We Should Guard and Cherish the Welfare of Victoria Beach

As the summers roll along and are placed on the eternal records, cottage residents are inclined to forget that here at Victoria Beach there is one of the greatest summer resorts in all Canada. Here is a great gift from Mother Nature's bounty. We know we have a cozy summer cottage, we are pleased to see our families enjoy themselves, we hurry out of the din of the city to spend a week-end with those near to us, but do any of us realize what a privilege it is to be here season after season?

At times there come voices from without to tell us what perhaps we many not even know. They awaken us to a proper understanding of our heritage.

A lady taking a vacation here said this week: "Do you people living at Victoria Beach know that in the entire Montreal district where I come from there is no summer resort as good as you have here and I have been at them all!"

A former resident of Victoria Beach, who now makes her home in Toronto, also said this week: "Do you know that in the entire summer home area of Toronto, there is not a beach which can compare with Victoria Beach. I live close to one of the greatest of the lake resorts. GUARD AND CHERISH WELFARE OF VICTORIA BEACH

an ideal place this is for children in the summer time!" one of the women exclaimed after a few days in residence here. All these unsolicited and freely offered words give us food for thought. How carefully we should guard and cherish this gem of beauty fringing the shores of Lake Winnipeg. This beach was set aside by the original owners for a great purpose. It has been guarded by written and unwritten laws. From time to time newcomers here have tried to break down these safeguards, which have done so much to retain this Beach for the families of western Canada. From time to time one hears the remark: "Its so quiet here, why don't you get in something to liven things up." But this livening up process is going on all the time in Winnipeg and other large centres. That's why Victoria Beach is different to other resorts. It is called a haven for comfort and rest.

What must we continue to guard?

The Highway Traffic Act must be enforced as it has been this summer. The council of the municipality did a splendid thing when they framed the act and they have been behind its enforcement 100 per cent. The representatives of the Mounted Police who have been looking after law and order here for the past two seasons, have never faltered when drawing attention to the meaning of the act to auto owners. The council and the police have worked together just as cottage owners would have it. The road being constructed from Albert Beach to Victoria Beach must also be carefully looked after and provisions of the Traffic act must be applied there also. The cottage owners do not want promiscuous traffic on the avenues of this beach and no encouragement should be given car owners from outside to use this beach for driving pleasures. The streets must continue to be safe for even the smallest child. Taxi-drivers who are already going at high speed should be restrained. There is too much "hurry, hurry" around train times on the part of some taxi-drivers.

It should be made clear to all auto drivers that the government was opposed to allowing any taxi-cabs to operate at Victoria Beach. The question was sent by the government to the municipal council and that body passed it on to the Victoria Beach Community club. The council was inclined to support the government's idea, but it was the Community Club which after consideration decided to ask that taxis be allowed this season at Victoria Beach. Had the Club opposed the suggestion and supported the government view, there probably would have been no taxis at Victoria Beach. So owners should appreciate this fact.

The by-laws of this municipality must be enforced. If drastic action is necessary such steps should be taken. Respect for law and order is slipping in the matter of the Pound by-law. If it

stretches at one place it might also break at another.

Our water system as far as it applies to fire protection should be carefully gone over by the council. The destruction of any part of the cottage area by fire would be a disaster felt by every owner of a cottage or a lot. We know that the council will give this matter their immediate attention. The Herald believes that every member of the council has only the welfare of Victoria Beach close to their thoughts. All through the year what is good for this Beach is wisely and carefully considered. Our finances are limited, it must be remembered, and the government of Manitoba watches carefully the expenditures of each municipality and it has no desire to see any part of the province go into debt when it cannot be afforded. There are so many province-wide welfare schemes which Victoria Beach along with other municipalities has to support, that taxpayers forget that taxes raised are not all spent right within Victoria Beach but are spread province-wide. But we must have adequate fire protection. Those who are calling on the municipal council to get busy and protect our properties from fire, should remember it is easier to say than it is to carry out. Fire protection is an expensive undertaking and requires consideration from many angles. We must go ahead within our means. Each one must watch for any careless act. Fires in stoves should only be kept going when there is someone around to watch them. Ashes must not be emptied when hot. The careless throwing away of a lighted match or cigarette should not be done.

The Beach should be kept clean from the point of sanitation. Sometimes residents are careless about such matters. It is most-important. The well system at Victoria Beach is in excellent condition and the engineer is carefully looking after it and the results are praised by the health department of the provincial government. The maintenance of a resident health officer is expensive but the council has always insisted that there should be a doctor at the Beach and all residents should appreciate that arrangement.

The Herald believes this Beach is well governed. We have capable and painstaking councillors and the mayor as the directing head has proved himself to be a very valuable member of the council. So we will continue to look to our council for leadership and help, confident it will be forthcoming in due time.

In the meantime each individual has his or her personal responsibility in the welfare of this Beach. Let us keep our own house in order and it will help materially in maintaining Victoria Beach as a blessing to many thousands.

Action is Needed For a New Dock

The Liberal party should look after their political fences at Victoria Beach. IN the newspapers and over the radio one hears comments that throughout the United States and in some few centres in Canada there are grumblers, men and women who complain that they have the money but they cannot get at the stores what they wish to buy. Some of them are outspoken against the government because the shelves in the stores are not well stocked or the counters filled with goods. These people never think why such a condition prevails.

All they feel is the money is in their pockets and they should be provided with all necessaries, war or no war.

To the credit of summer residents of Victoria Beach, no such conditions are apparent here. Talks with the merchants indicate that when wants cannot be filled, customers take it all in good part and walk away understanding well why the situation in the stores is as it is.

The Government of Canada must look ahead. In the civil service are men and women whose duty it is to plan for the future; to be ready to meet emergencies and to see first of all that the men in the armed forces have all their needs well looked after. This latter task is a tremendous one.

This is the critical year in the Great War for the Allied Nations. If the people of Canada do as their government bids them they will hasten the end of the war. Let all get behind the government and follow their instructions to the letter for the people of Canada will only be following the course pursued in the United States in the way of restricting supplies. The people of Britain find four years of war bearing heavily upon them.

The people of Canada are well provided for by their government compared to the people of the Mother Country. They are not complaining. Let everyone be all out for the fighting men. The government knows best what to do.

CHURCH SERVICES OF UNUSUAL INTEREST

Rev. J. S. Watson in a discourse last Sunday morning in the Clubhouse directed his hearers attention to the subject of "Friendship", so vitally needed among the United Nations during the war years. It was a strong appeal to his audience not to forget the value of friendship amid the temptations to drift away from such an attitude. It was worth thinking seriously about lest a greater disaster befall Canada. The Canadian people are being sorely tried but the speaker pointed out that guidance and strength could be found in the teachings and promises of the Christian faith. Miss Norrie Duthie, director of St. Giles Church Choir in Winnipeg,
