together.

The regional sewer and water concept proposed by the RM of Alexander, for example, would have to deal with only two governments - Winnipeg River and Sagkeeng. The larger Winnipeg River tax base would also make financ-

ing of the project more easily arranged.

A regional sewer and water system would not only improve the quality of water in Powerview and Pine Falls, it would improve fire protection, and make possible an industrial park.

An industrial park, with sewer and water, is sorely needed. Without it economic development is scarcely possible. With it Winnipeg River may be able to make the same boast as Winkler, where jobs are made available for every graduating high school student. Young people would not

have to leave the area in order to make a living. Winnipeg River would also have the resources to hire an economic development officer to find tenants for the industrial park and jobs for our young people.

Parks, cultural and tourist facilities which are difficult to organize now would suddenly become much easier.

The municipal boundaries we have now were established many years ago, for a completely different set of communities. There can be little doubt that if municipal boundaries were being established now they would be different from

those we have, but changing them, or modernizing them is not that straightforward.

To create a municipality of Pine Falls, Powerview, and part of the RM of Alexander to McArthur Falls would rip the guts out of the RM. The logical conclusion would be to give Bird River to the RM of Lac du Bonnet, Stead to the RM of Brokenhead, to set up the beaches as a new municipality, and close down the RM of Alexander.

Two problems emerge. First it is not simple to close down a municipality, and the permanent population of Ward 1,

(The Beaches) is not high enough to incorporate as a municipality. The permanent population was 830 in the 2001 census, (up from 709 in the 1996 census). However it could be close to the necessary 1,000 by the time the necessary boundary changes are made, particularly is Gull Lake could be included.

Tembec has asked the Department of Intergovernmental Affairs to meet with local people to explore the possibility of setting up the municipality of Winnipeg River, and the procedures to be followed to make it a reality.

to have at least 1,000 residents, and Pine Falls had only 776 at the time, the community was given the option of joining either Powerview or the RM of Alexander. They voted overwhelmingly to join Powerview.

Subsequent to the vote Tembec set up the Pine Falls Advisory Committee to take care of administrative details

until the merger of the two communities could be completed. The cost of necessary infrastructure improvements in Pine Falls, especially sewer and water, proved a stumbling block in negotiations between Tembec and Powerview. No one broke off negotiations, but meetings stopped.

In the meantime the new Pine Falls Advisory Council did everything possible to keep things the way they were. That is, as an independent municipality and an independent school. Several options were followed; to get the government to change legislation allowing Pine Falls to incorporate on its own, to incorporate under Northern Affairs legislation as a community in unorganized territory, and to incorporate as a private corporation. The first two were not acceptable to the provincial government, and the third was not acceptable to Tembec.

At a Pine Falls public meeting in January, there was some indication that the community favoured the "Winnipeg River" concept rather than amalgamation with Powerview. No formal vote was taken, but the Advisory Council decided to pursue this option. The fact that the latest census gives Pine Falls population as only 650 probably contributed to the council giving up on the "go-it-alone" option.

Parisian told the fifty people present at the meeting that the Advisory Council would

not be attending the meeting between Tembec and Powerview the following day because it could be construed by the Provincial Government as giving tacit approval to the amalgamation with Powerview as opposed to the "Winnipeg River" concept. He said that everyone at the previous meeting was enthusiastic. He said, "The government has been contacted. That will lead to it becoming a reality."

There was not unanimous support for the Winnipeg River approach. One resident said it was "the completely wrong path - the best way is with Powerview. Another said, "We voted to go with Powerview. Why are we not doing that?" Parisian replied that negotiations with Powerview had failed. He said joining with Powerview first, and the pursuing the Winnipeg River option would result in Pine Falls having less influence at the negotiating table.

However, another resident thought the bigger municipality was the route to go. He said the amalgamation would not be a merging of the two communities, but an annexation, with Powerview dominating Pine Falls.

