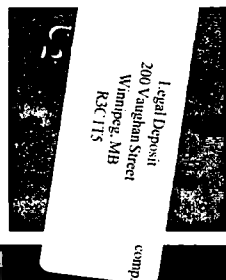
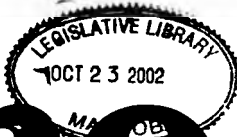

9th annual Pine Falls International Walleye Classic

This past weekend the St. Georges Voyageurs held their 9th annual fishing tournament. One hundred and ten boats entered and the tournament was filled to capacity.

Winner's of this years tournament was team #41 Robert Scott and Gerald Bilyk. On day one their catch weighed in at 10.39 and day two's catch was 19.25 for a total weigh in of 29.64. They caught 7 fish in total and received \$10,000 cash for first place, they also received two Lund jackets for the highest finishing Lund Boat. "The fishing was good, and the tournament was excellent, we will definitely be back next year" said the winners upon receiving their cheque.

The winner's of the mixed

team entry was team #89, Bob and Pauline Vincent. They had five fish weighed in for a total weight of 21.58, they won the mixed team highest weight and placed fifth overall. They received \$1,100 cash for fifth spot and a 12 ft. Lund Boat for mixed team highest weight. Other winners were team # 52 Dan Stier and Brian Ney they came in second and their total weight was 27.06 and that netted them a \$4,000 cash prize. Third place winners were team #54 John Guzet and Geo Gurtin with a total weigh in of 26.77, they won \$2,500 in cash. Forth place went to Wayne Wagner and Alex Keszler for their total weigh in of 24.83 and they received

Accident claims Lac du Bonnet man's life

The Lac du Bonnet RCMP are investigating a two vehicle accident on Provincial Road 313 and the junction of Provincial Road 433 in the Rural Municipality of Lac du Bonnet. The accident occurred shortly before 4:00 p.m. on Saturday the 12th of October. A compact van was attempting to turn onto P.R. 433 from P.R. 313 the van turned into oncoming traffic and was struck by a full sized pickup truck. The driver of the van surcummed to his injuries, while his passenger was in critical condition. As of Monday, October 14, her condition was upgraded to stable.

Occupants of the pickup only suffered minor injuries. Deceased is 63 year old Lac du Bonnet resident James Thorsteinson. Charges have not been considered at this point but the matter is still under investigation.

Sagkeeng First Nation Shoreline stabilization project

Sagkeeng has received another \$300,000 for its ongoing riverbank stabilization program

The Sagkeeng First Nation Shoreline Stabilization Project began in 1992 with preliminary field investigations and proposed methods to control the extreme shoreline erosion. As a result of this erosion, it has been estimated that approximately 356 hectares (879 acres) of land has been lost from the Fort Alexander Indian Reserve

since it was first surveyed in 1874. Sagkeeng First Nation also expressed concerns about a number of other shoreline problems that include riverbank instability, accessibility to the river or lake, aesthetics, and safety issues.

With the help of Manitoba Hydro (MH), a remedial works plan was developed and included sloping the riverbanks and placing a rock berm (rip-rap) along the erod-

ing shoreline. In 1995, MH financed the first rip-rap protected shoreline consisting of 5,000 tonnes of rock and was located on the Winnipeg River north's shore near the mouth of Lake Winnipeg. This first section of shoreline protection proved to be a success and in the following years work has and is currently being performed on both the north and south shores of the Winnipeg River.

Bears are wild animals and must be treated that way

Dear Editor:

Further to the issue of bears becoming a nuisance and a potential threat to human life and property in the Pine Falls and Powerview areas, I would like to discuss why we have the occurrences in our areas and possible solutions that are available.

We all enjoy the pristine area that we live in, the beauty of the forests surrounding our communities and living next to the river. The only problem is that we do live in prime bear habitat and bears do live in and adjacent to our lovely communities.

It is common knowledge that bears are very much a problem animal in the communities of Pine Falls and Powerview. One of the main reasons that bears come into the community is due to attractants. Bears have a very acute sense of smell and can smell food from many kilometers away.

