Longer School Holidays

VICTORIA BEACH is gay and bright this month already with the presence of happy children. What a regretful fact it is that they were not able to spend the month of June at this Beach instead of listless hours in school.

Why should not the children of Winnipeg spend more of their life in the open in the summer? Why should there not be less holidays at Christmas and Easter and two and a half months, if not three months in the summer, from early in June until the first week in September? That is how schools are regulated in Illinois, in the states of Washington and Oregon and in many other states as well. The solution is therefore up to the Manitoba government. Revert to the old system of giving schools yearly, and not daily grants, and school will be closed earlier in the summer and opened later in the autumn as they were in the old days. No old time board thought it wise to keep school in right up to Dominion Day and to open the doors of schools before Labor Day had passed. Longer holidays in the summer would result in better health among the school children of this province; it would relieve the mothers of many hard tasks which always continue while the children are at school. The washing would be less and the cost of clothing would be reduced, for shorts and overalls would be worn. But school children must be dressed up.

So if the mothers and fathers desire healthier children they should elect men and women to the School Board and to the legislature to carry out more modern methods of regulating school days.

Held within doors for so many months owing to the cold weather, when the warm days of Manitoba's short summer comes, why not let the children get away from their studies earlier in the summer? The School Board of Winnipeg takes every day it can away from holidays so that the funds in their treasury may swell, for every extra day schools of Greater Winnipeg remain open the greater is the grant from the Manitoba government to the School Boards of Winnipeg and District.

Ample Street Cars

Adequate street railway service is given each day around train times for the Lake Winnipeg benches for all trains leaving the C.N.R. depot, when train time approaches, and there is no necessity of taking taxis as the street cars are ample and always get their patrons to the depot in time to catch the outgoing service.

By-Laws Must Be Respected

Horses were running loose around the cottage district of Victoria Beach last weekend and on one occasion came thundering down Arthur Road, in a wild gallop, which would certainly have meant death for any children in their path. Hundreds of dollars' damage have already been done to cottage grounds.

There is a by-law on the records of the municipality, placed there last August, which calls for all horses and cattle to be off the streets of this municipality by May 1, and there are penalties attached for infractions.

All through May and June no attention was paid to this by-law by certain residents of this beach. They opened the doors of their stable and chased the animals into the cottage district there to annoy, damage and infest the pathways and roads at their will.

The municipal authorities although aware of this violation of the restricted area and although a pound was erected with a purpose in view did nothing. There was no law on the side of the cottage owner. The council was inactive and the cottages and grounds suffered.

Before the night train left for Winnipeg Sunday the representative of the Herald, on the platform was informed by a member of one of the all the year round families:

"You are putting too much junk in the Herald about speeding autos and animals running loose. You had better lay off."

The municipality is inactive; the police are inactive and so forsooth, the Herald must also "lay off!"

Laws on statute books to be ignored; police not to interfere with law-breakers, and a padlocked press. All very fine! But too one-sided. Where do nine-tenths of the tax payers come in? Are they to stand continually holding the bag?

We support the school, we give much business to the all-year-round residents; yet some of the residents (not all) flaunt their acts in the faces of cottage owners. If the

Municipality with all the authority of Manitoba behind it will do nothing, and the police stand by and watch law-breakers work their own free will, what can the press do? Just one thing, get the Royal Mounted Police of Manitoba placed in supreme authority at Victoria Beach. Let the attorney-general of Manitoba be informed of all the facts.

The Herald does not take the implied threat made to its representative lightly. We cottage owners are down at Victoria Beach at most, three and a half months of the year. Our interests are at the mercy of any one who might desire to take revenge at any restriction imposed. That law and order must register at Victoria Beach as it does in other Municipalities; life and limb must be safe-guarded; the by-laws on the records of the municipality must be observed or these should come off.

Last Saturday some young people broke a number of panes of glass in the Victoria Beach clubhouse, after wrenching off the outside screening protecting the windows; and unfastening the windows, thus obtaining illegal entrance to a community owned building. Do these invaders realize how severe is the penalty attached to such an act? Do they ever think of the consequence of their act if the club should take the necessary steps to protect its valuable property? When the sergeant of the Manitoba Mounted Police was informed of this wilful damage in the clubhouse he said: "Why did you not send for us. That's what we are here for. We would soon get the guilty ones."

Last Saturday night certain people drove in from outside this municipality and joined certain beach residents and held high revelry all night, disturbing the night rest of cottage residents. One of the councillors of this municipality said to the Herald: "These wild parties kept me awake all night."

Such doings should not be allowed. Someone is falling down on their job. This Beach is known and has enjoyed the reputation as one place where tired city dwellers can come down to and have rest and quiet and safety from marauders.

The Herald believes that all the acts mentioned, serious as they are, can be corrected and should be early in the season so that the summer will be a peaceful one to all residents. We should start at once to secure this benefit.

There is an election for two councillors in a few days. The prospective candidates should be asked: "Where do you stand in maintaining a law-abiding and peaceful Victoria Beach? Surely this district can get men who will stand up for the rights of the summer residents."

There is no reason why all classes of residents at Victoria Beach should not co-operate towards the desired end. And critics of law-breakers should not be told to "lay off that junk!"

A Trip to Gimli

A SHRILL whistle resounding across the water early Saturday evening, June 17th, announced the arrival of the trim and staunch boat J. H. Montgomery; and the ever popular evening walk to the pier for a number of Beach residents was made more interesting by its arrival.

More interesting still, however, to a few of the residents was its departure at 1:20 p.m. Sunday for a run to Gimli. This trip was planned somewhat hurriedly, following a conversation Mr. Burager had with the Captain, and it was unfortunate that many who would liked to have taken advantage of such trip did not know in time. Capt. Stevens hopes, however, to be at the Beach again in the near future and will give the residents another opportunity for a day's outing on the lake, so watch for the arrival of the J. H. Montgomery. Those who took the trip this week can highly recommend the Captain, the boat and the crew of seven.

Capt. Stevens has sailed Lake Winnipeg for 33 years, starting as a lad of 13 years, so he is very familiar with the lake in all its moods.

The boat left the pier at 1:20 p.m. and five minutes later the Captain had set his course and we were gliding along past the heavily wooded shores and sandy beaches of Hillside and Belair, just Ironwood point, on beyond Grand Beach and out into the open lake where a good breeze was blowing, but the staunch ship rode along with very little perceptible motion.

On board were Mr. and Mrs. Alex Flett and Lucille, Kay Spence, Mrs. English, Peggy Duffy, Dorothy Thomas, Mr. Burager, Miss Louise Strath, Mrs. W. A. Strath and the bride and groom. Mr. and Mrs. Schaumlössel, who are honeymooning at Victoria Beach.

Some of the passengers aboard had heard of the trip but a few minutes before leaving so had no time to have lunch or bring one along. Mr. Burager came to the rescue, he having very thoughtfully brought along a very large bag filled with bananas, which he passed around.

As we neared Gimli dark clouds gathered and it looked as if we would run into a storm, but the clouds passed before we reached the dock, where a large number of the residents had gathered to welcome the boat which docked at 3:35 p.m.

About two hours were spent at Gimli, some of the passengers motoring out to Camp Marion.