While almost everyone thinks the larger municipality may be a good idea it may be difficult to realize. It would require the cooperation of Powerview and the RM of Alexander. Powerview Mayor Henry Ostrowski does not appear enthusiastic. He says that

first has to come the union of Pine Falls and Powerview. He says it's a learning process and it will take time to assimilate. "Once that's done we can talk about St. Georges, then maybe Silver Falls, and then perhaps Great Falls. He says he has been "building bridges" with the provincial government and that they agree with him.

The RM of Alexander may be even more difficult since the end result would probably be the end of the RM. Reeve George Harbottle has given no indication that he is about to preside over the dissolution of the RM.

### Tembec meets with Powerview

Tembec met with the Powerview Council last Tuesday (April 16) - without any representation from Pine Falls. It was a successful meeting with real progress being made, especially with respect to Pine Falls infrastructure costs. It was not open to the public but a joint statement was issued that indicated that "There was an agreement not to proceed further at this time until there was Pine Falls resident representation at the table." The wording "Pine Falls resident" rather than Advisory Council was significant. Pine Falls representation is wanted but Advisory Council representation is not expected.

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# The Charter Twenty Years Later

Twenty years ago Canadians

matters of education and religion, for example, were subsequently terminated by democratically elected governments who found it politically convenient to discard those guarantees. So too, aboriginal Canadians understand that government institutions and agencies can, through the power of laws, harm, as well as help, their development as equal partners in Canadian society.

Arising out of the concern that there did not appear to be any check on the power of government to unreasonably intrude on our rights and freedoms many Canadians began to call for an American style "bill of rights". It appeared to those advocates that our British Parliamentary system simply did not move quickly enough to address perceived injustice. They sought a more effective mechanism to assist them in this pursuit of

justice.

The mechanism chosen by Canadians was the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. As is the case with our American neighbours, this bill of rights provides our judges with the power to overrule the decisions of the democratic representatives of the people in Parliament and the provincial legislatures where the judges determine that the decisions of the legislators are at odds with the guarantees of the Charter. However, a new concern arose: who would call the judges to order if their decisions appeared to contradict the intent of the Charter? Who would be there to challenge the judges when their decisions threaten to undermine the moral values that ultimately form the basis of all the laws of Canada?

Almost 150 years ago, President Abraham Lincoln noted a similar concern when the United States Supreme Court prevented the American Government from abolishing slavery. By taking the right to make the most basic moral and cultural decisions out of the hands of the people Lincoln worried that the people had ceased to be their own rulers. While no one would suggest that our courts would use the

Charter to impose slavery, it is clear that as a direct result of the Charter Parliament's ability to legislate in respect of moral concerns has been significantly restricted.

Whether or not we agree with the decisions of the courts this limitation on Parliament's ability to legislate has become apparent in a number of cases. These include cases involving the extension of free speech to the tobacco industry, to extend equal rights to homosexuals, to strike down the abortion law and to virtually rule out the extradition of criminal fugitives who have entered Canada to avoid prosecution for capital offences committed abroad. More recently the courts have provided John Robin Sharpe with the right to produce sexually explicit and violent pornography glorifying the exploitation of children by adults.

These cases all involve moral issues that are now primarily governed by the courts and non-elected judges rather than the democratically elected representatives of the people. While the Charter of Rights does allow Parliament to temporarily overrule the decisions of the courts by the use of the notwithstanding clause, the hesitation of poli-

ticians to use this clause arises out of a concern that to do so would be seen as a failure to respect the constitution. As a result, politicians are simply accepting judgments that prefer the narrow interests of individuals even where these decisions are contrary to the interests of society as a whole.

Twenty years is not a long time in the life of a nation. However, decisions made during the course of twenty years can have a continuing, and unintended negative impact on the future development of the nation. As a nation we need to be mindful of the concern that in protecting our individual rights and freedoms, we do not destroy our responsibility to nurture and protect broader societal values. Our ability to live together in a civilized society demands this continued vigilance.

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# Celebration 2002 - only 16 weeks away!

Folks along the Winnipeg River should be anticipating the midsummer festivities as the weeks fly by and there is evidence that the word is getting out to former area residents who are scattered throughout Canada.