The best way to deter bears from entering our communi-

ties and putting citizens at risk is to remove any and all attractants. Attractants may include garbage, rotting fruit, used restaurant grease, bird feeders, pet food, fish guts, etc. Bears are attracted to the smell of things. The smell of any item that may provide the bear with energy to survive the winter will be sought out. I'm sure that many people have heard the phrase "a fed bear is a dead bear". What this means is that a bear has a very opportunistic feeding behaviour. Once a bear is dependant of human related foods, he will no longer feel the need to gather food for himself will begin to demonstrate nuisance activities and will take the easy way out and root through garbage bins in order to find an easy meal. Once the attractant is removed and the bear is no longer rewarded with an easy meal, he no longer has any reason to return to the area.

Bears are creatures of habit. It is commonly known that cubs may return to an area that

is rich in food that their mother had showed them years before. Many years of translocation studies (trapping bears in problem areas, radio collaring them to track their movement habits and moving them up to 300 km away) in different areas of the province and country have indicated that the relocation of adult bears is only an interim solution and many will return to the location if not the exact site they were trapped before. Bears can find their way back to an area after being flown over 300 kilometers to another location and, in record time.

Once a bear has been habituated, there is little to no chance of that bear actually surviving in the wilderness alone with out needing to find the easy meal. Once this happens, this bear becomes a problem bear and must be destroyed for his own safety and the safety of others.

We must remember that even though the bears are in the community, they are still wild animals and must be treated that way.

Shoreline stabilization project

Since the project's inception, Manitoba Hydro has provided financial support and has recently supplied quarried rock as an in-kind contribution. Funding has also been provided by Indian and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC). The successful operation of the stabilization project has also initiated contracts with the Manitoba Department of Transportation and Government Services to protect severely affected areas along PTH 11. To date thanks to the involvement of all parties, approximately 84,000 tonnes of rock has been placed along 4.3

km of shoreline. It is estimated that of the 33 km of shoreline bordering the Winnipeg River, 22.6 km needs to be stabilized, required 201,900 m³ (359,382 tonnes) of rip-rap.

In addition to protecting the shoreline, the project has provided employment for over 20 residents during the past 5 years in the form of labour, equipment rentals, operators, and community liaisons. The project has also provided job training in areas such as project/construction management, surveying, construction labour, and the operation of heavy equipment. Local contractors have also used the stabilization project as a build-

ing block to make contacts and seek similar work outside of the community thus building the capacity of the people.

With each passing year, the Sagkeeng First Nation Shoreline Stabilization Project continues to increase production. The resulting positive effects include riverbank stability, beautification of the river, improved fish habitats, and a safer environment along the shore of the Winnipeg River. Continued support for the project from Sagkeeng First Nation, INAC, Manitoba Hydro and the Department of Highways will ensure all parties experience the project benefits well into the future.

This year had an all time record of mixed teams entered, there were 18 teams that registered. Next year the Voyageurs will be hosting their 10th Annual Pine Falls Walleye Classic. Hat off to all 35 volunteer's who worked so hard to make this once again a great tournament.

Election 2002

Mayor of Powerview

Three candidates are contesting the election for the Mayor of Powerview, in alphabetical order; Ian Cyr, Henry Ostrowski, (the incumbent) and Gord Watson, currently serving as a Powerview Councillor.



Ian Cyr

Ian Cyr sees the major issue facing the next Powerview Council is the amalgamation with Pine Falls. He says a deal can be made that would benefit everybody - and probably reduce taxes in both Powerview and Pine Falls at the same time.

Once that has been accomplished he sees the next task to be working with the RM of Alexander on the establishing of an industrial park on a joint revenue and cost-sharing basis. He says serviced lots in an industrial park would make it possible to attract commercial and industrial enterprises to the area and thus create jobs for young people who are currently forced to leave town to find work.

Cyr says there is a need for more developed land in Powerview, and that land is available South of the Village at the end of Art Street. He sees this as a priority.

He says the Council needs to deal with ratepayers in a more professional manner. The council has not dealt with complaints properly, and a lot of small things have not been done properly.

Cyr said he was asked to run by several people but did not realize how much support he had until he announced he began campaigning.

