



## Bissett community shocked by gun-wielding man



A 51 year old male is currently in custody at the Winnipeg Remand Centre after he entered the San Antonio Bar in Bissett, Mb with a rifle following an argument with another patron.

At approximately 8:30 p.m. on Friday, July 26th a disagreement took place between two males who were playing pool inside the hotel. One male left the hotel and retrieved a rifle from his camper, loaded it and entered the hotel in search of the other male. The hotel manager was struck with the rifle in the head after he tried to stop the man from entering the hotel bar area. The man continued into the hotel bar searching for the other male he was

arguing with earlier. A waitress tried to use the phone but was stopped when the man pointed the gun at her telling her to put the phone down. One of the patron's inside the bar told the irate man that the person he was looking for left the bar through the back door. The irate man then exited the hotel and pointed the gun at the fleeing vehicle. After this, he returned inside the hotel and told his friend that they were leaving. Both men were seen leaving in a 1989 White Ford F15P with a camper travelling into the Nopiming Park. Police believed that they were attempting to flee the area and return to Selkirk.

A police road block was set

up inside Nopiming Park at the intersection of Trans Licence Road and Highway #314. The suspect vehicle stopped at the road block and the two men inside were taken into custody. Police recovered two rifles in the camper of the truck.

51 year old Craig Rowat Amell of Selkirk is currently in custody facing firearm, assault, threat and driving related charges. Police did not charge his passenger in the incident.

The community of Bissett is north of Powerview, Manitoba. This small northern community is known for its quiet life style and the event has shaken community members.

## Larry 'Razor' Sharpe captures title

On April 27<sup>th</sup> Larry "Razor" Sharpe won the WKA North American Middleweight Muay Thai Title by knocking out Mexican National Champion Aldolfo Lozano. In the post fight interview for Bell Express Vu and TSN, Sharpe issued a bold statement. He said that he was willing to get into the ring with anyone out there.

Sharpe's challenge was to be recently answered by Jerame Harminson. Harminson the US National Champ and the #1 ranked fighter in the world according to the IKF, which is the largest sanctioning body in the world. However, politics of the fight game have the fight between Sharpe and Harminson set at another date.

Sharpe, instead faced Marc Bourgeois for the ISKA Canadian Title. This title will allow Sharpe to fight for the IKF North American Title in the near future, if he wins. Bourgeois is a veteran of the ring with a professional record of 25-7 and an amateur record of 11-0. He has been in the ring with more than one World Champion as well. Bourgeois hoped to rekindle his career that has declined in recent years and Sharpe hoped to continue his ascent in the middleweight division, looking eventually for a World Title. This was a fight that will decide for both fighters where to go next.

The Olympic, or Standard triathlon - a 1500 metre swim, 40K bike ride and 10K run, the Sprint which is a 750 metre swim, 20k bike ride and 5 k run, The Duathlon-a 5k run, 40K bike ride and 10K run, the Corporate Challenge-750 metre swim, 20K bike ride and 5Krun, and the Try-A-Tri race which is a 300 metre swim, a 10K bike ride and a 2.5Krun.

Organizer Scott Brown has nothing but praise for the way the Town and RM of Lac du Bonnet have cooperated with the Triathlon committee and participants. "The Knights of Columbus and Robin Law of the Youth Centre have worked

very hard and done an excellent job." Says Brown, "We had 135 volunteers, which is more than in any other town in Manitoba. # Larry 'Razor' Sharpe captures title

The fight was Sharpe's last local fight and it decided who is the best middleweight in Canada right now.

The first round of the fight Sharpe was using an effective stick and move technique. Sharpe would feed heavy punches and kicks to the shorter Bourgeois from a distance and then avoid his opponents' attacks. When Bourgeois managed to get in on Sharpe, Razor would grab Bourgeois and deliver some big knees to the body and head. But Bourgeois kept moving forward as if nothing phased him.

