TENNIS COURTS COMPLETED

The new tennis courts, which have been in the making
for the past three months, and it has been a job to try one's
patience, will be ready for inspection this week-end. Some
of the city champions in tennis are expected down and the

There are three courts of standard size, capable of hav-
ing official championship matches played on them. Getting
the right level was the hard part of the work. After
watering or after rolling the ground would have to be built
up here and there. It will probably be two years before it
is real hard, but then it will be as good as any in Canada.
The courts will have their own watering system, with a
new high pressure tank close by, and the stream which
can be shot across the courts will be adequate. The
manager of the Company, Mr. Frank E. Sprague, who
supervised the laying out of the courts from the beginning,
has been very exacting, and the workmen have had to go
over and over the work until it was perfect with the instru-

ARRANGEMENTS FOR CITY BREAD
 The problem of an adequate fresh bread supply at a summer resort located some distance from a large home centre, is always one which requires careful handling. The Victoria Beach Company fourteen years ago recognized that in preparing for a resort which would some day have a summer population of thousands, it was necessary to make adequate arrangements daily for a bread supply; and so the then president of the Company, Mr. C. W. N. Kennedy did so, and did it well. He established a bakery at Victoria Beach for the exclusive patronage of Victoria Beach residents. It represents an investment of \$7,000. The president was taking no chances of a shortage of bread as had been experienced before the beach bakery was built. So the present bakery has served well this beach.
 There are, however, city residents who are cottage owners at the Beach, who desire to keep on with the bread which is served to them by the large bakeries in the city. The Victoria Beach Company has therefore arranged with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Thoms, lessees of the bakery at Victoria Beach, to carry fifty loaves of Canada Bread on their counter from day to day to meet this demand, which has been rather persistent from a few of the cottage owners. The Winnipeg bakeries do not desire to ship down supplies of their bread to their city customers living at Victoria Beach if they can possibly avoid it. They have been doing so solely with the object of retaining their business in Winnipeg when the summer season is over and have lost money on the shipments. The arrangement made by the Victoria Beach Company is very satisfactory to the large bakeries.
 It is now hoped that any one who orders Canada Bread will call for it regularly and thus avoid loss to Mr. and Mrs. Thoms. It will be sold at the same price as the beach-made bread, seven cents a loaf.
