Move Against Vandalism

ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS REWARD is offered by the municipality of Victoria Beach for evidence that will lead to the conviction of the vandals who have been damaging, willfully, the Victoria Beach clubhouse and who are also responsible for other damage experienced by cottage residents.

It should not be difficult to secure this evidence. The gangs move in small groups. They wrenched off the outside screening of the clubhouse, then smashed the window panes, unlatched the window and scrambled in. They used the verandah as a dressing room for discarding clothes and putting on bathing suits; they entered the clubhouse after the regular dance was over and used the place for frolicking around. They wrenched the door off the locker where the church hymnbooks are stored, breaking the padlock off and prying off the hinges; for no real purpose except to scatter the contents around. It has been necessary to nail fast some of the windows, thus preventing their use for opening to let in cool air. They climbed the side of the clubhouse to the transom windows, wrenched the screens off, broke open the window and climbed down the rafters to the dancing floor. Everywhere these vandals went they did much damage.

One dozen records brought down to the clubhouse last season, disappeared in two weeks. Thieving is rampant in the clubhouse after the building is closed.

These culprits should be punished and, if it is at all possible, it will be done as an example to others.

The damage to cottages and grounds should not go unpunished. The running of cattle and horses wild about the Beach contrary to the By-laws of the municipality, should also be attended to without delay. Fences are broken down by the animals in an effort to get at lawns. Beds of flowers are damaged so that they cannot be again planted for the season. The desire of cottage owners to keep their premises clean and attractive in many instances has been frustrated. These herds of cattle and bands of horses are growing larger every season; and soon there will not be room in the Victoria Beach area for cottages and roving animals.

Along Sunset Boulevard valuable plants have been dug up by garden robbers. Only the vacant

space is left for the cottage owner to gaze at when he comes down in the Spring. It should be easy to trace who these are and it will be done before the summer ends. Valuable plants are too sore a loss each year for cottage owners to stand idly by and take it.

Bright and Cheery Clubhouse

The Victoria Beach clubhouse deserves a boost and so do the club secretary-manager, Hugh Johnston, and his assistants for having the interior of the clubhouse ready for the season's opening, last Saturday night. It was a big undertaking and was a good job when completed, so that members and guests Saturday night were warm in their praise at the improvements. The interior was brilliantly lighted from the C.N.R. Plant and steps are being taken to continue the lighting on to the verandah and as far as the roadway in front of the clubhouse.

The club is looking forward to an entertaining season and all through the week the clubhouse will be open and music will be provided until 11:00 o'clock. What might be done with the clubhouse Sunday evenings is open for suggestions.

Camp Life and The Great Outdoor

The summer at Victoria Beach for the young—it's too bad there aren't camps for the old—has become such a well established institution that it has as much of a place in the routine of Manitoba life as the school in winter.

There is a difference, however, between a modern cottage life like that at Victoria Beach and the one without any environment but nature. If the boys want to go away on a few days camping certain rules should be observed.

As to the question whether it is "good" for the children, I don't think there can be any doubt about that. After all, we were not designed to live in houses. It was only after we got hairless and weak and lost all our natural protections that we sought shelter indoors. I agree that our superior mentality and ingenuity in designing protection and heat, and the other appurtenances of indoors, have added to the length of human life and that we have better health and more comfort, especially in the feet, than the naked savage in the woods. The legend of the health of the primitive brute is very easy to explode.

But a stretch of outdoor life in the summer is swell for anybody's health—mental, moral and physical. There is no country in the world so favored as Manitoba for this sort of life. European countries are cold and rainy in the summer or overcrowded, so that it is next to impossible to find a camping site. We have limitless woods galore, lush with natural beauty.

In sending boys and girls to camp I advise the same preliminary precautions as when they are going to school. Each one should be vaccinated against diphtheria, typhoid fever and smallpox. In camp typhoid fever is the most important because, although camp directors are very careful about their water and milk supply, slip-ups will occur, and individual phylaxis is the safest way.

The beginner in camp will learn not only a great deal of woods lore but also hygienic lore—first aid, emergency treatment, artificial respiration.

We just had an example of the proficiency of the Boy Scout's training when in my own city several persons were struck by lightning on a golf course. Boy Scouts were in the crowd and immediately began carrying out artificial respiration by the approved prone pressure method. One man's life was undoubtedly saved by their knowledge and promptness.

Probably the best all round exercise for all parts of the body is swimming, and all camps make a specialty of that. There is no better appetizer than open air, no better cure for insomnia than sleeping under the stars. Young people need neither appetizer nor hypnotic, fortunately, but for their elders who are troubled that way, I recommend two weeks in the woods.

Our Problems as a Beach

The Editor of the Herald is besieged with requests to "go after" many problems. But after all the Herald must be a builder up and see if certain advantages cannot be secured without using strong arm methods. Telephone requests come in daily asking if the Herald had seen something which would be better articulated.

With a municipality not yet getting its bearings after the court decided the municipality did not own the roads, the councillors are facing a difficult problem and probably they are making the most of it. The Herald believes the taxes on cottages are too high. The Herald may be wrong; but we would like to have a copy of the municipality's financial statement to clear up a certain mystery; has the municipality been piling up a reserve, and for what purposes? Are salaries paid out of proportion to the work done? The school costs a lot of money to maintain and is growing in number of pupils. The municipal tax levy never gets any smaller. The Herald believes the municipality is well served by the present officers and council. The Herald desires to see whole-hearted co-operation on the part of everyone to maintain this Beach up to the standards of the past. Victoria Beach enjoys an enviable reputation among municipalities of its class and someone should get credit for it. Perhaps all organizations deserve some credit for the part they have played. Victoria Beach is hefty with organizations but all have proved they have a niche to fill when it comes down to placing all the cards on the table. Asked the question: What have you done? All could give an accounting of the talents they have; none have buried any in the ground. But Victoria Beach must have co-operation from everyone. The Herald's columns are open for the insertion of the financial statement. It is also open for a statement from Victor L. Scott, the mayor of this Beach. He should make it clear that the council meetings are open at all times to the public; and he should name the place where any taxpayer can telephone to find out when the next meeting is to be held. The Herald helped to elect the present council and we feel sure they are worthy of the trust placed in them, but as intimated a word from Mr. Scott would help.

Nominations for two vacant seats in the municipal council of Victoria Beach will be held Tuesday at the noon hour in the clubhouse. The retiring councillors are Mr. Beach and Mr. Campbell G. Grant. They will probably be re-elected for two years. Mr. F. C. O'Brien will attend to receive nominations.