Henry Ostrowski

Henry Ostrowski has been Mayor of Powerview for ten years. He blames Tembec for the slow progress towards amalgamation with Pine Falls and sees the Pine Falls Advisory Council as a major impediment to the joining of the two communities under one municipal government. He says he is willing to look at the possibility of one municipality from Pine Falls to Great Falls but insists that the first step is the amalgamation of Pine Falls and Powerview.

Ostrowski is running on his record. During his term Powerview has carried out extensive infrastructure works including street paving, and replacing and installing sewer and water mains. The Village has annexed RM land between Powerview and Pine Falls and the land from the old boundary to highway 304 and provided sewer and water services to the taxpayers in that area, and to prepare the way for economic development.

The municipality has expanded the village office and built a community park on Highway 11. In conjunction with the RM of Alexander and Pine Falls a Recreational Director has been hired. New equipment has been purchased and the Village has negotiated its first union contract. By extending the village boundary, and promoting residential development, between 3.5 and 4.0 million dollars in revenue generating assessments has been realized.

Gord Watson

Gord Watson is looking for increased economic development and the amalgamation of Powerview and Pine Falls "in the best interests of the people of the area".

He says the community has great-untapped potential and he would like to be a part of the team that will help to "secure our future as a vibrant, growing and economically viable community." He said he believes "it is time to move forward in our thinking and actions."

Watson is proud of his record on council. He has served as a councillor for eight years, has attended over 150 meetings with an attendance record of 92%, and served as Deputy Chair on the Planning District.

He is the co-founder of the local chapter of Duck's Unlimited and has served on the executive for ten years. He has coached for many years in minor hockey, ringette and senior hockey, bring several provincial titles to the community.

He said he would be honoured to represent the residents of Powerview and looks forward to the opportunity.

Reeve of the RM of Lac du Bonnet

Two people are campaigning for the job of Reeve of the RM of Lac du Bonnet; Dorothy Boznianin, the incumbent, is being challenged by Councillor Donald Halbert.

Dorothy Boznianin

Dorothy Boznianin has served three terms on the RM council - two as Councillor and one as Reeve.

She says the major issues are drainage and garbage disposal. She says she has worked closely with the North East Agassiz Management Association to look at setting up retention areas to slow down the rate of runoff in the spring. A holding basin in Reynolds has been proposed. Boznianin said she has been lobbying the province to carry more of the load.

She said the RM has been working with a coop of local municipal governments on setting up an East Interlake Gasifier plant to produce energy from garbage rather than dumping it in landfill.

Boznianin said of the controversy over derelict vehicles that there will be minor changes in the by-law and that the whole issue had been grossly misrepresented.

She said school costs are uncontrollable and the RM has been lobbying hard for the provincial government to remove school taxes from property.

She says she believes she has been approachable and caring, and fiscally responsible. She says she has worked hard to keep the mill rate as low as possible.



Donald Halbert

Donald Halbert has served on council for four years. He says there are a variety of issues at stake in this election - the major one being lack of planning.

He said he has been on the council for four years and "I don't see the big picture - because we haven't painted it." He said the RM needs a four or five-year strategic plan.

"We need to charter a course for ourselves and share it with the ratepayer. It is far simpler to finance if we know what the plans are for the future." He said the council has been too reactive and not proactive enough.

Halbert said there are conflicting needs within the community and there needs to be a balance between the interests of all parties concerned.

"We need to know where we are today, and where we want to be tomorrow and how we're going to get there." He said. "And the public needs to be privy to the discussion."

Election 2002 RM of Alexander

There are two candidates for Reeve of the RM of Alexander - Doug Neal and the incumbent, George Harbottle.



Doug Neal

Doug Neal served on the RM council for one three year term, from 1995 to 1998. He is challenging George Harbottle because he doesn't like "the secrecy that appears to be going on."

"I don't like the way they went about doing the Grand Beach Entertainment thing." He said it was all secret until most of the work was done. "If you're going to do something, do it out in the open." He said. He wants to see a people orientated council rather than a company orientated council.

He said the council is not

lobbying hard enough to get rid of school taxes altogether. "It benefits everybody." He said.

