## With Palliser, Lake Winnipeg, 1857

THE MIDDLE of the nineteenth century saw considerable interest in Great Britain concerning that part of British North America lying west of the Great Lakes. The fierce struggle between the Hudson's Bay Company and the North West Company, culminating in the bloody fray at Seven Oaks in 1816, caused the British Government to intervene and bring about union in 1821. In 1841 Sir George Simpson, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, began a two years' trip around the world, an account of which was published in two volumes. Young men from the Red River colony were going over to study in Edinburgh, London and Paris. In 1846 the threat of war over the Oregon boundary led to the 6th (Warwick's) Regiment being sent to the Red River via Hudson Bay. Three years later the first Anglican bishop of the Red River, David Anderson, came over, and on the same ship was a young Glasgow physician, William Cowan, destined to become a leading figure in the little colony on the Red River.

This interest in British North America led to a sum of £5,000 being voted in the British House of Commons to cover the cost of an expedition to discover the possibilities of that vast, and then largely unknown, region. The leader of the expedition was Captain John Palliser M.P., (1870-1887) of Waterford, Ireland, and so chosen because in 1847 he had undertaken a hunting expedition among the North American Indians, his experiences being published in 1853 under the title, "Adventures of a Hunter in the Prairies." With him as surgeon, geologist, naturalist and cartographer was Dr. James Hector who is said to have discovered the Kicking Horse Pass in the Rockies. A monument to him may be seen at the Great Divide on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. By reason of his professional skill, tact, hardihood and understanding Dr. Hector won much respect from the warlike Blackfeet and throughout he appears to have been the most valuable man on the expedition, not even excepting the leader. The report of Captain Palliser, after whom the Canadian Pacific hotel at Calgary is named, was printed by H. M. Government and a copy of "The Journals Detailed Reports and Observations Relative to Captain Palliser's Exploration of a Portion of British North America" may be seen in the Provincial Library.

The Palliser party entered this country by the fur traders' route from Lake Superior. On July 4 1857 the party was crossing the Lake of the Woods and on July 8 had reached the mouth of the Winnipeg River. The hand of Dr. Hector, who was both physician and geologist, may be detected in both extracts:

"July 4, 1857. We were off at sunrise and

steered for a narrow strait by means of which, with a small portage across a narrow neck of land, we cut off a large headland which projects from the eastern shore. In this place we landed for breakfast at a place where the shore is composed of high shelving rock, on which are to be seen both the effects of the lake ice and also of true glacial markings."

"July 8—Wednesday: At 6.15 p.m. we arrived at Fort Alexander which stands on the left bank of the river Winnipeg, about a mile and a half from its mouth. It is built of wood and situated on a fine fertile flat, elevated 40 feet above the river, and a wooden pier is built out into the water for loading and discharging the boats. Here Dr. Hector found a great many patients, all suffering more or less from symptoms of intestinal worms caused by exclusive fish diet. The cat-fish (*Silurus felis*) is plentiful here, the liver of which abounds with an oil which might be successfully substituted for cod-liver oil in the treatment of consumption cases which are very frequent among the half-breed population."

## Forced Landing From Cloudland

IT was one of those glorious mornings globe-trotters rave about. But then all mornings are like that at 14,000 feet, with sun shining brightly on large fluffy clouds spotting the land with shadows, just the sort of day to make one poetical. It would have done that to me if such were possible without the aid of surgery. As next best thing, I tried to recall some of the poems of school days that would fit the occasion, only nothing but the parodies would come to mind. It is possible that I had devoted more study to the latter. Finally, I remembered a few lines of that little rhyme called "Pippa Passes," written possibly by Bernard Shaw or Will Rogers. Musing on, I got to analyzing it, "Pippa", odd word that, couldn't agree as to whether it was a girl's name or a disease. Anyhow, it was no use getting the old brain all fevered up, so I gave up the struggle to lapse back and enjoy the thrill of soaring through the upper air at 14,000 feet. Not being the pilot, as you may have guessed, I was happy to be going places and not having to do things.

How long this blissful coma lasted I have no idea, but suddenly I came to with rather an unpleasant jerk to realize that those pretty white clouds had degenerated into a beastly wet blanket which completely hid the earth in all directions as far as the eye could see. We headed down to push our way through the stuff. As we got closer it made me think of standing again on the bank of the old swimming hole in late September, shivering and hoping vainly that the water would not be cold. Suddenly we plunged in. Nothing to see anywhere but the swirling vapor. It seemed frightfully lonesome and eerie—just like going down cellar in the dead of night, barefooted, and expecting every second to step on the cat.

Before taking off that morning, it was a toss-up as to whether I should wear my overcoat or the parachute, and being chilly at the time I decided on the coat. Now, however, I began to think that my decision had been a trifle hasty. The longer I thought the more certain I became that the parachute would be more comfortable.