Dodie and Marlene, daughters of the late Doris and Buff Seebach grew up at 15 Birch Street next to the public path. Marlene, with whom I attended St. John's College at the U. of M. lives in Vancouver where she taught school, and Dodie resides in Oak Point, Manitoba. Buff Seebach arrived in Pine Falls in October of 1926 to work on the construction of the paper mill and when No. 1 paper machine started up in February of 1927, he transferred to that department starting as 6th hand or "Broke hustler". During the depression, Buff worked as a greens keeper at Clear lake and in the mine at Bissett, returning to Pine Falls when the mill resumed operation in 1935. Not long after that, Buff and Doris Gillespie, a nurse from Medicine Hat, Alberta, who had come to Pine Falls to work at the hospital and they were married in 1937. When the mill went on short time during the war, the Seebachs, with daughter Dodie (born 1938), went to Tasmania where Buff and Doris went to Chile where Buff was Assistant Paper Machine Superintendent at a mill which was receiving start up assistance from Abitibi. After Doris passed away, Buff, who retired in 1973, stayed in the

Birch Street house where he and other bachelors (including my father) had lived in the early days of Pine Falls, and continued to live there until his death.

Murray and Frances Manson came to Pine Falls after World War II to join Murray's two brothers Earle and George who had settled in Pine Falls a few years earlier. The Manson brother, George, Earle, and Murray were all born and raised in the Strathclair - Shoal lake area of Manitoba. Murray's daughter Marilyn Manson (King) and husband Ave and family live in Westrose, Alberta and they plan to attend the big event in August and visit with mother Frances, Murray and his sister in law Anita (Mrs. Earle Manson) both passed away last year.

My old classmate Hardy (Harold) Velie, brother to Lyle Velie, has taught school in Pinawa for many years and we're hoping that he and wife Dolores will join the festivities this summer. Steve, father of Lyle and Hardy, worked for the company all his life and served as Scoutmaster in the 1930s and an be credited with revitalizing the local Scout Troop in the 1960s. Mrs. Jean Velie, nee Jean Campbell from Lac du Bonnet, was a newspaper columnist for the Springfield Leader and faithfully reported news and events from the Pine Falls area for many years. She did not always get the thanks she deserved for her efforts. Many subscribers to that publication, especially those in other parts of the country like my late sister Edith Kolesnik

in Prince George, B.C., enjoyed catching up on news and happenings in the old home town. Do you remember her final words in each article, "Don't forget to feed the birds!"

Walter Inglis moved to Pine Falls in the early 1940s to work for the Paper Company and later married Alda Larson from Beausejour. They raised three children: Greg, John and Chris. Greg and wife Shirley live in Ottawa where Greg works for the Federal Government in the Department of Customs and Excise. In the 1980s, Greg was posted to the Canadian Embassy in London, England, as Customs Attache, and in 1985, during one of my

trips to London, I paid him a surprise visit at the Canadian Embassy in Governor Square and was subsequently invited to stay with them at their home in Montagu Square. Coincidentally, Greg's brother John, wife Audrey, and children arrived from Winnipeg the following day. John, now retired from the RCMP, and Audrey, still reside in Winnipeg, as does brother Chris.

R.J. "Rorie" McLeod arrived in Pine Falls in July of 1927 with parents Tom and Abigail McLeod, brothers Gerald and Ken, and sisters Mona, Isabel, and Geneva. They lived in "Bannock Town" briefly, then settled on "The Rock" near other pioneer

families like Pat and Myrtle Lalor and sons George, Fintan, and Terry. (Mickey was born in 1930), the Browns and their children Herb, Lily, Emily, Percy, Hattie, Allan, Foster, Marjorie, Madge, and Keith. Rorie McLeod, who was a Company Forester, and wife Murial (Lou), left Pine Falls in 1967 to work for the Federal Government. Their children, Megan, Jennifer, Pam and Dean, who did most of their schooling in Pine Falls are all married and residing in Winnipeg.

Most of these old timers are gone now but perhaps we will see some of their children and grandchildren in August in Celebration 2002.

## ECHOES FROM THE Heart

When I was in seventh grade, I was a candy striper at a local hospital in my town. I volunteered about thirty to forty hours a week during the summer. Most of the time I spent there was with Mr. Gillespie who never had any visitors, and nobody seemed to care about his condition.