In the second round Bourgeois began to open up a bit more but Sharpe managed to move and counter most of Bourgeois' attack. Sharpe then began to land more combinations towards the end of the second round. Bourgeois, however was still moving forward pursuing Sharpe.

When the third round began Bourgeois came out hard but was met with some big knees to the body, which seemed to finally slow him down. Sharpe began to open up his attack even more and was landing some hard kicks to his opponents' thighs. The heavy strikes Bourgeois received in the first two and a half rounds were starting to take effect. Sharpe delivered a hard kick to the inside of Bourgeois' leg which made Bourgeois drop his hands. Sharpe followed up with a kick punch combo to the face that put Bourgeois in trouble. Sharpe continue his attack until the ref stepped in to give Bourgeois a standing eight

count. But Bourgeois was still shaken up, he literally asked Sharpe not to hit him anymore, but the ref didn't step in. Sharpe continued to hit Bourgeois who seemed defenseless at this point in the fight. The bell rang to save Bourgeois who would not come out for the fourth round. Sharpe was awarded the ISKA Supermiddleweight Pro Canadian Title in front of about 150 fans from Pine Falls who came in to see the fight.

John Simard fought well early in the night as well. He fought an even fight against an American fighter from the World famous Duke Roufus Gym. John loss a close decision, which could have went either way. Many fans believed that John deserved the decision but was robbed.

Bob "The Fighting Frenchman" Vincent took on Jon Jon Ferrier, who has many more fights and much more experience than Bob. However, Bob pressured his opponent the entire first round and continued his attack in the second round. Ferrier the more experienced athlete capitalized on a mistake: as Bob dropped his hands Ferrier delivered a well placed hook that sent Bob to the canvas. Bob would be stopped in the second round.

A big thank you to all the fans that came out to support the fighters from Pine Falls. A special thanks to Neil Boulette, who held pads day and night for Sharpe getting him ready for this fight; despite having torn muscles in his chest and back.

# WEST NILE VIRUS



West Nile virus is carried by mosquitoes. It affects people, animals and birds. Most people will never get sick from it although in rare cases, it can cause serious illness.

**You can do your part to protect against West Nile virus in Manitoba. Here's how:**

**Reduce standing water**  
Mosquitoes need water to breed. Take steps to reduce mosquitoes by looking for standing water in and around your yard. Then empty it, cover it or remove it.

- Ensure pool covers, saucers under flowerpots, pet bowls, children's toys and wading pools are regularly emptied of standing water.
- Clean eaves troughs regularly so water does not collect.
- Empty and clean bird baths twice weekly.
- Ensure that openings in rain barrels are covered with mosquito screening or tightly sealed around the downspout.
- Aerate ornamental ponds and/or stock them with fish that eat mosquito larvae.
- Ensure that your yard is free of debris, such as old tires, that catch and hold rainwater.

**Report dead crows and jays**  
Crows, and other birds in the crow family, are particularly susceptible to West Nile and act as an early warning sign of the virus.

You can help detect West Nile virus in your area by reporting dead birds from the crow family to Health Links at 788-8200 in Winnipeg (toll-free 1-888-315-9257).

Please report only the following kinds of birds:

- crows
- magpies
- blue jays
- gray jays
- ravens

Health Links will provide information on dead bird pick-up or disposal. Remember, never touch any dead bird or animal with your bare hands.

**Take steps to reduce mosquito bites**  
Wear long sleeves and long pants, use mosquito repellent and limit the time you spend outside at dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active. For more information, visit our Web site:

## What to Do if Your Child Gets a Sunburn

A sunburn can sneak up on your child, especially after a long day at the beach or park. Often, kids seem fine during the day but then gradually develop an "afterburn" later that evening that can be painful and hot and can even make them feel sick. The best way to take care of your child is to treat the symptoms and prevent further problems.

### Sunburned Skin

When children get sunburned, they usually experience pain and a sensation of heat, symptoms that tend to become more severe several hours after sun exposure. Some children also develop chills. Because the sun has dried their skin, it can become itchy and tight. Burned skin typically begins to peel about

a week after the sunburn. Encourage your child not to scratch or peel off loose skin because skin underneath the sunburn is vulnerable to infection. The following tips will help you keep your child comfortable if he has a sunburn.

