## A Question that Never Disappears

**T**HE welfare of the children is always a first charge on the cottage residents of Victoria Beach.

As has been said so often and is emphasized so many times this is a "children's beach" and their guidance and protection comes first when beach polkies come up for review and decision.

These remarks are again necessary when the question of the entrance of the auto is pressed on the attention of the authorities. There is never a week goes by but residents who have children and own autos in the city, do not say to the editor of this paper: "How can I get my auto down to the beach?"

What is prompting this movement with ever increasing force? These questioners are men and women who have lived for many seasons at Victoria Beach. They have brought up their children here in comfort, health and under protection against the fast-moving auto.

"I would like to bring my car in from Winnipeg," they remark, "and run up to my cottage and leave it there until I return to Winnipeg. Remember I would not like to make the trip very often in the season but just occasionally," they declare.

Well, there is no road into Victoria Beach at the present time. The one across the swamp back of the lagoon is under water. That road runs across the Victoria Beach company's property and is a private road. It is not on the map.

All the avenues, roads and streets which cross and re-cross the island on which this beach is located run into water: Traverse Bay, Lake Winnipeg, or the lagoon and bay on which the old air station fronts.

Special legislation will have to be secured to enable a road to be built into Victoria Beach. Year by year as the roads leading from the city towards this beach are improved for the settlers they are made more accessible for motoring, and it will be only a short while before the question will be pushed right up to voters of this municipality. The whole subject is one for serious thought and wise judgment, taking into consideration many interests and viewing it from many angles. The Victoria Beach club has discussed the outlook a number of times and are watching carefully any development which might affect detrimentally this beach and the owners of property and cottages.

In the meantime revert to the children. There is the masquerade one week from tonight at which there is always a large turnout of children in fancy costume. They invite your inspection. It is a duty you owe to the mothers and the youngsters to see the designs and spirit of the beach costumes. Make it a point to attend.

Then one week later we have the Patricia Beach sports for the Kiddies in the morning and the swimming and diving events at the pier. It is good to encourage the young in these accomplishments. There is always a financial responsibility which the committee of the club has to carry and when asked for donations kindly be as liberal as you can.

### "Hard Times" Masquerade Dance, July 23

There are two events in each July which the residents of Victoria Beach never lose track of, and that is the annual masquerade in the Club house, and the annual water sports, beside sands of Patricia Beach, and off the dock. This year these events are earlier than usual. The masquerade is on July 23, and sports July 30. Already scores of youngsters and young folks are looking forward and preparing to do their share to make the events big successes.

This year the club has decided to have a "Hard Times" Masquerade dance, with allowances for pretty costumes on the part of the children, as well as the "hard time" feature. There are no hard times at Victoria Beach. Old Man Depression did not pay this beach a visit. Stores are prospering too; cottages are well occupied and the railway reports the usual high class business. But a change was decided on this year. So here you have the Hard Times Masquerade for July 23!

Costumes typical of the beach will also be accepted by the committee. Mrs. C. B. Barrager has been asked to supervise the sale of tickets by the children, adults 50 cents; children 25 cents, with a 10 per cent commission for the children who make sales. Many prizes will be awarded.

### CHURCH GENEROUS TO CLUB FUNDS

Probably no paragraph appearing in this weekly journal has created so much agitation among the church executive as the one in last week's issue. It was a typographical error, the printer in resetting a line omitted the figure "2", making the amount \$10 in place of the original \$120. The fact is the church is a generous contributor to the club funds. The church pays \$120 a year for the use of the hall for its Sunday morning service and the use of the piano; besides they pay \$25 towards the caretaking of the building, a total of \$145. **CONFIDENCE**  
By R. C. LLOYD  
At various times in writing on the interesting subject of swimming and life saving, I have particularly stressed the fact that by following certain simple principles, moderate swimmers or even non-swimmers may keep afloat. It suddenly they find themselves in deep water. Some of these articles were addressed in particular to school teachers, who in turn had large numbers of children within their control, and I think that I might fittingly quote from the August number of "The Swimmer", the official organ of the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association, to make my point.  
"Tell the children"—I said—"If suddenly tipped out of a boat, or in any way getting into deep water, and being unable to swim, or only moderately, not to throw up their hands and shout for help; because that action will automatically sink the body, and will waste the valuable life-giving air in the lungs.  
"Instruct the children to keep their hands and arms below the surface, moving the hands slowly in the manner of paddling; and at the same time work their legs in a slow paddling motion as though they were riding a bicycle. Combined with this, they should blow out the air rather forcibly, but not too fast, and take in periodical gulps of air through a partially open mouth.  
"Impress on the children the importance of these simple principles: IF THEY WILL CARRY THEM OUT, THEY WILL NOT SINK; they will actually be doing what is known technically as "treading water." Even a non-swimmer could do this, if he would concentrate on the first clause: "Don't set on impulse and throw your hands up out of the water as you reach the surface after the immersion, and don't shout for help"; it is only wasted and useless effort, and will surely be your undoing!"  
**LEARN TO TREAD WATER!** Do not wait for the tip from a boat or a slip on the pier to try out the above mentioned precepts. Get right busy and learn now! It will positively be a wonderful help to you in gaining CONFIDENCE in the water, and will tend to show you how simple it is to gain a mastery over the dreaded depths.

wave joyfully and smile up at the long line of coaches, and we wave and smile back—"One touch of nature makes the whole world kin." We catch glimpses of the Red River, shining silver beneath the azure sky. On, on thro' ploughed rich-soiled fields, and woods alive with migrant birds, cattle live in the grass and roosters crow triumphantly. At length the first stretches of the lake break on our longing eyes. The water is deep blue as the heaven above; far, far out the ice lies, awaiting a strong south wind to break it up. Now the train arrives and all the happy campers hurry out, eager to give good-bay to the store-holders who are time-old friends, and then to be off to open their camps, and live the simple life.

Once more the shining stretches of the lake lie before us. Close in to shore, cleanly mirrored in the deep blue of the water, wild ducks are floating in peace, or flying over the surface, quack-quacking as they stretch out their long slender necks and flap their heavy wings. Divers call to each other with soft notes and disappear and reappear with mangle swiftness. Loons fly by and call to each other and laugh and laugh.—Far away on the ice-floes wild geese honk. A corvid barks.—Crows caw, silhouetted black against the azure sky. In the undergrowth chipmunks triak and run to eat out of our hands. Many white-throated sparrows are scratching among the leaves. A white-breasted nut-batch runs up and down the silver-birch trees, and fills the air with his tiny plaintive note. Flickers are hammering busily on the dead tree-trunks; bitterns fly by, on their way to the marsh; bumblebees buzz about.—The woods and lake seem teeming with life; glad are we to be once again at the beach. In our garden, pansies are in full bloom. Around us the dead are full of colour, red of young willows, green of spruce and yellow of sallows. Spring is here once more, and the air is full of bird-notes. And to crown all our joy, our two baby pet crows of last summer have returned to us and sit above the cottage on the low tree-branches, or solemnly parade our paths. The hot sun sinks earthwards. Reluctantly we close camp, but not sorrowfully for summer is at hand and so are the simple inexpensive joys of life lived close to nature, that give health and happiness and leave sweet memories.
