## Everyone Ready! Sports Day, Saturday, August 1st

EVERYONE is looking forward to Sports Day, which is Saturday, August 1. Children's sports will be run off in the morning, commencing at 10.30 o'clock, on the sands of Patricia Beach, and there will be prizes for castle-building with the sand, and for those having the best coat of tan, in various classes. Free ice cream cones will be given out at the close.

In the afternoon there will be swimming and diving competitions at the pier, starting at 3.30 o'clock.

The Winnipeg Canoe Club will provide a programme of exhibition races in canoes, and this year the champion lady paddlers will be down. The swimming races among the youngsters promise to be keenly fought out.

Entries can be made at the pier or at the Company's office, but all participants must be summer residents of Victoria Beach.

The final event on the programme is the war-canoe race between the Victoria Beach crew and the Winnipeg Canoe Club paddlers, champions of Canada.

## A Ruling in Pyjamas-Wearing at the Club-House

At the last meeting of the executive of the Victoria Beach Club, the question of allowing the wearers of pyjamas on the floor at the Saturday night dances in the club-house was brought up, and the action of the house committee in not allowing it in the past was endorsed as the future policy. On other week nights the rule will be lifted.

Many were willing to concede considerable liberty to the dancers, but had to draw the line somewhere, and there it is.

Financially, it is a loss to the club, as many of the young people decline to come to the club-house Saturdays unless they are allowed to wear the new tops of this season. The editor of the "Herald" has received the following letter on the situation which speaks for itself, and may encourage others to write on the subject:

Editor of the Victoria Beach Herald:  
Some of us girls have been talking about what we ought to wear at the Saturday night dances at the Community club-house, for even at Victoria Beach one must wear something, though one of the girls who takes German at the "U" and has been reading about some new kind of club in Germany, where they wear (or rather don't wear)...but none of the girls would stand for that kind of "kultar" with a "K".

Another of the girls says she is going to be a "New Woman," but she can hardly do that without reminding us of the first woman before the spring leaves were on the fig trees; so we ruled her out. But the rest of us are just girls out for a good time, and are rather worried, for there are two questions to be answered: What does the club committee think about it? And, again what do the boys think about it?

Of course, it's the boys after all who really matter. But we've been told the club president, in spite of appearance, is really an old, old man, and anyone in his second childhood should be sympathetic to us girls in our first; and we hate to shock his Victorian prejudices by being too modern. But the first vice-president is a youth; at least, he looks youthful; and the second vice-president is a woman, whom we know has a woman's kindness of heart. That should help us girls.

Another of the girls, first year Arts at the "U," started the question: whether pyjamas, like the latest movie type; then she quoted Shakespeare again, see Henry V, Act 1, scene 3, "Once more into the breach, dear friends." There, again, you have the white ducks so many of us are wearing; so you see we have Shakespeare on our side. But "revengeous e nos moustous" (first year French) we

are quite prepared to let the old folks slide; but, if we cannot carry the boys with us, we're "sunk"; these nautical phrases come from the sailors' ducks; and there is a real association of ideas, for some of the boys are really ducks, and if we don't please them, why, we girls are going to find ourselves wallflowers. A game consists of 18 holes, which must be played continuously. That is, you cannot play one nine holes in the morning, and one later, or pick out the best of several games.

Cards should be turned in to either Stephen Drew, at the golf club-house, or to the professional, A. E. Potts. Prizes will be given to the best score for children, ladies and men, and also for a hidden hole for each class.

To avoid the possibility of the hidden hole being known in advance, it will be drawn for after the games have been all played.

Prizes donated by the Victoria Beach Company, Ltd., will consist of two golf balls for each award.

Providing the children with "cones" costs around \$30.00. Prizes cost about \$50.00, not to mention the many prizes donated; printing costs \$25.00, and the erection of the starting platform and the work at the pier costs considerable. **COST OF 1930 SPORTS DAY**

Printing account, 600 ice cream cone tickets, \$2.52; 12 cardboard posters, \$6.57; 500 dog tickets, \$3.02; 50 silk badges, \$5.05; 1,000 programs, \$5.56. Total paid Alton Press, \$23.74.

Express on prizes, Winnipeg to the Beach, \$2.45.

The committee also absorbed 10 cents on every meal given the paddlers of the Winnipeg Canoe Club by Moonlight Inn, to keep the price down to the Canoe Club to 40 cents a meal, which amounted to \$7.50. This makes a total of \$127.89, for which the committee has all the vouchers.