To help alleviate pain and heat, have your child take a cool (not cold) bath, or gently apply cool, wet compresses to the skin.

Pure aloe vera gel (available in most pharmacies or taken directly from the within the leaves of the plant) is excellent for relieving sunburn pain and helping skin heal quicker.

To rehydrate the skin and help reduce swelling, apply topical moisturizing cream 1% hydrocortisone cream can be applied thinly to the most

severely burned areas.

Do not use petroleum-based products (like Vaseline) because they prevent excess heat and sweat from escaping.

Avoid first-aid products that contain benzocaine, which may cause skin irritation or allergy.

If your child has a sunburn, keep him in the shade until it's healed. Any additional sun exposure will only increase the

severity of the burn and increase pain.

If the sunburn is severe and blisters develop, call your doctor. Until you can see your child's doctor, tell your child not to scratch, pop, or squeeze the blisters, which can become easily infected and result in scarring.

### Heat-related illnesses

Heat-related illnesses such as heat syncope (fainting from heat), heat exhaustion, and heat stroke are far more serious than a sunburn. These conditions occur when kids become very overheated and dehydrated, and in many cases, they are accompanied by sunburn. Contact your child's doctor if your child has an unexplained fever higher than 102



degrees Fahrenheit or 38.9 degrees Celsius, the skin looks infected, or he has trouble looking at light. (This may indicate a sunburn of the eye's cornea.) If your child has nausea, vomiting, fainting, delirium, or diarrhea, contact your child's doctor for immediate assistance.

# Pine Falls - The Beginning

The history of Pine Falls goes back a lot longer than seventy-five years. The falls themselves were created about

ten thousand years ago - after the last ice age - when Lake Agassiz drained into Hudson's Bay, but it is the foundation of the newsprint mill and the town site that were are celebrating this week

Building a papermill on the Winnipeg River was the brainchild of railroad builder and entrepreneur J. D. McArthur who obtained cutting rights on land north of the river in 1921.

In the year 1921, J.D. McArthur, a successful contractor, became interested in establishing a paper mill in Manitoba instead of continuing to supply wood to paper mills in Ontario and the United

states. He secured a timber concession on lands lying North of the Winnipeg River, a lease to a portion of the Fort Alexander Indian Reserve, which is now known as Sagleong First Nations, and founded the present mill site of Pine Falls. Eventually the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Company took over his holding, and purchased the land outright.

Arrangements were made with the Canadian National Railway to run a 19 mile Branch line from Beaconsia. In spite of six miles of open muskeg, with ten feet of peat and moss overlying the clay

soil, the railway was through to Pine Falls early in 1926. By July 1900 men were employed, and the mill walls were rising from a basement that had been blasted out of solid granite.

The first paper was turned out in January, 1927, and a grand Ball was held in the Finishing Room to mark the occasion. The mill itself cost two million dollars to build and began operation with one paper machine in January 1927, producing about 90 tons per day. A second paper machine was put into service in the following June. The two machines were designed to operate at 1,200 feet per minute but began operating at 900 feet per minute. The same machines are now operating at more than

2,700 feet per minute. Today a new mill would probably cost close to a billion dollars.

Abitibi took over the mill in May 1928. By that September the Paper Machine Crew were being congratulated for their production of 212.7 tons of paper daily. Today the Pine Falls mill produces over 500 tons daily and is continuing to expand and plan for future growth.

