WE are quite proud, among other things, of the attention the girls and boys of Victoria Beach give to their appearance during the course of the summer. Said a Winnipeg visitor making his first visit last week-end: "I can realize why the campers of Victoria Beach take a pride in their place. I noticed it from the time I stepped off the train that this beach is different, for all in the platform crowd wore apparel that did not in any way offend the good sense and refined mind of anyone." So whether the girls and the boys dress in shorts or slacks, it is well to see that these are neat and dressy. It adds so much to the standard everyone tries to attain at Victoria Beach. "I did not see any untidy overalls or skimpy covering on the girls and young women, which is so common at other beaches in Manitoba," this visitor continued, "and I think you must have a very fine community."

To the Editor,
Victoria Beach Herald.

Some discussion has been created by the article which appeared in your paper recently in which it was stated that because the roads had been turned over to the Municipality, the Council could not prohibit motor cars from coming into the Beach, and perhaps due to this article, several Winnipeg cars came into the Beach during the past week-end, and were requested to leave. I would be glad if you will publish the actual facts, which are as follows:

"While the Roads were held by the Victoria Beach Company the Council felt they could not legally enforce any by-law permitted in the Act which was assented to and came into force on April 7th, 1933.

"As the Roads and Lanes have now been turned over to the Municipality, the Council are in a legal position, and intend to enforce the by-laws—the Act reads as follows:

"Assented to April 7, 1933
HIS MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba, enact as follows:

1. Notwithstanding the provisions of "The Highway Traffic Act", the rural municipality of Victoria Beach may pass, enforce and maintain a by-law or by-laws forbidding the use by motor vehicles of any highway, street, road or

boulevard within its limits, or restricting the use thereof to motor vehicles operated by or for permanent residents of the municipality or by other persons operating such motor vehicles for the purpose of carrying on business within the municipality.

2. This Act shall come into force on the date it is assented to."

From the above, you can see that the Municipality not only has the right to enforce and maintain a by-law forbidding the use of motor vehicles on the Roads, but they have the right to restrict the use of motor vehicles operated by anyone for business purposes within the confines of the Municipality.

The seventeenth annual Victoria Beach water sports were successfully held last Saturday. Perfect weather contributed the enjoyment of the competitors, officials and spectators. There was some little confusion on account of the forest fire which started just before the sports commenced. A group of young men, who were on their way to compete in the swimming and diving events were hurriedly asked to assist in fighting the fire, and were told the sports would be postponed; but the officials were not consulted and, in fact, were so busy getting the sports under way, that they did not even notice the fire, it being in the direction of the station and appearing just like an unusual amount of smoke from a locomotive to people with their minds on something else.

When it was brought to the attention of the officials that competitors were assisting at the fire, which was then under control, the program was re-arranged to give those competitors an opportunity to have a rest and then take part. One of them was Bill Gray, who won the grand aggregate trophy.