I spent many days there holding his hand and talking to him, helping with anything that needed to be done. He became a close friend of mine, even though he responded with only an occasional squeeze of my hand. Mr. Gillespie was in a coma.

I left for a week to vacation with my parents, and when I

came back, Mr. Gillespie was gone. I didn't have the nerve to ask any of the nurses where he was, for fear they might tell me he had died. So with my questions unanswered, I continued to volunteer there through my eighth-grade year.

Several years later, when I was at the gas station when I noticed a familiar face. When I realized who it was, my eyes filled with tears. He was alive! I got up the nerve to ask him if his name was Mr. Gillespie, and if he had been in a coma about five years ago. With an uncertain look on his face, he replied yes. I explained how I knew him, and that I had spent

many hours talking with him in the hospital. His eyes welled up with tears, and he gave me the warmest hug I had ever received.

He began to tell me how, as he lay there comatose, he could hear me talking to him and could feel me holding his hand the whole time. He thought it was an angel, not a person, who was there with him. Mr. Gillespie firmly believed that it was my voice and touch that had kept him alive.

Then he told me about his life and what happened to him to put him in the coma. We both cried for a while and exchanged a hug, said our good-byes and went our separate ways.

Although I haven't seen him since, he fills my heart with joy every day. I know that I made a difference between his life and his death. More important, he has made a tremendous difference in my life. I will never forget him and what he did for me: he made me an angel.

# Mrs. Lucci's Receives \$10,000.00 Grant

On behalf of the Cabot Foundation Inc., Tanco Mine Manager - Bill Ferguson presented a \$10,000.00 cheque to the Board Members of Mrs. Lucci's Second Hand Store.

The grant money is intended for the proposed Winnipeg River Community Resource Centre future expansion project. "The proposed expansion is the result of needs expressed by our clients and members of the community. The main focus of the Centre is to offer a variety of life skills experience and training initiatives for members of the community", said Karen Kost - Project Coordinator for Mrs Lucci's.

The proposal is to purchase the land and K&S Equipment

building on Lake Avenue to make room for a new two story - 6000 square foot facility. So far, the new Community Resource Centre is intended to house Mrs. Lucci's Second Hand store along with a teaching cafe that will offer only a limited soup or casserole lunch menu. "The idea is to provide training and experience for youth in food handling, managing budgets, public relations and business skills. With the limited menu, we want to make sure that existing restaurants do not see us as a threat", Kost explained.

been met with some interest is to provide a Kiosk for local artists to showcase their work. "Our goal is to encourage lo-

cal artists to publicly display their work. In turn we are asking for a commitment of 6 hours per month of their time mentoring youth who interested in working with that specific art medium". "We also hope to partner with our seniors to draw on their skills to help support a variety of youth initiatives", Kost said.

Since the doors opened in 1998, Mrs. Lucci's - a non-profit organization - has gained recognition throughout the province for its innovative approach for assisting members from the community in

developing skills to help them enter the workforce. With the Board Members working in partnership with local schools, Child and Family Services, the RCMP and members of the community, the concept has evolved into a variety of community driven programs for youth. "About 80% of our clients have gained employment", Kost said.

Although the proposal has been in the works for sometime, the Board is currently waiting for Federal Government funding approval before releasing further details.

Find someone to do the heavy work; try your community centre, church, local high school. If you can't afford the expense, perhaps you can trade jobs with a neighbour.

Plan your garden work schedule. Do a little each day. Take a 10 minute break every hour, you can use a kitchen timer to keep track of when it's time for a break.

Respect pain. If you have pain for more than one hour after activity, reduce the length of the next gardening session.

Gauge your energy level each day and only do as much

as you're felling up to. Minimize lawn care by using ground cover such as inorganic mulch or decorative rocks instead of grass.

Keep tool storage near to intensive works areas.

Use raised bed, free standing containers or hanging baskets. These allow you to get closer to the ground with crouching or kneeling.

