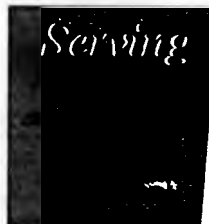

## Lac du Bonnet commemorates Canada Day

# No injuries in Blue Water Aviation crash

Last Friday, at about 9:30 in the morning, a Blue Water Aviation DeHavilland Beaver DHC-2, taking two scouts and a scout leader from Bissett to Scouting Inagak Lake, 40 miles north of Bissett, lost fuel pressure at just over the half way mark. The aircraft was not out of fuel.

The pilot attempted to restart the engine but was unable to restore fuel pressure. With an emergency landing the only option open to him he chose a rock ridge 25 miles out of Bissett for the attempt.

It was not a smooth landing. They knocked down a few trees and the aircraft rolled over on its back as it came to a halt. The three passengers and pilot emerged without a scratch - not even a minor bruise.

The aircraft was one of two taking passengers to the same lake. When the second aircraft arrived at the lake (at

about 10:30 am) and found the first had not arrived the pilot followed the same route back to Bissett in an attempt to locate the missing aircraft but was unsuccessful. In the meantime three other Blue Water aircraft joined in the search and Search and Rescue were notified.

A Blue Water aircraft found the crashed Beaver at about 11:30. A helicopter from Bissett (there for fire fighting), with an RCMP officer and a medical attendant, was dispatched to the crash site. The pilot and three passengers were flown to the Pine Falls hospital where there were examined and released. They were driven into Winnipeg. The only injuries from the adventure were a sunburn suffered by one of the scouts while waiting for the helicopter, and skin punctures from IVs given by the medical attendant.

# Razor's Challenge Answered

On April 27<sup>th</sup> Larry "Razor" Sharpe won the WKA North American Middleweight Muay Thai Title by knocking out Mexican National Champion Aldo Lozano. In the post fight interview for Bell Express Vu and TSN, Sharpe issued a bold statement. He said that he was willing to get into the ring with anyone out there.

Sharpe's challenge was recently answered by Jerame Harminson. Harminson is the US National Champ and the #1 ranked fighter in the world according to the IKF, which is the largest sanctioning body in the world. Harminson is a veteran of 21 professional bouts and only has one loss on his record. He is a heavy puncher as is Sharpe, who predicts the fight will not go to the score cards.

The fight will be Sharpe's last local fight and it will decide who is the best middleweight out there right now. The fight takes place July 27<sup>th</sup> at the Rendez-Vous in Winnipeg. In addition to Sharpe four other competitors from Pine Falls will be competing: John Simard, Scottie Too Hottie

Murphy, Trisha "Thrasher" Sammons, and Bob "The fighting Frenchman" Vincent.

## Powerview students receive Non-Smoking Success Awards at Grad

Students at Powerview School are making an active choice to be healthy. They are developing positive lifestyles that will continue throughout a lifetime.

Students have tried cigarettes and have decided not to start smoking. Students who smoke are choosing to quit - fighting pressures from advertising, the media, peers. The quitting process is difficult. Students struggle with a powerful addiction to nicotine and with nasty withdrawal symptoms to the drug. Their determination is commendable. We are very proud of them.

Laws and the community are helping. Areas are deemed smoke-free. Next year Powerview School will be smoke free, inside and outside of the building.

Tobacco use primarily begins in early adolescence, typically by the age of 16, but recently, studies show an even earlier start at 12 or 13 years of age. We know about the health consequences from smoking but, as well, tobacco use in childhood and early adolescence has been shown to

retard potential lung growth and maximum lung function for a lifetime - another cause for serious concern.

Studies also show that, because first start of cigarette use begins in middle school and in high school, students who stay smoke-free in school will probably never smoke at all. In the school there is developing a very powerful peer group - those students who have chosen NEVER to start smoking. They have made a pledge early

on, not only to make a personal commitment to health, but also to help change attitudes and beliefs about tobacco... It's not cool!

Ten Powerview students received a "Non-Smoking Success Award" along with a cheque for fifty dollars at graduation June 23rd. A big "Thank You" goes to the Parents Advisory Council who assisted financially with the awards.