Neal also asked where the 911 system was. He said the civic addressing system, needed to make a 911 system possible, had been in place for years, but "still no 911."



George Harbottle

George Harbottle said he feels the council has provided good government over the last four years.

On the issue Tembec's desire to get out of municipal government he said the amalgamation of Powerview and Pine Falls is the first option. "Then we have to work with them - it's going nowhere now. Powerview has stated their position and will not move."

He said that, failing an agreement between Tembec and Powerview a Local Improvement district within the RM is an option. They would have their own budget and capital program, and would have a representative on the RM council.

Harbottle said the major need throughout the whole

community is to work together to promote social and economic development.

Asked about Doug Neal's suggestion of secrecy and delay in implanting the 911 program he said "Doug has never asked us for any information." "He said the delay was not the result of the RM but is a provincial problem."

CAT sticker deters auto thieves

The Combat Auto Theft (CAT) program is a highly effective option against auto theft, according to statistics released today by Manitoba Public Insurance.

Of 1,300 stolen recovered vehicles examined over the last three months at Manitoba Public Insurance facilities, only four vehicles had CAT stickers.

"From these statistics, it's clear that the CAT sticker works to deter auto thieves," said Marci Mattern, Auto Crime Issue Specialist with Manitoba Public Insurance. "The CAT decal is another

option for people to consider when protecting their vehicles against thieves."

Convicted auto thieves have also said as much in a juvenile auto theft report recently released by Manitoba Public Insurance. Of 43 incarcerated youths interviewed for the study, more than half said they do not steal vehicles with a CAT sticker for fear of being pulled over by police.

Now in its 11th year, the CAT program is administered by Manitoba Public Insurance, in partnership with the RCMP, Winnipeg Police Service and other provincial police agencies.

"CAT is a simple and straightforward way of helping reduce the chances of your vehicle being stolen," said Mattern. "Motorists can simply pick up a CAT registration form from Autopac brokers, Manitoba Public Insurance Claims Centres or police stations."

If police observe a vehicle

displaying a CAT decal on the road between the hours of 1 a.m. to 5 a.m., it can be pulled over and checked.

To date, nearly 40,000 Manitobans have registered with the CAT program, said Mattern.

The MPI juvenile auto theft study reported that the most effective deterrent to auto theft is a passive immobilizer, an after market system which disables several key vehicle systems - such as the ignition, starter and fuel systems — if someone attempts to start it without the proper key.

Manitoba Public Insurance strongly encourages the use of immobilizers. Last year, as part of its continuing battle against auto theft, MPI began offering a discount for motorists who equip their vehicles with an aftermarket immobilizer device approved by the former Vehicle Information Centre of Canada (now part of the Insurance Bureau of Canada).

"The Nightmare"

As I walked down the burned out city, I saw people still standing in the same position as they were when it hit, like it was paused. I wondered how I had survived. It was a perfect morning. The sun was shining bright, very little clouds in the sky, people getting ready for another day, students getting on the busses. People were walking their

dogs just like every other day. I was getting ready to go to work too. I was taking my dog for a walk and suddenly heard planes overhead. You could hear whistling as objects fell to the ground. People started screaming, yelling and running, running nowhere. I stood real still waiting to see what was happening. When the first set of bombs hit, I realized that it was happening. I waited so long for this moment to end that at first it came as a surprise to me. People were running all over, everywhere. They didn't even try to protect themselves. More bombs fell

to the ground, different types of explosions happening 360 degrees around me. I seemed to be in the middle of it all. Bombs that exploded on the ground spit out napalm and shrapnel! The people that got hit were running nowhere, burning and bleeding from the glue-like fuel that stuck to their skins, with deep gashes all over their bodies, ripped open by sharp metal fragments. There were a lot of people, suffering and screaming in agony, crawling on the ground, dragging their limp, bloody and burnt bodies. There were some people who didn't get injured by the blasts. They just stood there, lost, blank minds. There were people that tried to help others, but couldn't help themselves and ended up dying.

