Happy and Joyous Season Opens at Victoria Beach

The superintendent of the Beach, Mr. Mattison, has had some difficulty in adjusting the new Diesel engine at the pump house, and water was not turned on to cottages until last Friday, one week ago. However, Mr. Mattison filled the wells three weeks ago and there was plenty of water available there.

As a rule the information bureau at the Winnipeg depot, on the trains, is reliable. But its announcements last week that there would be no trains on the King's Birthday, Monday, June 9, was incorrect. The bureau gave out the word: "There will be no train to Victoria Beach on Monday." Yet a train went down in the morning and returned Monday evening. RAILWAY FARES

THE Victoria Beach Club has decided to take the necessary preliminary steps to bring the question of railway fares between Winnipeg and Victoria Beach and return before the Dominion Government's Transport Committee, which is the judicial body carrying on the work of the former railway commission. The railway committee of the club at an executive meeting of the club, held on June 17, was instructed to go ahead and see what should be done to bring the question before the highest tribunal in Canada on railway rates.

The decision was reached following a conference between the railway committee of the club and Mr. Osborne Scott, traffic passenger manager of the Canadian National Railways in which the matter of railway fares was gone over thoroughly. The letter sent to the railway before the visit to the chief official was made, appears in this issue. The community will therefore have a clear conception of the merits of the request made to the railway.

One of the main features of reduced fares that was impressed on Mr. Scott was the desirability of eliminating as far as possible the sale of "stubs". It was pointed out that the sale of "stubs" will go on as long as a saving of 75 cents can be made in a return fare to Winnipeg. If the saving could be reduced to 25 cents, the sale of "stubs" would cease, it is believed by the club. The company was more active last summer in stopping the sale of buying of "stubs" through its investigation department and a warning was handed out to all those rounded up. Still, such action by the railway creates an unfavorable feeling towards the railway, which the community wishes to avoid.

This community desires to work in harmony and co-operation with the Canadian National Railways and is trying to find a way whereby the railway fares controversy can be smoothed out.

At the conference Mr. Osborne Scott said he was definitely against a one way 75 cents' fare and would not recommend it. He said Victoria Beach was 72 miles from Winnipeg by rail and that is a considerable distance when a railway figures on a summer resort rate. Still the Moonlight trains carry passengers 60 miles for a 50 cents fare, it was pointed out, to attract business to these trains, and Victoria Beach community believes lower fares would increase the railway's revenue. Mr. Scott could not see where any reduction in the passenger tariff could be made to Victoria Beach at present, except he would recommend a fare of \$1.50 to Victoria Beach for Wednesday afternoons, returning on the 8 a.m. Thursday train, a rate that is now included in the C.P.R. tariff to the Lake Winnipeg beaches.

Mr. Scott said that summer resort railway fares were based on a Dominion-wide survey and there is a general basis set for arriving at the rate for each summer resort in Canada. The Canadian National railways could not change the summer resort fare tariff from Winnipeg without toppling over the whole structure.

And there you are—and that is as far as the delegation from the Victoria Beach club got; hence the decision to take another step forward. If anyone can suggest another practical course to take, let them come forward. The club will give it a hearty welcome.

Mr. Scott promised that now the regular schedule for the summer is in effect, the equipment on the trains will be improved.

This community has no misunderstandings with the Canadian National on any matters that might come up each season, except railway fares. This community believes lower fares would increase business for the railways; the passenger department is of the opinion it would not. There it stands. The community has halted auto traffic into this beach in the interests of the railway, and also in the best interest of Victoria Beach. This community, in every possible way, has tried to increase the business of the company in its operation to Victoria Beach. There is not the slightest ill-feeling expressed towards the railway or any of its officials; on the contrary the best of feeling prevails. But many people are prevented from visiting Victoria Beach more frequently because of the drawback in railway fares. If a couple wishes to spend a day or two at Victoria Beach it costs almost \$5.00 to do so, which is far too much for a short summer outing.

Special Childrens' Events

This summer the Victoria Beach Club is continuing the policy, begun last year, of providing a program of activities for the children. For children six to nine years of age, there will be morning meetings on the beaches, featuring stories, games, sing-songs, picnics and other amusements. For those in the ten to twelve age group, hikes and other events will be organized, and a circus staged by the boys and girls is planned for this month. A big masquerade party for all the boys and girls is to take place on Saturday, July 19th. Shirley Nicholson has again been engaged to take charge of the children's activities.

The first meeting for children six to nine years of age will be held at Patricia Beach on Wednesday, July 2nd, at 10 a.m. A similar meeting will take place at Alexandra Beach Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.