In 1925 the only access to Pine Falls was by boat, either via Lake Winnipeg or via the CPR to Great Falls. The first crew, including a Duncan McDonald, with two teams of horses arrived by boat in September 1925 and began clearing the land and setting up a

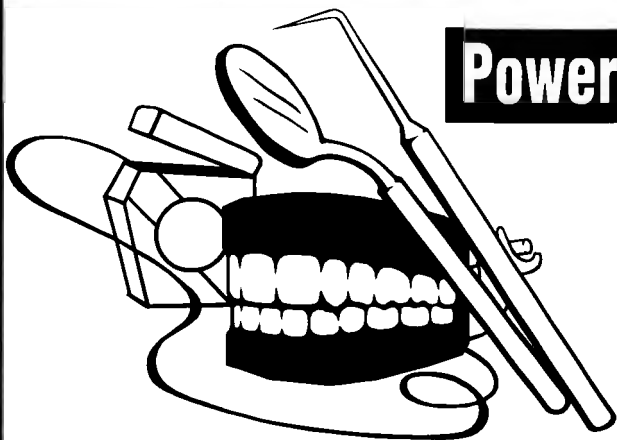

campsite. That winter Canadian National built a spur to Pine Falls from Beaconia on the rail line to Victoria Beach. It reached the mill site in the early spring of 1926. Part of that line was over open, frozen muskeg. Anne Cavers, writing in *From the Beaches to the Falls* wrote; "When the frost went out of the newly laid grade, the rail line heaved, warped and settled, but somehow, some way, it was kept in operation and supplies never failed."

In 1926 a two-room school opened with 100 students. Laura Douglas taught 50 students Grades 1, 2, and 3. The Principal, Harold Greenway

taught another 50 students grades 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. The hospital was moved from a shack on the campsite to a new duplex on Tamarac. Dr Landsdown and an orderly were the staff. The building burned down in 1927 and the hospital was moved to 29 Birch. There were two nurses, Antoinette Viau and Annete Dansereau. They worked twelve hour shifts and their duties included keeping the hospital clean. Later Dr. Bisset became the company doctor. He was assisted by Dr. Landsdown.

The Pine Falls Curling Club was formed in November 1927, with the following officers for that season; Jack

Small/President, Jim Lyon/Vice-President, Barney Campbell/Secretary-Treasurer and Executive: Bill Brown, George Wilson, Buck Hay, Don McCulloch and Dave Pepard.

The season opened with one sheet of ice in an old construction bunkhouse. Dr. E. D. R. Bisset presented the club with a trophy which was known as the "Bisset Trophy" and given for grand aggregate and club champion. The J.L. Anderson Rink won this trophy the first year. This rink was composed

of J.L. Anderson, Jack MacDonald, Jack Zeemal and Slim Hoogenson. A second sheet of ice was put in for the 1928-1928 season, and a third for the 1929-1930 season.

From 1937 to 1947 there was not much interest taken in curling in Pine Falls although the club continued to function, but it was not until the 1947-1948 season that curling started to come back to its own, with fifteen rinks.

The 1948-1949 season opened with twenty four rinks and this season saw the begin-

ning of the Open Papertown Bonspiel with thirty one rinks participating it was deemed a real success.

When the Recreation Centre burned down in June 1966, curling along with all other winter activities were not in existence, however, with the opening of the new Recreation centre in the winter of 1967 there was now five sheets of ice to play on and this encouraged many more new players to the great game of curling. Curling is still an active sport in the community.

# Pine Falls - The Pre War Years

Within a year and a half of the mill going into production, in 1927 the tennis courts were in use, a floating, a fenced off swimming pool in the Winnipeg River was proving very popular, and the school was expanded. A fire brigade under Police Chief Fred Mastin was formed. In the same year Charlie Young set up a Chinese restaurant and Laundry in the same location as the current Fine Chinese Cuisine and Sonnys Chicken House.

In 1928 Abitibi purchased the mill from the Spanish River Pulp and paper Company, and a new hospital was completed.

By 1929 production at the mill was averaging 260 tons per day. There was a gravel road to St Georges and a

courderoy road to Great Falls. By August the following year the road to Great Falls was finished. In 1931 the road to Lac du Bonnet was completed, School enrolment had reached 150, and the golf club had 125 members. Boy Scouts and Girl Guides had been organized.