# Trading with the Empire:

## A Few Facts About the Canada-US Softwood Lumber Dispute Part One of an Op-Ed for Churchill Riding Newspapers

I have recently received many letters, calls and questions from constituents in the Churchill riding about the ongoing crisis in Canada's softwood lumber industry. This crisis has affected several forestry communities in the riding, such as The Pas and Pine Falls.

As the New Democratic Party Industry Critic and the MP for the Churchill riding, I have been working diligently on this issue, on behalf of the Manitoban and Canadian forestry industries, for the past year and a half. The purpose of this article is to give some background on the dispute with the United States over softwood lumber and how it has affected our forestry companies and communities. Next week, in part two of this column, I will look at possible solutions to this crisis.

The crisis in Canada's softwood lumber industry, which now threatens hundreds of jobs in the Churchill riding alone, began when the old Canada-US softwood lumber deal expired in early 2001. In that deal, Canada agreed to limit its timber exports to the US. In return, the US agreed not to put punishing tariffs on Canadian timber products crossing the border.

The US has long been the biggest market for Canadian timber. Companies like

Tembec and Tolko depend on the US market. The problem is that US timber companies resent losing market share in their own country to cheaper, better Canadian timber products. US timber companies cannot compete with us on a level playing field, so instead they cheat. They cheat by lobbying their government to put tariffs on Canadian timber products crossing the border. Right now, these tariffs are set at between eighteen and forty percent, depending on where in Canada the product is produced. This makes Canadian timber more expensive by the time it reaches US markets, so US timber products seem cheaper and more competitive compared to ours. Therefore, fewer Americans buy Canadian timber. Canadian timber companies lose money and Canadians lose their jobs.

Of course, the US government will never admit that they are cheating. Instead, they accuse us of cheating by saying that we unfairly subsidize our timber. They claim that their tariffs on our timber are only levelling things out. This is, of course, completely untrue. What the US calls "unfair subsidizing" is actually environmental stewardship. In the US, timber companies own their own wood lots and cut down as much timber as they please. In most Canadian provinces, including Manitoba, the provincial government owns most

of the woodlands and leases out a certain quota of land to timber companies each year. This way, the provincial government can protect our environment, make sure areas that are logged get replanted and make sure our forest industry jobs are still there for our children and grandchildren.

The difference between the US system and the Manitoba-Canada system is the differ-

ence between owning and leasing a home or car. US timber companies own their wood lots. Canadian companies lease them from the provincial government for a reasonable market price. If you were comparing two trucking companies, and company A owned its trucks while company B leased its trucks at fair market value, you would not say that company B had an unfair advantage over company A. The

same is true of the softwood lumber industry. The US claim that Manitoban and Canadian timber companies are unfairly subsidized is nothing but a misleading smokescreen.

So if the US is acting so unfairly, why is the Liberal government in Ottawa not doing anything about it? Next week, we will look at what the Liberal government is doing, what they are not doing and what they should be doing.

# Summer Safety Tips

## Sun Safety

Use a sunscreen every time kids play outside. Make sure the SPF is 15 or higher and that it blocks UVA and UVB rays. Sunscreen wears off so re-apply every 2 to 3 hours or after swimming. Apply sunscreen 15 to 20 minutes before going outside.

It's a good idea to wear a hat and t-shirt when playing outside. Encourage children to play in the shade between 10:00 am and 3:00 pm when the sun is the hottest. Keep babies in the shade. Babies under 1 year old are too young for sunscreen and should not be out in the sun. Even in the shade they should wear a hat and t-shirt to protect their skin.

## Water Safety

Children should not be left alone in or near water. This includes bathtubs and buckets

of standing water. Even a small amount of liquid can be deadly. Of all buckets, the 5-gallon size presents the greatest hazard to young children because of its tall, straight sides. It is nearly impossible for infants and toddlers to free themselves when they fall into the bucket headfirst.

Always swim with a buddy, and swim in supervised areas. Know your limits and swim within them. Watch out for the dangerous too's - too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, and too much strenuous activity.

## Bill Bryk to be featured in Canadian Hot Rodder

Bill Bryk of Powerview bought a 1967 Chevrolet Short Box pickup for \$1,000 in 1993. He drove it for about six months then decided to rebuild it. Since then he's spent somewhere between forty and fifty thousand dollars on it. Every piece has been either individually painted or chromed.