Then another huge plane flew over. It released one of the

biggest bombs I had ever seen. The massive flash burned my eyes, stunned my brain and stopped my heart. I came to and ran for shelter. I found the deep cavern hidden in the sewer. I made it to shelter and passed out. Two days later, I came to wondering where I was. I found my way out of the sewer and saw hell. The sky was brown, yellow and it was windy. The awful smell of death, burnt people lying on the ground, eyes and guts spouting out just like overheated pizza pops. People had turned to dust from the blast. People had survived but were suffering with horrible wounds you could never imagine. Screams could still be heard in the distance. I walked around looking for people that were all right. I couldn't find any. Everybody seemed to be dead. I thought I was in hell for all the stuff I did.

Pap Smear Awareness week is October 20-26, 2002. To encourage a greater number of women to attend screening, the North Eastman Health Association in collaboration with the Manitoba Cervical Cancer Screening Program will be offering Pap Smear Screening

Clinics in the communities of Lac du Bonnet and Beausejour. Women who have not had a Pap Smear within the last two years or longer are encouraged to attend. Female practitioners will be available to perform Pap Smears during the following clinics:

Lac du Bonnet Health Centre - Thursday, October 24, 2002, 1:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.

Beausejour Primary Health Care Centre - Sat. October 26,

2002, 10:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.

These clinics will be open to all women of the North Eastman Region.

A Pap Smear is a simple test where a sample of cells is taken from your cervix by your doctor of specially trained nurse and examined under a microscope. In most cases, the cells

will be abnormal.

These abnormal cells, called cervical dysplasia, are not cancer. In most cases, they will never become cancer. But, if left untreated, these cells could grow and over time, become cancerous. A Pap smear will detect cervical dysplasia and alert your health provider BEFORE this has a

chance to happen. A regular Pap smear can greatly reduce your risk of cervical cancer.

Women are at increased risk for cervical cancer if:

They have never had a Pap smear or have not had one in over 5 years. This is the #1 risk factor for advanced cervical cancer.

They have human papilloma virus (HPV). Several types of this common, sexually transmitted virus have been linked to cervical cancer. Chances of getting HPV increase with the number of sexual partners a woman or her partner has had. Over 80% of women will come into contact with HPV in their lifetime.

They smoke or have ever smoked. Chemicals produced by smoking may cause cervical cells.

They have HIV. HIV infection puts women at increased risk.

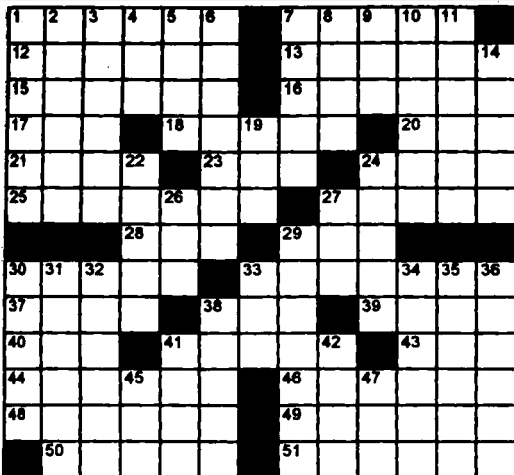

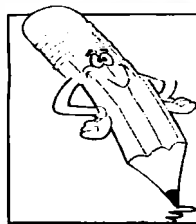

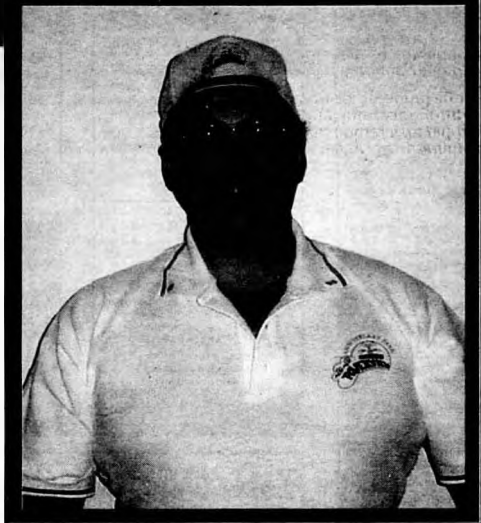