The stock market crash of 1929 and subsequent recession final caught up with Pine Falls in 1931. Abitibi closed their Pine Falls mill but kept Ontario's mill operating. Some employees were able to get some work in other mills. Some men left their families in Pine Falls and left town to seek work elsewhere. Some went on relief. Others subsisted on hunting trapping and fishing. There was occasional maintenance work in the mill and Abitibi charged

only nominal rents to Pine Falls residents. The School, Hospital and the company store, the Mercantile Store, in Pine Plaza continued to operate.

Times were hard. The golf course was maintained by members working off green fees. In an emergency credit could be obtained at the mercantile store. Abitibi would provide the odd days work at the mill so the debt could be paid off. Local musicians played free at local dances. Coffee and sugar were provided by nurses and teachers who were the only people with jobs.

The slow recovery from the recession resulted in Abitibi re-opening the Pine Falls mill with one paper machine in July 1935. The second machine went in production a few months later.

During 1937 to 38, the mill's water

treatment plant was expanded and began supplying water to what is now Powerview. The Fort Alexander Indian Hospital was built and The Chateau opened, giving the community a movie theatre, dance hall and bowling alley. 1937 also saw the dedication of the Anglican Church of the Advent. Until that time Anglicans in Pine Falls had been an offshoot of the Fort Alexander Christchurch. The first Church of the Advent service was conducted by Canon W. J. Walter of Christchurch.

During the war Drs Landsdown and Bisset served in the Canadian armed forces and the entire area, from Lac du Bonnet to the Beaches was looked after by a Dr. Reid from Lac du Bonnet. German prisoners of war worked in the logging camps from 1944 to 1946.

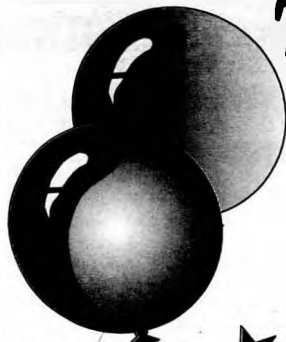

## Activity guidelines for infants and toddlers

### Infants

- Help your child explore his/her surrounding.

- Get your child moving and using his/her leg and arm muscles through activities like rolling over, standing, and walking.

- Don't restrict movement for long periods.

- Make sure play areas and safe for crawling and exploring.

- Inform caregivers of the importance of physical activity for your child.

### Toddlers

- Encourage your toddler to be physically active.

- Help your toddler to accumulate at least 30 minutes of structured or planned physical activity daily.

- Encourage your toddler to be active throughout the day, accumulating at least 60 minutes (and ideally more) of unstructured movement through plan and routine activities.

- Help your child minimize sedentary activities like television watching. Toddlers shouldn't be sedentary for more than one hour at a time unless they are sleeping.

- Make sure play areas are safe.

- Inform caregivers of the importance of physical activity for your child. Skills learned at this age are building blocks for more complex movement.

# Pine Falls - The Post War Generation

After the war, with young men returning from Europe, Pine Falls experienced a housing boom as they began starting families delayed by the war. In keeping with the growing community the town got civic addresses. The original block and lot numbers were replaced by numbers and streets named after tree species. By 1948 mill production was up to 345 tons per day. In that same year the ground floor of the Legion Hall was completed (It is now Empower School), and The Founda-

tion Company of Canada began construction of the Pine Falls Generating and the Manitou Lodge was built.

In 1947 Abitibi sold the Mercantile store to the Hudson's Bay Company. They moved across the street to the present location of the Northern Store in 1949.

The post war increased rate of activity continued into 1950 when a \$80,000 recreation centre was built. More than 7,000 man hours of volunteer labour were put in by more than

300 workers. Daylight Saving was extended by three weeks to help with the completion. (At that time the company decided when to implement daylight saving. Usually it was at the same day as everyone else but at a time to accommodate a shift change.). The centre had four sheets of curling ice and a skating rink. That year mill production reached 370 tons per day.

The Legion Hall was completed in 1951, and the Pine Falls Generating Station began producing power. The dam was completed in 1952. In June 1955 mill production broke through the 400 ton per day mark with a record production of 403.9. The event was celebrated with a dinner and dance in the Arena.

