Convenience at Mail Time

An annex to the North side of Mr. G. B. Barager's store will be appreciated by patrons of the post office, for that is where the residents of Victoria Beach will receive their mail matter this summer. A wicket has been placed on that side of the building for the purpose. The annex is screened in and has an entrance and an exit door to facilitate passage out of the place once mail is received. A table, chairs, pens and ink will be in the centre where post cards may be addressed. The crowding in the store will thus be avoided.

Better Mail Service Starts

Official announcement of the fast summer mail service to Victoria Beach from Winnipeg, and from Victoria Beach to Winnipeg for this season, promised by the post office department when a delegation of the Victoria Beach Club waited on Mr. W. F. Lough, district director of postal service Winnipeg, last winter, was given out this week. In past seasons mail went in on the mixed train and came out the same way, taking almost eight hours on the journey. This is changed to a two and a half hour service going and coming. Starting Monday, July 1, the mail leaves Winnipeg on the 9.30 a.m. every morning except Sundays, and arrives at Victoria Beach at 11.55 a.m., and should be distributed by 12.30 noon at the post office located in G. B. Barager's store. Leaving for Winnipeg on the 7 p.m. train every evening, except Fridays, when it leaves on the 9.20 the "Moonlight" mail is in Winnipeg at 9.50 p.m. each night except Fridays when it arrives at 12.10 midnight. This should allow for early distribution the next morning in Winnipeg.