# Guardians and underage beneficiaries It's the Law

A guardian is someone who looks after a child until the age of majority. Many people are motivated to prepare their Will because they want to provide for their children under the age of 18 years. If you have children under the age of majority, and die without a spouse and without a Will, the Courts will name a guardian for them. The person appointed by the Courts may not be someone you want to assume this role for your children, however, the recommendation of your relatives will be considered.

An inheritance paid to a child must be held in trust for that child until he or she reaches the age of majority, even if your spouse survives you. To protect the inheritance, the Trustee may be required to report to the Public Trustee periodically and account for how

the money was spent and managed on behalf of the children - not something a parent is normally required to do. If a large sum of money is involved, the Trustee may be required to post a bond for the money.

Beneficiaries under the age of majority are entitled to receive their share of the intestate estate when they reach the age of majority. Remember when you were 18 years of age? How would you feel about your children receiving a lump sum of money at that age? You may want to ensure that their day-to-day living and education requirements are provided for but that they not receive a large sum until they are older, and presumably more mature. Unfortunately, without a Will the inheritance cannot be held longer, even if distributing it later meets the children's needs better.

the sites also contributed \$10,000 in the first year and will be providing \$20,000 each in the second year (2002/2003).

Development of all sites will be completed by the end of March, with the exception of Norway House, said Network Director Wayne Boyce who was present at today's opening.

In the coming year, access to grand rounds and diagnostic imaging capability will be added, said Mr. Boyce.

Participants at both ends of the video conference Network can talk to, hear and see each other. Additional specialized equipment such as digital cameras; digital otoscopes or document cameras improve assess-

ment and information sharing.

"Manitoba is a perfect setting for Telehealth technology, as currently up to 30 percent of Manitobans travel to Winnipeg to access specialist care," said Dr. Ray Postuma, Manitoba Telehealth Medical Director. "Beyond reducing travel time for patients, Telehealth decreases professional isolation and improves access to continuing education for rural health care providers. It supports better planning for patients returning to their communities from Winnipeg or Brandon hospitals, and it saves time for health care providers and administrators needing to attend provincial meetings."

For patients to book a telehealth appointment, or they would like further information in regards to telehealth, they should contact their coordinator, Brenda Sanderson at 367-5421 at the Pine Falls

Health Complex.

All Manitoba Regional Health Authorities have joined the Manitoba Telehealth Network. The program, under the leadership of the Winnipeg Re-

gional Health Authority, has implemented the infrastructure to link 23 Telehealth sites across the province. These are located in the communities of Ashern, Berens River first nations, Brandon, Churchill, Dauphin, Flin Flon, Gillam, Killarney, Leaf Rapids, Lynn Lake, Pine Falls, Russell, Selkirk, Stienbach, Swan River,

The Pas, Portage la Prairie and Thompson. Sites have also been established in Boundary Trails Hospital (Winkler/Morden area) and in health Sciences centre, St. Boniface General Hospital and the Rehabilitation Centre for Children in Winnipeg. A site is planned for Norway House in the spring of this year.

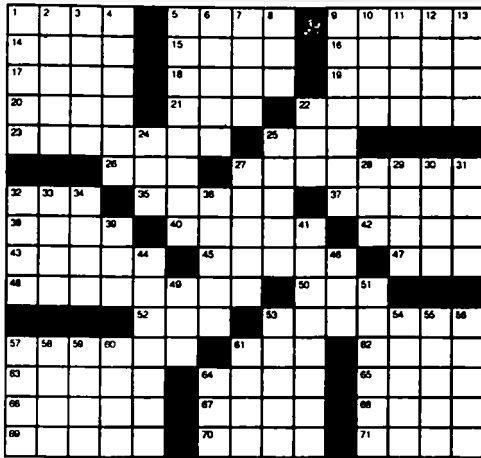

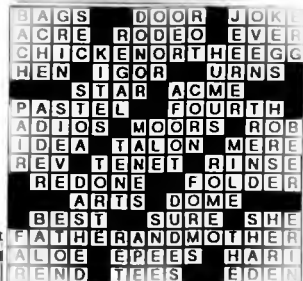