In 1964 the hospital was completely renovated and integrated with the Indian Hospital. It was officially opened as the Pine Falls General Hospital in January 1965.

The last log drive on the Winnipeg River took place in 1965.

On June 1, 1966 fire broke out in the wood built recreation centre. It proved impossible to save and was reduced to ashes within an hour. The major fire fighting effort was focused on protecting the homes across the street from the intense heat of the blaze. The centre was rebuilt, of steel construction, with five sheets of curling ice the following year.

# Winnipeg River RCMP Report



Police report for the period of July 20th to July 25, 2002

**Saturday July 20th:** In the early morning hours, Police responded to a complaint at a residence on Sagkeeng of person banging on doors and yelling to come in. Police were unable to locate this individual.

Police responded to a call of break and enter in progress to a garage on Billy Goat Drive in Traverse Bay and matter is still under investigation.

Police responded to a complaint of theft of gas from Pine Falls Shell. Vehicle was located in the Little Black River Community, attempts were made to stop the vehicle by way of spike belt but the driver avoided it and proceeded south on PR #304. # Lac du Bonnet RCMP report

**When to turn up the heat**

If you are wondering about heat therapy, read on. Traditionally heat was applied to an injury soon after icing it, but this may stimulate blood flow, thus increasing inflammation.

New evidence now suggests that cold therapy be continued every two hours for at least 48 hours after an injury, and heat to be applied only after the swelling has subsided. It is at this point that the healing effect of heat becomes evident

as the increase in blood flow helps remove waste products. Other benefits of heat are pain relief, relaxed muscles, and reduced joint stiffness. If applied five to ten minutes before exercise, muscle soreness may be prevented. Hot packs can also help relieve the ache of chronic, dull pain. Treatment time last for 20 to 30 minutes, two to three times a day or as often as necessary.

There are many types of hot packs available, but there are dangers associated with them. You must have normal skin

sensation to determine if the pack is overheating. I have seen burns that were caused by heating pads and microwave gel packs - both are prone to having hot spots. Heat should not be applied to any infected area.

Hot packs can be a therapeutic, relaxing treatment, but make sure they're warm, not hot.

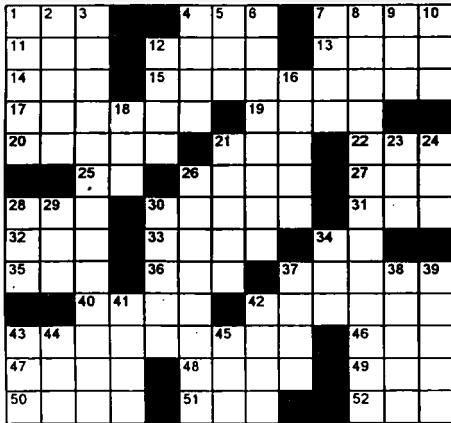

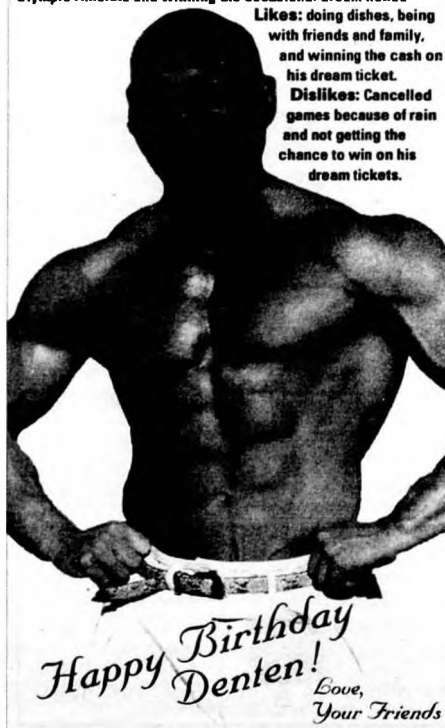


