## Final of this Season's "Herald"

**H**IS is the last issue of the Victoria Beach Herald for the season of 1933. The Herald was issued early in June this year so as to catch the eye of the Winnipeg public and direct their attention to Victoria Beach as their summer home, and this early issue brings the ten numbers to a close this week-end.

At no period has Victoria Beach been so much in the public eye as in the present year. The policy of the community in respect to the auto traffic has been heartily endorsed by all who have been down this season; and the desire to keep this Beach free from undesirable visitations, which have ruined other Beaches on Lake Winnipeg, may have hurt the pride of a certain race, but it has been adjudged to be the only course to pursue if this Beach is to be preserved in its high character and limited exclusiveness.

For a number of weeks this year every cottage was occupied at Victoria Beach, while at other beaches and resorts there were hundreds of vacant summer homes. The result of the community's stand thus speaks louder than words.

We congratulate the stores on their fair-minded and far-seeing policy of maintaining prices at the

lowest possible figure to meet the "shopping" tendencies of the majority of Winnipeg householders today. Only by so doing can they retain the trade of the community.

The municipal officers have attended to their business in an efficient manner; the Victoria Beach Company has "hewed to the line, let the chips fall where they may"; and thereby has won the respect and confidence of the public. The golf course and the tennis courts have been worthily patronized, a splendid endorsement of the management's desire to entertain in a big way residents and their visitors.

The Community Club has continued to serve the people well and will have in hand some knotty problems this winter. We wish them every success.

The Community Church has given good measure at the services each Sunday; and the large attendance from Sunday to Sunday shows that they are filling a need that is appreciated.

I agree with you there, but on information received from other beaches, I find out they also keep their bands down over the week-ends and their price is much cheaper. I would suggest lowering the price to 25c or 35c. I have spoken to many people down here and they all said they would attend if the price was 25 cents.

The second, but not so important a reason, is the music. The orchestra is fair, but for the price of admission I think it is only reasonable that we have a bigger and better orchestra. Although the club house is not really for dancing, we will not kick about the floor.

The second suggestion I would make is to try and have an orchestra composed of residents of the Beach. I don't play myself, but feel a suitable band could be obtained within the Beach. I hope my suggestion will be a help to you.

The proposal to secure an orchestra from Beach residents has been tried again and again in past years without success. Every orchestra in Winnipeg in this season working and an orchestra is hard to obtain for Victoria Beach.

**OXFORD GROUP SPEAKERS AT CLUB HOUSE**

To many it was an unusual experience last Sunday morning to be silent participants at an Oxford Group service. Every seat in the clubhouse was occupied when the leaders appeared on the platform. It was described by the opening speaker as an "amateur" church service, none of these taking part ever having conducted a church service before.

Mr. Aidan H. Conklin, president of the club, presided, and carried out the devotional exercises, which preceded the address of Miss Mildred McMurray, who described with clearness and in an effective manner her experiences at the Oxford Group house party at Quebec last June. Her own part at the gathering displayed nothing of the sensational, but she had heard the stories of men and women who had drunk to the dregs in sin and had recovered their equilibrium through the influence of the Oxford Group work. Miss McMurray spoke on the cardinal points of the movement: Absolute honesty, absolute purity, absolute unselfishness and absolute love; stating many did not know they did not possess these virtues until they went through a rigid self-examination; then the truth came to them with force and understanding. It was not easy at first to "share" with others, but once a man or woman came out in the open and got in contact with God, a heavy burden was lifted and life became more cheerful and brighter.

There was nothing new to Christians in the Oxford Group movement, the speaker said; it was only in its application to everyday life, and the changed outlook it gave that it bore testimony to its value. Miss McMurray was listened to with the closest attention, and being an easy and a fluent speaker, one of the outstanding women on the platform in Winnipeg, she was able to carry conviction to many.

Later on in the afternoon in the club house there was a public gathering, quite a number attending and conversing with some of the younger leaders for one hour and a half—a most interesting session to many.

The company's manager is considering the erection next year of a boat house, to be placed near the government pier below the bank, and which will accommodate twelve canoes or small boats.