The original box had too much rust to be saved so he looked around for one in better condition. Most of those he

found had at least a little rust but eventually he found a US company that built brand new boxes for the vehicle.

He installed a 327 cu. in., 375 HP engine with a four-speed manual transmission - both of them chromed and in immaculate condition.

The 67 Chevrolet Short Box is quite rare. The truck was built from 1967 until 1972, but the 67 version is unique in that it has a smaller rear window than later models.

Bryk is an earth moving contractor and is busiest in summer. He says he put in thousands and thousands of hours on the truck, mostly during the winter. "It's a slow, tedious job." He said. "You can't rush something like that."

This year Bryk has taken the vehicle to four auto shows where he took first place in three of them. (The fourth was a demonstration only show - no prizes were awarded.) Taking these awards has resulted

in a feature article in a future edition of the *Canadian Hot Rodder* - and a picture in this month's edition.

Understandably, Bryk does not often drive his truck on the highway, but he will be in the 4P parade this year. Look for a small, green, immaculate pickup, being driven very carefully.

## Report from Legislature

Growth of the economy of Manitoba is very important because extended growth leads to more jobs, and better services. The Manitoba Department of Finance's survey of independent private forecasters shows that Manitoba's economy is forecast to grow 2.3% this year, which is slightly below the national average of 2.5%. Forecasters predict that an economic recovery will occur in 2003 with growth estimated at 3.3% in Manitoba, compared to the national average at 3.9%. The Manitoba economy, therefore, is expected to be below the national average in 2002 and 2003. The good news, however, is that the Manitoba economy will grow by 2.3% this year and

3.3% next year. I see my job as working to ensure the economy in Lac du Bonnet Constituency grows, and I will work to ensure that the growth in our economy outperforms the Provincial and National averages. I want to see real job growth in Pinawa where Hundreds of jobs have been lost over the last few years due to the continued pull out of A.E.C.L. The Federal Liberal Government should be held to account for those job losses. The Federal Liberal Government is awash with surpluses, and some of those funds should be used to ensure that the federal jobs lost in Pinawa are replaced. There is no precedent in Canada where the Federal Government has

entirely closed its program in a community and has not replaced those jobs. The Liberal in Ottawa must be held to account for this action! Jobs in Pinawa benefit the entire Constituency in Lac du Bonnet. It is therefore incumbent upon all of us to join in the call to the Federal Liberal Government to restore jobs in Pinawa.

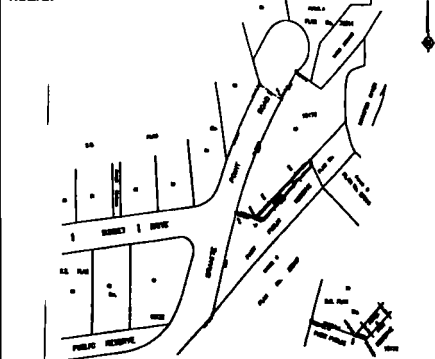

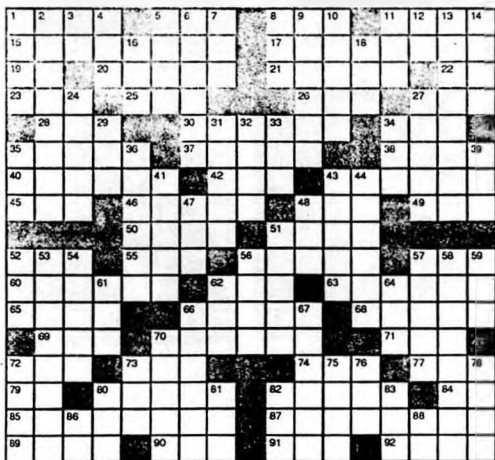

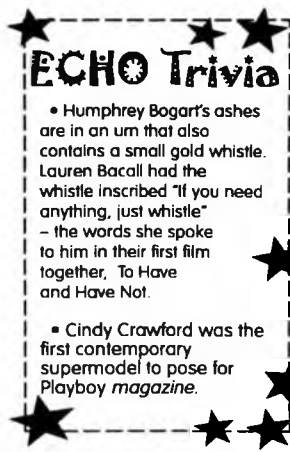
